Gently cook the onion in the oil to soften. Mix the meats, chopped herbs and onion by hand. Shape into burgers no more than 2cm thick. Cook burgers in a frying pan for 3-4 minutes on each side. Serve in bun with tomato ketchup or salsa. Enjoy!

Barring any late slip-ups, I'll be one of 30,000 eccentrics running the London Marathon on Sunday, April 18. I've clocked up nearly 500 miles in training. including quite a few pre-dawn ones in fog, ice, snow, gales and driving rain, and although this is a great way to lose weight, I think I've earned the luxury of putting it back on by lying on the sofa all summer with plenty of giant Toblerones! The only reason most of us are running is to raise money, and the charity I'm supporting is one that means everything to Carmel and me. As most of our friends in West Ilsley know, Carmel had a long series of miscarriages before Anna was born three years ago, and she wouldn't be here without the amazing, pioneering work of the Silver Star special baby unit at the John Radcliffe hospital. The unit is expanding and last year, 400 babies were born there against all odds to women with problems ranging from recurrent miscarriages to cancer, organ failure and dangerously high blood pressure. It's an NHS unit but it relies on the Silver Star Society, a registered charity, to pay for a lot of the research and specialist equipment that makes such a huge difference to the lives of families like ours. WHAT DOES IT COST TO RUN A CHURCH? Andrea Cook

For the last few years I have given my services annually to the All Saints PCC and performed the role of "independent examiner" of the church accounts. It's not an onerous task, as I'm pleased to report that

our PCC appear to be a very honest bunch, but it *is* interesting as it gives me some insight into the monetary workings of the church. Each year I think to myself "I'm sure that not many people know this" and this year, with the PCC's permission, I'm going to share some of the insight I've gained, and hope that you will be interested to read a little information, and possibly motivated to lend a hand – or a pound or two – to help.

So, what does it cost to run a church? Well, the answer for All Saints is nearly £10,000 a year. The bulk of this cost is the Diocesan Quota, which is a fee paid to the Diocese (in our case the Oxford Diocese) and goes towards paying the stipend (salary) of the clergy and also contributes towards the running costs of the Diocese – the Bishop etc. Other expenses include day-to-day expenses including travel for the clergy, candles and upkeep of the church.

Where does the money come from to run the **church?** Essentially, two sources - donations, and We are all aware of the fundraising fundraising. events which add to our social calendar - more about them later - but not everyone is aware that donations are a vital way of raising money to meet the annual running costs. By donations, I don't mean the collections which are taken at services - these usually go straight out of the coffers and on to charities such as the British Legion, Macmillan Nurses and other worthy causes. Donations are a vital part of the church's income and are perhaps the "unsung heroes" in that they are made privately, usually in the form of a cheque or standing order, paid directly into the church If the donor is a taxpayer and bank account. completes a "gift aid" form, income tax can be reclaimed by the church and thus the donation is increased in the church's hands. At present, less than half of the annual running cost is raised from donations. The balance of the annual cost is raised by the efforts of the PCC, church members and nonchurchgoing villagers in arranging events intended to give us enjoyment and to extract cash from our

Where does "raising the roof" come in? We've all seen the appeal booklet, which explains the aim of raising £45,000 by Christmas 2005. This is an enormous task, and is *in addition* to the annual running costs outlined above.

Why am I telling you all this? Many of us have been galvanized into action by the focus on the appeal - we've already had some lovely times spent at fundraising events, and look forward to many more - but let's not forget about the private, discrete and loweffort (lifting a pen is all that is required) way to contribute to the day-to-day costs, without which we'll have a fine looking building, but might not be able to afford the "living" church underneath it!

How can you donate? The PCC are happy to accept donations from anyone – you don't have to be a churchgoer – but if you like the thought of having a village church which is used for the purpose for which it was built, and believe that those who wish to worship should have a church to worship in, please think about making a regular donation. TREE FELLING IN WI HOUSE ORCHARD

If you're wondering what's going on in the orchard, the trees are being felled under a Forestry Commission Licence, which allows the felling of the trees and replanting with fruit trees. It is a condition of the licence that the area remains as an orchard for 10 years from the planting, and it must be planted before 30th June 2006. NEW HEALTH FORUMS THAT COULD IMPROVE YOUR LOCAL COMMUNITIES HEALTH SERVICE

As from the 1st December 2003 a new independent national organisation was set up to enable local people from all sections of the community to have a voice and be involved in the decision making about health services in their local area. The organisation called Commission for Patient and Public Involvement in Health has set up local health forums made up of members of the public all across the country that have real legislative powers set out by government to influence the way NHS is run locally. Each forum is supported by a team of staff within your area. A forum member's role is to obtain local views from the community and take action. This is done by influencing decisions where they are made and monitor and visit health facilities. Newbury and Community have one forum and are currently seeking members. The most important thing is enthusiasm to make health services better in the future for you, your family and the community. MYTHS AND MAGIC

Recent research by local independent fostering agency, familyplacement.com has revealed that the public still believe many of the negative myths and misconceptions about foster care.

According to the research, a significant proportion of people think that most foster children have extreme behaviour problems, that all of the children come from broken homes, that you have to jump through hoops to be approved to foster and that most foster carers are unpaid work, untrained "mother earth" type volunteers. As agency manager and researcher, Andy Clipson has explained the reality is more complex. "Although some of the children can be very trying, and applicants do

have to complete a robust vetting process, in practice, providing a safe and nurturing home for a child, can be a magical experience. There is nothing quite like seeing a child relax, become happier and begin to thrive in your care and knowing you have made a real difference for them."

To help people realise this level of achievement, the agency pays all of its foster carers a significant weekly fee in addition to a maintenance allowance for the child and all carers have access to around the clock support.
