THE 'NEW LOOK' DISTRICT COUNCIL 1979

On May 3rd, the electors in Newark District clearly decided that neither Labour nor Conservative members should be placed in such a position as to have absolute control of the District Council. The Independent members were quick to appreciate the position in which they were placed and realised the responsibility thrust

upon them.

An attempt was made to try to have all sections of the council working together, but political dogma overruled commonsense and the two political groups were not prepared to co-operate with each other. As Independents now hold the balance, a decision had to be made and in coming to a decision the Independents ecognised that the Conservative group are the largest single group on the council and if anyone were to be placed in an advantageous position, be it ever so small, they had a numerical right to that position.

In arriving at an informal agreement with the Conservatives, the Independents insisted that both they and Labour members should have proportional representation on all committees and other bodies, thus giving no one group an overall majority or a right

to dictate policy.

It was essential that some agreement was reached so that committees could be appointed, chairmen elected and the work of the new

council get under way.

But in coming to an agreement, Independent members have given no undertaking to support Conservative policies, but will judge each and every issue on its own merits and support or otherwise according to our own personal views.

Each Independent has given an undertaking to our respective electorates that we are free of all political ties and this

undertaking we shall honour.

There will be occasions when some Independents will support one oint of view and some another; there will also be occasions when we agree with each other and vote collectively, and again there will be occasions when some or all of us abstain. This freedom of the individual we shall do our utmost to preserve and ask others to respect.

As Independent members we shall encourage all sections of the council to work for the benefit of the people we represent, the

ratepayers.
