1 million people to plant trees with a campaign slogan "Help tackle Climate Change one tree at a time". The Trust indicates that reducing carbon emissions will not be enough and they are actively encouraging a UK – wide patchwork of newly grown trees, woods and hedgerows.

Our seed plantation has enough saplings to make a start on planting sometime in the spring but with no thanks to the deer who have been spotted grazing on it from time to time!

But to thicken it, the Trust has advised me that I can expect more than 100 bare roots corresponding to a 'medium wood' to be delivered to my address in late February. I suspect that number will be too many for infilling in the plan I have made. Which means there will be a number of saplings 'up for grabs' for anyone who would like to plant a tree in their garden. At this stage, I haven't a clue what type of trees we shall receive but if you would like to be on the list please let me know.



**Dear Residents** 

I am seeking any information in relation to the following crimes that have taken place since the New Year in the area of this magazine.

At 10:45 on January 5th 2020, The Conkers Garden Centre near Mapledurwell was broken into by two white men, one had a beard and spectacles, tall and of slim build. I am aware they cut the gate padlocks and drove their vehicle into the car park of the centre, I ask if anyone was passing and may have seen a vehicle in that area at that time, if so please call. Overnight of January 10th and 11th a yard in Tunworth Road, Mapledurwell was broken into and diesel from a tractor was stolen after the vehicle was damaged. The following evening of January 12th and 13th gates were rammed at a house in Crown Lane in Newnham village and an outbuilding was broken into. Again I ask if anyone was in the areas of these crimes and saw anything untoward to please give me a call direct, as always all calls treated in strictest confidence.

As promised below is the chart for reported crime in yours and neighbouring parishes for 2019. It is important to stress that this is reported crime, sadly a great deal of crime goes unreported, so the figures provided are only those using actual crime recording. For such reasons it is important that if you are a victim of ANY crime, you should reported it via 101 or if an emergency 999, we need to know as it may be part of a trend, linked with other crimes or particular criminals who may have just moved into an area or perhaps passing through, but we need to know.

Across the whole of the area that I police, actual homes being broken into remained the same and low with five being reported over a 75 sq. mile area, however for burglary to sheds and outbuildings rose from 36 in 2018 through to 79 in 2019, as such I continue to urge all residents to please make sure their outbuildings and sheds are secure, please record serial numbers of expensive machinery and mark with your postcode, if possible take photographs of expensive items and especially jewellery.

# Newnham & Nately Scures

#### **NIGEL DOWNES**

We learnt with great sadness that Nigel Downes died on the 23rd of December in Frimley Park hospital. He had been in ICU for some two months and just before Christmas it was discovered he had an auto-immune disorder with underlying lymphoma but unfortunately it was too late.

Nigel and Angela moved to Newnham in 1996 as a convenient berth between her job in the City and his with the Ordnance Survey in Southampton. Together with Angela, Nigel was a keen walker and runner - an outdoor person. He and Angela regularly cycled far and wide, went sailing and skiing. In about 1998 Nigel became the Parish Footpaths Warden, which duty he fulfilled to the end. He was also much involved in helping to run Newnham Clubroom from about 2000 besides delivering the Villager and lately circulating it to all other distributors.

Nigel was a man with a neat sense of humour, he usually preferred beer to wine, a practical man and a great participant in what was needed in the village, but with no ostentation. He quietly did much for all of us - often unnoticed - and we will miss his contribution, indeed he leaves a real gap.

# NOTES FROM THE JANUARY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

**Nigel Downes** The Parish Council recorded the sorrow felt by everyone at the death of Nigel Downes and its condolences to Nigel's wife Angela. He will be greatly missed in the Parish by many, and for the many ways in which he was always ready to help and contribute. This included his 'formal' roles but also being ready to lend a hand with any village task, be it a litter pick or clearing the pond. Nigel may prove irreplaceable considering the amount of work he did for the Clubroom, including maintenance. As Footpaths Warden he could be found scheduling the priority cutting list, liaising with HCC Countryside

Services (HCCCS) over problems or obstructions, or righting a footpath sign with a bag of ready-mix.

The Strings boardwalk Nigel had been in discussion with HCCCS re rebuilding the boardwalk, which had been scheduled for this summer. With part of it collapsing and the whole structure now gone, Countryside Services have rescheduled construction for mid-March with the help of volunteers from the Ramblers Association. HCCCS are responsible and so liable for 'structures' on public rights of way. Any volunteer attempt to rebuild would need to be assessed and signed off by a HCC engineer and would be dismantled if it fell short of safety requirements.

The Parish Council will be looking for another footpath or village project to complete in Nigel's memory.


PC Reid PC Andy Reid as always attended the Parish Council meeting and presented an update on incidents and crime affecting the Parish. His Area presently extends over 22 parishes and plans are afoot to extend this further by including Bramley. Newnham will be joining other Parish Councils in Andy's 'Candover' beat area to oppose this.

