Chairman's Update Welcome to our latest newsletter.

As the days lengthen and we welcome Spring, I'd just like to look back to Christmas and although it's a bit early, tell you of some of our plans for next year.





Despite some technical problems with power, we were joined by a crowd for our Christmas singalong.

As you may know, we are trying to be a greener council and a couple

of years ago we planted what we hoped would be our forever Christmas tree. It would have been lovely if it had reached the heights of the one in the photo but unfortunately it has struggled and we bought the large one just for this year.



We have taken some more advice and will be planting a different species tree in the coming months and hopefully we'll have it for many years to come. The little tree will be relocated somewhere more suitable.

We appreciate the efforts of parishioners to decorate their homes and gardens. We are to

fortunately receive some CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) monies which we hope to use to fund far more lights for the village green next year, and we may even use solar power too!

On the subject of trees, we have also been planting some more indigenous trees in Price's Wood, as we promised when we were gifted it and took on maintenance.

The cost of living crisis continues and very soon your new Council Tax bills will be landing on the door mat. You pay for a proportion of the

cost of your local services through the Council Tax. It is made up of five charges for Kent County Council, Sevenoaks District Council, your local town or parish

council, Kent Police and Kent Fire & Rescue Service. Each authority sets its own charge. Once again, I am pleased to say that DGPC, like last year, will not be increasing its part of the Council Tax. Unfortunately the other 4 organisations will. As we go to press these figures are not available but we expect KCC to be 4.99%.

In December the village was hit by a lot of doorstep parcel robberies, causing a lot of frustration and annoyance but ultimately very difficult for the police to solve. There was also a daylight robbery on Ryewood. With the help of video doorbells and neighbourhood awareness, the intelligence did lead to an arrest and jail.

Planning issues continue to challenge the Parish Council. In the past weeks there has been a Public Appeal hearing about the proposed bunds on the Chevening estate (the Chevening Parkland Scheme), which if allowed will increase lorries using Polhill considerably during their construction. At time of going to press there had been no decision on the Appeal. Permission has been granted for over 600 homes at Fort Halstead.



VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

We have submitted a response to the latest consultation on the Sevenoaks Local Plan (Plan 2040). We are disappointed that the land that runs parallel to

London Road from the Village Hall to the school continues to be classed as poorly performing Green Belt.

The Parish Council really needs some help. There are currently some vacancies for Councillors and if you are interested in joining us, please contact the Clerk. However, if you'd just like to help out

occasionally, we really need some volunteers to help run the very popular fireworks event in September. Again, please contact The Clerk. It's only a few hours here & there but *if we don't have any volunteers we will have to cancel.*

The Railway Tavern, Dunton Green

Whilst chatting with friends one evening in the local pub, conversation turned to the whereabouts of the old Railway Tavern in the village, and I thought it worthy of further investigation.

Along with the Miners Arms, this pub originally catered for the Welsh Miners who were digging the nearby Polhill tunnel for the London to Hastings line. Pictured below around the 1900's, the Railway Tavern was located on the right-hand side just after the railway bridge down Station Road and is thought to have been built between 1840-1860's.


The Bligh's reference on the sign relates to John Bligh, said to be the largest hop grower in the region. Bligh purchased the Holmesdale Brewery in Sevenoaks in 1862 and extended the Railway Tavern building in 1882. The picture possibly shows the landlord and his family standing outside the pub, with seemingly a large lake in the background, which is likely to be one of Dunton Green Brick & Tile

Works flooded pits. These flooded pits were later filled in and the site became the West Kent Cold Store, and thereafter, the large housing development of Ryewood.

An Ordinance Survey map from 1909 shows the location of the Railway Tavern by the Brickworks and near the bridge. Interestingly, the map also shows the <u>Westerham railway branch</u> from Dunton Green (from www.disused-stations.org.uk).



A notification in the 'Intoxicating Liquor and Billiards Licensing' section in the Sevenoaks Chronicle and Kentish Advertiser dated 21st February 1913, states that the license for the Railway Tavern beerhouse expired on the 28th December 1912. It's not apparent what happened to it after that, however, friends recalled the virtually derelict building, by then known as Bridge Cottage, still standing in an overgrown plot of land in the 60's and 70's. They remembered a recluse, an old chap known as 'Dick Turpin' by the local kids, who grew flowers and sold them locally and (rumour had it) at Covent Garden. A little research has revealed the man to actually be called Turtin (an easy mispronounced or misheard derivation) with first name possibly Frederick, who passed away in 1972. Mr Turtin was in fact a brilliant Mathematics professor who previously lectured at the London University and had the nickname 'Trigger' Turtin, as a nod to the maths discipline of Trigonometry. He moved into Bridge Cottage after the collapse of his marriage, living in the increasingly derelict and run down cottage. Although appearing unkempt and dishevelled, residents remember him being very quiet and polite, and when he did speak, he had an impeccable cut-glass accent.



