NFDC's NEW WASTE AND RECYCLING STRATEGY

New Forest District Council (NFDC) are planning changes to their recycling and rubbish service to improve recycling and reduce waste.

NFDC's new waste and recycling strategy is due to be approved this summer. Once approved, changes are unlikely to take place until 2024 onwards.

Why does the service need to change?

With a new recycling and rubbish service, NFDC aim to:

- increase their recycling rate to meet government's target of 55% by 2025
- recycle food waste. Food waste currently makes up 40% of NFDC black sack waste, by weight
- · recycle more, including foil, film, and a wider range of plastics
- provide the safest way of working for waste crews. Wheelie bins are recommended by the Health and Safety Executive
- do everything they can to reduce waste
- comply with new Environment Laws
- reduce the current use of 10 million single-use sacks a year. For example, with the proposed new service, mixed recycling would be added straight to a wheelie bin with no need for a plastic sack
- · provide more frequent glass collections and collect glass with mixed recycling
- reduce litter in the district's streets from split sacks

That's why NFDC are:

- · looking at best practice from top performing councils in England
- working with Hampshire County Council and local authorities in Hampshire to improve the service
- working with their staff and the community to understand the impact of the proposed new service
- · following feedback from government to understand the new laws they must comply with

How will the new service work for the community?

Any new service will be flexible, the council will survey households across the district to establish which properties are not suitable for wheelie bins. The council will vary the service where needed, this could include keeping sacks for some properties and providing communal bins for flats and houses with multiple occupants. It will be NFDC's aim to provide the core service wherever possible, to ensure the service is efficient and to achieve their recycling and waste prevention aims.

The council will provide additional or larger containers for residents who need extra storage, such as larger families. They will continue to provide their assisted collection service for residents who are unable to take their recycling and rubbish to the edge of their property. The assisted collection service will be adapted for the new service.

BEAT REPORT



Hello and welcome to the May 2022 Beat Report for the New Forest Heart area. Your team in the North of the Forest is PC 25169 Carl PEVERILL and PCSO 14495 Richard WILLIAMS.

our Beat area.

If you have any questions for us we will be at Bolton's Bench in Lyndhurst with our partners at their RESPONSIBLE DOG OWNERSHIP event from 9am on Sunday 5th June and at the Minstead Open Door café in the church in the village from 2pm on Thursday 16th June. Then you can join us at the Bramshaw Stores on Wednesday 22nd June at 8am and later that day at 10am at the BARTLEY POST OFFICE. We will also be at the POST OFFICE in the HAPPY CHEESE in ASHURST at 11am on the following Thursday, 23rd June.

A house on Goose Green in Lyndhurst was broken into between 10th May and 24th May and several items stolen. Extensive House to House enquiries have been carried out in the area but if you saw or heard anything suspicious in that area during those times please contact us on 101 and quote the crime number 44220206343. Thank you.

The fish and chip shop on Brookley Road in Brockenhurst has also been broken into this month with money stolen from the safe – again if you have any information can you please call us and quote the crime number 44220216830.

Thirteen garages, sheds, stables and outbuildings have been targeted in May, including at four separate properties on the road from Brook that goes up to the Rufus Stone. Other thefts happened in Minstead, Ower, Ashurst and at Emery Down and a safe was stolen from the Longdown Activity Farm and workshops at a farm on Woodlands Road, Woodlands were also targeted. Tools and other items were also stolen during a break in at a church in Brockenhurst.

The theft of expensive bicycles has continued this month with twenty four stolen in total. Eight of them were taken on the same night from the Hollands Wood campsite just outside Brockenhurst, another three from Roundhill campsite and one from the Ashurst campsite.

Other bikes have been stolen from racks attached to cars and vans in Brockenhurst and Lyndhurst and one has been taken from the sheds at Brockenhurst College. Again the advice is where possible keep your bicycle with you at all times. Most of the hotels we have spoken to have said they are happy for bikes to be stored inside but if that isn't possible take a wheel or the saddle, or both, off and lock the bicycle inside your car or van rather than just chaining it to it.

At 10am on Saturday 9th July we are a holding a bike marking event in the main car park at Lyndhurst so please put that date in your diary, in the meantime make sure you have your bicycles serial number and a recent photograph of it.

Other vehicles broken into this month where handbags, rucksacks and tools have been stolen were parked on the roadside in Brockenhurst, the Ornamental drive and the Wilverley Inclosure, as well as in pub and restaurant car parks in Newbridge and Emery Down.

Also this month a van has been stolen from an address in Ower, thieves took a JCB from the SSE site at Minstead, jewellery and other items were taken from a locker at a hotel in Brockenhurst, copper piping has been stolen from a house in Bartley and a quantity of beer was taken during an overnight break in at the Cadnam cricket club.

We have been surprised and disappointed by the number of open fires and BBQs we and our partners at Forestry England and the National Park Authority have had to put out across the Forest this month. Open fires and BBQs are banned everywhere in the Forest so if you could spread the word we would be grateful.

EXPERIENCE OF THE 101 AND 999 SERVICES: SURVEY

A national survey has been launched to understand more about the public's experience when contacting their local police forces.

The public in England and Wales is being asked to take a few minutes to tell police chiefs about their experiences of the 101 and 999 services, as well as preferences for future modes of contact.

Association of Police and Crime Commissioners Local Policing Leads, Alison Hernandez and Jeff Cuthbert, said: "Reporting to 101 and 999 remains a challenging area of business for police forces. The needs of those making contact must be understood and forces must prioritise those most in need, meaning contact about routine items is sometimes not responded to as quickly as people would like."

"In addition, new technology deployed by some forces presents significant opportunities to speed up responses and open lines of communication with people who might not be comfortable using traditional methods. As the voice of the public in policing, Police and Crime Commissioners (PCCs) are very keen to better understand their constituents' views on these issues and will be urging as many people as possible to respond to the survey."


