

HOTHFIELD HEATHLANDS IN MARCH

The pace of life, that was quietly ticking over through the winter, is picking up on the Heathlands. With longer days and stronger sun, solitary bees and other early insects are foraging, overwintering butterflies emerge on warm days, caterpillars munch quietly in the grass and leaf litter or on twigs. There's a twitter and flutter of birds in mating plumage. Migrant birds start to fly off (because it's too far to walk, according to an old cracker joke I found recently. Sorry).

One of the earliest flowers is dogs mercury in the wooded areas, with small tassels of tiny green flowers quickly hidden by the developing leaves. Wood anemones will be flowering. I have a photo of them with a sprinkling of snow on 17 March 2018. A few violet flowers will be tucked under leaves. By the end of the month shining yellow celandine will open on sunny days. Bare trees cast complex shadows as buds fatten, and the subtle colours of moss and lichen glow. Fungi are still very visible, while

glossy arum leaves and bramble and nettles sprout early to get ahead of the crowd. Gorse flowers seem to go on and on.

The early catkins of the hazel that light up February with their green-yellow have been replaced by the catkins of the sallow, or goat willow, Salix caprea (caprea from the Latin for goat). It also flowers before the leaves appear, but unlike the hazel, this willow has male and female catkins (flowers) on different plants, as does the holly. The small oval male catkins covered in grey silky hairs resemble a cat's paw, hence 'pussy willow'. They clasp the twig tightly until several hundred stamens expand from the catkin, each tipped with a yellow anther bearing pollen. This is scattered by the wind but also collected by bumble bees. Female catkins are larger and green, with many short stigmas protruding to catch the pollen. Once fertilised these ripen into minute seeds embedded in white fluffy hair which are then dispersed by the wind. This cotton wool makes a very visible carpet around the trees later in spring. The seed needs bare ground in order to germinate.

Sallow is native here and across Europe and Asia as far as Mongolia, tolerating very harsh conditions. It is a pioneer plant, growing on bare soil and stopping other plants growing under it through chemicals in its fallen leaves. Trees or bushes often occur singly or in small groups, easily hybridising with other species. Sallow has wide roundish leaves with a point at the end bent to one side. The underside of the leaf is downy. It is browsed by mammals and an important food for butterflies, moths and other insects. There are several along the lower side of the boardwalk across the main bog. Willow bark was once the sole source of salicylic acid, the basis of aspirin, its discovery derived from the belief that endemic illnesses had a remedy close by; rheumatism is associated with living in damp places, which is where willow occurs.

field Heathlands, and everyone is welcome to visit. Please remember this is first and foremost a haven for wildlife. You can help our work by staying on the main established paths and wearing footwear suitable for coping with the muddy sections. Keep dogs close at all times; do not let your dog run off the paths and through the areas of heather and gorse where they will disturb wildlife. Make sure anything you

Make sure anything you bring with you leaves the reserve with you. Remove litter and dog mess, and place all dog bags in the bins. Hothfield Heathlands is one of the best spots of wildlife in the county, with your help we can keep it that way.

The first phase of the removal of dangerous roadside ash trees will have been completed by the time this is published. Nine Oaks Vineyard and Hothfield Public Rights of Way



As Nine Oaks Vineyard enters its third season, we wanted to issue a reminder regarding the use of the land and particularly the use of the public rights of way (PROWs) by members of the public.

Two PROWs exist on the piece of land now known as Nine Oaks Vineyard.

PROW 167 runs from the gate on The Street towards St Margaret's Church.

PROW 166 begins at the gate and transects both vineyard plots, by means of a pedestrian gate. A second pedestrian gate marks the boundary of Nine Oaks Vineyard and the neighbouring livestock fields. PROW 166 is also the route of the Greensand Way.

We are aware that on some maps, including older editions of the ordnance survey and even the Kent County Council (KCC) website at low resolutions, the route of the Greensand Way follows an alternative route (marked 'path') down the side of the vineyard. This is not a public right of way. KCC are aware of these issues, and are in the process of correcting them. We are working closely with KCC to update the PROW signage around the vineyard. We have also begun an application to re-route

PROW 166 to the alternative route; however, we would like to remind walkers that currently there is no access or public right of way through the five bar gate between the vineyard and the adjoining livestock fields. The gate is closed to maintain separation between the two properties, and for the protection of both the sheep and the vines.

We accept that several routes have been used around the vineyard for many years, and at this time we are content for people to use either the PROW through the vineyard, the path along the wood or that between the Church and the gate between vineyard plots. We do ask, however, that people only use one of the three PROW KCC managed gates to enter or exit the vineyard plot.




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The site for private Italian tuition in the mid-Kent area.




