- ➤ Turn down thermostats by at least 1 Degree


They don't have to be these but they seem to be the ones other communities have found the most useful and achievable. These challenges will shortly be passed to the Greening Campaign and we will order sufficient cards for every household. The Green Tent at the Charlton Village Community Day on 9 July will be used as a consultation opportunity with Cards being delivered to households with the September Charlton News. Once received, households (really good for children) will be asked to tick the boxes

they have implemented and when they have ticked 5, they are asked to put the card in a front facing window. In other places this has worked well with an element of competition driving the pace. Once sufficient cards are displayed, they will be counted and the Greening Campaign will convert actions into CO2 and £ saved. Figures shown on the card are being updated so are illustrative only.

The Music and Alcohol licence have been sourced so the Beer tent will be there.


The Lakeside Café will be open for all the usual

Letter from our Priest in Charge, Alex Randle-Bissell

Dear friends,

The harrowing images of war and its devastating effect on populations are always a reminder of the terrible potential we have as human beings to wreak havoc on our planet. Whatever the conflict, wherever in the world, it always leads to terrible consequences not only for those caught up in the present moment, but for generations to come. As we witness these events we inevitably ask the questions of how and why has it come to this? What could have been done to prevent such things taking place? Such questions are indeed valuable starting points, but the more that knowledge of the stories behind such awful happenings are exposed the more we realise that our world is not as simple as we may have thought and as such is a complex network of circumstances and decisions that it is near on impossible to quantify let alone understand. So, how do we learn lessons that can possibly prevent the next conflict, the next breakdown of negotiations between opposing sides? It is difficult as it seems that societies have seemingly forgotten about what it means to debate and argue well, and that makes it problematic when trying to draw people together to achieve some common ground. In an age of post-truth, where it seems acceptable to just try and forge ahead with a lie in the belief that if one shouts it loud enough and for long enough people will just accept it makes for even bigger problems in trying to negotiate for peace, because in the end, what is the point?

The other question, of course, is – where do we begin to find solutions to such disarray? I find that in the midst of confusion, anxiety and chaos I need to seek refuge in things that make some sense, retreat to places of safety and peace for a while to try and pause for thought. Without these places I would argue that we become more anxious and afraid, more prone to be constantly affected by the turmoil and that nearly always leads us to making poor choices and decisions. I often pray that those in positions of great power and authority would take time to do the same.

However, saying this, I often find people seeking some of this refuge in our churches around the Pastrow Benefice. Sometimes they give me a look as if to say, 'I just want five minutes, please leave me alone...' and at other times they will stay and want to talk about something that has affected them

in some way. In any case, they are attracted to the stillness and comfort of buildings which have for centuries offered the same kind of refuge to believers and the puzzled alike. Jesus Christ often found it necessary to retreat to quiet places before beginning a new part of his journey of ministry (which invariably involved conflict of some kind) but met conflict with love at the centre and always fixed on the truth.

Blessings for the month ahead, and please do use our churches for places of peace, even if just for a moment!

OAKTRACK SPRINGS IN TO ACTION!

The arrival of Spring means only one thing here at Oaktrack – lambing! Our first arrival came on 27th February 2022 and since then we have welcomed over seventy lambs including thirty sets of twins and two sets of triplets to the smallholding. As we write, we have just three ewes left to lamb before our lambing season officially comes to a close for 2022. Every season seems to be slightly different, some bringing more challenges than others, but this year has been easier, with the ewes lambing naturally, without assistance and producing multiple lambs.

The horticultural side of the smallholding also springs into life at this time of year too! We have been weeding, planting, sowing and filling up the polytunnel and greenhouses with lots of vegetable and cut flower seedlings for the months ahead. We are now busy planning for our summer event when we will be opening our



gates to visitors, to come and explore the smallholding and learn about our livestock and lives as smallholders. The event is being held as part of the national 'Open Farm Sunday' celebrations organised by LEAF, on Sunday 12th June 2022. We hope you will join us!