After his death, West Kent Cold Store bought the building and plot of land for an extension to their car park. The site of the old Railway Tavern now sits on the edge of the Ryewood estate nearest the railway bridge.

If you have any interesting old photos of Dunton Green, we would be delighted to receive them.



PLAN 2040 - Sevenoaks District Council

<u>consultation.</u> As reported in the Winter 2022 edition, SDC has drafted an important part of the new Local Plan and they wanted to hear your views. The Parish Council submitted its comments on this Regulation 18




consultation. There will almost certainly be



another phase of consultation in autumn this year and the Parish

Council will provide information to residents so that you can submit your views. As SDC is committed to protecting the Green Belt (covering 93% of the District), at this stage, they were not considering any Green Belt release but that is likely to be a consideration in further rounds of consultation when there could be more site specific consultation.



The Parish Council has reiterated again

its concerns about Dunton Green being considered as 'Sevenoaks Urban' for the purposes of SDC Planning. As a reminder, where the Plan 2040 refers to the 4 town settlements (Swanley, Sevenoaks, Edenbridge, Westerham), when it refers to Sevenoaks it means SEVENOAKS URBAN, an area that SDC Planning identified some years back which encompasses a number of outlying villages, including Dunton Green.

• <u>Comments were submitted by DGPC to the Appeal for the Chevening</u> <u>Parkland Scheme.</u> The original application by the Chevening Estate was refused planning permission by SDC but the Chevening Estate submitted an Appeal and this was heard at the end of January. A decision is expected within 4-6 weeks of the Appeal Hearing. DGPC was NOT a consultee on the application or the Appeal but commented anyway.

PARISH COUNCIL News Highlights

• <u>Council Tax 2023.</u> The Precept has not changed. This is the amount of money which the Parish Council asks the District Council to collect with the

local council tax. Unlike the District and County Councils, the Parish Council receives no direct government grant. It raises its income through the parish precept element of the Council Tax and the charges it makes for its services. Due to a very slight change



in the Tax Base this actually means that for each household there is a very slight reduction for the year. Of course, this will be swamped by the increases to the other elements of the Council Tax bill, which are expected to increase significantly.

• Plans have been put in place for this year's Annual Parish Meeting.

This is an Annual Assembly of the village; a chance for organisations to report on what they have been doing in the previous year, a time for residents to ask questions and an occasion when the community can come together. It is NOT a meeting of the Parish Council, although the Chairman of the Parish Council is obliged to chair the meeting and the Parish Council Clerk takes the minutes. The Parish Council also now uses this evening as an opportunity to hold a Parish Reception so that it can say thank you to volunteers and organisations who help provide services in the village. It also offers residents a more informal opportunity to speak to the Parish Council and others. Everyone is very welcome! *See the back page for more details.*

•<u>Kent Police are currently reorganising and the new structure (a new</u> Neighbourhood Policing Plan) will be introduced in June 2023. We will



be welcoming the PCSO to this year's APM whilst we still have a ward PCSO. The new plan will see PCSOs (those that remain) allocated to various streams. There will be Ward PCs but it remains to be seen how the new structure will work in practice. The Parish Council has had excellent links with the PCSO and the Community Safety Unit and will be working

towards developing similarly good relationships under the new structure.

PARISH COUNCIL News Highlights

As previously reported, the Parish Council is planning to upgrade its play spaces in the recreation ground and Longford



Meadow by making use of the existing fencing. There



will be further talks with play specialists. This will be a project that runs over the longer term so that we enhance the facilities each

year, making them appealing for a wider range of users. We'll publicise dates for a public consultation on which games would be preferred later this Spring . Look out for more information in due course on social media.

- The Parish Council has agreed plans to install hanging baskets at three more locations in the village. We'll keep the locations under wraps for now but we will hopefully be able to share pictures of them in situ in the next edition of Dunton Green News!
- And in keeping with its 'Making Dunton Green Greener' ambitions, the Parish Council will be looking to install signage, more planting, insect hotels and bird boxes across a number of its sites this year. We'll be talking to the school in the hope that some of these projects can be used to engage our younger residents.

