Parich Council Meeting

Minutes of the Great Milton Parish Council meeting held at The Pavilion on Monday, 15th January 2024 at 7:30 pm. Present: Cllrs S Harrod (chair), B Fox (Vicechair), D Harms, S MacMahon, S Illingworth and Cllr G Heritage (SODC). In attendance: Chris Ashworth (Clerk) and 5 members of the public.

01/24 Apologies for absence

Apologies for absence were received from Cllrs P Allen and M Horsley and Cllr F Van Mierlo (OCC)

02/24 Variation of order of business

06/24 Planning application P23/S3048/FUL was spoken about after agenda item 12/24

03/24 Declarations of members' interest

No declarations of interest were received in matters on the Agenda.

04/24 Matters to report

The District Councillors' report was received and reviewed and is available on the Parish Council website. No report from OCC was received for this month.

05/24 Correspondence and public discussion

No correspondence has been received in matters not otherwise on the agenda.

06/24 Planning applications

A The following planning applications received from SODC were reviewed and discussed:

P23/S3048/FUL (The Bull The Green Great Milton OX44 7NS) Demolition of existing single and two-storey extensions, erection of single-storey side extension, single and two-storey rear extension, internal alterations, dormer window to rear, with alterations to existing parking layout (Bat roost assessment, tree protection, and plan to make changes to car park layout received 13 December 2023)

Cllr Harrod raised that the Parish Council are very keen to see the plans get going and that GMPC are all behind the development and stated that to the Parish Council, this is exceptional circumstances due to the benefit to the Village.

Cllr Heritage said she is currently trying to gather all the information regarding the planning application for The Bull. Cllr Heritage will be in contact with the Planning Department to find out where they are with the application, but the Planning Department requires an ecologist survey completed as there is too much information missing without it. Mr Hutton mentioned that he had an ecologist's report done himself, which has been completed, and the report is available. Cllr Heritage said that the Planning Department have to refer to their own Ecologist.

The main contention is that the works planned to be undertaken now do not involve the part of the property that SODC needs the ecologist to report on and that these works should be given the go-ahead, with ecological reports on the remainder of the property carried out later in the year, in preparation for the works planned for 2025. Furthermore, SODC requested this ecologist's report too late to conduct it in the 2023 season, thus delaying the whole project by 12 months.

Mr Hutton stressed the need to act quickly on these issues and wants to take the planning application to the committee to get approval. Cllr Heritage understands the need to act quickly and agreed to be in contact with the relevant departments on Tuesday, 16th January.

Cllr Heritage was unaware that the Planning Department was working from an outdated document and not the new National Planning Policy Framework 2023. Mr Hutton stated that it is the Local Authority that is using and quoting the outdated document, and as such, he is following those guidelines.

Cllr Heritage said she was in principle in support of the Pub and would do what she could to find out how to get things moving. Cllr Harrod reiterated the Parish Council's full support for this application.

P24/S0011/FUL and P24/S0014/LB (Le Manoir Aux Quat Saisons Church Road Great Milton Oxford OX44 7PD) Erection of glass porch and external alterations to stable extension, and installation of a dummy gate, access panel and light fixture to the listed wall.

Cllr Harrod spoke to the Parish Council with regards to this planning application, as the work is not within sight of any neighbours. Cllr Harrod recommended the Parish Council support this application. The Councillors in attendance all agreed.

09/24 Parish clerk and councillors' update of matters in hand

• Grass-cutting quotes are being found for the renewal of the Parish Grass-cutting contract. A few recently have been unable to undertake the full requirement.

10/24 Security in the village

Neighbourhood watch updated the Parish Council regarding the security in the

Village and raised that recently there had been an intruder spotted in a back garden in the village. TVP turned up and did a walk-through of the Village to ensure safety. Thanks to the quick thinking of the resident in question, the offender was caught.

Residents are reminded of the benefits of security lights and cameras, especially as much of the village backs onto open land.

11/24 Allotment/School Barrier

The Parish Council has been asked by a Foundation Governor at the Great Milton School about a barrier between the School and the Allotments. For the School to meet Health and Safety standards, the School is required to have an effective barrier along the boundary to the allotments.

