WILDLIFE IS EVERYWHERE & EVERYWHERE IS WILD!

Winter is a difficult time for the young of all animals and birds but can be particularly challenging for those at the top of the feeding chain. Whilst small birds are normally well looked after by bird table feeding, raptors (locally buzzards, kites, kestrels, hobbies) and especially owls are very dependent on small mammals and road kill. Severe winter weather can decimate mice, shrew and vole numbers and threaten young owl numbers.

Locally we have good numbers of Tawny owls, a few Barn owls and some Little owls. The Tawny owl is largely a woodland bird, feeding off small mammals, large insects and frogs; distinguished by their distinctive 'Toowhit-twhoo' call and an alarm call of 'Keewick' similar to other owl species. Like most raptors and owls the females are much bigger than the males. Barn owls hunt silently, low over fields for shrews, voles, and mice. They have uniquely shaped wing edges to minimise noise during flight which may alert potential prey. Little owls, with their typically 'grumpy' looking faces hunt mostly during the day unlike the other local owls. They often are seen sitting on fence posts, silently watching a field for victims which are usually large insects, earthworms, and other invertebrates. Their call is a characteristic 'Keyoo'. They nest in holes and crevices in trees, rocks or even buildings and are less likely than Tawnies and Barn owls to take up the offer of a nest box!

The owls have their young all the way from March through to September/ October in the case of Barn owls. The young may be highly dependent on the parents for many weeks to provide a variety of food, often predigested by the parent to aid digestion! By the autumn though, the young owls disperse from the nest to fend for themselves; Tawnies being very territorial have to disperse to find their own territory and mate.

So, at this time of year, especially at times of severe weather, keep a look out for distressed or collapsed owl chicks. They will have failed to put on enough weight to hunt and catch for themselves.





Naturewatch have already rescued one young Tawny owl who had either collapsed from exhaustion, or more probably flown into a window or building whilst trying to hunt. We will happily pick up and house any 'collapsed' young owls, feed them up and release them when they are strong enough to go it alone.

Help us to help these wonderful, iconic birds, and keep an eye (and ear) out for any owls in the area. We would particularly like to hear of any Barn owl and little owl sightings in the parish. You could also think about putting up owl (or other bird) boxes so that you can observe your own youngsters develop. Just remember that handling or even going near owls is very closely regulated and should only be undertaken by experienced people. Tawny owls in particular are

actually very fierce and protective of their young; there is one famous occasion when a very experienced bird photographer, Eric Hosking, lost an eye due to an attack by a worried mother Tawny owl.

We would also be interested to know if you also feel there are fewer buzzards around the village since the kites became more common; presumably the larger kite is out-competing the buzzard. Let us know.

OBITUARY Anne Cooper On 2nd December 2014 St Stephen's Church was filled to the brim with family and friends who had gathered to say a final farewell to Anne Cooper.

Anne and Gordon moved to Up Nately in the early 1960s, when their new home, which Gordon had helped to build, was finished and both of them became involved in village events; organising various parties in the old village hall (a tin hut in the centre of Mapledurwell) and later on with the building of the present hall. Anne also served on the Village Hall committee and for many years was news co-ordinator for the Villager.

Anne trained as a nurse and as well as bringing up their family, she worked in the hospital and later in a care home. She was a very artistic and talented lady who produced beautiful embroidered, knitted and sewn pictures and clothes. Her flower arrangements in the church where she was in charge of the flower rota were always much admired. Her last display in the church was for Remembrance Sunday 2014, a very special arrangement indeed.

The many Flower Festivals, meticulously thought out and planned by Anne, raised thousands of pounds for St Stephen's. Many visitors who visited the Church also then walked to her home where cream teas were served by the whole Cooper family. Harvest Supper organised by Anne was always a great event, with different dishes each time it was Up Nately's turn – beautifully decorated tables and printed menus were all designed by Anne. It was a joy to work with her on the suppers and flowers; we will all miss her enormously – she is a hard act to follow!

Anne is buried in the churchyard in the village, where we can go and have a chat with her; rest in peace Anne.

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

POLICE UPDATE

Dear Residents

Overall reported crime increased last year across the whole

of this beat area by 14 crimes – from 104 in 2013 to 120 in 2014. Below are the 2014 figures for reported crime in the Parishes which are part of my beat area covered by this magazine with the 2013 figures shown in brackets.

A good reduction in dwelling burglary but again a rise in outbuilding burglary.

The significant increase in criminal damage offences was partially due to an illegal hare coursing (poaching) competition held with a £30,000 first prize across North Hampshire and parts of the Thames Valley Police area. People involved came from as far as South Wales and Lincolnshire to illegally hunt for hares.

The damage occurred when field locks were broken and or vehicles were driven across growing crops looking for hares using a spot lamp or 'night vision' then allowing dogs to be released after the hares. Several people have since been arrested for conspiracy to commit criminal damage and are on Police bail.

As to 2015, there has been no reported crime in any of the Parishes at the time of writing.

I will also keep you all updated on the latest concerning the rural policing reorganisation and how this will effect the policing of our area – talks are still taking place.

NEWNHAM VILLAGE TRAFFIC CALMING

HCC engineers have carried out a further audit of the scheme in the hours of darkness, following some concerns expressed to HCC Highways (Strategic Transport Delivery Team) on the night-time visibility of the traffic management features.

