March Musings

I'm writing this on a rather dreary day in February, rain and sleet all day, a real February Filldyke. I hope by the time this magazine pops through your letter box spring will have sprung and the signs of hope and new life be very much in evidence.

March gets its name from the Roman God of war, Mars and the saying for this, the first month of the Roman calendar, is that it comes in like a lion or a lamb. I am hoping for lamb- like throughout the month as we seem to have had a great deal too many storms recently!

We are well into Lent now having celebrated Ash Wednesday on Feb.14th which coincidently was also St Valentine's Day. In March we have several well known saints to celebrate starting on March 1st with St. David, the Patron Saint of Wales and the only one of our national patron saints who was born, lived and died in the country where he is celebrated, so if you have Welsh ancestry as I do wear you daffodil, (or leek) with pride!

On March 2nd we have St. Chad of Lichfield (although he came originally from Northumbria along with lots of Celtic saints). More locally, on March 8th we have Edward King, Bishop of Lincoln from 1885 so missed being bishop of our area by one year. Not a saint admittedly, but a notedly caring and pastorally inclined bishop.

By now we are coming up to the 4th Sunday of Lent, (this year the 10th) a time when the traditional strict fasting of Lent was eased a little and Mothering Sunday was celebrated. Many young people who were "in Service" as maids or farmhands were allowed to return home to their families and their "home" churches taking presents of Simnel cake or bunches of spring flowers. We will be celebrating at 9.30am at St. Wilfrid's South Muskham, all are welcome not just mothers!

Another famous patron saint comes along on The 17th, St. Patrick of Ireland with many stories and legends attached. He was possibly born in Celtic Cornwall and was captured by Irish raiders when he was 16 and taken to Ireland as a slave. He eventually escaped to France, trained as a priest and then bravely returned to Ireland determined to evangelise the pagan population. He walked the length and breadth of Ireland and instigated monastic foundations. Legend has it that he used the leaf of the shamrock plant with its 3 leaflets forming one whole leaf to help people understand the concept of the Trinity, and we still use words of prayers and hymns, like St Patrick's breastplate which are attributed to him. A very early saint as he died in 460CE!

Later in the month on the 19th we have St. Joseph of Nazareth from the gospels of Matthew and Luke, and on the 21st when we celebrate the arrival of Spring officially we remember Archbishop Thomas Cranmer who was born at Aslockton in our own county in 1489. As a reformer under Henry VIII he was the Archbishop of Canterbury who famously annulled the king's marriage to Catherine of Aragon and he was also the constructor of the Book of Common prayer and the 39 articles of the Church of England. When Queen Mary came to the throne following protestant King Edward VI 's untimely death he was convicted as a traitor and burnt at the stake in 1556. His genius for formal prose has left a lasting mark on Anglican liturgy!

This year Holy Week comes at the end of March starting with Palm Sunday on the 24th when there will be the usual procession this year starting at the church and walking to the chapel. There will be services every evening during the week at different churches and on Good Friday at North the hot cross bun service and Messy Church in the morning, and an Hour At The Cross in the afternoon at Averham. On the Saturday, Easter Eve we have the service of light at South at 7pm and on the great Festival of Easter itself we have the Riverbank Communion with our Methodist friends at 7.30am by the Ferry and at 9.30am the Easter Benefice Communion at Averham church at 9:30am.

We look forward to welcoming you to these services.



Maybe you've seen the latest Dior fragrance commercial (I'm not on commission!) In it a beautiful woman does some extreme things, jumping off a cliff into water, riding a car at high speed on a beach (spelling out the word love in the sand), and some other rather random perfume advert type things... at the beginning the man shouts, 'I love you!' And she replies, 'prove it!' Then, at the end we're asked the question, what would you do for love? What would you do for love? Maybe you're a bit like Meatloaf - you do anything for love (but not that - whatever that is!)

This Lent the Methodist Church has been reflecting on God's love, inspired by the classic hymn, 'Love Divine all Loves Excelling.' It was written by Charles Wesley a prominent Anglican of the eighteenth century and brother to John Wesley, Anglican priest and founder of the Methodist Church. John Wesley famously had his heart 'strangely warmed' (as he described it) by the love of Jesus and Charles writes about it in the hymn:

Love divine, all love's excelling, joy of heaven to earth come down. Fix in us thy humble dwelling, all thy faithful mercies crown.

