PARISH COUNCIL

At the Parish Council Meeting on 13 July the Clerk reported that the accounts for 1986/97 had been audited. Donations of £10 each were authorised to the Downland Sports Centre and the St John Ambulance Centenary Appeal. In addition to the normal house to house collection, which is for the general work of the Society, the Centenary Appeal is for 4 special projects, namely to purchase land to conduct:

A combined Operations and Training Centre for the County and West Berks Area

A centre and hall for Woodley Division

A centre and hall for Newbury Division.

The fourth project is to purchase 6 more ambulances.

There was considerable discussion about local footpaths and who is responsible for their upkeep. While the Highway Authority has the

ultimate responsibility it would be unrealistic to expect it to maintain every footpath and bridleway in Berkshire. District Councils undertake some of the work and Newbury carries out its commitments through the Community Programme Agency. In many areas volunteers undertake the clearance of paths. If you would like to assist please check with the landowner first. Also please notify Dennis Gilmore of any areas where clearing needs to be done. The Council approved the application for grant for the re-building of the front of the Pavilion. As the ownership of the building is complicated, the Council agreed that the legal position must be clarified to protect the use of this facility by the village.

Newbury District Council is now offering 'Rural Recreation'. This is a large van adapted to carry equipment for recreational activities for all age groups. It will bring equipment and expertise for different activities to the villages and could provide for example, a mini-gymnastic session for Mothers and Toddler groups, a badminton session, over 50's keep fit, chess, painting, ballet, etc. It is up to groups to make known their requirements. Further details will be in the village shop and please sign the notice, saying what activities you would like.

The meeting ended with a long discussion on whether it would be feasible to replace the village hall and the cricket pavilion with an all purpose building, possibly at the Cold Harbour end of the recreation ground. Please let Parish Councils know your views. The next Parish Council meeting will be on 21 September at 1845 hours.

WEST ILSLEY, FARNBOROUGH, BEEDON AND PEASEMORE

On 1 July the Vicar of Beedon and Peasemore resigned and it has been suggested that a new benefice be formed with the parishes of Beedon, Peasemore, West Ilsley and Farnborough. this grouping of four small parishes instead of two would justify the appointment of a new stipendary vicar. It also reduces the Wantage Downs grouping to four parishes, all on the north side of the Ridgeway, a more manageable grouping, and so a benefit to all.

On Wednesday, 22 July All Saints Church West Ilsley met to discuss this proposal. The matter has been complicated because in February we were told the first choice for a site for a new vicarage was West Ilsley, and three months later those promoting the scheme tell us Beedon is pastorally a better place for the vicarage. West Ilsley has welcomed the initial proposal, but Wednesday's meeting now wonders why we should be linked with Beedon and Peasemore when all contacts are with East Ilsley and Compton. The primary school is in East Ilsley, the secondary school at Compton, so that valuable pastoral considerations favour such an arrangement. This of course may not be possible, but the matter has been referred back to the Bishop.

IN REPLY TO THE OPEN LETTER OF JUNE AND REPLY TO OPEN LETTER OF JULY

Following Ed's remarks last month that a Parish Councillor may like to take the floor, I am, below, stirred into action, but wish to preface this reply with the statement that what follows does not necessarily reflect the views of the Parish Council but are merely the observations of a resident of West Ilsley for 43 years.

Firstly, I wish to appraise the excellent response from Tina Gibbs last month, her vision of West Ilsley as a refuge from the rat race is certainly one I greatly appreciate, and her defence of the village pond and play area need no further comment.

Our anonymous writer asks if we should have a village plan; indeed one was prepared some years ago with great effort and little, if any, effect. An example would be the section dealing with future growth and expansion of the village, and retention of open areas of land, which certainly had no bearing on the later development of West Ilsley House (now the Maltings) and of Fir Tree Paddock, neither would a new plan prevent further development within the village if Central and Local Government decreed it was within the requirements of the Town and Country Planning Acts.

Plans for 'saving' the bus service, the Post Office or the village shop can only be formulated if one is aware they are about to cease; or do we have parishoners waiting on the side lines with mini-buses, postage stamps or tins of baked beans ready to step in if these village institutions fail?

