There is a tug of war competition with several teams entering and a new trophy shield for the winning team, engraved with your team name for eternity.

The new petanque court will be open for use and our local Weston Turville U3a will be doing lessons or challenges for the afternoon; if you are not in the know; it is like bowls, but you throw the ball not roll it. It is easier to say than do!

HELP IS OUT THERE!

Living in Weston Turville, it sometimes feels as if we can escape the problems that others are experiencing with food and energy poverty. I mean, we are a relatively prosperous neighbourhood with million-pound housing stock with no obvious signs of deprivation. But is it so? Is not the sort of food or energy poverty that people are suffering now, hidden behind closed doors like domestic violence? We don't want to admit to suffering from it or want to acknowledge it if it is in our road.

The war in Ukraine, the repercussions of Brexit, the recovery from COVID, are all playing a part in our current situation and our expenses are increasing with the rising cost of living; whilst most people's incomes are falling year on year.

For those who follow the Everything Weston Turville or Parish Council Facebook pages, you will know that we have a couple of collection points in the village for our local foodbank in Aylesbury. One is in School Lane and the other in Church Lane near the Chequers Pub. The following figures are from the foodbank website which covers this area:

OVER 7,587 three-day emergency food supplies given to people in crisis in and around Aylesbury since opening in April 2016.

OVER 17,997 people have been fed by Aylesbury Foodbank.

OVER 161,973 meals have been provided by Aylesbury Foodbank.

Whilst we could debate all day the rights and wrongs of people going hungry in a first world country, we need to do something about it whilst better people than I, try to resolve the situation.

There is help available. Bucks Council list different organisations that can help with food, money, etc and give vouchers to help during school holidays (www.buckinghamshire.gov.uk/housing-and-benefits/support-with-food-bills-and-finances or ring 01296 531 151). The foodbank is located in Rabans Close off Rabans Lane and you can access via the number above. Sometimes you only need a one-off bit of assistance to tide you over until payday or to help with a special occasion. In that case consider our local parish charity The Widow Turpin's Trust. Details on the next page.

If you are fortunate enough not to need help please consider helping others by donating to the foodbank and if you need help......make contact and ask! It is there for you.

Widow Turpin Charity

There is a very large wooden plaque on the wall in Weston Turville church. It sits there largely unnoticed, in spite of its size, but in fact is probably the oldest documentary record of The Widow Turpin's Charity, Weston Turville.

From the photo of it here you can see how a certain Mrs Turpin left her land to the Parish to buy bread for those in need, and indeed for many years this was exactly what was followed by the Overseers (Trustees) of the Charity. However, some years ago this formula was found to be outdated, so instead of loaves of bread being handed out, vouchers to buy groceries were given instead. And so it continues to this day.

This tiny local charity has somehow survived, in spite of so many others either disappearing into thin air, or being swallowed up by larger charities. The total annual income is very modest, but at least is not lost in administration or other outside expenses; there has only been one single non-charitable expense in the past 16 years. The biggest problem the Charity has faced in recent times is trying to identify individuals

THE WIDOW TURPINS GIFT.

She gave all her free-hold lease-hold arable land and lay Ground, lying & being within the Parish and Common fields of Weston in the County of Bucks, with all Commons & Profits their-unto belonging to Mary Hockley, for the term of her natural life & no longer, & if She hath any children lawfully begotten on her Body, then they to have her land & lay Ground aforesaid equally divided betwixt them,& for want of such Issue then Immediately after her decease. She gave all the aforesaid Estate to the Poor of Weston aforesaid for ever. & that the Overseers of the Poor of the said Parish of Weston & their Successors, shall at the Best rate & for the most Profit they can, let all the said Estate & the Rents of the same, shall be all laid out (only two Shillings for their trouble, in groat loaves of good & wholesome Bread, to be equally distributed by them, to the Poorest Inhabitants of the aforesaid Parish by equal portions, on the feast of S. Michael the Arch Angel, and the Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and it became due in the Year

Midnight Walk returns for one last night



Weston Turville Village Hall Annual Report 2021-2022

It has been an almost normal year for the village hall since the last lock down was lifted, with regular hirers starting to return in April 2021 and children's parties permitted again from the summer onwards.

BOOKINGS: We have several new regular hirers which have assisted in filling the letting void left by the closure of the children's preschool Topsy Turvey pre lockdown and are slowly filling all the available booking slots. We now have a total of 14 regular hirers throughout the week. Weekends are still kept available for local parties and activities.