Price's Wood now has six new trees. The planting is the last phase of the



Queen's Green Canopy project (the other area was the Longford Meadow planting last year). It also forms part of the Parish Council's stated aim to enhance the wood, which was gifted to it five years ago, with more native species.

WHAT DO LOCAL COUNCILS DO?

Your local (parish and town) council has overall responsibility for the wellbeing of your local community. Their work falls into three main categories:

- Delivery of services
- Improve quality of life for residents
- Give communities a democratic voice

Local councils run numerous services, depending on the size of the council. Many you will see day-to-day, but some are less known. These include introducing solar panels, setting up dementia-friendly groups, organising community buses, creating neighbourhood plans, implementing suitable housing, establishing youth projects, managing allotments and open spaces, maintaining footpaths, public seating and litter bins.

BECOMING A LOCAL COUNCILLOR

As a local councillor you can become a voice for your community and make real change. Local councillors are the champions of their community who invest time in local projects and issues to the benefit of residents and the neighbourhood.

Local councillor responsibilities fall into three main categories:

- Decision-making
- Monitoring
- Getting involved locally

Local councillors attend to local needs of residents, local groups and businesses, make decisions on local services, collaborate with district and borough councils to adhere to local needs, and progress vital projects to invest in the future of the community.

CAN I STAND FOR ELECTION?

To stand for election to a local council you must be:

- A UK or Commonwealth citizen; or be a citizen of the Republic of Ireland; or be a citizen of another Member State of the European Union
- At least 18 years old
- An elector of the local council; or in the past 12 months occupied land or other premises in the area the local council serves (as owner or tenant); or work in the area local council serves (as your principal or only place of work); or live within three miles of the local council boundary

VOTER INFORMATION 2023



Voter ID

The UK Government has introduced a requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station at some elections. This new requirement will apply for the first time in England at the local elections on Thursday 4 May 2023.

Which forms of ID can I use to vote?

You may already have a form of photo ID that is acceptable. You can use any of the following:

- Passport
- Driving licence (including provisional license)
- Blue badge
- Certain concessionary travel cards
- Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- Biometric Immigration document
- Defence identity card
- Certain national identity cards

If you don't have an accepted form photo ID

If you don't already have an accepted form of photo ID, or you're not sure whether your photo ID still looks like you, you can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a **Voter Authority Certificate**. You can apply for this at <u>voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk</u>.



Pilgrims Way

Running through the North end of the village is a rather unassuming footpath: Now known mostly as the North Downs Way, this was once part of the Pilgrims Way.

Locally it runs down Star Hill and clips the Northern tip of Dunton Green down Morants Court Road, before heading off alongside the Donnington Manor Hotel to Otford and Kemsing and off towards Canterbury. Blink and you miss it in the



village. However, "The Pilgrims Way" is an ancient trail stretching some 150 miles across Hampshire. Surrey and Kent. Although now primarily used for recreational purposes, the route is historically significant as it connects the

shrines of Saint Swithun at Winchester Cathedral and Thomas Becket at Canterbury Cathedral. Records suggest that pilgrims might have walked along this route for at least the last 1000 years. But there is evidence that the name 'Pilgrims Way' has actually been applied to a pre-existing ancient trackway dated by archaeological finds to 600–450 BC, but probably in existence since the Stone Age. The prehistoric route followed the "natural causeway" east to west on the southern slopes of the North Downs.

So thousands of years ago, people were trading, hunting and migrating along a very similar route.

The name "Pilgrims' Way" may in fact only date to the early Ordnance Survey Maps of Victorian times, and actually the surveyor Edward Renouard James published a pamphlet in 1871 entitled "Notes on the Pilgrims' Way in West Surrey". While acknowledging that the route was "little studied" and that "many persons in the neighbourhood had not been aware of it", he nonetheless used the name on the Ordnance Survey map. I find this totally plausible, as even today people tend to be unaware of the history of where they live. In contrast to Edward James' findings, F. C. Elliston-Erwood, a Kentish historian, notes that tithe records dating from before 1815 use the well-established name "Pilgrims' Way" to reference and locate pieces of land. Earlier still, surviving thirteenth century documents show a "Pilgrim Road" by the walls of Thornham Castle, Kent, on what is today considered the route, so there is contention there.

Another source of contention is the volume of traffic that used this route to access the shrine at Canterbury: Wikipedia says "The numbers making their way to Canterbury by this route were not recorded, but the estimate by the Kentish historian William Coles Finch that it carried more than 100,000 pilgrims a year is surely an exaggeration; a more prosaic estimate—extrapolated from the records of pilgrims' offerings at the shrine—contends an annual figure closer to 1,000". Given the length of the route, the time it would have taken to walk it, and the terrain covered, I think this is far more believable. It's possible that the larger estimate assumed all pilgrims heading for Canterbury, by all routes. The famous "Canterbury Tales" by Geoffrey Chaucer, for example follows travellers to Canterbury, but via a different route: from South London via Watling Street.

