### Year 1 and 2 Scatterball Tournament

We were lucky enough to enjoy glorious weather for the Year 1 and 2 Scatterball tournament. As always we showed great determination and we were really impressed with the standard our team played to, both in their fielding and bowling.

The parental support for this event was brilliant and really helped with the happy vibe.

Our final result was joint 4th out of 6 teams. The children should be very proud of the way they represented their school.

### Whole School Skipping

We enjoyed a brilliant day of skipping with all of the children astounding us with their skills and determination.

The level of stamina shown was incredible and the progress made since we announced the event has been really pleasing. There has been a real buzz about skipping on the playground with the children helping each other to improve.

We have been overwhelmed by the generosity that has been shown to support this event.

The GRAND total raised for the British Heart Foundation is £574.60, school will receive 20% of this amount, which we will use to buy new playground equipment.



### Sports Day

A lovely warm day for our 2019 sports day.

Excitedly, the children arrived at Brighton Hill School. Register was taken and the children sorted themselves into their house teams.

The Brighton Hill sports leaders helped the children to warm up and then each house captain led their team out to the sports arena before they went to the first of their Athletic Skill Stations.

Children had been preparing for these during their PE lessons. These included jumping circuits, throwing, rugby shuttles, a water race and dribble hockey/football and bouncing a tennis ball on a racket around cones. It was great to see so much support and encouragement across the two key stages.

The second part of the morning was enjoyed watching the children in the sprint races, egg and spoon and relay races finishing off with up and over. Family and friends stayed for a picnic lunch with the children. A huge well done to all of our children for taking part and showing Real PE values and to the BH sports leaders who were a credit to their school.

#### Year 5/6 Football Tournament

Our Under 11 football team took part in a Basingstoke Schools 5-a-side competition. We finished in 6th place overall and won 3 of our games.



We had a thumping from some of the teams but carried on with determination and all enjoyed the tournament tremendously.



#### Staff vs Year 6 Netball

This year the chosen sport for Staff vs Year 6 end of year competition was Netball. This event is highly charged, competitive but above all a huge amount of fun.

Mrs Hussey, our referee, explained that we were playing High 5 and told us the rules and expectations. The teachers had a reputation to uphold. Four exciting matches were played in total and each match was played in good spirit. The scores were 4-0, 4-2, 5-2 and 3-2 to teachers making the teachers the victors winning 16-6. However, by the last match, the score was close, maybe the teachers were tiring!

Regardless of the score, we were incredibly proud of the sporting values shown by Year 6 and the respect they showed towards their opposition.

#### Beech Class Church visit

As part of our RE topic, Beech Class has been thinking about 'Special Places' and in particular how churches are a special place for Christians.

On the afternoon of 11th July, Beech Class visited the local church in Cliddesden village - St.Leonards Church. We walked through the country fields to get to the church and were met by Reverend Stephen on arrival.



Whilst we were at the church we were shown special parts of the church which are important, such as: the font, the lectern, the altar, the pulpit and the pews. We were also very impressed with the stained glass windows and we learnt that the windows are there to tell Bible stories through pictures. Reverend Stephen also let us listen to the church bell - we liked hearing the sound this made and thought about how it made us feel.

Reverend Stephen told us that people go to church for many different occasions like weddings, baptisms, funerals, confirmations and most importantly for prayer.

The children had some time quietly reflecting on their visit in the church and deciding what was special in that moment. Popular answers were the age of the church, the stillness, the stained glass windows and the bells.

We all enjoyed our visit to the local church and it was nice to experience what it is like be in a church. We have learnt more about how and why churches are special places to Christians.



#### Brodowski Quartet

Brodowski Quartet came into school today and took the children on a tour to different countries with their music.

They visited Germany first with a piece from Brahms (1833-1897). The Quartet introduced themselves and their

instruments. Children learnt that violins were first made in Italy, as we know them today, and are the smallest of the string family. Also, playing with a bow has a name, 'Arco'. Next in line with a deeper sound is the viola followed by the Cello with a very deep sound.

The next piece played was by Tchaikovsky (1840-1893) followed by Peter Warlock (1894-1910), which brought us back to England where children learnt the difference between the melody, harmony and base. Some lucky children were invited up to demonstrate the differences by being the Quartets controllers.

Borodin (1833-1887) was the next piece played and children were encouraged to picture the story behind the music as they listened.

Off to Austria with Mozart (1756-1791) where children had a try at conducting the quartet along with Mrs Hussey who was nominated by her class. The children clapped along to the 'Sailors Hornpipe' before the final piece. It was a lovely summer concert.