The Parish Council discussed the request by the Foundation Governor for a 1.8m high barrier to be installed. The Parish Council were in full agreement and agreed to a barrier being placed on the boundary. The Parish Council would like the barrier to be as ecological as possible. Finally, the Parish Council agreed as this is a school requirement, it would be the school's responsibility to pay any costs related to the installation of the barrier.

12/24 Re-introduction of the annual Parish Walk

Cllr Harrod raised that an annual Parish Walk should be introduced again, all Councillors agreed that it would be of benefit to start this annual event again. It was agreed the decision for a date would be agreed upon during the March or April meeting and the Walk to be completed during a springtime evening.

The Rector's Pint

I find that January and February are possibly the hardest months of the year to get through. It is partly the post-Christmas effect. Our 2023 Christmas in all three parishes was remarkably good, and I left our Christmas Day service in Little Milton with a feeling of joy and goodwill. I was then clobbered by the inevitable bug. I was in bed at 9pm on New Year's Eve, and spent New's Year's Day in a haze, having cancelled a meet up with friends. I did not face the New Year filled with great enthusiasm! I had just turned 64 a couple of days earlier, and was feeling every one of those years.

However, I write this following a rare and crisp frosty morning. The first snowdrops are showing and as I walked with Oscar past the windmill, the sun was rising over the Chilterns. To the south are The Clumps and beyond those, the foggy outline of the Downs; ancient Wessex. I was overwhelmed with gratitude, and with a reminder that moments of joy, when they come, need to be welcomed and cherished.

We are already looking forward to Lent. As usual, there will be a weekly reflective service of Compline every Wednesday at 6pm. There will also be a series of Lent Lunches, and in addition, we will be hosting a series of studies every Tuesday looking at St Paul's letter to the Thessalonians. The details are included here, following The Pint. Further details of venues for all the Lent activities will follow once they are known.

On another matter entirely, I have been so struck with how divided things are now. This came to a head for me with the demonstrations around the world relaying to Gaza, and the corresponding rise in antisemitism, not least in London. In December I organised a simple and non-partisan 'vigil for peace' in St Mary's. I hope that for those who did come, they found it helpful. I am grateful to Andrew Meynell for letting me have a prayer he came across some years ago, which comes from St George's Anglican Cathedral in Jerusalem. I believe it still has relevance now.

Pray not for Arab Or Jew, For Palestinian Or Israeli, But pray rather For ourselves, That we might not divide them In our prayers, but keep Them both together In our hearts.

Churchwardens' Update

We are delighted that we have now been awarded a Faculty from the Diocese of Oxford to conserve the historic Dormer monument in situ, as recommended by Clivedon Conservation Workshop Ltd in their report dated July 2023. Work will start on February 5 and will probably last 3 weeks. It should cause no disruption to church use. As part of this project, we have installed an Info Point. We are the first religious building in Oxfordshire to have one. If you have a phone, you can tap on the localised wi-fi network and you can read the interesting history of the Dormer monument and other historic items of interest in the church. Do try it. We will be adding information in the future.

We are grateful to The Benefact Trust, Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust, Frances Coales Charitable Foundation, Leche Trust and the Morris Fund for grants totalling £18,900 which were added to our contribution of £8,769. These grants funded the work to be done on the monument as well as improving information available on its history.

Our next phase of work will be on re-ordering the interior of the church, to include a WC and kitchenette. We have refined our ideas, building on feedback so are awaiting revised plans. Once we have these, we can apply for more funding and Diocesan approval.

Dear Lovely Bull Customers

We have failed at the Bull in our attempt to obtain planning permission for the planned improvement work to the pub. This is quite a blow and totally unexpected too! The application was submitted after much consultation, we thought we had planning officer support, seemingly not! We thank you all for your kind words and support.

It is now required that we carry out further ecology and habitat investigations, these can only be carried out in July and August in any year, only then and after our submission of the reports will planning consent be granted.

We are very disappointed. It means the works to the toilets, garden and parking will be delayed by one whole year. I am sorry to report this and I am sorry that our pub will not have the much wanted improved facilities when we re-open on the 21st February.

