The village continues to grow



Call for Memorial Hall Trustees

Marden Memorial Hall is a vital village amenity used by many organisations, including the Pre-School Play Group who use the facilities on a daily basis in term time. The Hall is a charity which is run by a group of Trustees, with the Parish Council as custodian trustee, however the Council does not have any responsibility for the running of the hall. The Memorial Hall is such an important village community asset and it is with regret that a few trustees are standing down, including the Treasurer John Elphick, who has served many years in this important role. If there is anybody in the village who has a few hours to spare each month and would like to become a Trustee, could you please contact Alison at the Parish Office.

Village Parking

The lack of both long-term and short-term parking in the village is a cause of annoyance to a lot of residents. The Parish Council is being proactive in trying to address the various parking issues that face the village. Councillors are in the process of analysing the parking survey that residents were asked to complete a few months ago. 133 responses were received – so thanks to those of you who participated. At the same time, the Parish Council is also examining the existing parking restrictions and single and double yellow lines. Once all this information has been gathered, Councillors will discuss with Maidstone Borough Council and then a Public Consultation will take place.

Parking on Double Yellow Lines

It is concerning that vehicles are frequently parking on the Double Yellow Lines (DYL) outside the Post Office. This frequently causes problems, particularly for large vehicles turning at the junction. Can we please ask everyone not to park on any of the double yellow lines in the village however briefly you are parking? If there are no spaces available, then please use the public car park. The Maidstone Borough Council Parking Wardens do check village parking on a regular basis.

Parking on Pavements

If you have an issue with vehicles parking on pavements that obstruct your right of way, then please call 101 and try to take a photo, if possible, so it can be dealt with promptly by our PCSO Nicola Morris. Whilst the police have no power to remove vehicles parked on pavements, they will assess and an Advice Notice can be placed on the vehicle - the police can only give advice to the registered keeper. However, if the offender continues to park on the pavement, a Police Officer can issue a ticket for obstruction.

Firefighter Appeal - Parking in the Parish

Kent Fire & Rescue Service has concerns about poor parking in residential streets and fear that this could cause delays in getting their fire engines to emergency incidents. Can we please appeal to residents to bear this in mind, but of course to still not park on pavements that will restrict pedestrian access.

Speeding in the Parish

Do you want to do anything about speeding in the Parish? Then please contact Erika at the Parish Office who is organising some speed watch sessions. If you are interested, Speed Watch Kent have now organised online training for Community Speed Watch (CSW) and Erika is happy to give you the details. 'Bag that poo, any rubbish bin will do'!

Maidstone Borough Council (MBC) has recently removed the current dog bins in the village and several have been replaced with 'co-mingled' bins - in other words, placing general rubbish and dog waste together! The Parish Council has lobbied MBC on this issue. Remember dog fouling is a serious health hazard — it must be stopped!

School Bus

Owing to recent roadworks, the morning school bus has been stopping on Church Hill instead of the usual bus stop. This has resulted in children blocking the pavement at the station approach, and some parents turning vehicles around at the entrance to the station. Can we please ask parents to drop their children at the bus stop? The alternative has been causing disruption for those walking and driving to the station.

Napoleon Drive Play Area

As previously advised, the Napoleon Drive play area has now been transferred to the ownership of Marden Parish Council. Councillors are currently looking at under-5 play equipment options to replace the existing outdated apparatus, and will hold a Public Consultation in the New Year. The surrounding shrubs and vegetation are being tidied up and cut back over the Winter.

Diseased and Dying Trees

The Parish Council have taken advice from a Tree Surgeon and unfortunately there are a number of diseased and dying trees, some potentially dangerous, in the Playing Field, Chestnuts and Rookery Path areas. Several of these have now been removed because of the danger they may pose to the public. Once all the work has been completed, Councillors will look at replacing some of the trees, if appropriate, especially those that have Tree Preservation Orders (TPO), along Rookery Path. This is, of course, a costly but necessary exercise.

Keeping Marden Tidy!

The Parish Council is very grateful to Alpha Wholesale, who is based in Pattenden Lane, for clearing the unsightly pile of rubbish from the area at the end of the Playing Field. Marden's Community Warden, Mira Martin, is looking into installing a rubbish bin there and the Parish Council is investigating ways in which the ditch can be cleared. It is also hoped to clear the vegetation in this area creating a tidier and more open aspect.

