#### **Parish Council News**

Minutes of the meeting of Great Milton Parish Council held at The Pavilion on Monday 18th September 2023 at 7:30 pm. Present: Cllrs S Harrod (Chair), B Fox (Vice-chair), P Allen, D Harms, M Horsley, S MacMahon and S Illingworth. In Attendance: Chris Ashworth (Clerk) and 3 members of the public. Apologies were received in advance from Cllrs F Van Mierlo (OCC) and G Heritage (SODC).

#### Variation of order of business

94/23 C was discussed before 92/23

Mr Hutton attended the meeting and handed out his proposals for The Bull to the Councillors and members of the public in attendance.

Mr Hutton reassured Councillors that his plans would not involve any changes to the external appearance of the original building. The lean-to garage on the west elevation, which currently accommodates the History Society, will come down and be replaced by a new WC block. At the back of The Bull, the current flat-roof extensions will come down to be replaced by a new 2-storey pitched roof extension, which will be located more centrally, thus creating a buffer with the neighbours to the east. There will be a single-storey extension to the side of this, which will house the kitchen, an accessible WC, and a staircase to the first-floor flat. The plan also includes reducing the car park level as it is currently artificially high.

Mr Hutton confirmed that he held a consultation at The Bull on September 6th, 2023, with 10 people attending; 9 out of the 10 were supportive of the plans.

Cllr Horsley asked what the time frame to complete these works would be. Mr Hutton said it would be a phased process to keep the pub open as much as possible during the works. Subject to obtaining all necessary consents, Phase One would start on 2 January 2024 and would include the demolition of the lean-to garage, building the new WC block, demolishing the current WC block and restoring the original back wall of the pub. He would also aim to reduce the car park level and re-route overhead cables and BT cables. Phase Two, beginning January 2025, would involve the completion of all remaining works, including the demolition of the existing 2-storey flat-roof extension and the construction of its replacement.

Cllr Harms asked what the outside materials would consist of. Mr Hutton said it would be a slate roof and timber cladding.

Cllr Harrod asked about parking. Mr Hutton said that the planners were looking to increase the number of spaces to 15, but this would involve the loss of garden space, and he is hoping to get them to agree that there be no increase in the current parking provision.

Cllr Horsley asked whether the plans would mean an increase in capacity for restaurant dining. Mr Hutton said that there would be a minimal increase in the number of covers.

Cllr Illingworth asked about a baby change within the pub: this will be included in the accessible toilet. Mr Hutton reiterated his desire to make the pub fully accessible to all.

The Parish Council have asked the Parish Clerk to contact the planning officer to ask for an extension to the need for a reply, which was the 6th of October. This has since been granted, so the planning proposal will be discussed at the next Parish Council meeting in October.

#### Declarations of members' interest

No declarations of members' interests were made.

#### Matters to report

The County Councillor and District Councillor's reports were received, reviewed, and are available on the Parish Council website.

Cllr Harrod noted about the EV charging consultation in Cllr F Van Mierlo's report the date for registering interest had passed, but the Clerk was asked to see if we could still apply. Potential places for the EV charging hubs were discussed, with Neighbours Hall being the most likely possible place.

#### Correspondence and public discussion

There was no correspondence or public discussion.

#### Parish clerk and councillors' update of matters in hand

- With an agreed budget of £500, the Parish Clerk is continuing the search for a suitable laptop which will be efficient and future-proof for the next five-plus years. The Parish Clerk has listed four potential laptops listed below, with more details about the laptops sent to all Parish Councillors.

The Parish Councillors agreed on the Vostro 14 - 3420 Laptop at £516.00. The Parish Clerk will purchase the laptop this week.

• The Parish Clerk is currently looking through and working out the best and most cost-effective way to get all the Parish Councillors onto Gov.uk email address. There is a pilot scheme run by SLCC over the summer, which, once completed, will give more guidance to Local Parish Councils about moving over to

.GOV.UK email address.

The Parish agreed to review this again once the findings from the pilot scheme have been released.