Nowadays, the route is largely covered by the North Downs Way National Trail, although the older name reappears too, notably up the road in Kemsing. So why did the pilgrims in the Middle Ages want to walk all that way?

Well it's mostly to do with Thomas Becket.

Also known as Saint Thomas of Canterbury, Thomas of London and later Thomas à Becket (21 December 1119 or 1120 – 29 December 1170). Thomas was an English nobleman of Norman descent who served as Lord Chancellor from 1155 to 1162, and then notably as Archbishop of Canterbury from 1162 until his murder in 1170.

Not long after his elevation to Archbishop, Thomas fell out with Henry II, refusing to put Royal Authority before Church Authority. This led to him seeking sanctuary in France for several years, before Henry agreed to compromise, and Thomas could return.

However, the two again fell out when Henry was formally crowned in York (rather than Canterbury which was normal as the Archbishop of Canterbury was the most senior cleric). In retaliation, Thomas excommunicated The Archbishop of York and the Bishops of London and Salisbury. Henry was furious. Posterity has it that he angrily exclaimed: "Will no-one rid me of this turbulent priest!"

But again there is contention. Edward Grim, a monk from Cambridge who was present at Becket's murder has the King's words as: "What miserable drones and traitors have I nurtured and promoted in my household who let their lord be treated

with such shameful contempt by a low-born cleric!" Which, while less punchy, has been accepted by historians including Simon Sharma as being more accurate (although as Edward wasn't with Henry in France at the time, we have to assume that he managed to speak to someone who was there while researching his biography of Thomas). Whatever the King actually said, four



knights who heard him considered it an order, and promptly rode off to Canterbury to do the King's bidding. The four: Reginald FitzUrse, Hugh de Morville, William de Tracy and Richard le Breton—travelled from Normandy to Canterbury with the intention of forcing Becket to withdraw his excommunication, or, if he refused, taking him back to Normandy by force to face the King. On 29th December 1170, they confronted Thomas in Canterbury Cathedral. When Becket resisted their attempts to seize him, they slashed at him with their swords, hitting him in the head and killing him. The actual



account by Edward Grim – who was himself wounded in the attack – is decidedly gory! Although nobody, even at the time, believed that Henry directly ordered that Becket be killed, his words had started a chain of events that almost inevitably led to his death.

In fact, as Henry's rant had not actually been directed at Becket, but at his own household, the four probably thought that a failure to act would be regarded as more evidence of treachery and ineptitude. It's possible that Henry was just shouting his frustration, and that this was picked up by over-zealous knights, eager to please their King and advance their own positions. Either way, Thomas was dead, and people were outraged!

There were demands that the King be excommunicated. Pope Alexander III forbade Henry to hear Mass until he had atoned for his sin and in May 1172, Henry did public penance in Avranches Cathedral in Normandy.

The four over eager knights subsequently fled to Scotland and from there to Knaresborough Castle in Yorkshire. All four were excommunicated by Pope Alexander in 1171 during Easter and ordered to make pilgrimages to the Holy Land as penance for 14 years! Meanwhile, Thomas was canonised on 21 February 1173 – little more than two years after his death – by Pope Alexander III and the rise in popularity of the Pilgrims Way began as people wanted to show their respects to the new saint.

He is still venerated as a saint and martyr by the Catholic Church and the Anglican Communion.

After his death, local legends regarding Becket arose. Interestingly, as well as honouring the saint, these tales also display Becket's well recorded grumpiness. "Becket's Well", in nearby Otford, is said to have been created after Becket had been

displeased by the taste of the local water. Becket struck the ground with his crozier (curved Bishop's staff) and two clear springs burst forth! Whatever the truth, the well is there!

And the absence of nightingales in

Otford is also ascribed to Becket, who is said to have been so disturbed in his devotions by the song of a nightingale that he commanded that none sing in the village ever again. Fortunately, this obviously doesn't extend to Dunton Green since our split from Otford in 1908 – as we had a nightingale in the village recently!

So the next time you're walking along the North Downs Way, spare a thought for the thousands of pilgrims who walked that same route nearly a thousand years ago, and to the hunters, traders and tribespeople admiring a similar view a thousand years before that. I wonder what people will see along this route a thousand years from now.