We are grateful for your ongoing support.

Dear Great Milton Residents,

As many of you will know, following the sale of the pub there was a balance left after the shareholders were reimbursed. It was specified that this fund should be given to the Great Milton village community and the pub shareholders were consulted on the proposed beneficiaries. As a result, a sum of £20,000 was generously gifted

to The Great Milton Recreation Ground, to be invested in the property for the benefit of the local residents.

We firstly wanted to say a very big thank you to all of the pub shareholders who responded to the survey and voted to gift this money to The Great Milton Recreation Ground. We also felt it was essential to keep you updated on the spending of this money and invite you to put forward any suggestions for its use. The Great Milton Recreation Ground Management Committee is delighted to be able to use this fund to carry out long overdue work on the property and invest in its future at the heart of the village. As a guideline, the committee expects this work and investment to fall into the following categories, noted with their priorities:

- Recreation grounds make good and maintain substantial wear and tear, landscape, improve waste management
- Pavilion building refurbish, repair (interior and exterior)
- Ancillary areas repair and refurbish sports facilities and play area

Update on Local Housing Plans Good news but we all need to act

The latest proposals from South Oxfordshire District Council for housing in our area is very good news for those who support Haseley Brook Action Group.

The draft Local Plan both:

- Removes Chalgrove airfield from the list of possible sites; and
- Does not include 'Harrington' on the list of possible sites.

The Emerging Joint Local Plan which aims to identify sites for housing in our area for the next 20 years is open for feedback via a consultation until 21st February.

To help ensure that this Draft Plan progresses to an Agreed Plan for South Oxfordshire we all need to go online and express support.

HBAG encourages you to:

- 1. Strongly Agree with the main elements of the Plan;
- 2. In Chapter 6 questions on Housing: Strongly Agree with the majority or all of these proposals;
- 3. In Chapter 8 Strongly Agree with deliverable sites such as Grenoble Road, Culham and Berinsfield;
- 4. Also in Chapter 8 (AS10) Strongly Agree with removing Chalgrove airfield from the Plan and using your own words reference:
 - Unsuitability of the airfield site
 - A 'New Town' in Chalgrove being undeliverable
 - Location not being adjacent to the housing need in Oxford
 - Poor transport provision for accessing Oxford.
- 5. Contribute to other questions and topics of personal interest and using you own words consider referencing:
 - Support for developments adjacent to Oxford that will serve the city;
 - Strong commitment to carbon reduction principles within the Plan;
 - Need for affordable housing as part of the Plan.

6. Submit your response by pressing "FINISH" having also added your contact details.

View From Views

For a change I won't bore anyone with a comment on the weather, I think we all know it has been wet, I have never known the river to be as high as it was on the 6th of Jan, nor have I known it to have been in flood for so long end!!



There is no question now as to what we have to do with 2/3 of

our planted ground which, is a complete washout literally. Let's hope the respite in the weather in the middle of January when, I write this column continues and, we can get our planting done in good time and conditions, to let the spring planted crops flourish.

Most of our land was drained by my predecessor but, now unfortunately they are beginning to cause problems, exacerbated by the wet weather. We find that some are blocked with root fibres that can be cleared once they are found. This is a process not aided by the 60 plus years since they we laid, these are all mapped, measured in imperial, with most of the reference points either not there or in the same place. These rely on what we call Mole draining, this is done by pulling a round 3" diameter cylinder through the ground about 18-24" below the ground crossing the drains at strategic angles to create channels for water to percolate into the drains all these now need renewing, those we have already show how effective they are, this is just another job we will have to do, as well as making sure all other water courses are free running mainly ones that come from water courses from other land, the law being the lower land has to take the higher.

Sir James Dyson, of Vacuum cleaner fame, is also a very big Farmer, owns as much land if not more than the Monarchy, known as "Beeswax Farming". He is producing Strawberries 12 months of the year under glass, in a completely sustainable way, all rainwater is collected and used for irrigation, he has anaerobic digesters that provide the electricity, and all berries are picked by robot. What the produce is like is up to those who eat them but, it does illustrate what the future could hold for food production. It does take those with his resources to lead the way and, experiment. If we are to survive in the future with the increase in population and, less labour, or willingness to do these mundane jobs, then these practices will have to be developed. You could argue is this the way we should be going? But it does have some merit.