- Precept remittance for the 2nd half of the Precept has been received.
- The bus service 275 will no longer serve Great Milton. The introduction of service 46 means that the diversion of the 275 is no longer necessary.

#### Security in the village

Neighbourhood Watch Rod Snowdon joined the meeting and gave the Councillors an update on security in the village. He mentioned that the Village is quiet at the moment with only a few instances of note, one being a small amount of anti-social behaviour, which Neighbourhood Watch is aware of and involved with the parties and one other instance of someone being seen with a pen trying to get into the Pavilion building. All were reminded to never confront anyone in these situations and to get somewhere safe, then contact 101/999 or Neighbourhood Watch.

Signs for Neighbourhood Watch will be put up on the village gateway features, but at this time, Neighbourhood Watch is in the process of changing its logos.

#### Building work in the village and the impact

There is lots of building work going on in the village at this time, and issues have been raised. The general encroachment of the projects into the road, and the other concern is about the build with increased traffic levels, kids, cars, speed, etc.

Cllr Harrod noted that the current builders working in the village have tidied up the messes left so far and are now in a better state than previously.

Cllr Harrod suggested to the Council that all future planning applications should also take into account the potential of any building work spreading into common areas. All Councillors agreed with this suggestion, and Cllr Harms raised the point that with this, everyone should be receiving the same information from the Parish Council. It was agreed that the Parish Clerk would draft a letter that would be sent to all approved planning applications in the village. This letter will be reviewed by all Councillors once completed.

#### Speeding in the Village - Speed indicator display update.

Speeding has again been raised as an issue throughout the Village. The Speed indicator devices have been enquired about, and Cllr F Van Mierlo Councillor priority fund has been applied for and approved.

These signs can be permanently mounted on the poles.

These cannot be permanently mounted and therefore one unit could be regularly moved between the two poles

Another option which some villages are working towards is to have the VAS signs

permanently mounted near the entrances to the village and then support this with a mobile SID that moves around several poles within the village.

The Parish Clerk also did some research into the Community Speed Watch programme run by Thames Valley Police. This can be applied for and set up with the volunteer co-ordinator/s needing to complete online mandatory training.

Cllr Horsley has volunteered to undertake the online mandatory training to become the co-ordinator for the community speed watch programme.

The Parish Clerk will contact Jon Beale to arrange a date to meet on-site with Clerk and Councillors in the village to discuss places for SID poles to be erected.

#### Grass-cutting concerns

There have been a few complaints raised about the recent quality of the grass cutting by McCracken and Sons in the Village, with areas missed during the cuts and excessive amounts of grass cuttings left. The Parish Clerk has contacted McCracken about this and will hopefully have a full response by the meeting on Monday, 18th September.

The Parish Clerk will contact Great Haseley Clerk to find out who undertakes their grass cutting as it was raised by multiple Councillors that the cutting in that Village is always of high quality.

The Parish Clerk will continue to try and make contact with McCracken regarding the collecting of grass cuttings in the village, and that they notify the Clerk in advance of the day they will attend to complete the grass cutting so local residents can be made aware. It was agreed that new providers will be looked into if McCracken doesn't improve or fail to respond.

#### Broadband in the Pavilion update

The Recreation committee have given the go-ahead for the installation of mega-fast internet in the Pavilion.

Openreach has agreed to put all the cabling underground, and this will not cost the village a penny.

Here are a couple of things to consider now the installation has been given the goahead:

- Three years of free internet is being provided, but after three years, it will need to be paid for.
- We could join other Parish Councils in lobbying for a change in Parish Council legislation to allow some councillors to join remotely from time to time, and also the general public.

As the installation of broadband in the Pavilion will allow much more to be done at the Pavilion, Cllr Horsley would like to discuss the possibility of buying a large video screen with teleconferencing attachments for use in the Pavilion.