We started working with 'Street Food' in September 2021: initially organising it as a 'one off' with a few vendors, so we could gauge the response from the community. The turnout on the first night exceeded our expectations with an estimated 400 + buying food from the available vendors. Another event was organised for October, and we listened to the feedback received so increased the number of vendors, included food suitable for younger palates and added more seating, some indoors and put on live music to entertain. Again the event proved popular and a similar number of people attended. We were not scheduled to hold an event in November due to a high possibility of inclement weather, but we had so many requests to hold another one and to make it 'Christmassy' that we organised a Christmas Street Food and found volunteers to lead community carol singing in the hall; which we opened up and decorated appropriately for the occasion. Our next event was in March of 2022 and again the hall was opened up, live music supplied, and different vendors sold food. At the time of writing, we have not been given numbers of persons buying food but indications on the night suggest it may have been the best attendance so far. The hall is booked for the 3rd Friday of each month for the rest of the year (excluding Good Friday in April and December!). The hall receives a % of any profits made to cover electric etc and because it cannot be hired out whilst an event is being held.

FINANCES: Our lettings for 2021-22 have given us an income of £16,741 and we were fortunate to get a further government grant to assist during lockdown which amounted to £8000. We had a total of £1075 given to the hall as donations with the majority of the money coming from the monthly 'Street Food' events. With the money from the Parish Council for services at £1947.81 our

total income for the year was £27,788.81. Our annual expenses were £17,145.14p (figures subject to audit).

MAINTENANCE: We have had the solar panels installed in April which will reduce the daily running costs and is part of our ongoing commitment to reduce our carbon footprint. We made use of lockdown by refreshing the paint work and undertaking deep cleaning whilst the hall could not be hired.

Recipe Pages

Coronation Chicken Pie

Ingredients

6 x boneless, skinless chicken thighs

1 tsp turmeric

Large chunk of ginger - peel and finely grate

1 tsp cumin seeds

3tbsp korma curry paste

400ml can coconut milk

400g spinach

60g dried mango - chop into chunks

50g raisins

500g block puff pastry

PI flour for dusting

1 egg - beaten

Mixture of black onion seeds / flaked almonds / cumin seeds for sprinkling

Small bunch of coriander - chopped

Dresssing

100g Greek yoghurt

1 tsp mild curry powder

1/2 lemon - juiced

- Mix chicken, turmeric, ginger, cumin seeds, korma paste and a pinch of salt.
 Marinate for a few hours or overnight.
- Tip chicken into a medium saucepan and pour over the coconut milk, stir, and bring to a simmer and cook for 40 minutes over a low heat until very tender. Leave to cool.
- Tip the spinach into a colander and pour over a kettleful of boiled water to wilt.
 Cool and squeeze out as much water as you can and roughly chop. Shred the chicken into the sauce then stir through the spinach, mango, raisins and coriander [this can be done a day ahead].
- Half the pastry making sure one half is slightly larger. Roll the smaller half into
 a 25 cm circle then put on a baking tray. Pile the filling into the middle, leaving
 a border. Roll out the remaining pastry to a 30cm circle and drape over filling,
 pressing, or crimping the edge to seal. Chill for 20 minutes.

Heat the oven to 200°C / 180C fan / Gas 6.

Score a criss-cross pattern over the pie and brush with some of the egg. Bake for 20 minutes then brush over with the remaining egg and sprinkle over the seeds and flaked almond mix and some sea salt. Bake for another 20 minutes until the pie is deep golden and the almonds are toasted.

Leave the pie to cool and combine the dressing ingredients. Serve in wedges with the dressing and some mango chutney if you like.

Can be eaten hot or cold.

Coronation chicken was served at the Queen's coronation; however it is based on a dish served at George V's Silver Jubilee that mixed chicken with mayonnaise and curry!

Very Very Rich chocolate mousse

170g dark chocolate 275 ml single cream 1 egg ½ tsp vanilla essence Pinch of salt

Break chocolate into small pieces. Heat cream until just bubbling then pour onto the chocolate and blend until smooth. Add the egg, vanilla essence and salt and whizz until smooth. Put in tiny cups — it's very very rich. Can be made the night before — keep in fridge.

If you find it's too rich, use a mixture of dark and milk chocolate – 70 dark / 30 milk.

Another way to lessen the dark chocolate impact is to mix a little honey + water, make some holes in the mousse and drizzle the honey mixture over. Pop a couple of raspberries or strawberries on top, drizzle the honey mixture over and then shake a light dusting of icing sugar.

Parish Council News

Chairman's Report

Our Annual Parish Meeting is an opportunity for me to update our residents on what your Parish Council has achieved over the last 12 months and what we have planned for the coming year.

We currently have a full complement of councillors who have worked throughout Covid and I would like to thank them for their diligent work to ensure that we provide a service to our whole parish.