Some interesting Facts about Queen Elizabeth II

- The Queen studied constitutional history and law as preparation for her future role
- She was the first female of the Royal family to join the Armed Services as a full-time active member
- She has owned over 30 welsh Corgis and even bred them herself
- As all British passports are issued in the Queens name, she does not need one. Neither does she require a driving licence or licence plate.
- The Queen receives 200 to 300 letters a day, that's about 70,000 per year! She chooses to read some herself but is shown all correspondence on a daily basis by one of her private secretaries.
- The Queen owns all of the whales and dolphins in the waters around the United Kingdom. A statute from 1324 states, "Also the King shall have whales and sturgeons taken in the sea or elsewhere within the realm." This statute is still valid today, and whales and dolphins are recognized as "fishes royal."
- The Queen used her rationing coupons and received a gift of 200 coupons from the British government in order to buy the material needed to create her beautiful wedding dress. The iconic dress featured a 13-foot-long train and over 10,000 seed pearls imported from the US.
- The Queen uses her purse as a way to signal her staff. It is said that if she places her bag on the table, it means that she wants to leave within five minutes. If she puts her bag on the floor, it shows she's not enjoying the conversation and wants to be rescued.
- She has sat for over 129 portraits during her reign

It's that time of year! The weather is getting warmer and we are doing more jobs in the garden. To enjoy the fruits of your labour here are some tips to prevent injury whilst gardening.

1. **Gardening is physical** - please spend some time warming up. To do this, start off with lighter jobs first before doing any heavy gardening to lessen the chance of a muscle sprain

2. **Vary your jobs** - Spend no more than 20-30 minutes on one activity and take regular breaks in between jobs to help reduce muscle fatigue.

3. When lifting heavy items - keep the load close to your body by keeping your elbows bent and tucked into your sides to minimise stress on your back.

4. When bending - keep your back straight and with one leg in front of the

other, bend your knees this will help to keep you more stable.

- 5. **Bulk buying** If buying compost, sand or gravel buy smaller bags or shovel the contents from the back of the car into smaller containers or a wheelbarrow.
- 6. **Heavy delivery** If you are getting heavy items delivered try to get them unloaded close to where you would need them.
- 7. Moving patio pots have them on plant caddies so they are easier to move around.
- 8. **Pruning trees** When pruning try not to overreach. Use some long handled secateurs for hard to reach trees and bushes.
- 9. **Going up** If you need to use a ladder make sure it is firmly in place, and try to have someone with you. Face the ladder so your shoulders, hips and knees are pointing in the same direction. Move the ladder rather than reaching
- $10. \ {\rm Drink \ water}$ Keep well hydrated in warmer weather, and have fun!

An update from our Local PCSO

We have seen a rise in reports right across Basingstoke Town & Rural regarding Nottingham Knockers. We would like to give you more information about this group and offer advice on how to deal with them.

Who are they?

Nottingham Knockers are usually young men who go door to door selling household products. They are dropped off early in the morning in a particular location by a large van and are then transported around that area throughout the day until approx. <u>9pm</u>. They will offer to show you ID which will likely be 'Hawkers Work Creation' and say they have just been released from prison. This company does not actually exist and is purely a laminated piece of card with their picture on. They will be carrying a large holdall style bag which contains various household items at high prices and will try and hard sell to make more money. They will also tell you about how they are trying to make a better life.

Is it illegal to sell goods on the doorstep?

Selling anything in a public space is subject to street trading laws and can only be done with special permits. Anyone selling goods on a public forecourt, road, footway or adjacent site, to a distance of 10 metres, must have written consent. Charity collectors can only collect on the doorstep with permission of the council's licensing team. Selling goods door-to-door is only permitted with a valid pedlar's certificate. The police will only issue these to people who haven't been convicted of a crime, any conviction will mean you cannot hold a licence. Traders selling vegetables, fish, fruit or food and drink do not need pedlar's licence but must register with the environmental health department at their local authority. Other traders can only sell at your doorstep if you have invited them round. Anything you buy at your doorstep over £42 is subject to a legal 'cooling-off period' of 14 days where you hold the right to cancel. The trader should give you pre-contract information, a written receipt and a template notice you can use to cancel. Failure to do this is a criminal offence and should be reported to Trading Standards.

Our advice...

Whenever you get an unexpected knock on the door, please check to see who is on the other side of your door before opening it. Either look through a side window, look through a spy hole, or simply ask out loud who it is. If you do not know them, establish who they are and what they are there for before you open the door. Please remember if the cold caller sales are unsuccessful, they are unlikely to return in future.

If you do experience any verbal abuse and feel intimidated by these people, please call <u>101</u> or report online and tell us what was said and provide a description of the person.

REMEMBER

- DO NOT deal with Nottingham Knockers.
- NEVER allow Nottingham Knockers into your home.
- DO NOT pay CASH on the doorstep.