#### <u>Ukulele Concert</u>

Year 1 and 2 performed their end of term concert, playing ukulele to a big audience. They all did a brilliant job and were very professional, demonstrating excellent performance skills. The children played a variety of pieces to show off their skills in strumming, plucking and playing chords as well as singing at the same time! Both year groups played together meaning there were over 30 ukuleles being played at once and it sounded fantastic! The children's favourites were 'Ukulele Magic' and 'Fly Away' which had a bit of whistling in the middle too!



The concert ended with a dramatic rendition of 'In the Hall of the Mountain King', with the children playing beautifully in time to the orchestral backing track. A hugely successful concert once again Year 1 and 2!

The audience enjoyed joining in with some of the songs and it is always a pleasure to see how much the children have progressed. ### COUNTRYSIDE HEDGEROWS: PROTECTION & PERMISSION

Countryside hedgerow is a boundary line of bushes which can include trees. The Hedgerows Regulations 1997 are designed to protect hedgerows in England and Wales.

### IS PERMISSION NEEDED TO REMOVE A HEDGEROW, EITHER IN WHOLE OR IN PART?

#### Yes... if the hedgerow -

- 1. Has continuous length of at least 20m or if less than 20m, meets another hedgerow at each end; and
- 2. grows in or adjacent to land used for agriculture, forestry, or breeding or keeping of horses, ponies or donkeys; or any Common land, Village Green, nature reserve, Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI).

#### No... if the hedgerow -

- 1. Is shorter than 20m (unless both ends join up with other hedgerows or it is part of a longer hedgerow); or
- 2. is in or borders a domestic garden.

Note 1: Gaps of 20 metres or less are counted as part of the hedgerow. A gap may be a break in the vegetation or it may be filled by, for example, a gate.

#### **HEDGEROW REMOVAL NOTICE**

If permission is needed according to the criteria above, a Hedgerow Removal Notice should be submitted to the Local Planning Authority (LPA). There is no charge for this.

Note 2: Coppicing, laying and removing dead or diseased shrubs or trees are considered to be normal management and do not require prior permission.

#### **IMPORTANT HEDGEROWS**

The LPA will make a decision to grant or refuse permission – but may refuse consent only if a hedgerow is considered to be important.

- It is against the law to remove most countryside hedgerows without permission.
- Permission to remove a hedgerow or part of a hedgerow covered by the Regulations – should be sought by submitting a Hedgerow Removal Notice to the LPA.
- Removing a hedgerow without permission (whether it is important or not) may result in an unlimited fine and a requirement to replace the hedgerow.

### For the purposes of the Regulations a hedgerow is important if it is at least 30 years

<u>old</u> and meets at least one of criteria below:

- marks all or part of a Parish boundary that existed before 1850
- contains an archaeological feature such as a scheduled monument
- is completely or partly in or next to an archaeological site listed on a Historic Environment Record (HER), (formerly a Sites and Monuments Record)
- marks the boundary of an estate or manor or looks to be related to any building or other feature that is part of the estate or manor that existed before 1600
- is part of a field system or looks to be related to any building or other feature associated with the field system that existed before 1845 - you can check the County Records Office for this information
- contains protected species listed in the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981
- contains species that are endangered, vulnerable and rare and identified in the British Red Data books
- includes woody species (generally 7 or 6 species) and associated features as specified in Sch 1, Part II Criteria, para 7(1) of the Hedgerow Regulations.

### ...and our cell will teach us everything

These words of Abba Moses chime with the experience of this great man:

The cell is an ideal place to know yourself. People tend to measure themselves by external accomplishments, but jail allows a person to focus on internal ones, such as honesty, sincerity, simplicity, humility, generosity and an absence of variety. You learn to look into yourself.



Alan will help us explore why we do what we do and how the Enneagram can inspire transformation through Self Awareness, Self-Regulation and Self Compassion for all of us on both sides of the bars. The Enneagram comes into its own when the *Pain of Change becomes less than the Pain of Remaining the Same*.

"Once we recognise the prisons we make for ourselves - then not only will the Lord come to us as He promised (Mt. 25.37) - but we discover the Truth that can set us free (Jn. 8.32)"

Canon Alan Hodgetts was ordained priest in 1983, serving 2 curacies in Birmingham and Hereford dioceses and 2 incumbencies in Guildford Diocese. He became a Prison Chaplain in 2006 and is currently the Managing Chaplain of HMP Woodhill. He became an Oblate of Alton Abbey during his Diaconal Year in 1982 and increasingly finds his spiritual life underpinned by the 3 Benedictine promises of Obedience, Stability and Conversion of Life. He is a trained Spiritual Director in the Ignatian Tradition and more recently a Certified Teacher of the Enneagram in the Narrative Tradition, in June he helped to guide the first Enneagram Prison Project in a UK prison.