I don't know if anyone has noticed how much more Mistletoe there is in trees around lately. This parasitic growth has mainly been prevalent in apple orchards and in Herefordshire, but now appears to have spread over the whole country, particularly noticeable here along the roadside at Adwell between Wheatfield and Lewknor. I read that this is due to there being more Blackcaps now overwintering in Britain, possibly due to Climate Change (Global Warming). Apparently, these birds like Mistletoe berries but not their seeds which get wiped off on other trees, unlike Mistle Thrushes (hence the name) and Fieldfares who I guess eat the whole lot and spread the seeds in other ways. Another possible sign of Global warming we saw a couple of hares (on the 7th January), cavorting as they are known to do in March, Partridges paired up around Christmas time, untimely early. In spite of the reports, we hear that nature in this country is depleted, I would defy anyone to come here and say that, the other day we counted at least 20 tits and others around our feeders, and whenever I walk our fields there are always flocks of unidentifiable birds flying around, I suspect Sky Larks, Buntings, Fieldfares, Starlings and, I suspect many other species. When mentioning Starlings there certainly do not seem to be so many about although, I understand plenty around the Otmoor reserve, there was a report on Faming today a few days ago where a farmer was having to erect netting around his cattle feeders because, Starlings were nicking all the best bits of the cattle food, I can remember in my student days, being responsible for a group of Barley beef animals and having the same problem. At the time this was the latest system now not accepted anymore as the beef it produced was lacking in all sorts of ways, flavour, texture and many other ethical issues.

So, with the storms we have been having, just as was predicted some 30 years ago the above habit of the Blackcap could be caused by Global Warming. So, if this is the case are we taking it seriously enough, our politicians certainly don't seem to be in spite of their rhetoric, the recent Cop conference statement may have some effect, unfortunately it hasn't so far, but let's hope. Unfortunately most of the measures we need to take will cost us all money, something we have to accept if we are to save the planet, in the past we have had our energy and, food far too cheaply, now we need to accept that it should cost us more to fill our cars, or feed ourselves and become more realistic on what spend on the necessities of life.

Our new Minister, Steve Barclay, came to Oxford for the annual Farming Conference, and as usual with Ministers, gave a paper saying, how marvellous we farmers are and, he would do all he could to support us. We have heard this record so many times before we await with bated breath. Some things sound good but, they often do but then fizzle out in delivery. All the Shadow Minister said was they would support green energy.

Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum

- Exhibition of art and museum objects related to the Battle of Waterloo open now until 30 April 2024
- Artist Shaun Maloney also running a series of workshops to build visitors' own drawing skill and confidence
- A recreation of the 19th century Waterloo Cartoon by Daniel Maclise, Shaun's piece has been donated as a prize in charity raffle supporting the museum which celebrates its 10th Anniversary this year.

Running alongside the popular war comics exhibition, Into Battle!, the Waterloo Cartoon by Shaun Maloney is now on display at the county's military history museum until 30 April 2024. The incredibly detailed sketch depicts scenes from the 1815 Battle of Waterloo and is based on the 19th century original by Daniel Maclise, on display in the House of Lords. Alongside the artwork itself, the museum has dipped into its own archives to display a range of objects and artwork of the Waterloo era, many rarely seen on public display.

These include items of the 52nd (Oxfordshire) Light Infantry who fought in the historic battle - some historians arguing they played a pivotal role in defeating Napoleon's Imperial Guard. Supporting panels from the National Army Museum provide visitors with the context behind the battle itself. Artist Shaun is a veteran himself, having served a long and varied career in the British Army, including the Falkland Islands, mainland Europe, Bosnia and Kosovo, Northern Ireland and the Far East.

With a strong sense of social responsibility, he now uses art alongside his coaching experience, to help others overcome trauma, physical pain and damaging thinking patterns. Drawing is a tool Shaun often uses.

