Olive was born in and grew up in the village in various places but settling with her parents at New Holbeck Farm. She went to Halam School where she was taught to garden by Miss Wright the headmaster at the Old School House. She left the village temporarily when she married George Kitts and then got divorced and returned back to the village in 1974 to live at Old School House for the rest of her life so overall has lived in the village for nearly 70 years!

She was involved in the village throughout that time as a keen member of the WI as well as nit and natter and tea at 2.30. She worked for Starkeys originally in the fields then worked as a dinner lady at Halam School, then once she retired, she cleaned for Mrs Ewin in the village as well as at the Waggon.

She knew everyone and everyone knew and liked her!

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# Report for Halam News: Halam Annual Parish Meeting – 7.30 pm Thursday 11<sup>th</sup> April 2024 in Halam Village Hall

### **Chairman's Report**

The Chairman stated that last year's Annual Parish Meeting was the last meeting of the previous parish council. He welcomed the parish councillors who took office last May and thanked them for their efforts and contributions over the past year.

After a 50% reduction of the parish precept, it had now been returned to the level that it was three years ago. This year's precept will only just cover the parish council's running costs – we have experienced increased in the cost of insurance, a rise in utility costs, and adjustment to the Clerk's wages. Despite these increases, the parish precept is now still the same as it was when set in 2021.

The King's coronation has been commemorated with a new parish council notice board, and now all four decorative village gateway signs have been put in place.

A grant application to allow the Parish Council to buy the field behind the council houses for parish use was unsuccessful. It was hoped that this land could be used to relocate the allotments and to provide a mixture of open space for village use and some conservation areas. To aid future grant applications, the Parish Council will need to demonstrate support from the village for the purchase of community land. A survey is being sent out to ask if there is support for such an idea.

Roads and hedges in the parish have been a continual bugbear, and the parish council has continued to lobby the County Council, both directly and through our County Councillor, Bruce Laughton. The worse potholes have now been marked up for repair, and the parish council has had some successes with very urgent repairs.

The trees and hedges have been cut back on School Lane, and the 30mph sign can now been seen. Some trimming has been carried out to the hedge at the bottom of Halam Hill, which has helped a bit with the width of the road.

Since October there has been an unprecedented amount of rain which has caused issues with flooding in the village. County Council Principal Officer (Flood Risk Management), Mr Marshal was due to attend this meeting but has had to postpone to a later date t.b.c.

County Council Highways have been contacted regarding the flooding round the ford in Halam to see what further improvements can be done to the drains. And some County Council money has been allocated to improve the drains running from Edingley Hill, down into Halam, along Mansfield Road.

The sewer overloading problems are ongoing (pumping station on the corner of Holme Lane), but solutions are being investigated. Severn Trent and the Drainage Board, along with the Environmental Agency, are looking into the possibility of diverting storm water directly into Halam Beck. There has been a camera survey and some sleeving has been carried out on the drains running under Radley Road. The Parish Council are involved in all these discussions and are working with all the other organisations to improve the situation. The Parish Council has tried to address as many critical areas as possible.

The parish Council has considered and commented on a number of planning applications over the past year. Generally, the District Council's decisions have been in agreement with the parish council's views. Recent changes to planning at District Council means that there can be greater consultation with planning applications that go before the D.C. planning committee.

The chairman thanked the parish councillors for their efforts and support this year. Thanks also to the Clerk and the Financial Officer for their essential guidance in procedural and financial matters. A special thanks to Chris Bevans for the village hall administration. Many thanks to District Cllr Penny Rainbow for her involvement, especially with planning issues, and thanks too to County Cllr Bruce Laughton for support at County level.

# **Open Meeting**

A parishioner highlighted the problems experienced last October with flooding over the bridge at the bottom of Cutlersforth. The council are aware of these issues, and hopefully this is a very rare occurrence.

# Village Hall

- 1. A request had been received to use the hall for a wake for a long-standing resident of the village who had died recently. It was proposed that all such requests for similar use for longstanding parishioners would not be charged for i.e. free use of the village hall. Agreed: 6 for with 1 abstention.
- 2. Chris Bevans proposed a change in method of payment for use of the hall, from PayPal to Sum Up. Agreed unanimously.
- 3. It was agreed to purchase a wi-fi extender so that the bar area can have wi-fi.