The key concerns of our residents include Speeding and new housing developments. We work with developers where appropriate and support residents where they have issues over planning. In particular we have represented our parish on the strategic planning meetings where several new developments on Aston Clinton Road have been heard. Although these have been approved, we are working with developers to mitigate residents' concerns including plans for traffic calming and new recreation facilities through section 106 agreements. The most disappointing outcome was where Bucks Council took all of the Section 106 funds from the Hampden Fields development to be spent on the Theatre and Aqua Vale instead of recreation within our Parish. As a council we have now secured an agreement to review this and are putting together a costed plan for facilities within the parish.

BBOWT will be carrying out a survey on the Glebe field in the coming months and the results of this will be communicated to the whole parish.

The Council would like to thank Susie and her team of volunteers who have been planting wild flowers around the parish and ensuring they look amazing for all the residents to enjoy.

The playing fields have had a major investment over the last 12 months with new facilities including the Multi Use Games Area, Skate Park, a pathway around both fields and a revamped play area with our new Petangue court next to be installed.

Other plans for 2022-23 include:

- Redesign layout of village hall car park and repaint white lines
- Electric vehicle charging points in the village hall car park
- Replace old, worn out benches
- Wildflower area in the playing field
- 3 yearly inspection of trees on the Parish Council's land

 Village sign is expected to be completed later this year and will be installed in Worlds End Lane, on the island near the war memorial

The Parish Council will also be working with CAWT (Climate Action Weston Turville). It has started looking at ways to reduce the carbon footprint of the hall and other ways. This includes solar panels on the village hall roof, investigating insultation for the hall roof, EV charging points, planting to improve biodiversity in the parish, promoting other initiatives such as the Repair Café and grants available from Bucks Council to residents.

Finally I would like to thank our Clerk and my fellow councillors for their hard work over the last 12 months, working on many projects and helping to make our Parish a better place.

Did you know you have Hedgehogs on your street?

Thank you for taking the time to read this leaflet. Hedgehogs need all of the help we can give them!

Did you know that rough estimates put the current Hedgehog population in England, Wales and Scotland at less than one million, compared with a staggering 30 million in the 1950s!?

Hedgehogs have been spotted nearby and the fact that they can travel up to 2 miles a night means that YOU have Hedgehogs near you!

Some of the reasons for Hedgehog decline in the UK:

HEDGEHOG DECLINE... can you help?



- Loss of Hedgerows and field margins.
- Loss of habitat in Urbans areas due to housing developments, car parks etc.
- New roads, fences and walls carve up suitable habitat and sometimes isolate populations which in turn prevents breeding.
- Lack of wild areas means a lack of bugs and beetles resulting in a lack of suitable food sources for the Hedgehogs. This is often a result of 'over-tidy' gardens.
- With more cars on the roads than ever before, roadkill is a big problem.
- Use of pesticides and slug pellets can poison Hedgehogs and also kill the bugs that Hedgehogs eat.

What can you do to help? PTO!

1. Link your garden - Hedgehogs roam between 1-2km each night during their active season. It's therefore critical that they can access a wide range of gardens. 13 x 13cm (5 x 5") holes in walls or fences will let hedgehogs through but be too small for most pets.

Why not create a feature of your highway with a Hedgehogs R Us Highway?



- 2. Make Ponds / Holes / Drains sate Hedgehogs are adept swimmers and climbers, but they can't climb out of steep-sided ponds, pools or deep holes. Use a pile of stones, a piece of wood wrapped in chicken wire to create a simple ramp to prevent drowning in ponds. Cover up drains and holes to prevent hogs getting trapped and dying of starvation.
- 3. Create a Wild Corner Let the plants go mad in a corner of your garden, and don't cut them back in winter and hedgehogs might nest here. They'll also benefit from the abundant insects. Try adding log piles, a compost heap and bug hotels!
 Why not buy some seedballs from Hedgehogs R Us to help?
- 4. Deal with Netting and Litter Hedgehogs are prone to getting tangled. Polystyrene cups, plastic, and elastic bands are all common offenders. Replace netting with a rigid structure or use a thick cordage and keep taut. Sports and garden netting should be tied up or stored inside when not in use.