Can we please request that residents keep their front gardens clear of weeds and overhanging hedges. However, any overgrown hedges or verges on Kent Highways land can be reported direct to Kent Highways via their website: http://www.kent.gov.uk/roads-and-travel/report-a-problem

MinB were absolutely delighted to learn that Marden was awarded 'Silver' in the Small Town category at the S&SE in Bloom Awards Ceremony in September. This is an excellent start for our newly-formed group. Can I thank all of the Committee and other members who have helped so much with this huge project to help tidy up our lovely Parish and make it more beautiful.

Our motto is 'It's All About Village Engagement' and we are grateful that so many of the village groups and residents participated. We have arranged numerous fund-raising events and had a number of generous sponsors, but our particular thanks go to Golden Hill Nursery who funded all the plants in the Summer.

We have been planting 2,000 crocuses at various spots in the village which were kindly donated by Weald of Kent Rotary, via John & Mary Elphick, in support of the 'Purple4Polio' campaign. The apple crate planters have also been re-planted with winter foliage and more perennials and bulbs have been planted at the Library area. Next year we will be focusing on encouraging children to get involved in projects such as growing pumpkins, sunflowers, and making bat and bird boxes. Residents will also be encouraged to grow more bee and butterfly enhancing-

plants; to create a wildflower meadow; to hold weed clearing groups; and maybe enter more competitions. So come on Marden help us achieve our goals and improve the look of our village – the S&SE in Bloom judges main observation is the clearing of weeds – so please try to keep the front of your properties clear and tidy! Contacting the Parish Council

One of the most important roles of the Parish Council is to acknowledge and, where possible, act upon issues raised by local residents. We are always happy to respond to emails and letters, and it is our duty to look into any issues that residents may have. On occasion we receive correspondence of a potentially libelous nature, although the Parish Council appreciates that sometimes issues can be contentious. However correspondence should not contain unhelpful, derogatory and/or inflammatory comments nor use language that we consider to be unacceptable. The Parish Council will not respond to any such correspondence until it is written in an acceptable way. Can we reiterate that Parish Councillors are volunteers who give a great deal of their time for the good of the Parish. Clearing Snow and Ice

Kent County Council (KCC) is responsible for clearing snow and ice from roads and roadside footways (pavements) in Marden, and the B2079 through the village is one of KCC's primary salting routes. During periods of severe weather, other authorities, including Maidstone Borough Council (MBC) and Marden Parish Council may also provide assistance if they have resources available. If the Parish Council is able to assist KCC to keep these routes clear of snow and ice, our priority will be to help clear the busiest lengths of footway in the village centre which is the North side of the main road between Church Green shops and the bus stop near Haffenden Close; and the South side of the main road between the bus stop near the Library car park and High Street shops.

If you are clearing snow and ice yourself, these simple guidelines below have been published by the Government and KCC. When you clear snow and ice:

- O Do it early in the day it's easier to move fresh, loose snow
- O Don't use water it might re-freeze and turn to black ice
- Ouse salt, if possible it will melt the ice or snow and stop it from re-freezing overnight
- O You can use ash and sand if you don't have enough salt it

will provide grip underfoot

- Pay extra attention when clearing steps and steep pathways
 using more salt may help
- O Be careful when you are shoveling snow ensure your own safety and visibility, especially when it's dark

NB: The salt/grit mix from the yellow salt bins may only be used to clear public roads and paths, and must not be spread on private drives or pathways.

You may also wish to help your neighbours. For comprehensive information, please visit the KCC website www.kent.gov.uk for their Winter service provision. From the home page, click on 'Roads and Travel' then 'What we Look After', then 'Winter Service'. It provides useful information on salt bins, gritting routes, how and when KCC salt the roads, clearing snow in the community and the latest weather updates.

Public Rights of Way

Due to work starting shortly on the Stanley Farm development PROW KM281 and part of KM283 has been temporarily closed from 17th October for six months while new roads are constructed. The Order for new route for KM275 from Copper Lane to Park Road has been made, however it cannot be used until KCC have installed stiles and bridges which should be undertaken shortly.

Southern Water have been undertaking a detailed investigation of the sewerage network in the area and looking at the current impact of surface water on the drainage network. Hopefully the results of the investigation will be published shortly.
