

DETLING PARISH COUNCIL NEWSLETTER

Our first newsletter has been well received and we have had so many positive comments as a result of which we have now had several residents who have offered to help with the distribution.

Sherrie informs us that the parish council used to have its own Newsletter, as a stand alone from the Detling News, and also a group of villagers who assisted councillors to deliver it. We have come full circle.

The newsletter forms part of a layered communication strategy that we will be developing over the coming months.

Summary Arising from Detling Parish Council meeting 22nd July 2021 (not covered else where in the Newsletter)

- The Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR) 2020/21 was approved by the Parish Council for submission to the external auditor.
- The purchase of 5 new lockable noticeboards was AGREED. KCC Cllr Shellina Prendergast has given a grant of £1000 towards the cost.
- A budget of £2500 was AGREED for the Communications Group
- A budget of £500 was AGREED for the Village Cricket Match
- A section 101 Scheme of Delegation was adopted.
 This provides delegated authority to the Clerk to facilitate effective decision making when necessary.
- It was AGREED that the Highways Group would investigate the possibility of additional parking in the fields adjacent to the Old School Playing Field
- · Tony Taylor provided his monthly maintenance report

The following recommendations from the Open Spaces Committee were AGREED:

- To obtain quotes from an arborist for a yearly tree survey and ongoing maintenance of the trees in the Old School Playing Field.
- To progress a Management Plan for Monks Meadow
- A £500 budget for Planting in our Open Spaces
- To purchase two litter bins for the Old School Playing Field to encourage our younger residents to put their litter in the bin.

Kent Association of Local Council (KALC) Community Awards Scheme 2021



The KALC Community Awards Scheme is to acknowledge and give recognition to those that have made a significant contribution to their local community, it is supported by the High Sheriff of Kent, Kent County Council and Medway Council.

Irene Bowie Chairman of the Parish Council, presented Tony with his award at the 22nd July Parish Council Meeting.

Old School Playing Field - The parish council is delighted to support the Village Picnic on the 21st August by providing the venue. We have also provided a £30 gift voucher for the Community Shop as a prize for the raffle

However, during the playground inspection it was clear the benches in the Old School Playing Field had rotted beyond repair and would not be safe for use. Unfortunately we have had to remove them completely. The new benches, which were ordered earlier in the year are expected very soon. Thank you Tony for the prompt removal.

Princes Way Alleyway Update:

We understand that some residents who may not have a printer or access to the internet and can not print off the **Public Right of Way User Evidence Statement.** If that is the case, and you would like a form, please contact Sherrie Babington on **01634 867173** and one will be posted to you.

These forms are needed to provide written evidence that, collectively, the public have used the alleyway for a full 20 years. The forms are still available to download from the parish council website from or by telephoning the Clerk on 01634 867173. The closing date for these to be returned to the Parish Clerk is be Wednesday 8th September. The forms cannot be emailed they must be posted to the Clerk. Sherrie's address is on the contact information at the end of the newsletter and is also on our website.

The Parish Council will submit the returned statements with the necessary forms to KCC as soon as possible after the 8th of September.

Monks Meadow:

A sewage spill occurred at the Meadow on Tuesday July 20th during flash flooding .

This was immediately reported to Southern Water by a neighbouring resident who also very kindly informed the Parish Clerk.

Southern Water attended rapidly and made repairs. The Parish Council, as landowners, sought updates from Southern Water and reported this event to the Environmental Health Agency for urgent action and advice.

On Sunday 8th August the problem re-occurred and was reported again to Southern Water who attended the site.

Residents are encouraged to report to the Parish Council any incidents that occur on Parish Council Land so that we can then formally address the matter with the appropriate agencies. Many thanks to the local residents who have contacted us.

At the time of printing we have been notified that a significant blockage was cleared by Southern Water on 19th August. An update will be provided in the September Newsletter

PARISH COUNCIL HIGHWAYS GROUP

Highways Improvement Plan (HIP):

A Highway Improvement Plan (HIP) is a method whereby KCC will consult with Parish Councils to create a plan for highway improvements in a parish area. The idea is for the Parish Council to list their ideas for improvements in priority order with as much information as possible to allow KCC officers to then investigate the ideas initially as a desk top study and then be able to discuss the ideas a little more in depth.

