


#### **Karin Davis nee. Lindley**

was born on 8<sup>th</sup> June 1955, at Sheffield Hospital weighing 8lb 4oz - The heaviest birth that week and perhaps the only time that she was the largest person in any room. Her early life was centred in and around Jump and Wombwell SY. She moved to Nottingham to attend the College of Education in 1973 where she met her future husband, Christopher Davis. After graduation she taught English at Top Valley until the birth of her children in the mid 80's.

Whatever the topic of the day Karin pursued everything with passion and determination. She was a dedicated educator of deprived and troubled children - occasionally dragging her students out of bed to attend their exams, as well as an active participant in the community as a member of the PTA, parish council and past editor of this very publication.

Karin's greatest passion was for art. Many may remember her for the hand painted cards she created every Christmas, or for her musical passion. Over the years she sang with several local choral bodies including Southwell Choral, the Bach Choir, Nottingham Harmonic and Mansfield Choral. Whilst maintaining a keen interest in

playing her collection of musical instruments, guitar, recorders of various sizes, piano and a merry flute.

# Report for Halam News: Halam Parish Council Meeting 7.30pm Thurs. 11th January 2024 at Halam Village Hall



#### Present

#### **Update for County and District Councillors**

- 1. District Councillor Penny Rainbow reported that the district council are looking at allowing planning applicants and neighbours to speak (for 3 minutes) at planning committee meetings. Further information shortly.
- 2. Flooding grants and council tax help is available to residents see Correspondence below. The district council also have a stock of aquasacs similar to sandbags available to local residents. Call 01636 650000 for further details.

#### Village Hall

Wall between Annesley House – the wall has been inspected by the Chair and the neighbour and it seems the wall presents no immediate danger. It may be possible to carry out some repairs and stabilisation – especially at the far end of the wall – which will be much most cost effective than a complete rebuild. Further investigation and new quotes to be obtained.

#### **Grant Application**

A parishioner has raised the possible issues with data protection if the survey results are identifiable. Some form of tracking will be required to ensure all responses are unique and the survey valid. Financial Officer to check GDPR with the Information Officer – further information at the next meeting.

#### **Replacement Noticeboard**

Payment to be made this month and the board is due to arrive shortly afterwards.

It was agreed that some form of commemoration should be held. To be discussed further at the next meeting.

#### **Flooding**

Following requests by the parish council, gulleys in the village have now been sucked clear.

Further to the recent flooding, it was agreed to ask the County Council Lead Flood Officer, Ross Marshall to a meeting so that the public can get advice and ask questions, and so that the parish council can see if there is anything further it can do to help the situation in future. Date of meeting to be advised.

#### **Planning**

1. Pepperbox Cottage, School Lane: Construction of retaining walls for new access, double gates, boundary walls, pedestrian gates and steps (retrospective)

Unanimously approved subject to County Council Highways having no issues with the application. Cllr Penny Rainbow to monitor application.

2. The Waggon at Halam, The Turnpike: Replace existing signage with new and add additional sign into land owned by the pub

After discussion, the application was not supported -4 against: 3 for. While the parish council has no objection to the replacement signs, it was felt that the proposed new sign in the field by the pub carpark would be an intrusion into the countryside setting.

#### **Planning Decision**

1. 1 Manor Farm Cottages, Radley Road: New access drive and construction of 3 bay Oak framed garage to rear of property.

Certificate of Lawful Development granted by Newark & Sherwood District Council

#### **Finance**

Unanimously agreed to pay for:

- 1. Fire check
- 2. Noticeboard

It was agreed to set the precept for 2024-2025 back to its 2021-22 level i.e. £8,000 per annum.

# **District Council report January 2024**



#### **NSDC** response to flooding

The after effects of storm Henk are still being felt around the district.

A multi-agency control room was set up at Castle House to support communities, particularly, those who were "cut-off" by the flood waters which included Tolney Lane, Gunthorpe, Holme, Girton, Bleasby & Gibsmere.

Fire appliances were deployed to the affected areas and were able to feedback specific needs of vulnerable residents. NSDC officers were then deployed accordingly.

Currently, the Council is continuing to clear and clean up the areas affected.

Residents who need help disposing of large household items that have been damaged during storm Henk flooding can book a free bulky waste collection via a request made to NSDC main contact number 01636 650000.

Contaminated aqua sacks can also be collected from pre-arranged locations.

Road cleaning requests should be made to NSDC.

Blocked drains can be reported to NCC

Details of flood grants and financial support are still to be received from the Government. Customer services at NSDC on 01636 650000 or the website will have information as and when it is announced.

#### **Future First Careers Expo**

Late November saw NSDC host its 6th Future First Expo. A careers fair held at the Lady Eastwood Centre at Newark Showground.

The event was attended throughout the morning and afternoon by 1,300 young people, in years 11 - 13. Seven schools from the Newark and Sherwood area and two schools from Lincolnshire enjoyed this well organised event.

The retail and beauty departments of Boots had a stand for the first time, which proved very popular.

The main sponsor for the third year running was John Deere.

The one-stop-shop is aimed at being both aspirational and inspirational.

The Minster School, Southwell had the most young people attend.

#### **Doorstep Glass Collection - Recycling**

The November planning committee considered an application from NSDC to erect a glass storage compound to the rear of the lorry park on the Great North Road, Newark, to enable this service to go ahead.

The facility will operate between the hours of 8am - 5pm Monday to Friday and is expected to receive two glass deliveries a day with the glass held within the compound which would be emptied once a week.

No firm date has been decided but hopefully new glass collection bins will be delivered to residents, who haven't opted out of the scheme, soon, to allow the glass recycle collection to begin.