On the subject of providing more than one sports and social facility this also was raised and discussed in great depth more recently when the Cricket Club wished to provide changing rooms and showers at the Pavilion.

Obviously, the village hall could not, by location, serve as a pavilion and it was suggested that it be sold for conversion into a dwelling and the proceeds used, together with club funds, to construct a new complex serving all the requirements of village organisations, in the recreation ground. This was coupled with a suggestion, by the then captain, Mike Robson, that a West Ilsley Sports & Social Club be formed to service its needs. One small problem - the village hall belongs to Lockinge Estate and if sold for development they would receive the money.

What a shame our anonymous scribe, who certainly holds strong views about the village, did not make these views known in person at the recently poorly attended Parish Council AGM. As you so correctly pointed out, 'the elected representatives deserve the support and assistance of the voters'. Where were you?

**WHITHER OR WITHER?
THE WEST ILSLEY DEBATE - CHAPTER
THREE**

Tina Gibbs is right! West Ilsley is primarily a farming and racing community, nestled in a little...- (sigh!) hollow atop the... (yawn) Berkshire Downs and... (snooze) it really is a nice... (big yawn) sleepy vill.....ZZZZZZZZZZZZZZ!

Wake up! To really conserve West Ilsley as a living community there has to be a measure of organisation otherwise the village will become a true 'dormitory' full of strangers passing at high-speed in their Range Rovers and Porshces on their way to find the meaning of life elsewhere. (Incidentally, it would be interesting to know how many people presently living in West Ilsley were born here!).

As we are among the newest arrivals we are anxious to protect those

aspects of the village which first attracted us to make our home here. However, some change is inevitable, and whilst not wishing to defend someone not brave enough to sign his/her name, there are three points which need emphasizing from Anon's letter - none of which actually contradict anything Tina Gibbs wrote, but are obviously misunderstood, by her emotive tone.

1. Anon was not suggesting the building of a 'sports centre', as Ms Gibbs accuses. It makes total sense to combine as many functions in one building as possible. Thus it is a waste of village resources to have separate cricket pavillion, village hall, etc. Combining just these two functions would be of benefit to all, giving both functions more space. It could even be large enough to house some indoor sport for those winter months when some of us are not brave enough to play soccer in the snow. But this hardly comprises a 'sports centre'. As it is, the village hall lacks even enough space to store a few toys to run an effective play group. The answer would seem to be for mothers and children to travel to Compton or Hampstead Norreys, thus destroying further the social fabric of the community in this generation - and the next.

2. Whilst in Compton, or elsewhere, visiting the playgroup or whatever, why not do some shopping, or pop into Newbury Post Office?. Then there would be no need for them in West Ilsley. Rather than exhorting people to travel out of the village, as Ms Gibbs does, she should support anything to keep people in the village, thus ensuring that the shop and Post Office - and the economy of the village - survive.

3. Cars. When there are more than a few people in the pub, the view of the village pond is destroyed by parked cars. If Anon were to follow Ms Gibbs suggestion to 'sit by the pond, relax and enjoy nature'

he/she has good chance of being choked on carbon monoxide - or run over. In this day and age a car park is a necessity if we are not to litter the roads and paths with hulks of coloured metal. If we can't get rid of them at least we can put them all in one place. And whilst on the subject of cars, the simple way to slow down traffic is a series of 'sleeping policemen' - or bumps in the road - placed at reasonable distances and especially near junctions. I hope we don't have to have a fatal accident before some measures are taken.

In conclusion, there is nothing contradictory about Ms Gibbs view of the village and Anon's proposals. We all want to live in a small community - that's why we're here - and we all want a 'refuge from the 'rat-race'' - but equally, West Ilsley cannot stagnate. Like it or not, there will be more outsiders moving in during the coming decade and the best way to cope with us is to have a solid foundation on which to build a community into which we can be integrated rather than distrust.

I apologise if this letter is over-long and if it offends anyone by its tone - but frank and open discussion is the first step towards a more understanding and closer community. West Ilsley, rather like its beautiful church, has a solid foundation, but its roof needs serious attention from time to time to stop dry rot and other forces eventually destroying it. Please look upon we 'new-comers' as sturdy new timbers wanting to support the roof, rather than being part of the framework of a new building.