The conclusion is that – as compacted leaf litter and mud etc is obscuring the white lining around the buildouts – additional reflective markers will be added to the posts make the build outs more easily seen at night by approaching drivers. Further work to be carried out on the scheme therefore includes:

- 1. Additional reflective markers around the posts on the build outs
- 2. The removal of signs that are no longer relevant/needed
- 3. Additional white lining (wider lines) around the build outs
- 4. Give way markings at the entrance to Fosters Business Park as requested
- 5. Renewal of existing white lining.

HCC engineers will notify the Parish Council of the programme of works as soon as dates are known. It is unlikely the white lining will be done before spring as it requires dry conditions and above freezing temperatures.

Save Our Loddon Valley Environment



AN INSPECTOR CALLS

At the exploratory meeting on 11th December, the Inspector heard a number of excellent presentations backed up by evidence. For once the majority of those present (not counting developers) backed up Councillors and Officers in defending the plan with a number of points including:

- There is a massive infrastructure deficit and the shortage of public funds means there is little money to pay for the changes needed to accommodate over 13,000 additional houses.
- There was much criticism of the Transport Assessment and questions over costs of the roads programme.
- Water quality is already exceeding EU limits. The Water Cycle Study does not cover the last six years of the Plan.
- Sewage processing is at capacity.
- Basingstoke has built more houses than neighbouring Boroughs over recent years.
- Economic growth is not a given, we could end up like Ireland with a mass of unsold houses.

The environmental issues on the Loddon Valley were given a good airing by some speakers, including the Hampshire and IoW Wildlife Trust. There were also a number of comments on the theme 'Brownfield First'.

We would like to thank Cllr Onnalee Cubitt who, as ever, gave an excellent contribution, and Maria Miller MP for her contribution making a number of strong points about past housing over-supply, the water cycle study, transport and, crucially, the 'tipping point'.

The 'tipping point' is relevant to a higher house building figure, ie at what point are these numbers unsustainable. BDBC indicated it was close to 748 hpa but agreed to consider this further. This is a fundamental question which, to his credit, the Inspector identified early on. The Inspector appeared sympathetic to the need for transport investment, another sustainable development constraint.

Unfortunately the Inspector, by saying he wanted more houses, started on the wrong foot and undermined any pretence that he is independent. He thought the housing allocation of 748 dwellings per annum (wpa) was not enough and indicated that he would prefer 850 dpa. Unfortunately BDBC Officers have since 'folded' in their haste to progress the Local Plan and have recommended 850 dpa.

However, there remain a number of questions:

The evidence base for 850 dpa

- How sound is the assumption that the economy will continue to grow and debt/deficit reduce?
- Whichever government forms after May, the general forecast is for continued global uncertainty.
- If 850 dpa is a 'policy off' number, it should reduce once 'policy on' factors like infrastructure deficit, water quality, previous housing growth etc are taken into account. Appling 'Policy on' is vital to avoid problems with the infrastructure deficit.
- Has a 15-year Plan has been considered? *See below.*

The Inspector named a number of key points for BDBC to answer and said that a full examination is unlikely before the General Election. The Inspector's letter to BDBC and key points can be found on our website.

Meanwhile CountryWatch and SOLVE have revisited our proposals to reduce the Local Plan period (SOLVE Website http://www.solveloddon.org/ report for March/April 2014). There are a number of advantages, principally 2,550 houses less in the Plan period and a shorter planning period in these uncertain economic times.

SOLVE continues to work with other groups across the Borough with the aim of setting a realistic housing target, one which takes account of the ability of the Borough's infrastructure to cope with a massive influx of people.

Dear Friends

Last night as I write, Roland and I went to the cinema to see *The Theory of*

Everything, the film about Stephen Hawking and his relationship with his first wife, Jane. I don't even begin to understand Hawking's theories about the world, the universe and time – but his quest was to find 'one exquisite equation' that would explain the creation of the universe. He is a professed atheist, seeking for answers in his science: for me, I am content to assign that mystery to God, even though I have no equations and theorems to prove it.

And I write the week after religion was seen in its worst form in the awful killings in and around Paris. We all deplore the tactics of extremism – of course the right to freedom of speech is sacrosanct in democracy – but I also do not like the way a few people show a complete lack of respect for and understanding of the deeply held beliefs of some faiths. Just because we have the right to express our opinions doesn't necessarily mean we should.

And this morning the newspaper included an article with the headline 'Archbishops warn of urgent battle for new worshippers'. This is reporting on a paper that will go to General Synod next month warning that the Church of England will not be able to continue in its current form unless its dwindling membership is reversed with the consequent implications for finances and the number of priests. This isn't new news – our Bishop of Winchester highlighted these problems and has been encouraging Parishes to address them for a couple of years now – but it does remind us that this is a serious issue and not one that will be addressed by tinkering at the edges of institution. Things need to change in a big way.

All these – and probably lots of others news stories this week – speak of the gap that seems to exist now between faith communities and wider society. The Church is accused of not being relevant to the world today and there is a deep ignorance of what she stands for and what she teaches, but as we get older the world seems to become harder to understand and impossible to keep up with! The groups that will be meeting during Lent this year will be looking at material that asks us to listen: to listen to God, to listen to one another, to listen to the wider community and to listen to ourselves. Through our listening we shall find ways to deepen our own faith and draw little closer to God, to share our questions and our experiences and to encourage one another as we go.

We'd love you to join us – to tell us what God means to you – or just to listen and learn!!

For example sprains and strains, broken bones, minor burns and scalds, minor head injuries, bites and stings, persistent coughs, severe sore throats, rashes, infections and sudden worsening of long term conditions.