Wesley captures the unparalleled lengths that God goes to to demonstrate (to prove) his love for us. In the words of this hymn we hear of the God whose love bursts the boundaries of heaven, bursts through the ways we insulate ourselves from God, bursts through the social barriers to reach those that the world rejects and finally (as we celebrate at Easter with Christ's death and resurrection) bursts through death into new life! There is literally nothing that can bind God's love. Nothing can separate us from God's love - it doesn't stay within the lines.

God is always present, in the good and bad times, when we can see or feel God and when we can't. When I lead school assemblies I ask the children to hold their hand out in front of them (try it). I ask them if they can feel anything, which with a still hand, they can't. You would think there is nothing there but if they (we) move our hand side to side quickly enough the air can be felt. It's all around us but we forget it's there because we can't see or feel it. Of course without the air, we would not be alive.

Unbounded Love continued ...

I don't know what you're facing right now, maybe you're in the midst of good times, perhaps you're facing difficult times. The message of Easter is that nothing can separate you from the love of God and that none of us are alone. The words of the hymn go on to say:

Jesu, thou art all compassion, **Pure, unbounded love thou art;** Visit us with thy salvation, Enter every trembling heart.

I pray that, this Easter, God will visit us with his salvation, fixing in us his humble dwelling. Come and explore the unbounded love of God at church - everyone is welcome. 'Life out of the Dirt'

A few years ago, a friend gave me a plant pot that she had painted black and written 'Flowers grow in the dirt' across in white ink. It was not the most glamorous of gifts but the point she was making would stay with me through the traumas of Covid and consistent current of negative news stories, through family bereavements and difficult situations.

What looks like dirt, waste on the ground, can be a source of life and beauty!

I am reminded of this as daffodils and snowdrops begin to flower, springing up from the unseemly brown muck below.

And I am reminded again as I reflect on the events that Christians celebrate at Easter.

I wonder what it would have been like to have followed Jesus to Jerusalem nearly 2000 years ago. To have watched as the man you thought was going to bind up the broken hearted and bring freedom for the captives died in agony on the cross. To have known that the one whom you believed was the Son of God lay lifeless in a tomb. To have felt the overwhelming despair and disappointment of that moment, and perhaps the fear and dread for your future in the light of his brutal demise.

What would I have done next? I like to think that I would have been one of the few who went to the tomb that first morning, perhaps like two of his disciples, Peter and John racing there, or maybe like another follower, Mary, peering tentatively in. If I had seen the empty tomb and neatly folded grave clothes, would I have been full of questions, or anger, or would I have believed?

And what if, like Mary, I had been greeted by the risen Jesus? Mary doesn't recognise him at first, mistaking him for a gardener. It feels so appropriate: gardeners spend time tending the dirt. They get close to the messiest places and soil gets caught in their fingernails. Gardeners bring beauty out of the earth.

And this is what God specialises in. He raised Jesus from the dead! He brings life out of the places and situations that feel most bleak, breathing hope to those enveloped in despair and disappointment.

As we move into this Easter season it is our prayer that, whatever situations you may be facing, you might know this God of hope, who is able to bring life out of the dirt.

South Muskham and Little Carlton Parish Council Information

The Parish Council doesn't meet in December, so the 17th January 2024 was our first meeting for two months.

Members noted that a response had been submitted to the Planning Inspectorate on the Scoping Report for the Great North Road Solar Park in line with the deadline of 7th December 2023. A joint parishes meeting has met twice, once in November and again in February. At the February meeting it was agreed that a questionnaire would be circulated to residents in all affected parishes so that parish council's/meetings could establish the views of their constituents. A smaller strategic group would be formed to compile a strategy going forward. Residents may also have seen that a Community Action Group has been formed. This group is separate to the Parish Council but will feed back to the larger parish group.

The installation of an interactive speed sign at Little Carlton has moved on slightly, with a site meeting held with Officers from Via and members of the Little Carlton Speedwatch Group to establish the best position for it.

The Community Emergency Plan is in the process of being reviewed to ensure it is fully up-to-date with contact details and flood wardens. If you would like to put yourself forward as a volunteer then please email the Clerk to confirm your details.