The benefit of this approach is that there is then an agreed document setting out the various schemes and the recommended action going forward.

KCC have no specific allocation of funding for a Parish HIP. Therefore, it is very likely that there will be no, or limited, funding available from KCC. KCC see it as an opportunity to work with Parish Councils with the potential for possibly jointly funding projects or looking to Parishes to fund a scheme possibly in conjunction with the local KCC Member and his/her grant fund.

Kent Highways have advised us that the new format of this document has now been approved and will be shared with all Kent parish councils in September and that each Parish can only nominate 2 priorities per year regardless of who is footing the bill!

Parking:

The Highways Committee have proposed a Multi-agency meeting is arranged for discussion of off road parking proposals and also consideration of options for on road parking restrictions between the pub and the Village store. We hope to report on options at the next Parish Council meeting.









Speeding vehicles:

Any personal incidents involving speeding traffic in the village should be reported in the first instance to the Police by calling 101, or by contacting the current PCSO, Matt Adlington (07870 163508).

Please also submit any details to the clerk eg. photo of vehicle/ vehicle registration /date and time of the incident, in order that the Parish Council can keep a log of incidents for discussion with the police.

Jade's Crossing:

Wear and tear/ weather damage to the steps on Jade's Crossing opposite the village store has been reported and also escalated- an Inspector from Kent Highways is now due to visit and assess for further action.

HGVs:

Hopefully, residents will have seen the recently installed signage on the A249 prohibiting HGVs from entering the village. Kent Highways kindly agreed with the DPC Highways Committee to fund the cost of these signs and also the installation.

Weight restriction permanent signage: is under discussion for installation at appropriate points of the village

"Medway Valley Countryside Partnership lead an awardwinning community volunteer team – the Thursday Action Group.

This group has been carrying out task days in Horish Wood since the autumn of 2019 and has been following the prescriptions of a Forestry Commission plan for the site.

Whilst carrying out these duties 10 different species of lepidoptera have been recorded, most notably Green Hairstreak, Silver Washed Fritillary and Silver-ground Carpet Moth.

On a recent Orchid Walk, three species of orchids were spotted – loads of pyramidal, four common spotted and one bee orchid.

These are all to be found on the recently created bund that is the spoil from the high-speed rail link. These species were out trumped by the Lizard Orchid on the road verge nearer to the village.

Forest School returns to the woodlands

During the past few months, children have enjoyed spending time in Horish Wood on Forest School programmes delivered by Medway Valley Countryside Partnership,. This beautiful ancient woodland site is ideal for children to learn, have fun and re-connect with nature.

Dee Pickerill, Principal of Snowfields Academy, the first school to attend Forest School on this site since lockdown, said,

"Our students have a wonderful opportunity to take part in Forest School at Horish Wood, right on our doorstep. Forest School at Horish Wood gives our students, who all have autism, the opportunity to learn transferable skills in a woodland setting. They learn problem solving, team building and independence, all highly worthwhile attributes for our students."

Favourite activities included making a woodland swing and a zipline (which provided much entertainment, if not being the fastest zipline). Using a stout rope, thrown over a sturdy branch taught many skills, including safety, teamwork, sharing and problem solving. Everything is removed from the woods at the end of a session, meaning that they have to work out how to put it up take it down securely and safely, in addition to the enjoyment of using the swing.

Forest School's learner-led process allows them to make choices and direct their own learning, leading to improved confidence, self-esteem and resilience. Students gain practical skills and knowledge whilst engaging in exciting, fun activities, such as building shelters, using hand tools, crafts and art. Play is also a vital element of learning, and the pandemic has meant that children have had limited opportunities to play with others. In addition, spending time in nature is shown to improve children's physical and mental health and wellbeing, so time spent in the woods or other natural environment, is beneficial for children in so many ways.

Learning to live with Covid

For the past 18 months our lives have been determined by Covid.