Cllr Horsley had a quick look into prices for a video screen, and they are not cheap but would allow a number of uses in the Pavilion, including allowing members of the public to join Parish Council meetings and, in the future, Councillors may be able to join virtually. Cllr Harms mentioned looking into the costings for a projector and projector screen as they can be more easily stored and are more secure.

Cllr Harrod would like a feature in the bulletin once the high-speed internet is up and running with things it could be used for, with this potentially coming from the Recreation Committee. Once the high-speed broadband is installed the Clerk will raise this with the Rec Committee.

#### Vacancy for Clerk/RFO

Chris Ashworth, current Clerk/RFO to Great Milton Parish Council, has handed in his notice of resignation in advance of moving out of the area in May 2024. The post will be advertised shortly.

#### Approval of documentation for Clerk/RFO recruitment process

The advertisement, application form and person and job specification for the Clerk/RFO vacancy were reviewed and approved.

The current Clerk will advertise the vacancy in the Village as well as online through places including Indeed and Facebook.

Cllr MacMahon will advertise the vacancy on 'Next Door'

this did make me reflect on the value we put on being known and remembered. For some, this is crucial to their lives as they strive to leave a legacy, for good or ill, that will never be forgotten. As a Christian I believe that one of the fundamental realities of our faith is that we are known by God. In Isaiah 49:16 we read "Behold, I have engraved you on the palms of my hands". And in John 10:28 we read "I gave them eternal life, and they will never perish, and no one will snatch them out of my hand". What is the true nature of our identity and security? Is it that we

are remembered after 45 years by someone we never really knew in the first place, or that we are known by God? I know which one gets my vote.

Remembering will be at the centre of a special service we are having at 4.00pm St Mary's Great Milton on Sunday 5th November a service of Commemoration and Thanksgiving for the Departed, so a bit of advance notice for people to put in their diaries. This will be for anyone who wants to remember family and friends 'whom we love but see no longer'. We will hear names read and there will be an opportunity to light a candle of remembrance. Also, as we reflect on our own mortality, we will remember that in God's eyes we are fully and completely remembered.

#### **Update from the Churchwardens**

We are finally moving forward with our plans for the church. We realised that conserving and moving the Dormer Monument from the tower to where it was placed originally in the south aisle was not practical for us to achieve at this time, especially as we could not raise the funds (£177k required). We have come to a compromise and are now planning to conserve it as best we can, in situ while improving the space in front of it which will enhance the viewing of it. The reputable Clivedon Conservation are looking forward to carrying out this work and we have grants to cover this and and an InfoPoint which will provide information on the monument and other interesting church history and information. Our kind donors are Oxford Historic Churches Trust-£6k, Francis Coales Charitable Foundation - £3k, Leche Trust -£4k, Morris Fund - £2k and the Benefact Trust-£3,900. We are adding £8,769 of our reserves. We are waiting for final approval from the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) before we can go ahead.

DAC representatives are visiting us on October 12th to discuss our internal church plans. We are hoping to

- remove the first row pews This has been requested for a long time as cramped when we have performers and they are also very uncomfortable.
- remove the pews in the south aisle, replace with flexible seating and move the font forward into this space. This would enhance involvement in baptisms and create a safer entrance to the church. Currently, the font base is a trip hazard.
- remove the small pews at the rear of the church for flexible use of space, infopoint and to enhance the viewing of the monument.
- build a servery in the NW corner where the font currently is. This would mirror the vestry on the opposite side
- divide the current vestry to incorporate a disabled WC
- update the heating system to a more green sustainable system
- re-decorate the church

The new plans will be placed in the church for viewing after we have met with the DAC. Once the plans are finalised and costed, we will seek further grants and will be doing much fundraising. Our fundraising group has some lovely events planned. Our final phase for grant applications will be for the external tower stonework repairs. We are delighted that Bill Fox has joined us and he will be using his experience to liaise with our Chartered Surveyors - Historic Building Consultants. If anyone would like to help us take forward these projects, do let us know.

