Sit back and watch the drama unfold in this very funny play but don't pull the communication cord – the new Guard won't be happy!





POLICE UPDATE

Dear Residents

I am pleased to be able to report that we have had no reported crime within the Parish during the past month. I do however make a plea to all residents, if unfortunately you are a victim of

crime please do report it. Recently in our area albeit not of this magazine, a secure office within a secure compound was broken into and an item valued at £40 was stolen. For some reason no one called the Police however, the thieves appear to have used this as a dummy run as they returned some weeks later, broke in again, and stolen property valued at £8,000. Had we been made aware, enquiries could have been made with CCTV, local residents, police related cameras etc. Reporting crime, any crime, is also really important as we the Police need to know what is happening in our communities, where as a result of crime we need to target our resources, check to see if it is part of a series of similar crimes and as in this case we could have warned similar local businesses to be on their quard.

Please report all crime via 101, on line at https://www.hampshire.police.uk or give me a call.

May I also ask local residents to keep an eye on the Jolly Farmer while it is closed, I note the fencing etc but we do not want the car park being used for 'unlawful occupation' or crime.

Just out of our area over in Oakley we have been experiencing several thefts from vehicle in the early hours of the morning. Predominately it is works vans that are being targeted with a black estate car similar to a BMW seen with two men loading up tools stolen from works vans. If you use a van for work please take tools out at night, if this is not possible try to park the vehicle with the doors against a wall or close to another vehicle to stop the rear doors being opened. While in Preston Candover between 1.30 and 3.30pm on Sunday 21st April a van and a car were broken into and property including wallets and tools were stolen; some of the property was later found at Farleigh Wallop Church. A similar incident where a car was broken into took place at Herriard Sports Club during similar times. I ask all residents to please take valuables with you if you park your vehicle in isolated areas.

And finally now we are into Spring please be aware of the seasonal increase in theft of tools from garden sheds (two broken into in Axford overnight of 22nd/23rd April), and items usually handbags from parked cars in our beauty spots. For expensive tools and equipment please mark them and record serial numbers, for expensive items take photographs.

For vehicles parked up please DO NOT leave steal-able items in the car, remove sat-navs and any electrical items that thieves using equipment can now detect in your vehicle, even in the boot.

Rooster Cogburn is an American western adventure film directed by Stuart Millar and starring John Wayne (in his penultimate film) and Katharine Hepburn.

The film is about an aging lawman trying to regain his credibility, following a string of routine arrests that went wrong He is helped by a spinster searching for her father's killer. Rooster Cogburn is a sequel to the 1969 film <u>True Grit</u>, which won for Wayne his only Academy Award for Best Actor in 1970.

Thursday 6 June 'The Way' (2010) Certificate 12, 115 minutes

The Way is a Spanish drama film directed, produced and written by Emilio Estevez and starring Martin Sheen, Deborah Kara Unger, James Nesbitt.

The film honours the Camino de Santiago and promotes the traditional pilgrimage. Saying he did not want the film to appeal to only one demographic, Emilio Estevez called the film 'pro-people, pro-life, not anti-anything'.

R ather than the usual dry report about steady bookings and trends in income and expense, I thought I'd take some time to reflect on my last 10 years as Chair of Trustees of the Village Hall – half the life of this Hall. Ten years that on the one hand has gone in the blink of an eye but on the other hand seems so full of achievements that I sometimes wonder how we, as volunteers, have the time to fit it all in.

THE LAST 10 YEARS

... has seen the Hall consolidating its popularity and continuing to host a wide range of regular weekly activities such as Ballet, Zumba, Art, Brownies and the Toddler group, along with monthly meetings for groups such as the Film Club, the WI, the Horticultural Society and many, many more.

It is a 10 years of being available for private hire for Weddings, Anniversaries, Birthday Parties and all sorts of other occasions, mostly happy but sometimes sad.

... 10 years of plays and pantomimes from our own Cliddesden Players which are now not only an integral feature on the Village's social calendar but continue to contribute a significant amount to the Hall's income, and for this I yet again proffer my heartfelt thanks to the Players.

... 10 years of regular income always exceeding controlled expense which ensures we have maintained a rolling surplus, allowing us to keep the Hall in a very good state of repair.

... 10 years of constant care and attention of the caretakers, cleaners, gardeners and Trustees and a good number of villagers, ensuring that the Hall is always kept in tip-top shape, little issues don't become big problems, and the grounds always look good. All of which has resulted in many favourable comments offered whenever the Hall is mentioned.

... 10 years of always looking to improve the facilities, resulting in the completion of many significant projects over this period including new slopes and steps to improve access to the gardens, improved sewerage facilities, better utilisation of loft space, as well as the annual redecoration of the Hall.