It has cancelled plans, pushed businesses to the brink, and taken loved ones from us. While the pandemic is far from over, our phenomenal vaccine rollout has put us in a position where we can begin to learn to live with the virus.

Thank you to everyone continuing to work or volunteer in our local vaccination centres who've helped make this moment possible. Over 2.3 million vaccinations have been given out across Kent, with two thirds of adults in the county having received both jabs.

I know just how important easing restrictions has been for local businesses – especially our pubs and the hospitality sector, and in making life worth living again for so many people.

In the months ahead I'll continue supporting people and businesses affected by Covid and do everything I can to help our local NHS and councils through these crucial next few months.

More than at any point in the pandemic, people need to use their judgement to help keep the virus under control. Everyone can play their part by taking up the offer of being vaccinated and getting tested regularly.

It's up to all of us to think about how our actions and decisions can keep ourselves and others safe. If we're on a crowded train or busy shop, then wearing a face mask is the sensible thing to do. We have our freedoms back, let's use them carefully.

More money for our schools

Schools in Faversham and Mid Kent have been allocated £59 million by the Department for Education – up £4 million on last year.

Minimum funding levels will mean that every primary school will receive at least £4,265 per pupil, and every secondary school at least £5,525 per pupil.

I've heard first-hand that our fairer funding formula is already making a difference to schools that have historically been under funded.

This month has also seen a number of our schools take part in virtual visits to Parliament – including The Holy Family Catholic Primary School in Park Wood and Oaks Primary Academy in Shepway.



Backing our tourism businesses

I visited Leeds Castle again recently to meet their new Chief Executive, Helen Bosner-Wilton.

I know the past year has been incredibly tough for tourism and hospitality businesses. I'm glad the Government has published a new strategy to help the sector back on its feet, which includes an extra £352 million in support.

With summer here, and restrictions eased, there's never been a better time to support our local hospitality businesses.



Shepway regeneration plans taking shape

I called into Shepway in July to see for myself how plans to redevelop Cambridge Crescent in Shepway could benefit the local community.

The proposals announced by Golding Homes would see Cambridge Crescent turned into 240 new homes, an updated shopping area, and new public spaces.

Flexible fares become a reality

June saw the introduction of new flexible season tickets for train passengers.

I've been campaigning for fairer fares on our railways, with a ticketing model that better reflects how people live and work, so I'm pleased to see this become a reality.

Under the new scheme, people can purchase a season ticket allowing travel on any 8 days in a month. For commuters from Maidstone, a flexible season ticket could save £832.00 per year on travel to London.

The Detling Players have been in existence since the late 1970s. Started by Rosemary Hawthorne the actress wife of John the then part-time curate; she said "you couldn't have a village without a drama group".

Since then with a short Covid pause The Players have put on two performances a year...usually a light hearted production in November and a more serious play in April. In addition, for a number of years **Gavin and Sue Mclaggan** produced an open air production of a Shakespeare play at The Croft. This was always a huge team effort including the need for raised seats and a lighting gantry and often included cast from other local amateur dramatic companies. As well as Gavin another regular director of many successful productions was **John Munson** who directed pantomimes and serious plays, including the award winning production of The Importance of being Ernest, the most recent of which was Dancing at Lughnasa. Many of the productions have had local children in the cast including **Tom Clayton and Emma Johnson**.

Over the years The Players have won many awards in the Kent Full-length Play Festival and the **Duncan Rand One-Act Play Festival**; Arcadia, a difficult play directed by Gavin was a great success winning Best Actor, Best Set and Best Costumes.

More recently **Ladies in Lavender** won **Best Set and Best Actress**, and in the One Act Festival, Tides, written by Helena Jaques-Morton, the daughter of one of our longstanding actors won Best Production, Best Director, Best Play, Best Actress and Best Set.

The Players have produced a number of actors who have moved on to work professionally including David Vale and Charlie O'Conor, and a number of young budding actors who went to drama school including Shaun Williamson and Megan Vernon.