- 5. Put out Food and Water Hedgehogs really benefit from extra food, using it as a supplement to their natural diet. Meaty cat or dog food, hedgehog food and kitten biscuits are all suitable. (Avoid foods such as mealworms & peanuts). Water can also be scarce at certain times of the year and is the only thing you should give them to drink. If you are worried about the local cats and rats getting to it, why not buy a Hedgehogs R Us feeding station?
- 6. Stop using Chemicals Lawn treatments reduce worm populations. Pesticides, insecticides and slug pellets are toxic and reduce hedgehogs' creepy crawly prey. They are all unnecessary in a healthy, well managed garden.
- 7. Check before Strimming Check before you cut and avoid causing horrific injuries or death. Single hedgehogs are easily moved, but use gloves! Moving a hedgehog family is more complicated and ideally they should be left undisturbed Call your local rescue centre or for advice.
- 8. Be Careful with Bonfires Piles of debris are irresistible to a hedgehog looking for somewhere to hibernate or nest build it on the day of burning or move the pile on the day of burning to avoid a tragic end.
- 9. Make a home for Hedgehogs –
 Houses available from Hedgehogs R Us.
- 10. Help hogs in need Hedgehogs are nocturnal animals and should therefore only come out at night. If you see a Hedgehog out during the day, not moving, moving slowly, looking sick or injured then using gloves, put it in a high-sided box. Place a hot water bottle wrapped in a towel in with the hedgehog and cover with a blanket. Offer food and water and then seek help from a rescue centre. For a list of local rescue centres call BHPS on 01584 890801. If you see a Hedgehog in the daytime moving with purpose then leave it alone as it could be a busy Mum!

In 1991, following more than a year of intensive research, Tessa Taylor self published "WESTON TURVILLE RESERVOIR - An Historical and Ecological Study". In 2006, it was updated and a second edition published.

Following the death of Tessa in 2020, it was decided to honour her memory by printing a third edition, in A5 format, adding colour where possible and reflecting some of the changes that have occurred in the 16 years since the 2nd Edition. We also

strived to keep some of the hand drawn, kitchen table character of the original.

The book covers the geography and history of the reservoir's inception to mitigate the loss of water to local mills caused by the construction of the Grand Junction Canal, through a period where it supplimented the water in the Wendover Arm flowing to the Canal Summit, and finally to it's use for recreation and wildlife protection.

Cattle and Climate Change

It was a slow start to Spring this year. The cautious emergence of shoots and buds was tempered by frost and cool air from the north. Whichever way Spring chooses to arrive, whether slowly or in a warm rush, it always brings an optimistic mood to the farm. After a barren winter with no bounty to harvest or guarantee of income, and the seemingly endless damp, cold days stretching into the distance ahead, Spring breathes life into all that managed to hold on through the dark months.

The cattle on our farm go out to grass at around mid-April each year, although the timing varies depending on the weather. There needs to be enough grass growing in the fields to support their appetite, however the ground also needs to be firm so that they do not churn the pasture to a quagmire and damage any future grass growth.



The pastures on any farm are a carefully

managed resource, and ours are no different. A grass field, contrary to popular belief, is not simply a place to let an energetic pooch loose. It is an important and vibrant ecology of many different plant species, supporting a wealth of bird, insect, fungal and bacterial life. To a farm, this biology is vital as the diversity brings resilience and health to the soil and all the life that the soil supports.

This country is good at growing grass. Our climate is temperate, which suits the growing conditions for the forage which makes up the natural diet of ruminant livestock such as sheep and cattle. Our native breeds of these animals are extremely well adapted to benefit most when they are left to graze in the fields, and farmers in the UK make use of these adaptations as much as they can. The cattle will graze the pastures for as long as the grass is growing throughout the summer, before they are housed again back on the farm over winter. Their diet will remain grass-based when they are inside- only now it is in the form of hay or silage.

Hay and silage are types of forage made from grass which has been harvested in the abundance of summer then preserved for the long dark months of winter when the fields are dormant and unproductive. Raising cattle this way is known as extensive and is directly opposed to the intensive beef industry of other continents who are not able to grow the grass that we can. Farmers in countries where grass is not plentiful have to artificially use unnatural diets of grains and pulses, often transported from elsewhere to feed their livestock.

The carbon footprint of beef production varies massively across the globe. Latin America and Asia produce significantly more greenhouse gas emissions per animal compared to herds in the UK. Feedlots in these continents contain vast numbers of cattle, and are responsible for gigantic areas of deforestation, soil erosion and pollution. By contrast, grass fields in the UK have an astonishing ability to store carbon, which in fact means British Beef can be good for the environment!

Transport has the biggest impact on global emissions today. The effect of reducing travel was plain to see during the pandemic lock-downs, when the air became clear and quiet, and nature was allowed a chance to recover. Minimising foodmiles is key to reducing the travelled distance for which we are responsible, and

it's easy to do: buy locally-produced,

seasonal food.

As with all topics, there is nuance to the effect around the debate that of the consumption meat has on environment, but it can be neatly summarised in the expression "It's the how, not the cow!"

If you'd like to know more about where your food comes from, where to buy locally, and the role that food production has in the environment, talk to your nearest farmer!


