M3 Junction 6 Black Dam – change to planned opening date

From Highways England

Please be advised that we will now be fully opening Black Dam roundabout in March 2016.

We had previously planned a phased opening of the 'half hamburger' arrangement in November 2015. This would have maintained two lanes on most of the approach roads to the roundabout.

However, a phased opening – rather than a delayed full opening – would require further changes to the traffic management layout later, as well as a significant number of off-peak lane closures in the New Year. Traffic signals would need to be on fixed timers initially and substantial numbers of temporary signs would be required. We consider this would be confusing for road users and less safe for road users and the workforce alike.

With shorter daylight hours and the winter holiday season approaching, it was decided with our partners in Hampshire County Council and Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council that leaving the existing traffic management system in place was the preferred option. To minimise the impact of the works on the local economy over the Christmas and New Year period, work will be suspended between Wednesday 23 December and Monday 4 January.

By delaying the opening of the carriageway through the roundabout, we will be able to complete construction of the new traffic lanes, install all signage, traffic signal equipment, new lighting and safety barriers. This will be safer and for all concerned and permit greater junction capacity at all times

Following the full opening of the junction, testing of the new equipment will take place, along with landscaping and minor remedial works.

POLICE UPDATE

Dear all

have seen several crimes committed within our area within the past month. Overnight of November 12th and 14th an attempt was made to break into a garage in Andwell Lane, thankfully the thieves did not succeed as the premises are well secured and nothing was stolen. Overnight of November 23rd and 24th 2015 at Up Nately a garage was entered at a house in Greywell Road, by thieves but again thankfully nothing was taken.

We do see an increase in theft and burglary to sheds and outbuildings at this time of year and I continue to urge residents to protect their property. The crimes above also go to show that criminals will and do visit our area but with increased security and vigilance they will leave 'empty handed' as in the Andwell Lane incident.

Not to far away in Hook they have experienced three house breakings and two shed burglaries since October 1st. One of the dwelling burglaries was at Southview Cottages on the Newnham Road on October 27th 2015 between 8am and 11pm. I am asking if anyone was in that area and saw anything suspicious to please give me a call direct.

are also experiencing several burglaries in the Winchester and Basingstoke area where in each case it has been reported that two young men have knocked the door of a home and then managed to get inside after the occupant has opened the door to them. They have then proceeded to search the address and steal items before leaving. All occupants have had money and jewellery stolen. One victim has had their car stolen; a silver Volkswagen Golf. None of the victims have suffered any injuries and the incidents have occurred between 6pm and 8.30pm.

The Northern Investigation Team are advising residents not to open the door to anyone they do not know. If you are able to, check who is at the door before opening it and ensure it is someone you know. If it isn't, don't risk it. If the caller has a genuine enquiry they will understand your refusal to engage with them. "We think these people are asking bogus questions in order to get the occupants attention. Ignore them and keep a chain on your door if possible.

Burglary of homes is very rare in our area, in 2014 we had two and a man was arrested and sent to prison. HOWEVER I ask all residents to take simple steps to maintain their security, leave lights and a radio or TV on, make the house look occupied when you are out. I will be placing 'Lights on' leaflets through doors of homes I see at night without lights on as a gentle reminder when in the area.

In the New Year I will provide a parish update of crimes etc during 2015.

I would also like to thank you all for your continued support during the year which is appreciated greatly, and I wish you all a very safe and Happy Christmas and New

From a letter by Maria Miller MP dated 7th November regarding the delayed reopening of the Black Dam roundabout

'I had a full debrief from the County Council and Highways England last week about Black Dam and the completion date. It's fair say no one has been happy about the progress on this for about six months, least of all me. Something I have made plain to Highways England and the Department for Transport.

You will remember that the funding was secured by the LEP through Government funded 'pinch point' projects because the LEP had an "oven ready" project. My most recent meeting with Highways England affirmed that the problems and delay are due primarily to utility companies' poor mapping of their assets (pipe, cables and wires), a factor not known beforehand.