Pond and Willow clearing - thanks to all volunteers Thanks are due to all who contributed to the two weekends' work at the Newnham Green Pond to remove much of the fallen Willow and then starting to clear the invasive Crassula Helmsii.

Newnham Village Green and Pond Project Thanks due to Peter James for drafting a 'pond project' to be used as a basis for further work and grant applications. The aim is to enable improvement of the natural conditions of the pond and also lay down a long term improvement and management plan. Bearing in mind this has to be achieved within the guidelines for working in a habitat which is home to protected species.

Church records show tithes for 'servicing' St Nicholas' church from 1129. It is likely the church was there way before that. (It is known there were Romans in Newnham, axheads are still being found dating from Roman times.) Church Path has over centuries been well-used by church goers - families and pall bearers alike would have walked the path. This was when Hook was but a small part of the wider Newnham Parish.

Church Path is a heritage asset due to its historical significance, unique status and the level of continued cultural importance. Importantly it continues to be well-used by people. It also has local importance or its wildlife, not rare but retaining considerable biodiversity.

Newnham Parish Council agreed unanimously that: 'The Friends of Church Path have its full support in their request to Historic England that this historic, cultural, heritage asset should receive graded status throughout its length.'



## A30 SPEED LIMIT REDUCTION AND CONSULTATION

Hampshire County Council (HCC) has agreed to some speed limit reduction on the A30 through Nately Scures. This was initiated by residents' proposals - and then meetings and deputation - supported by Newnham Parish Council and County Councillor Elaine Still. The reductions have been considered as part of a wider review of *Traffic Management and Road Safety issues along the A30 between Basingstoke and Blackwater.* The full report is on the HCC website at:

The *Report* recommends reducing the speed limit to 60 both ways through

The *Report* recommends reducing the speed limit to 60 both ways through Water End from west of the Y-Knot to east of Crown Lane, and to 50 both ways from the bottom of the hill to the existing 50mph limit at the top.

The recommendations were agreed at a HCC 'decision day' in November, again with representation from residents and the Parish Council. Despite best efforts it was evident that there will be no move for greater reductions now, though the situation will be monitored and further review possible. Traffic police - not local police, but specialist traffic officers - will not agree to a speed reduction much below current speeds. Measures must be taken - via traffic calming - to reduce the 'natural speed' of the road.

HCC now has a final 'consultation' to confirm the proposals. Given that Councillors and Officers have confirmed no possibility at this stage of lowering the limit further, the Parish Council will respond to welcome and appreciate any speed limit reduction, but to stress that a maximum 'safe' speed limit on the A30 through all of Nately Scures and Water End is 40mph. Also to express concern that the varying speed limits and changes between numbers of lanes encourages inconsiderate driver behaviour, and that ongoing monitoring and review is needed.

This is to look towards a next step of further speed reduction in the future and to this end the Parish Council would urge everyone to respond. https://www.hants.gov.uk/community/publicnotices/publicnoticedetails?id=10472 The consultation ends on Friday 7th February.


**Newnham Clubroom** Chris Alliston confirmed the Clubroom Committee's wish to contribute to a Project in memory of Nigel Downs.

# NATURAL OIL SHEENS ON WATERLOGGED GROUND

Fields to the north of Newnham Road have been very wet of late and showing an oily film on surface water.

Advice has been sought from BDBC's 'Contaminated Land Officer'. This is naturally occurring and is common in waterlogged ground, or on water bodies in the autumn. The sheen is derived from plant matter broken down by microbial action.

It can look similar to oil sheens from a pollutant, but lacks the typical petroleum smell. Also and particularly, if the water is disturbed, a natural surface film will fracture into pieces and stay dispersed, whereas a petroleum based sheen will move with the water and then reform.

I'd like to share with you one of my favourite passages from the Bible, taken from the book of Numbers in the Old Testament :

The Lord bless you and keep you;

The Lord make his face shine upon you,

be gracious to you;

and give you peace

This blessing is often used during worship services in Church. If you've ever come for a blessing at the Communion rail, you may have heard me pray this over you... or , perhaps, for the whole congregation, at the end of the service.

So as my ministry closes here in North Hampshire, I want to wish God's blessing upon you all.

Here is my modern version:

May God keep you safe in every way. May he look after you and provide for your every need. May He bring you peace which goes far beyond the peace of the world.

May His peace bring good health and well being to each of one of you. And may His peace bring social and physical health to the whole community, bestowing holiness upon all.

Blessings are truly wonderful because they're so reciprocal—they're both given and received.

God blesses us and we receive His blessing.

As Christians, God blesses us in many ways, but especially through the gift of His Son, Jesus Christ, whom we have the great honour to receive by taking Jesus into our hearts. I hope He has found a permanent home among us.

From my husband Len and me, our thanks for all your love and support in the past three years of my ministry. You have been our blessing.

It's been a privilege to serve in our church network, especially in Long Sutton and South Warnbrorugh where I've been the parish priest.

May you receive God's wonderful, abundant blessings in the years ahead.
