Parish Council News

As we reach the end of the year, there is much to reflect on – and plan for! Please do respond to the consultation in the centre pages to help shape the various facilities in the parish. Your magazine is our way of communicating directly to your household in addition to our web site and Facebook page. We look forward to reviewing the responses to help us shape how we move forward.

The parish is expanding with new developments underway along Aston Clinton Road and the Hampden Fields development due to start soon. This will bring challenges but we are speaking with them regularly in order to keep our residents updated on anything that may affect the village and the wider area. We are also working on plans to see if we can gain some of the section 106 funds for our parish.

We have had a change of councillors, saying goodbye to some long serving members — Mandi Simons, Jim Paterson and Michael Conolly who we thank for their time and service. Each one of them has helped shaped the parish in positive ways for the benefit of us all. We also welcome new councillors — Ernesto Martinez and Saryo Dawkins. They have already shown a great willingness to work on several committees and bring their knowledge and skills to help us look after our parish.

Parish Councillor Vacancy

Following the resignation of ClIr Simons, a vacancy has occurred for a parish councillor. The required 10 electors have written to Bucks Council requesting that the vacancy be filled by an election. A date for the election was set for November but sadly there were no nominations received by the deadline. A new election date has been set for 5th January 2023 and the deadline for nominations is 4pm on 6th December. If you are interested but would like to find out more before committing please contact the Chairman, Vice Chair or Clerk.

Road Safety

In the last issue of the Weston Turville Times, you will have read about the work the Parish Council does with regard to monitoring and reporting the speed of vehicles travelling through the parish.

The Parish Council is also regularly contacted about HGVs and skip lorries using village roads. None of the roads within the parish of Weston Turville have weight restrictions so drivers of these vehicles are not breaking any laws by using the highways through the

parish. However, some of the large developments have a Construction Traffic Management Plan in place that has a routing agreement – in these cases if the use of village roads such as Marroway and Main Street is not allowed within the plan then Bucks Council's Planning Enforcement Team can take action. In order for them to be able to do that, they will need the vehicle registration number and the development site they are accessing. Please forward this information on to the Clerk if you see this happening and she will take it up with Planning Enforcement.

Village Hall Car Park

Following repeated damage to the post and chain link fencing which protects the grassed area inside the car park entrance, the Council has agreed to tarmac over the grass and relocate the dog waste bin and sign. One section of railing will also be removed to widen the entrance. It is hoped that these measures will help ease congestion at busy times. At the same time the car park bays will be repainted. This work will be carried out during February half term — please be aware that the car park will be closed to ALL cars whilst works are being carried out.

Reminder This car park is for users of the village hall and recreation ground only.

New home energy schemes for low-income residents

Climate Action Weston Turville (CAWT) working in conjunction with the Parish Council is pleased to announce the Sustainable Warmth scheme, a grant funding opportunity delivered by City Energy and the Greater South-East Net Zero Hub on behalf of Buckinghamshire Council. The funding, provided by the Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy could see hundreds of households benefit from energy efficiency and low carbon heating measures to reduce bills and carbon emissions.

The grants are for households with a gross annual income of less than £30,000 or a household income of less than £20,000 after housing costs and where the property has an energy (EPC) rating of D or lower.

The scheme is open to both homeowners and those who rent privately. For owner occupiers, the work will be carried out for free. For rental properties (whether private or social), the landlord will be expected to pay at least one third of the cost towards the work.

Applications are open now to eligible households at: www.buckinghamshire-applications.co.uk.

The closing date for applications is 31st December 2022.

Buckinghamshire Council has secured just under £5m of capital funding. This will be allocated as follows:

- £3.2 million through the Local Authority Delivery 3 (LAD3) scheme to support low-income households in Bucks on the gas grid with energy efficiency and low carbon heating measures such as cavity wall insulation, solar PV and loft insulation
- £1.7 million through the Home Upgrade Grant (HUG) to support low-income households in Bucks that are not connected to the gas grid with energy efficiency and low carbon heating measures such as external wall insulation, underfloor insulation and air source heat pumps



Wendover Canal Trust

The Wendover Canal Trust was formed in 1989 at a time when there was a danger of the canal suffering further deterioration due to neglect. Wendover Canal is 6.75 miles long and links Wendover to the Grand Union Canal at Bulbourne. The Trust is working hard to restore the canal by rebuilding and relining it. All work is carried out by volunteers and the Trust holds regular working parties to carry out the restoration of the canal. It is possible to walk the entire length of the canal. You can also walk around the nearby Weston Turville and Tring reservoirs which were created to store water for the canal.

The Wendover Canal Trust's Restoration project has been divided into three phases:

in the first, the Grand Union Canal from Bulbourne to Little Tring now has full navigation for narrowboats following restoration work and the complete rebuilding of the bridge at Little Tring.

The second phase, from Little Tring to Buckland Wharf, is currently



underway. The stretch used to be almost impassable and is now being transformed into a watertight navigable canal with extensive biodiversity. By the end of this phase the whole canal will be in water for the first time in over 100 years.

In the third phase, when the canal is restored via dredging to sufficient navigable depth, and three bridges have been raised, narrowboats will be able to reach Wendover.

Towpaths The Canal and River Trust has recently been awarded grant funding to improve the towpath on the Wendover Arm which will improve the surface, making it resistant to flooding and accessible year round.

The Trust relies entirely on grants, donations and volunteers. If you would like to get involved or maybe purchase a bridge plaque please visit the website www.wendovercanal.org.uk for more information.