Black Dam is a real lesson for the Borough Council. Basingstoke & Deane is trying to drive through nine major roundabout improvements by 2019 as part of the proposed ocal Plan. If any of these nine projects encounters similar poor mapping then this could have serious implications for the town. Two of the improvements are on the A30 which appears to be the superhighway for our utility companies too.

I think Basing Councillors have a unique perspective on this which needs to be heard. There needs to be a more detailed schedule of works included in the Transport Assessment study detailing when and where roundabout works are needed, and how each works impacts the other cumulatively.

'Nine major roundabout reconfigurations to be complete in four years, given our experience in and around Black Dam, is well beyond what Hampshire County Council says is feasible.


BASINGSTOKE & DEANE LOCAL PLAN EXAMINATION

Hampshire Superfast broadband

Hampshire County Council is launching the government's superfast broadband Universal Commitment Scheme. The Scheme is intended as an interim solution for premises that are currently unable to access broadband download speeds of at least 2Mbps. It will provide useable broadband service, pending the future availability of Superfast Broadband services in your area. The Scheme will provide a unique code that can be presented to one of a selected number of retail service providers to obtain a satellite broadband service.

If you currently have less than 2Mbps of broadband speeds available to you then you may be eligible for a subsidy code to install a satellite service.

Local Plan Hearing

We have just reached the end of the Local Plan Hearing. A paraphrased summary of a letter, from our Local Councillors to the Gazette, follows:-

Imagine a room full of 'suited and booted' executives from house builders and developers, most of whom don't live anywhere near Basingstoke, telling the Planning Inspector about our Local Plan.

The following points do not matter to them -

- However many homes Basingstoke offers to build, it won't be enough. Plans for Manydown aren't enough; they must build more to the East as well.
- Basingstoke and Deane has built more homes than all their neighbouring Councils, they still need to build more.
- Chineham and Basing have seen the bulk of new houses in recent history, but there's plenty of room for more.
- The majority of residents don't want many more homes even though [The Developers'] mate George, from No. 11, promised 'localism'. What he meant to say was 'tokenism'.
- Residents have concerns over infrastructure, support services, water and sewage.
 These are unfounded. The only way forward is to raise more money by building more homes!

To cap it all, the Taylor Wimpey representative, commenting on the environmental impact on The Loddon Valley, uttered the following incredible comment. Paraphrasing - "If you walk along the River Loddon, you'll see it's not a very attractive walk. Our plans to build 4000 homes will improve not only the environment and bio-diversity, but also the water quality of the river". We kid you not! You couldn't make it up!

However, this contemptuous and self-serving nonsense from Developers must take the biscuit. Let's hope the Planning Inspector doesn't fall for it!

Greywell's WW1 Commemoration

Greywell's WW1 Commemoration took place at the Village Hall over the weekend of 7th and 8th December.

The events began with a series of well attended talks on Saturday by WW1 expert and battlefield guide, Dave Platt who came over from France to deliver his excellent presentations, including a special educational event for the village children.

Over the entire weekend there was a static exhibition in the hall, with information researched about the men from Greywell who fought in WW1 including items loaned by the granddaughter of one the soldiers. There were also items recovered from the battlefields, contemporary books and films. A display of photographs of the village and its residents taken about a hundred years ago proved a popular attraction, creating much interest from villagers in seeing their own homes pictured around the time of WW1.

Air Commodore Mike Barter CBE dedicated a new stone war memorial at a ceremony on Remembrance Sunday, in front of a large gathering outside the village hall and conducted a moving service of Remembrance to the 'Fallen', with the 'Ode' read by Richard Glover, Last Post and Reveille played by a bugler. Inside the hall, Air Commodore Barter dedicated another tribute to the five Greywell Fallen from WW1, made from five Tower of London Poppies, mounted in a glass case. The stories of the five men were mounted on the wall surrounding the case.

On Wednesday 11th November at 11.00am, the Rev Jane Leese conducted a Remembrance Day service at the village Hall to dedicate and bless the new memorial.
