

John Howell MP writes

The structure of Government, national and local, can be confusing. When someone needs help with something it can be difficult to know just who is responsible for what, and therefore who can help when things do not go as they should. I often receive requests from people to help them with issues that are not Parliamentary matters and with which I cannot help. I appreciate that this can be frustrating and so I thought that it might be helpful if I set out who does what.

It is often thought that an MP sits at the top of a hierarchy of Government and has power to direct local councils. This is not the case. Local councils are autonomous, and MPs do not have any jurisdiction over local council decisions. Hence local councils have their own elected representatives in the form of councillors. People elected to these councils have direct access to officers at the respective councils and so are better placed to take up relevant issues. I have found that referring to local councillors is the quickest way to get action.

So, to help steer through the hierarchy let me set out who does what. Essentially as an MP I can help with issues and concerns that relate to central government departments. In Oxfordshire we have three tiers of local government, the County Council, District Councils and Parish Councils or Parish Meetings. Oxfordshire County Council is responsible for local services such as education, social services, transport, roads, rights of way, libraries, the fire service, and bus subsidies. The constituency is served by two district councils, Cherwell and South Oxfordshire. They are responsible for local services, including planning, housing, rubbish collection, environmental services, leisure services, some car parks and council tax collection. Parish Councils and Parish Meetings deal with very local concerns and can influence the other councils on behalf of residents.

Whilst on the topic of what I can and cannot do it may also be helpful to comment on requests to attend specific events. When Parliament is sitting MPs are expected to be in Westminster from Monday to Thursday, unless on other parliamentary business elsewhere. During a week in Westminster there are many competing demands such as scrutinising legislation, attending debates, committees, and other meetings. These competing demands mean that it is not always possible to attend a particular debate or drop-in session that a constituent may ask me to attend. When I cannot attend something it does not reflect lack of interest, simply that I cannot be in two places at once.

I hope that setting this out is helpful and answers several questions that I have been asked of late. If there is a particular issue that concerns you, please do share your thoughts. My contact details are on my website - www.johnhowell.org.uk.






Quad Stretch

The quadriceps (or quads for short) are a group of muscles located on the front of the thigh. Their role is to extend or straighten the knee. We use these muscles when we walk, run, stand, sit, kick, climb stairs etc. As with all muscles it is important to look after them and this involves not only strengthening them but also stretching them so that they remain balanced with their antagonist (muscle on the opposite side of the joint) in this case the hamstrings.





Stretching the quads involves flexing (bending) the knee. This can either be done in a standing position (picture A above) or in a lying position (picture B). If you struggle to reach your ankle from either position you can put a towel or an exercise band around your ankle and then pull on that (as shown in the pictures, cat optional).

As with all stretches, form is very important. For this stretch you are aiming to have your knee, hip and shoulder in a straight line. You then bend the knee by pulling the ankle towards the bottom as far as you can whilst maintaining knee, hip and shoulder in a straight line. At some point during bending the knee you will start to feel a stretch in the front of the thigh. How much you put the muscles into stretch is a personal thing (how much discomfort can you withstand). Once you have got to your maximum point of stretch hold that position for at least 30 seconds and then gently release before repeating on the other leg. If doing this stretch standing up, I would recommend having something within reach to help with balance, just in case! Happy stretching! 

And from our District Councillor....

I've become aware that some district councillors include their own council and committee meeting attendance in their monthly report, and I thought Haseley Brook parishes might also like to see this information. My attendance record from May to date stands at 88%, and council meetings attended in September were as follows: • 11th Sept - Licensing panel • 13th Sept - Training (planning enforcement) • 20th September - Planning Committee • I also spoke as ward member at planning committee on 11th September and 20th September. The next full council meeting will be on 12th October.

Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete (RAAC)

Regarding concerns around the historic use of RAAC, SODC released the following statement on 7th September: "We are not aware of, and have no reason to believe, there are any issues with our council properties. However, in light of the increased national concern around Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete (RAAC), our property team is as a priority, currently reviewing our building records. We will follow up if necessary and this will include taking concrete samples for further analysis if needed. Our approach is purely a matter of caution and diligence given the national situation". The update received earlier this week is that there is no known RAAC is SODC properties, however a working group is being set up to organise detailed surveys.

Available Grants

In partnership with Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment (TOE), SODC has created a Nature Recovery fund of £50,000 to increase biodiversity and encourage public access to green spaces in the district. Community groups, town and parish councils, charities and non-profit organisations are invited to apply to TOE for funds to help look after South Oxfordshire's green spaces. Grants ranging between £1,000 and £15,000 can be used for tree and hedgerow planting or restoring community orchards, ponds, and naturerich meadows. Grants could also be used to improve access to nature for the public to enjoy and learn from. This could include replacing stiles with gates for better accessibility and also improving pathways. The new fund uses money from Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) paid by developer contributions. Early applications are encouraged, so any South Oxfordshire based group involved in protecting and restoring their local environment should contact TOE to find out more

District Councillor Cont'd

Check it before you chuck it!

