# Nine Oaks Vineyard – May Update

It has been a huge month for Nine Oaks Vineyard. We have wine! Our 2022 Pinot Noir Rosé is now on sale



and we have been thrilled with the response, particularly and most importantly from our lovely local community. Thank you so much for sharing your feedback with us – it means so much to hear. Our 2022 Chardonnay will be on sale from 23 May so please do look out for that.

On the vineyard itself we are now thoroughly looking ahead to the next season. All the vines have been pruned and tied down ready for the new season's growth and the buds are just starting to burst.

We need a period of 10 days where the weather is 10C or above for this to happen we're almost there. Keep an eye on them! Unfortunately the freak hail storm did some damage to the buds but overall the vines look really well so we are excited to see what the season brings.

We won't know until later in the summer quite what our yield will look like (and everything is subject to change right up until the last minute) so what wines we produce is also subject to change but we are anticipating the same rosé and chardonnay, with the addition of a Bacchus. With the varieties we have planted we can play around with the blends or combi-

nations so we may have a few surprises up our sleeves. Next spring will also see the release of our first sparkling wine (from our 2021 harvest) which will be fantastic to see.



Kent Wildlife Trust (KWT) visited the newly developed site to check on our amphibian population in April. Alas no great crested newts to be found as yet, but we have had some much larger and very exciting new creatures take up residence. We are thrilled that the



beautiful longhorn cattle have taken a break from the Heathlands to visit Nine Oaks. They are hugely important in naturally and organically managing the landscape, eating and breaking down the vegetation. Of course, they are absolutely stunning to watch too.

# HOTHFIELD HEATHLANDS IN MAY



There is so much to see, hear and enjoy on the Heathlands in May. But one of our summer visitors, arriving this month and from as far south as the Democratic Republic of Congo, just does not want to be seen and is rarely heard. The enigmatic ground nesting



Nightjar, *Caprimulgus europaeus* has grey and brown plumage, heavily mottled and marked to resemble bark, that is superbly camouflaged in daylight, when the birds sit in undergrowth or when incubating eggs laid on bare ground. Nocturnal, their flight is silent, as their large eyes help them locate moths, flies and beetles caught on the wing with a small beak but very wide gape edged with bristles to trap prey. These elusive birds are most easily spotted when they hunt or display to females at dusk, the male making a distinctive extended churring call, or when hawking for food at dawn. They have long wings and a long, pointed tail, both marked with white in the male, and in shape resemble a cuckoo or kestrel.

*Caprimulgus* is Latin for goatsucker, as birds being noticed around livestock, it was believed they sucked the milk from goats. In reality they would have been hunting for the insects attracted to the ani-

mals. Nightjars will be breeding from late May and hopefully will have two broods. Sitting on eggs laid on bare ground for 20 days and caring for chicks for another two weeks, camouflage provides essential protection from foxes and hedgehogs which will eat both eggs and chicks. During this nesting period any disturbance of the adults risks leaving eggs and chicks exposed. Nightjars will migrate south in September. Their routes were little understood until the mid-2000s. Numbers have increased but they are on the amber list as a species of conservation concern. Loss of habitat for breeding is believed to be the biggest issue for nightjar popula-

tions, but this heathland with open woodland and clearings provides just what Nightjars need.

Another recent appearance on the Heathlands is more permanent. A warm welcome to the new Ashford Area Warden, Will Glasson, who has moved from Wyre Borough Council in the damper Northwest to one of the drier corners of the British Isles.

February this year was indeed one of the driest on record. March made up for that (and Easter Monday - typical!). In late March the indefatigable volunteers built a series of "leaky" dams in New Fen, a small reserve off Watery Lane, on the road to Westwell. The dams are logs laid in ditches, held with stakes and topped with brash, all material cut on the reserve. This work copies the labour that beavers would have done naturally, creating localised flooding, helping wildlife during the drier months and provide breeding areas for amphibians and other water loving species. A healthy colony of Marsh Marigolds (*Caltha paulustris*) or Kingcups has developed here and they will adapt to higher levels of water, their hollow stems reaching out over the water surface to root and grow wherever they touch soil.

The highland cattle meanwhile have been moved to a new grazing area the other side of Hothfield Village. This is an exciting project with a local landowner to spread the wildlife benefits of conservation grazing to a larger area. The cows will return to the reserve later in the spring.



As the first orchids appear and the sundew unfurl their tiny spoons of glistening tentacles, the Great Grey Shrike (*Lanius excubitor*) will head back to mainland Europe, perhaps as far north as Norway, but was still attracting attention on the heathland over Easter. It has been observed with a harvest mouse, and picking minotaur beetles off the ground. Hosting one of only a hundred or so individual shrikes that over-winter in this country, is yet another rich element in the constantly evolving tapestry of this amazing but fragile wild place. **Margery Thomas**

#### **Historic Coronation celebrations in Hothfield**

The past minutes of Hothfield Parish Council give us a brief insight into celebrations that were held in the village for past Coronations. In 1902 the village was preparing to recognise the coronation for King Edward VII, and the minutes in May 1902 show that Mr Sayer proposed that a penny rate be made to give the children a treat, and 'the old people to receive the benefit of anything left'. However Mr Croucher proposed that the women and children be treated at a cost not exceeding two pence on the rateable value of the Parish. But a further amendment was proposed by Mr Collyer "That the whole of the people of the Parish be included in the treat".

In 1911 the Parish Council planned a similar event for King George V and would spend one and a half pence per person from the Rates. The celebrations were to include sports and entertainment in the evening. The views of the Rector were sought and there was a proposal that the Poet Laureate Alfred Austin, who lived at Swinford Manor, would be asked to plant an oak tree on the Common in a ceremony to be attended by the whole village; and there were to be fireworks. That Coronation was in June 1911 and the Kentish Express reported that there had been a cricket match with Westwell (won by Hothfield), the church bells were rung and there was a service. Lady Hothfield presented mugs and medals; there were swings and a bonfire was lit at 10pm. The Minutes in July 1911 recorded the expenses of the celebration including: "Tea - £13 9shillings and 10pence, Ginger Beer - 18shillings, coconuts..., fireworks..., oak tree - 8shillings, spoons and eggs, sports trophies." It all totalled £25 8 shillings and 3pence.

In 1937 there was to have been a Coronation for Edward VIII but as he abdicated his brother George VI was crowned in May. The Parish Council was again organising an event which included tea for children and adults, sports and fireworks. It was also agreed to hire a Radiogram to be used in the Institute Hall. (The Women's Institute Hall doubled as the village hall and presumably the radiogram was for people to listen to the Coronation being broadcast.) After the event the records show that there were Coronation Mugs and medals.

In March 1953 the Minutes record that the tenants of Hothfield Camp were to be invited to the Coronation celebrations for Elizabeth II. In 1953 the plans were not only for tea and sports, but for a Fancy Dress competition, baby show, a 'social', and Coronation mugs for children under 5 years old. Mike Bates records that the children were given mugs and a coach and horses.

Hopefully we will enjoy the next Coronation celebration in the Village Hall on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> May.