STORAGE PROJECT

But I suppose there has been no bigger project than the one we embarked on a few years ago, culminating in 2018 being the year in which we improved our storage capabilities. And with all the lofts and every nook and cranny utilised for storage, this was a well overdue improvement. As we all now know, successful applications for a number of grants provided us with the funding to turn this dream into reality, seeing the vision turned into detailed plans early in 2018, grants formally awarded and the build commencing in September with the new building now complete.



HERE'S WHAT THE RHS SAYS ABOUT GARDEN JOBS IN MAY

- 1 Watch out for late frosts. Protect tender plants
- 2 Earth up potatoes, and promptly plant any still remaining
- 3 Plant out summer bedding at the end of the month (except in cold areas)
- 4 Water early and late to get the most out of your water, recycle water when possible
- 5 Regularly hoe off weeds
- 6 Open greenhouse vents and doors on warm days
- 7 Mow lawns weekly
- 8 Check for nesting birds before clipping hedges
- 9 Lift and divide overcrowded clumps of daffodils and other spring-flowering bulbs
- 10 Watch out for viburnum beetle and lily beetle grubs.

With the weather warming up, and so much to do, it's sometimes easy to forget the simple pleasures of a garden – just to stand still, take a look around us. There are so many things going on, not just the weeds growing! A few deep breaths of can 'feed' us, just as we feed our plants.

Cliddesden Primary School such a busy end to our spring Term

Year 4 Heartstart Children in year 4 attended Heartstart workshops throughout the week; these are intended to teach children lifesaving skills. They learnt how to recognise the symptoms of someone who maybe having a heart attack or cardiac arrest and how to deal with the situation, including how to perform CPR. They learnt how to put someone into the recovery position when they are unconscious and how to help someone if they are choking.





World Down Syndrome Day To celebrate World Down Syndrome Day all the children came to school in their fabulous odd socks. We are celebrating this cause because we have two children in the school and it is really important for us to be as inclusive as possible and help raise awareness. It was explained to our children what Down Syndrome is and in an assembly they were taught a few Makaton signs and were signing along to The Greatest Showman's song, a Million Dreams. £111.66 was raised for our local Stepping Stones charity.



Book Week Everyone enjoyed celebrating book week. We were delighted to welcome author Anne Wan to our school who held creative workshops for our younger children and the older children learnt all about the writing process and how small ideas can lead to a story. We held a Spelling Bee competition to find the best speller in each year group, staff brought in books with some objects linked to each one and challenged the children to match all the objects to their books. For example there was "The smartest giant in town" and a gold paper crown with a tie, and a butterfly from "The very hungry"

caterpillar". The children enjoyed buddy reading with someone from a different class and all classes wrote a story using an image of a strange forest. The highlight of the week was World Book day, we loved seeing all the different costumes and the week finished with an exciting Big Book Quiz.

Willow Class – Castle Themed Parent Workshop They tried medieval dancing in the morning, prepared a feast for the afternoon and enjoyed reading the book *Dragon Stew*. In the afternoon their grown ups joined us for different activities. We created colourful potions and had brilliant ideas for how to use them; blowing up houses, turning people into frogs or unicorns... There was an enormous castle built from a range of materials.

Chestnut Class – Roman Parent Workshop Chestnut Class Emperors invited their parents in to assist with building their chariots. Having measured and

cut the wood for the frame and designed and decorated the outside of the chariot, all that was left to do was to put everything together. The Emperors impressed everyone with their knowledge of the Romans including how mosaics are made and the different shield formations Roman soldiers would use in battle. There were non-

fiction books and Roman artifacts, which the Chestnut Emperors told their grown-ups all about. Parents had the opportunity to go back to school and write their name using the Roman alphabet. However, it was not all hard work for the adults as they did have the pleasure of playing a Roman game with an Emperor!





Willow Class visit QMC The children were very excited to take their first visit out of school on minibuses to QMC. The children had the opportunity to learn all about living things through different activities. They learnt how to care for animals and their environment, they looked at which animals certain food or product came from and worked out which animals were wild or those we could keep as pets. They found it hard sorting animals into herbivores, omnivores or carnivores but succeeded with the help of their adult.

Year 5 visit QMC and were invited to work with volunteers from AWE to find out more about Space. They found out why we have different

seasons as well as why we have different time zones. They also learnt about the vacuum of Space. Their favourite part of the afternoon was making paper rockets. They investigated which adaptations made the rocket fly further and discovered that a nose cone and 3 fins made the rocket fly the entire length of the QMC hall.





Chestnut Class visit Fishbourne Roman Palace A great trip supporting their Roman Topic. After reading the review written by Max, would you be tempted to visit? 'Great for school trips – 4.5* Fishbourne Roman Palace is a great way to find out about a rich person or family living at that time. The garden plants were flattened but new ones were placed exactly where they were. In the workshop you get to role play slave jobs which school children might find interesting living the life of a Roman slave for one day.