SODC is urging residents to 'Check it before you chuck it' as part of a drive to increase the amount and quality of recycling in the district. It can be very difficult to remove non-recyclable items out of the large loads of recycling in our collection trucks or at the recycling facility, and if it's food waste or other messy items then it could result in whole truckloads of recycling having to be rejected. South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse have placed in the national top ten districts for recycling every year since 2009; the districts are currently second and fourth best recycling districts in the country, however we all need the occasional reminder! An estimated 3,340 tonnes – the equivalent of just over 200 double decker buses – of items that residents put in their recycling bins during 2022/23 were not actually recyclable – that's 11 per cent of all the contents of our green bins for the whole year! This autumn, South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils will be placing stickers on all green household recycling bins to encourage people to 'Check it before you chuck it'. The sticker features a QR code for people to scan to help them check, along with a reminder that all items in the green bin should be clean, dry and loose.

Even if the label says that something can be recycled, we should still check to make sure, since recycling labels on packaging are often incorrect and we may not be able to recycle that item locally.



View from Views ...

Last month I mentioned the lack of growth in our Oil Seed Rape (OSR) crop, we now discover that the problem is two-fold not only is it suffering from cabbage stem flea beetle but also slugs. we are not the only ones to have suffered this fate, it seems to be nationwide. What's annoying is that in the areas where the last crop suffered from pigeon damage, shed seed has sprouted and is looking really like a good crop would do. Sadly, we have to write off 2/3's of this year's planting and give the land a break. Having made that decision what do we replace it with, maybe Beans, a crop we have not grown for many years, and Lupins. Both being legumes will build some fertility in the soil, unfortunately, both tend to be subject to various conditions that can severely affect yield, having just cut a disappointing yield of Lupins the jury is out. Although a bit soon to jump to a decision, I think they should be given a third chance as it is a protein crop that will replace the importation of Soya, and provide a home grown protein source, meaning it could be of great value in the future. We now have both winter Barley and Wheat, plus a new alternative supported by Government, Grass and Clover being a conservation crop. This year's Winter Wheat planting we approached differently. You may wonder why I mention this. Following last seasons OSR, we planted a cover crop of Buckwheat & Phacelia, this is to sequester carbon and save nutrients etc. We then planted directly into the cover crop, which is standing at about 18 inches tall, a first for us. Apart from having hopefully killed the cover with Round Up the day before, we have saved the fuel of a plough and cultivation, leaving the crop residue for a mulch on the ground, this will protect the young plants and, help retain moisture. That's the theory anyway, we will see what happens. It all went without a hitch thanks to modern equipment. Fingers crossed the slugs don't have a field day. Last month I intimated that most wildlife was either sheltering from the rain or the heat, I think now they seem to have acclimatised to these weather swings and are more in evidence. We are informed that the UK is probably the most nature depleted area of the world. I would take issue with this having just had a week in Canada where wildlife somehow did not seem to exist, so where this idea comes from I cannot imagine. We did spend a lot of time in city's but, also had two days drive through open country. In the last few weeks of party conferences we have been told what each party is going to do for us, sadly agriculture hardly got a mention. To me this is very worrying as food is the most important commodity we have and with the world situation being under tremendous threat now, our food security should be of paramount importance. To cap it all one MP (J-R-M) expressed his lack of knowledge on issues agricultural by saying the NFU were protectionist by objecting to the import of hormone treated beef, when it was the government, in the face of public opinion, who banned it in the first place. Now the PM is proposing to lift some of the environmental restrictions on planning, this flies in the face of all that we and the conservation movement has been spending a multitude of energy and finance on. Are we not at the point where we ask ourselves do we want expansion and more development and forget about nature as I believe this is a choice we may well have to make.

It is suggested that farming is the biggest polluter, it is also the largest industry in the UK and, said to be contributing more to our GDP than any other industry, so it is little wonder that it is one of the bigger polluters especially in areas where there is intensive animal production, these areas I understand have plans to alleviate this problem, by trucking the waste away or processing it, to reduce its bulk for more efficient disposal. It is interesting on this particular point, to note the results I have had from taking monthly samples of run off from our land. This has shown that most of the nitrates in this runoff comes either from springs or other sources, not the land drains. A water course that is from land with no springs shows very little Nitrates but after it is joined by runoff from the village the nitrate is considerable, in another situation where a field drainage system is fed by springs the nitrates are high. This points to the fact that a lot of nitrate runoff is not from fertiliser applied to the land but some other factor, I would suggest rotting vegetation perhaps from some time in the past.