# **D-Day 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary** 6<sup>th</sup> June 2024

As reported last month, the initial proposal is for the church bells to be rung at 6.30 p.m. The parish church has declined to hold any church service to commemorate the event. It was stated that villagers could attend the service being held at Southwell Minster if they wished.

A village "bring your own" supper is proposed in a marquee in the field by the Waggon from 7.30p.m. Ed at the pub has been asked if they would like to provide a bar and maybe some food – details t.b.c. – but Ed is receptive to the idea. 1940s music (and maybe some singing) may be arranged. A beacon will be lit at 9.15 p.m.

### **Commemorative Mugs**

There are still a few Queen's Platinum Jubilee and Kings Coronation mugs available. There is also a handful of Queen's Golden Jubilee (2002) mugs spare. Please contact the editor, Chris Bevans if you or your family would like another mug.

#### **Allotments**

Registration of Title – still in progress. A date to be arranged for the Clerk to speak to the solicitor regarding the letting's history of the allotments. Andrew Paris was authorised to sign the land Registry paperwork.

# Roads & Hedges

- 1. Some potholes have been marked up on School Lane.
- 2. The trees and hedges have been cut back on School Lane opposite Pepperbox Cottage. Thanks to the organisers/contractors for leaving the road open on 10th April to allow access for the Lancaster Memorial Service.

3. Holme Lane is in a terrible state, and the parish council continues to put pressure of the county council.

Please report major potholes to the County Council either online or by phone – the more complaints the C.C. receive, the more likely action may be taken.

- 4. Railings along the Beck on the Turnpike Clerk to contact Matt Duckworth at County Council Highways to progress.
- 5. The hedge at the bottom of Halam Hill Andrew Paris to re-send photographs to County Cllr Bruce Laughton showing the narrowing of the road at this section.

# **Best Kept Village Competition**

Halam will be entered into the competition this year. Judging is likely to take place in June, so please keep paths and property frontages looking neat and tidy. The competition allows areas of the village to be excluded from the judging; it was agreed to exclude the Turnpike from the ford, along the railings, up to and including the sewage pumping station.

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# District Cllrs Karen Roberts and Peter Harris Report for April 2024

### Cabinet Mar 26

- The Council has closed their previous loan Scheme to local companies introduced in 2012. Loans of >£1m have been distributed with most of the capital and interest received back but there have been £100,000 defaults, now written off.
- The Jubilee Bridge over the canalised Trent in Newark requires refurbishment. The bridge was not adopted by NCC and is, therefore, not a footpath. The cost will be over £333.000 and a decision to refloor the bridge was deferred
- Empty for two years, a vacant shop in Newark Market Place owned by N&SDC is to be refurbished and relet with a 2.11% return and payback in 52 years.
- There will be a formal consultation on whether public speaking at Planning Committee should be introduced with a maximum of 1 supporter and 1 opponent allowed to speak whilst retaining the Town or Parish Council and Ward Cllr representation to be made too.
- Ollerton and Clipstone: money from the Government will be used to purchase empty commercial buildings to bring them back into use and develop a 'transport hub' in Ollerton. A new Sports Facility could be developed along with the Miners Welfare Trust
- CCTV monitoring will be brought back into Castle House from the monitoring currently done elsewhere
- Peter is following up individual planning issues on Halloughton Road and Landseer Close and at The Vineries

# Planning Committee Mar 4

- An N&SDC proposal at Kings Court for the conversion of the 4 bed flat to two single bed flats and making three new parking spaces was approved
- Government proposes to have an Accelerated Planning Service (APS) initially applying to applications for major commercial development which create 1,000 sqm or more of new or additional employment floorspace. For Newark and Sherwood, this relates to an average of 40 applications per annum. There would be penalties if timescales are not adhered to
- The appeal for the refusal for a 3 double garage at Woodside Cottage, Newark Road, Hockerton, has been dismissed.
