HOTHFIELD NEWS GOES TRANSATLANTIC! - Editor

I was delighted to receive an email from Mary Jane Cox Chris, who lives in Richmond, Virginia USA who had picked up the Hothfield Newsletter on the internet. Jane is descended from a number of Hothfield residents - beginning before 1600 - mainly the Bourne family. Matthew Bourne, died in 1600, was rector in Brooke and Hinxhill - some of his family lived in Hothfield until Jane's ancestor went to America in 1846/7.



Jane told me that several cousins in England and she have done extensive research on many families in that area - with the help from records (visitations, The College of Arms, Oxford, church records, etc), she has traced the Bourne family back to Somerset. Highways

Did you know that the main Maidstone to Ashford road did not originally follow the route that it does now? Some evidence is very clear that the wide A20 that we see now was narrower and on a more winding route. Some of the old road can still be seen in front of the Yellow Fisherman chip shop, and beyond the Esso Garage where the old road meandered at Tutt Hill and Ram Lane. From what we can make out from old maps and aerial photographs much of this appears to have been realigned around the 1930s.





But what is more dramatic is that the road did not exist at all between Cades Road and Yonsea Farm (just beyond the old mill that is now the base for 'Move It'). The main road traffic all had to follow a route down Cades Road, across into what we now know as Coach Drive and along Waterfall Lane. Just beyond Home Farm there is a narrow track that crossed the fields towards the Mill and another fork through Yonsea Farm, where the road then continued past the Hare and Hounds towards Ashford. The Reverend Russell describes this route in

more detail in his research carried out around 1900. He says that the new route was opened in 1797, and the old lanes from Yonsea closed in 1864 (although the old routes were still navigable).



This meant that Coach Drive was one of the main roads through Hothfield, and it was the site of the first school. A number of cottages lined the road, particularly on the north side (nearest Home Farm) where there are just two houses now.

Public Transport

The History Society has been kindly provided with copies of bus timetables from 1916 to 1930, along with extensive research by a local public transport enthusiast.



The timetables show that in the early days independent private companies ran local bus services. In 1919 the Ashford to London Service stopped in Hothfield Village eight times per day in the week and four times on a Sunday in each direction. In 1926 there were four services each day to Ashford, Pluckley, Smarden and Tenterden. At the same time the new Maidstone and District bus company was moving in on the local providers, and regulations meant that small bus companies were struggling to survive; however M&D's service from Ashford via Charing and Lenham did not actually call in to Hothfield and villagers had to walk up to the main road to catch their buses near the Common.



By 1928 the service stopping at Hothfield Post Office, the Swan at Little Chart and making its way to Maidstone via Pluckley, Smarden, and Headcorn was under the control of Maidstone and District and had been suspended! However, timetables two years later show a service between The Wheel at Westwell and Ashford centre stopping at Hothfield train station. A return fare was 7d.