As is obvious from the list of awards its' not just the Actors that make a good drama group. There are usually far more backstage than there are on the stage. We have been, and still are very lucky to have people in the village and in Maidstone who commit many hours to making wonderful costumes, building excellent sets, creating sound and lighting to support the plays and working front-of-house on the box office, marketing and the Bar.

Our next production in the Village Hall from November 10-13th will be Pressure, a much Coviddelayed play about the D-Day landings by the well-known actor David Haig.

BONFIRES IN DETLING

The Parish Council would like to encourage everyone within the parish to consider the **impact having a bonfire** may have on others in the community.

It is a common misconception that local by-laws exist to control bonfires. They do not. There are no local by-laws or regulations affecting your right to have a bonfire. It is not illegal to have a domestic bonfire for the purpose of disposing of **your own garden waste**. It is not an offence to light a garden bonfire.

It is however an offence under the Environmental Protection Act 1990 to cause a statutory smoke nuisance. A statutory nuisance happens when smoke causes unreasonable interference with a person's use or enjoyment of their property. Smoke nuisance can occur at any time of the day or night.

 The Parish Council does not have the authority or legal powers to take action against residents who have caused a statutory smoke nuisance. We are not being obstructive the authority rests with MBC.

If you are bothered by smoke you can **approach your neighbour and explain the problem**. You might feel awkward, but they may not be aware of the distress they are causing and it will hopefully make them more considerate in the future.

If an informal approach does not work and MBC are satisfied that the problem amounts to a "statutory nuisance" they may take legal action by serving an "abatement notice", requiring your neighbour to stop. The maximum penalty for failing to comply with the requirements of such a notice is a £5000 fine, (£20,000 in the case of a trade or business).

WHAT'S WRONG WITH BONFIRES?

Burning garden waste can be a convenient way to get rid of bulky and messy waste; but what happens to it when you burn it?

The process of burning it causes it to disintegrate and undergo chemical changes. The result is smoke. Smoke contains many unpleasant and **harmful** components, including **carbon monoxide**, **dioxins** and **particles**, which are lifted into the air by the heat from the fire.

But that's not the end of it. Put simply, what goes up must come down.

Depending on the atmospheric conditions, smoke may be dispersed over a wide area, causing no visible effects. Alternatively, the combination of careless burning and adverse weather conditions may mean the effects are felt more locally.

- Health effects Some of the chemicals emitted by bonfires can have serious health effects. People with existing health problems such as asthma, bronchitis, and heart conditions are especially vulnerable to the effects of air pollution. We therefore urge you to think about your neighbours and avoid having garden bonfires. Instead of burning garden waste, we ask that you consider the use of more environmentally friendly methods of disposal.
- Air Pollution The materials released into the atmosphere by a garden bonfire will damage the quality of the air. The effects may be transient and harmless most of the time, however, if there are several people with the same idea in the same area at the same time, or the material being burned is damp, and allowed to smoulder or contains plastics, rubber or painted material, then the resulting smoke will contain many more dangerous chemicals and the pollution will be much worse.
- Nuisance and Annoyance The localised pollution from garden bonfires can prevent other people from opening their windows, hanging out their washing and generally enjoying their gardens.
- Safety Fire from garden bonfires can quickly spread in dry conditions. Sheds, fences and other structures may be at risk. Don't forget also that stray sparks carried off with the smoke can have a devastating effect on some buildings.

Simple Steps to avoid trouble:

There are some simple steps you can take to reduce the impact of your bonfire, or to avoid having one altogether:

- Compost garden waste or use an alternative disposal service for green waste.
- DO NOT burn any oily rags, rubber, plastics, damp garden waste or other materials that would create heavy smoke or toxic fumes
- Never light a bonfire when your neighbours have washing drying, or are out enjoying their gardens or have windows open.
- Advise your nearest neighbours before you light a bonfire so they can be prepared for any minor inconvenience that may arise.
- Choose the time of day and weather conditions that will cause the least inconvenience to neighbours.
- Never leave your fire to smoulder for long periods and do not allow a bonfire to continue burning beyond dusk.
- Burn material quickly in small quantities in a hot fire so the minimum amount of smoke is created. Choose your bonfire site carefully, well away from trees, fences and windows.
- Beware of attempting bonfires on very windy days as it can so easily get out of control.
- Have a hose-pipe and buckets of water handy just in