The surveys will be made freely available to homeowners and will be posted on our website so that everyone can access expert advice on improvements to increase home energy efficiency and appropriate renewable energy technology for their type of house. The reports will be produced by leading independent home energy consultants, CLPM.

If you're successful you'll receive a visit from a CLPM surveyor and, following that, a free report detailing the age and construction of your property and analysing the existing insulation and heating provision. This will be accompanied by advice on how you can make your home more energy efficient and which renewable energy technologies would be appropriate to install.

According to a recent study, 71% of British adults do not get the recommended 7-9 hours of sleep per night, with 14% surviving on less than 5 hours per night (1). Here are some tips from a Psychotherapist which could help to improve your sleep:

Find your routine!

Train your body to sleep by going to bed and waking at the same times every day - even weekends! Try to create a bedtime routine with gentle stretches. mindfulness or reading. Exercise in your day can help you sleep, but not too close to bedtime.





Think about your space!

Your bedroom should be super comfy. Do you need new pillows? Is your room too bright? Do you watch the clock? Try to keep your room nice and cool. Only use your bed for sleep and intimacy - no working or watching TV!

Beware of stimulants!

Caffeine is a stimulant. Tea, coffee, fizzy drinks, energy drinks and even chocolate can contain caffeine. Try not to drink caffeine within 6 hours of bedtime. Be aware of sugary foods and nicotine too close to bedtime.





Naps are banned!

You need a certain amount of sleep each night. If you nap during the day, you may struggle to sleep as you have used some of that allowance. If you lose sleep, you only need to make up around one third of your lost sleep.

Turn off those screens!

Turn on your device's blue light filter or your brain could be alert and suppress sleep hormones (2). Try to limit screen time (including TV) in the hour before bed. Remove the TV from your bedroom or turn it off at the wall.





If at first you don't succeed...

...Get up! Try to go to sleep when you are sleepy. If you struggle to fall asleep, get up and do something relaxing until you feel sleepy and then go back to bed. If you are overthinking, write it down and come back to it in the morning.

If you need more support to improve your sleep, you could consider a course of Cognitive Behavioural Therapy for Insomnia (CBT-I), or speak to your GP.

Spinach Kedgeree with spiced salmon

For the kedgeree

2 tsp rapeseed oil

1 large onion, halved and sliced

thumb-sized piece of ginger, finely chopped

½ tsp cumin seeds

½ tsp ground cinnamon

6-8 cardamom pods, seeds crushed

1½ tsp ground turmeric

1½ tsp ground coriander

1 red chilli, deseeded and sliced

1 garlic clove, finely chopped

1 large red pepper, deseeded and roughly chopped

70g brown basmati rice

375ml vegetable stock, made with 2 tsp bouillon powder

160g baby spinach leaves, roughly chopped

For the salmon

3 tbsp fat-free natural yogurt

1 tbsp finely chopped mint or coriander

2 skinless wild salmon fillets

1 tbsp toasted almonds, to serve

Heat the oil in a large frying pan and fry the onion and ginger for 5 mins or until soft. Add the cumin, cinnamon, crushed cardamom seeds, and 1 tsp each of the turmeric and coriander. Cook for 30 secs until fragrant. Add the chilli, garlic, pepper and rice, stir briefly, then pour in the stock. Cover and simmer for 35 mins or until the rice is tender and the stock has been absorbed. If the rice is cooked but some liquid remains, remove the lid and simmer uncovered to allow the liquid to evaporate. Add the spinach, cover and cook for 3 mins to wilt.

Meanwhile, prepare the salmon. Heat the grill to medium and line a baking sheet with foil. Mix the yogurt with the mint or coriander and the remaining turmeric and ground coriander. Spread the yogurt mixture over the salmon, then transfer to the prepared baking sheet and grill for 8-10 mins until the fish can be flaked easily with a fork. Top the kedgeree with the salmon fillets or flake the fish into it, and scatter over the almonds to serve.

Coffee Crunch Cake

Ingredients

175g softened butter, plus extra for greasing

175g caster sugar

3 medium eggs

175g self-raising flour

1 tsp baking powder

For the meringue topping

2 egg whites

100g caster sugar

3 tsp instant coffee granules

25g chopped walnuts

For the filling

100g softened butter

50g icing sugar, sifted

For the drizzle icing

3 tbsp icing sugar

Make the meringue: whisk the egg whites until stiff, add half the sugar, whisk again until stiff, then repeat with the remaining sugar. Mix the coffee with 3 tbsp boiling water to dissolve the granules. Gently fold the walnuts and 1 tsp of the coffee into the meringue. Set aside while you make the cake mixture.

Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Grease 2 x 20cm loose-bottomed sandwich tins and line the bases with baking parchment. Beat together the butter and sugar until light and fluffy, then gradually whisk in the eggs. Fold in the flour and baking powder, then finally fold in 2 tsp of the coffee liquid. Divide the mixture between the 2 tins, putting a little more mixture in one than the other.

Spread the meringue on top of the tin containing less cake mix. Bake the untopped sponge for about 20 mins until an inserted skewer comes out clean. Continue baking the meringue-topped sponge for an additional 20 mins, then carefully remove both cakes from their tins and leave to cool on a wire rack.

To make the filling, beat the butter and icing sugar together, adding 2 tsp more coffee. To make the icing, mix a final tsp of the coffee into the icing sugar. Add a drop more water to make a runny icing. Sandwich the 2 cakes together with the coffee filling, putting the meringue topped sponge on top. Drizzle all over with the coffee icing to finish.