#### **Great Milton Athletic Club (GMAC)**

As summer draws to a close, and the 2023 outdoor track and field season ends, Great Milton Athletic Club members can look back with pride at their notable successes with personal bests (pbs), club records, medals, and county selection.

The club delivered 97 training sessions to 31 children in different age groups, and members competed in 17 competitions including indoor events at Lee Valley in London, the winter cross-country (xc) season, and summer outdoor meetings. School events were in addition.

Winter highlights included participation medals in the Oxfordshire xc league for U11s Alice Mosley,



Abby Kirkman and Tommy Wilson, whilst U13s Grace Mosley and Rufus Blanche also competed across the season. Those five were joined by Leo Harris and Leo Powell in the County xc championships held on Shotover in January.

The first summer track and field event took place at the start of April at Tilsey Park in Abingdon where 14 athletes represented the club at the Radley Open Meeting. These early outdoors events lead up to the county championships in May, held at Horspath Track. At these events, athletes in Year 6 and 7 compete together as Under-13s, whilst Y8 and Y9 are U15s.

A highlight at the county championships was seeing three of the 8 lanes in the U13 girls hurdles final occupied by Great Milton athletes (photo), with Fleur Wilson winning silver, and pbs for Abby Kirkman and Grace Mosley. Fleur also took silver in javelin, gold in long jump (3.84m), whilst Abby took silvers in shot and discus, and Gracie Wilson won bronze in the U15G hurdles.

Those performances saw Fleur and Abby invited to represent Oxfordshire in a Southern Inter-counties' competition at Walton-on-Thames. There Abby threw the shot 5.91m, and Fleur the 400gm javelin 23.07m – both were new club records.

Other club records broken over the summer included Leo Powell in U11B Vortex Howler throw (28.30m), Dora Twycross (U13G 300m 53.11s), Abby Kirkman (U13G discus 13.44m), and Gracie Wilson (U15G discus 17.59m, long jump 4.20m, 100m 14.02s, 500gm javelin 19.01m).

The end of season was marked with the club presenting medals to the boy and girl who attended most training sessions – Abby Kirkman (42) and Leo Harris (45), and to the athlete who entered most competitions – Abby (13).

The club are grateful to the parents and volunteers who give up their time to help the club function, to the older athletes and former athletes who help coach, including assistant coaches Phoebe Coleman and Jack Spencer when not at university, and head coach Pat Read. GMAC appreciate the support they receive from the Shepherd Trust, and from Le Manoir staff who once again cut a maze of paths in their field last winter making xc training a lot more interesting.



#### **Facts and Figures**

At the start of the new school year we welcome all new staff & 27 new pupils. School remains a smaller than average primary school. Attendance is better than national attendance and the school has a low deprivation factor. Our catchment is Great Milton, Great Haseley, Milton Common and Tiddington. Other areas include Berinfsfield, Chalgrove, Cuddesdon, Denton, Holton, Horspath, Kingston Blount, Little Milton, Littleworth, Newington, North Moreton, Stadhampton, Tetsworth, Thame, Waterperry, Wheatley and Worminghall.

### Royal Academy of Culinary Arts & School Meals

We are delighted that school is participating in The Royal Academy of Culinary Arts 'Adopt a School' programme. Chef Bradley Cross at Le Manoir will be giving his time to Y4 for free in 3 sessions. These will be beneficial both to them in their future



lives and also for the school. Chef Bradley is particularly interested in helping children, and by default parents and carers, learn to cook using fresh ingredients so as not to rely on ready meals/ultra-processed foods (\*UPFs) which are contributors to childhood obesity and negatively affect children's locomotor skills.

In London all primary school children this academic year are having free school meals as a one off whilst in Oxfordshire all children in \*EYFS and \*KS1 also get free school meals as do \*KS2 children who qualify (those in \*FSM and \*PP categories) whilst others pay £2.41/day. Great Milton has a lower than average proportion of FSM pupils (17%). You can see the lunch menus for the school year on the school website, www.gmilton.org under Information for Parents.