Shaun explains, "Drawing has been a constant in my life for as long as I can remember. In recent years I have used mindful drawing to steady my own mental health as well as helping others. There is a special gift that drawing gives us and for me, it's being able to focus on just one thing at that one moment in time. When I'm drawing, time is immaterial. Hours pass without any intrusive thoughts entering my mind. To help with this meditative process, I tend to draw finely detailed pieces. I love to be able to get right into the detail and discover those things only really close looking can see".

Alongside the exhibition Shaun is running two art workshops for visitors looking to build their own confidence in drawing or develop their skills, the first on 17 February, and the second on 13 April 2024.

Open to all ages from children aged 10 up to adults, the workshops will encourage attendees to both express their own creativity while casting an analytical eye over historical visual sources such as the original Waterloo Cartoon. While visitors can drop in to see the exhibition any time the museum is open, spaces on the workshops are limited, with tickets available now from the museum's website and via Eventbrite.

Following the exhibition, Shaun is also kindly donating his Waterloo Cartoon as the grand prize in Soldiers of Oxfordshire Trust's 10th Anniversary raffle, with proceeds supporting the charity's continued work at the museum in Woodstock, preserving the county's military heritage and sharing Oxfordshire people's stories of conflict and peace.

John Howell MP writes...

Even before the Christmas decorations were down, or perhaps before they went up, speculation on the date of the General Election has been hotting up. It could actually be as late as January 2025, but that would not be a preferred option for many people, not least as political campaigning over the festive period would



not go down well. Now the Prime Minister has given a strong hint that it is more likely to be later in the year than sooner.

Whatever the date, the campaigning is already underway. Not just in the battle for media attention and getting messages out, but also in more subtle ways. In Parliament the increase in emails on specific issues referring to the next Party Manifesto was noticeable even in November and December. In parliament the use of mechanisms to promote specific issues, such as Early Day Motions and Westminster Hall debates appears to be increasing, so it might be helpful to explain what these are.

Early Day Motions (EDMs) are motions that formally call for debate in the House of Commons but there is no timeline, simply at an 'early day' and few ever get debated. They are often used on behalf of campaign groups and, although it may

seem that they are being proactive, the reality known by all involved, is that they rarely achieve anything. In any one Parliamentary session there will be well over a thousand EDMs tabled, and at an average cost of a several hundred pounds each, this is a substantial cost to the taxpayer. Given that they are ineffective, along with many colleagues on both sides of the House, I decided some time ago that I would not sign EDMs. Instead, there are many other more effective ways for an MP to raise an issue or lobby government. These include writing to Ministers, meeting with Ministers, asking Parliamentary Questions (which can be written for oral) and holding Westminster Hall debates. Over the years I have frequently raised numerous concerns in these alternative ways. Whilst EDMs can only be signed by MPs we now have e-petitions which can be signed by anyone. These have much more success in raising awareness of different issues and some do get debated.

There is also a note of caution on Westminster Hall debates. I said above that I have often held a Westminster Hall debate. An MP uses a Westminster Hall debate to raise issues of concern to them. They are formal debates recorded in Hansard, but there are not votes. However, they do get a response from a Minister. So, whilst the debate is important to the MP holding it, the attendance of other MPs is neither critical nor representative of the wider support for the issue. Sometimes it is just not possible to attend, but this does not mean that I am not interested in the issue.

I have always been very conscious that most local magazines do not want carry Party political material. As such, over the years I have always been careful to ensure that my newsletters share my thoughts rather than make sweeping Party-political statements. I am grateful to those Editors who have faithfully carried my copy and encouraged exchanges with constituents. I know that some Editors choose not to carry copy but include my contact details to ensure that constituents have them should they wish to make contact and I am grateful for that too.

I have already made public that it is not my intention to put myself forward as a candidate for the next General Election. I have served the Constituency since initially being elected in 2008 and have been returned to Parliament in four subsequent elections. I continue to take an interest in the views of constituents and, with the support of my team, assist those constituents wanting help. However, I am in the happy position of being able to sit light when an email tells me that the senders vote at the next General Election depends on my reply to their email. Such emails often spring from campaign groups and, whilst I will continue to reply with my view, it is really the views of the various Parliamentary Candidates for the Constituency that should be of greater interest. I will have moved on to pastures new.