ROAD WORKS AND CLOSURES



M20 J7 Overnight bridge work (East side)
Work scheduled 8pm-6am Sunday August
22nd-Monday September 6th (excluding
bank holiday weekend 27th-30th August)

Some residents received a letter from Highways England ref. M20_609233 on the 11/8/21 regarding the diversion of traffic through Detling Village. Upon receipt of this letter, **Councillor Coles** immediately contacted Highways England and Kent Highways for correction of and clarification on the diversion routes.

Highways England and Kent Highways have now confirmed the following:

ALL traffic is to be held at J5 on the M2 and no traffic other than residents' (for access), low cc motorcycles, cyclists or horses will be allowed access to the A249 S.

- Motorway traffic will be diverted from M2 J5 along the M2 and the A229 S.
- (Non-motorway traffic will be diverted from M2 J5 along the A2 and the A229 S)
- Local traffic wishing to access the A249 N: travel through Detling to Bearsted via Hockers Lane and then return past Notcutts across the west side of the bridge at J7 on the M20.
- Local traffic which is London bound: from the A249S take the M20 East bound to J8 and return on M20 towards J7.



Temporary Road Closures:

Kent County Council have provided the following information: (PROHIBITION OF DRIVING) THE ROAD TRAFFIC REGULATION ACT 1984 TEMPORARY ORDER MAY 2021

For the safety of the public and participants whilst events are held at the Kent Event Centre, Kent County Council has made an Order to temporarily restrict through traffic on various roads in Maidstone.

This Order will come into operation at times when required on:

- Military Odyssey Saturday 28th August 2021 to Monday 30th August 2021
- Paws in the Park Saturday18th September 2021 to Sunday 19th September 2021

The following restrictions will be imposed whilst an event is being held, as shown opposite.

SCHEDULE

It will be necessary to impose temporary mandatory speed limits on the following roads:

Detling Hill, Detling &Sittingbourne Road,

Thurnham(Northbound) - 40 mph speed limit will be imposed from the junction with Scragged Oak Road up to the vicinity of the Shell Garage.

Scragged Oak Road, Stockbury - 30mph speed limit will be imposed between the junctions with Cox Street and A249 Detling Hill.

Sittingbourne Road, Thurnham & Detling Hill, Detling (Southbound). - 50 mph speed limit will be imposed from the junction with Chalky Road to the off-slip near the junction with Scragged Oak Road.

Detling Hill, Detling (southbound) - 40 mph speed limit will be imposed from the off-slip near the junction with Scragged Oak Road near to the junction with The Street.

Vehicles will be prohibited from turning right, expect upon the direction of a Police Officer, cause or permit a vehicles to turn right, on the following roads between the hours of 08:00 and 18:00 only:

Scragged Oak Road, Stockbury - from turning right into A249 Detling Hill southbound.

A249 Detling Hill, Detling - from turning right into Scragged Oak Road. **Rumstead Lane, Stockbury** - from turning right into A249 Sittingbourne Road northbound.

A249 Sittingbourne Road, Stockbury - from turning right into Rumstead Lane. South Green Lane, Sittingbourne - from turning right into A249 Sittingbourne Road northbound. Sittingbourne Road, Stockbury - from turning right into South Green Lane.

A249 Detling Hill, Detling (northbound) will have a lane closure in place on lane 1 from the main gate to the exit located near the Shell Garage, to allow for vehicles to join the A249 safely.

A Clearway Restriction will be imposed on both the northbound and southbound carriageways of Sittingbourne Road, Detling, A249 Detling Hill and Sittingbourne Road, Stockbury between junction 7 of the M20 and Junction5 of the M2

The alternative route for any through traffic affected by the above restrictions are either:

Traffic travelling northbound is via the roundabout at junction 5 of the M2 motorway

Traffic travelling southbound is via the roundabout at junction 7 of the M20 motorway.