From the archives of St. Wilfrid's church, South Muskham

Whilst researching the church history a few years ago, I came across the following and still when I read it I experience a wonderful tingle of mystery and nostalgia for times past. What secrets our beautiful churches of the Riverside Parishes must hold for us all to discover and share.

Good Friday 1931 A curious happening South Muskham Church

It was a lovely Spring day. The sun was shining, birds were singing their happy hymns of praise. As we went into Church for the service at 3 o'clock we seemed to leave all the happiness & brightness outside & a sense of sadness & disappointment permeated through the building - so few were there to remember the Sacrifice & death of Christ. Only nine people had cared to come - even the organ blower had thought it not worth while; so I went up into the Chancel to blow for the organist. When we came to the old & well known hymn 'There is a Green Hill far away' we all sang as best we could, and if the voices were few and thin at least we sang true and meant what one sang. I noticed my husband kept turning round & looking into the Chancel with a puzzled curious expression on his face, as if there was something that he could not understand. After the service was over he told me that during the singing of the hymn he heard a beautiful choir of childish voices joining in with our older ones, singing in sweet harmony. Their singing filled the Chancel with a rush of wonderful sound, the sound as of many voices remembering with awe & thankfulness their crucified Lord, & after that the disappointment & the sadness seemed to be swept away & the smallness of the congregation did not seem to matter so greatly. It was as though in the years of long ago, some saintly old priest might have gathered his little flock of village children around him in the Church & their childish voices upraised to Heaven, have never really died down into silence, but have come down through the long ages, to help us take new courage and to carry on. Were they earthly children of long ago - clattering out into the sunshine when the service was done, or were those pure and lovely voices the voices of more Angelic Spirits singing at the gates of Heaven & the earthly mortals heard for a few moments something of the worship & the glory of the other world? Who can tell. I only know that this is absolutely true & I write it down now that those may read who come after.

Love and serve one another

On Maundy Thursday we recall the final command that Jesus gave to His disciples before His death. After the Last Supper, He rose and washed His disciples' feet. This was astonishing for a 'teacher' to do, but He had a firm purpose in mind: "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." His disciples were to love through service, not domination, of one another.

In Latin, the opening phrase of this sentence is 'mandatum novum do vobis'. The word 'mundy' is thus a corruption of the Latin 'mandatum' (or command). The 'washing of the feet' ceremony was an important part of the medieval church's liturgy, symbolising the humility of the clergy, in obedience to the example of Christ.

North Muskham Parish Council information

At the December meeting, the Parish Council took the decision to dismantle the skatepark, and this was removed on Monday, 12th February. The concrete plinth will be re-purposed and used to provide an alternative sports facility.

Flooding has been high on the agenda during January, with Storm Henk landing and depositing so much water on an already very high water table. Thankfully, the River Trent, although close to the 2000 level did not breach this side, although communities the other side didn't fare so well. A community action plan is in the process of being finalised and is with the County Council's Emergency Team for review before it is implemented. Volunteers will be key to this being introduced successfully and, while the Parish Council is thankful for those who have already come forward, more are always welcome.

The Parish Council have been successful in its bid to the Community Ownership Fund to try and secure the North Marsh for the village. The grant consists of £188,000 capital, and a £20,000 revenue fund. Any money granted has to be spent by December 2024. Negotiations are underway with the landowner to try and secure the land. The Parish Council resolved to apply to the Public Works Loan Board for a loan of £47,000 to help towards the cost.

A letter was circulated to every household in the Parish to explain that the Precept would need to rise to fund the cost of the PWLB Loan. This would require a Precept of £22,890 for the financial year 2024-25, with the cost to a Band D property of £54.24.

The first round of community consultation on the Great North Road Solar Park is in the process of being undertaken by Elements Green. Statutory consultation will take place later in the year. The Parish Council are liaising with all other affected parishes with a view to combining together to respond to the proposal.

All parishes affected by the solar park have met for the second time and a Parish Strategy Group will be formed which will work alongside the recently formed Community Action Group. It was also agreed that a questionnaire would be circulated to parishioners in the affected parishes in order that Parish Councils/Meetings were aware of the views of their constituents before the Council determines its approach.

Muskham Rural Community Centre news








The church is open daily for anyone to call in, not only to absorb the history of the building but also for a quiet moment away from the hustle and bustle of our daily lives. There is also a Children's