#### **View from Views**

Now with harvest done and dusted, except for our 2nd year of our current experiment into lupins that, will come to harvest about the time you read this, like all other crops this year they look promising, however the proof of the pudding is in the eating. As I have just mentioned crops looked better than they produced this year. The



Winter Barley that looked so well all through the year I think was so good it could not hold it's self up by the time of cutting and about 10-20% had fallen over and were on the ground before the combine could cut it the result being that we cut off their heads. The Winter wheat was just disappointing it also looked so well through the whole growing season but just did not yield, I think in fact had I walked the whole field, on a regular basis, I would have realised that it was not all that good. However judging by the national crop we were about average most of our colleagues suffered in the same way with the fickle weather this season. However I have to crow about the Oil Seed Rape not an outstanding average crop but again very respectable yield. What I must crow about is that as I will have mentioned many times before, due to pigeon damage in the spring I estimated that a 1/3 of the area would yield ½ a crop, when I worked this out with the tonnage, we harvested I was within 2% on 100 tonnes. Looking on the bright side except for about ½ the Rape crop all our harvest came in without the need to dry a grain, we were so lucky in this what has proved to be a very tricky time, and with the contractor that we employ. At the time of writing next years Rape has been planted and eaten by Flee Beetle, we now have the tricky decision to take, do we re plant as it is now a little late, or hack it up and plant something else, if so what. I must add that we are by no means alone, it is reported as a nationwide problem, some crops have escaped, luckly for George Farrant he has at least 2 good crops.

After such a long explanation of our Harvest, which is the most important time of year on our farm I must make mention of wildlife which I guess most readers are interested in. Well not a lot to mention as most birds now this year are either sheltering from the rain or the blistering heat. Once the crops were off we a number of Hares, and Partridges until, they found their way out of sight, the numbers of both which have been very low of late, also perhaps not quite so welcome, but great to see the number of deer we are accommodating. What is good though is to see the amount that wildlife has increased of late.

On the subject of conservation the great news is that we have recently formed what is known agriculturally as a "Farm Cluster". For the last few years there we 2 clusters on the River Thame, which only achieved a talking shop status, which some of us did not feel good enough, as the Government was encouraging us to do something. As a result it was decided that these should amalgamate and, employ a facilitator. With the

help and mutual agreement with "River Thame Conservation Trust" (RTCT), the "Thame Catchment Farm Cluster" (TCFC) was formed with the "RTCT" allowing us the time of one of their senior project officers to be our facilitator. Already we have started a project called Landscape recovery which aims over the next few years enhancing the catchment of the Thame or extending the good works the "RTCT" is already doing, it is thought that there is substantial Government funding for this sort of initiative. This I think is all very exciting as it will give us farmers the finance to carry out works that we could not otherwise do. As an aside if it can be reproduced the picture is of a fish refuge, we dug only 4 years ago now it looks as if it has been there for ever, just shows how quickly nature takes over.

The big issue concerning us in this locality, is the threat of the development of Waterstock Golf Course. Firstly this was going to be a transport Hub, but now as did not seem to perhaps fit with the rural environment it is now to be a science Park, with residential, perhaps the developers thought this might be more acceptable. There are several questions we have to ask ourselves on the whole issue, is this area far too close to the "River Thame", will we be able to enforce the necessary measures to stop any pollution reaching the river with the existing infrastructure? When it is already under pressure from sewage pollution. Surely a Science Park would be better nearer other like facilities (Culham, Harwell, & Sandford). When we consider the transport hub this would be warehousing for the likes online shopping, the head of John Lewis has already suggested that we need a royal commission to investigate the demise of the high street. Then it could be argued do we need so many houses built when there are many left vacant for no apparent reason, either second homes or just an investment, this is really criminal when we are destroying the environment just to build houses for human beings. Is it not time we stopped and took stock, made sure all precautions were taken to avoid pollution, (sewage, proper drainage and control of surface water) before anymore development is allowed, developers have been allowed to get away without taking proper control of these issues.
