The First Nowell

SOLOIST: Catherine Rooney-Ward, Soprano

Canadian-British soprano, Catherine Rooney-Ward completed her studies in vocal performance at the Glenn Gould School of the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto and continued her studies with the English National Opera's "Opera Works" programme in 2011. A keen performer of Baroque repertoire, Catherine has performed the role of Sesto in Giulio Cesare (Opera in Concert/Aradia Ensemble), Armida in Rinaldo and the title role in Handel's Semele (Summer Opera Lyric Theatre). Other roles include Frasquita in Carmen (Co-Opera Co.), Annina in La Traviata (Opera York) and the title role in La Gran Vestale by Mercadante (Opera in Concert). Catherine recently moved to Shropshire where she lives with her husband Chris, daughters Olive and Florence and pug Thor.

MUSIC DIRECTOR: Michael Turner

From Birmingham, Michael Turner studied violin and viola, before settling on percussion as his main instrumental study. As a singer, he has been a member of the CBSO Chorus, along with a number of other choirs across the Midlands.

Michael has attended conducting courses with John Carewe and George Hurst and studied under Hilary Davan Wetton, with whom he settled on adopting the conducting technique favoured by Sir Adrian Boult.

A music graduate of Leicester University, Michael has conducted several amateur and professional ensembles and choirs including the Birmingham Singers, Proteus Chamber Orchestra, the More Singers, the Telford Orchestra, the Marches Choir and the Phoenix Singers. He made his professional debut with the Milton Keynes City Orchestra and has also worked with the Manchester Camerata. Michael has been Music Director of the Bloomsbury Chamber Orchestra since 1996, was Music Director of the Oswestry Sinfonia from 2014 - 2020 and became Music Director of the Stretton Choral Society in September 2021. He has been an ensemble conductor for Shropshire Music Service since 2016.

Michael has composed extensively, with works including a Horn Concerto, several orchestral and choral works, instrumental music and pieces for percussion and wind ensemble. He lives in South Shropshire with his wife. They have three sons.

Musical Notes

An introduction to tonight's concert from our Music Director, Michael Turner

Putting together a Christmas concert programme can prove auite challenge. Christmas in music seems to take two forms: significantly large Bach's **Christmas** pieces such as *Oratorio* or Handel's Messiah, or miniatures such as the magnificent repertoire of carols old and new that can be drawn upon.

It is for a concert like this evening's that Geoffrey Bush's pieces such as Christmas Cantata come into their own. This work, the most substantial piece on the programme but lasting around 30 minutes, was written in 1947 and sets a series of Christmas texts, many of which will be familiar. Similarly, Bush employs known melodies well associated with those texts (such as the Coventry Carol), often with slightly astringent harmonies to add a charming "newness" to them. As can be found in his extensive output of songs and opera, Bush is an effective writer for the voice (solo or choral) and here chooses to provide small-scale accompaniment in the form of a string orchestra and a single oboe.

Opening our concert is a reworking of a piece I wrote for Stretton Choral Society to mark the Coronation of King Charles III back in May 2023. Now retitled *For Christmas*, I've set texts from the Bible, where Mary is visited by the Angel to tell her of her impending childbirth, before a hymn-tune tells of the setting for the birth and, finally, the piece ends on a celebratory note marking the arrival of the newborn King, Jesus.

Between the two choral pieces in the first half comes a short *Suite for Strings* which I wrote some time back. There are three short movements: a *Prelude*, a *Dance* and a *Finale*.

Our second half is given over to a series of carols (including three which we would love you to join us in singing), two Christmas readings, and a short piece by Edward Elgar, *Christmas Greeting*, setting words written by his poet wife, Alice.

We all hope that you will enjoy our evening's music making and go on to have a splendid Christmas!

Joseph Horovitz's Captain Noah and his Floating Zoo is a reworking of the bible story using lyrics written by Michael Flanders (of Flanders & Swann fame).

George Shearing's Songs and Sonnets are jazz-inspired settings of familiar verses from Shakespeare.

Or you're put off because you've never had any formal choir training? These fun and more modern pieces could be the ideal opportunity to give it a try.
