



Dear Friends,

As I write this piece for March, snow drops are proudly adorning our foliage with daffodils swiftly following behind, one can't but notice and the morning bird song calling for Spring, and evenings becoming ever lighter. As I reflect on the beauty of God's creation, it reminds me of the seasons in the church liturgical calendar. This year Lent begins on the 2nd of March. I always encourage my congregations to ask why we bother to observe Lent, since it isn't in the bible, rather is something Christians have devised? The early church began to observe Lent from about 190 AD. It is modelled on Jesus' forty days fasting and prayer in the wilderness and was originally a time to prepare people for baptism on Easter Day.

In the wilderness Jesus was tested and rejected sin, all in preparation for his ministry. I don't believe Lent is supposed to be a gloomy time to punish ourselves by giving things up to please God. It is actually a time of spiritual renewal to put aside things that might keep us from loving and serving Christ. In the Lenten season we are invited to walk the way of the cross with Jesus, to consider the destructive reality of human sin and the cost of laying down our lives for others. So Lent is a season to understand afresh the generosity of God and reaffirm our commitment to Christ, in this way it mirrors Advent.

In the wilderness Jesus was hungry for food, but he was hungrier for God! In this way the emphasis is not so much fasting from food, but feasting on the word of God. We declare it is God who sustains us, not chocolate, not the internet, my mobile phone, social media or TV! There is no hard fixed rule what we should fast, but we know Jesus set an example to his disciples because he says 'When you

fast...', Jesus' assumption is that his followers will fast as part of their devotion to God. John Wesley said 'Some have exalted religious fasting beyond all scripture and reason; and others have utterly disregarded it'. Fasting is centred on God so that when we deny ourselves food or activity, we can spend more time with God. So what will you give up or start doing this lent? Pope Francis famously said:

Fast from hurting words and say kind words.
Fast from sadness and be filled with gratitude.
Fast from anger and be filled with patience.
Fast from pessimism and be filled with hope.
Fast from worries and trust in God.
Fast from complaints and contemplate simplicity.
Fast from pressures and be prayerful.
Fast from bitterness and fill your heart with joy.
Fast from selfishness and be compassionate to others.
Fast from grudges and be reconciled.
Fast from words and be silent so you can listen.



An International trio return to create a joyful evening of accessible Early Music including works by Bach and Boccherini

Alberto Sanna and Marino Capulli on violin and Elizabeth Elliott on Cello are a string ensemble who remove the barrier between the players and the listeners and engage in a dialogue on the meaning of the music they present. They formed with the goal of searching for an authentic way to perform early music, not just through historically informed interpretations but also through the choice of venue and interaction with the audience. Their aim is to take you back to the intimacy of 17th and 18th century with performances for the chamber, playing with replicas of historical bows. They have since performed in the UK, Italy, Kenya and Cuba, and taken part in such important festivals as Habana Clásica and Bach & l'Italia.

We couldn't be happier about the success of this event, as gloomy late January and early February were brightened at the Mill with a blaze of sumptuous and exciting colours and patterns created by light, on and in the Mill buildings and in the gardens. Accompanying music and an audio tale of the history of the Mill added to the experience, and visitors were really enthusiastic about all we had to offer: as well as the light and audio shows there were magical characters such as a stilt man to chat to, children's teatime events, a sensory day and quiet evening for those wanting a more peaceful experience, a cocktail stand, and hot drinks and food in the café to take away the chill of the winter evenings. Final results aren't in at the time of writing but we already know that we've matched the success of the 2020 event; more than we dreamed possible considering the challenges posed by winter months in a pandemic. Thank you to all who visited and volunteered and helped.

News from the Weaving Shed

The 'Elizabeth' silk is being woven to celebrate Her Majesty the Queen's platinum jubilee and will be made into products for sale in our shop.

Outreach

- Tea & Talk sessions have restarted, and our volunteer guide Colin Adams recently visited Oakley Residential Home to talk about all we're doing at the Mill
- Our project with the Winchester School of Art third year students will see them designing stripes inspired by the Mill's archive. The students also offered Testbourne students a weaving workshop in January.
- We are working with the organisers of Whitchurch Wildlife Project to produce an exhibition of local wildlife photography which it's planned should take place in the Mill's activity space in April this year, along with associated events and activities.

The Hide Family Heritage

More than 100 objects from Geoff Hide's collection have been donated to the Mill and are being recorded and taken into our archive and database. Some items are on display in a case on the middle floor and we're creating digital images of all the donated objects. Two interesting ones are James Hide's safe and his bowler hat!

Edgelarks: Out of the Ordinary II, Friday 11 March

Edgelarks (BBC Folk Award winners Phillip Henry and Hannah Martin) combine folk music with diverse influences such as blues, Indian classical and beatboxing, and they're coming to the Mill as part of their current tour. Their strong roots sound and stomping beatbox harmonica, soaring fiddle and vocal harmonies are sure to make for an entertaining evening. Tickets £15 (Friends of the Mill £13.50), doors open 7pm for a 7.30pm start. Don't delay: this is selling out fast!

Pins & Needles

This year our popular Pins & Needles adult crafting sessions are on the first **Thursday** of each month. Tickets £10, including tuition, all materials and a hot drink. TOAD PATROL - VOLUNTEERS NEEDED



Each year frogs and toads make their annual migration back to the pond where they were born to produce their own young. They will follow the simplest trajectory possible and, often, this means that they end up crawling straight across a road and are crushed by traffic. St Mary Bourne have been very successful at setting up a 'toad patrol' of helpers who come out when the conditions are dark and wet (and therefore suitable for toad movement) and help the creatures on their journey.

There are further sites which need urgent help from volunteers.

One is at Paper Mill Farm on the road between Tufton and Hurstbourne Priors. The other is along Nun's Walk and up to Southside Road in Longparish. On one night there was movement of around 400 frogs and toads across the two sites and, even though the volunteers we had were working very hard, around 60 were lost.

With some teamwork we can not only bring the number of deaths right down, but we can capture data for the wildlife conservation charity *Froglife*, which may allow some practical measures to be made on the sites to allow these creatures to cross safely without the need for so much human intervention. Frogs and Toads are an essential part of the ecosystem and their survival is unfortunately threatened by numerous factors, one of the main ones being death on the roads. 



SMB ST MARY BOURNE VILLAGE SHOP

I try not to listen to the news too much... I find it depressing. I prefer to live in my little St Mary Bourne bubble of idylicness (I know that's not a real word but bear with). What with Climate Change, Russia and the Ukraine, Prince Andrew... I mean, I even heard today that two medium sized glasses of wine take up my whole daily sugar allowance! Is there no end to the gloom!? The news that affects us the most is the continuing massive increase in the cost of living. Everything is going up... apart from wages. This is very real and very scary for a lot of us... if not all of us.

However, it's that last point that we, at the Village Shop, can do something about. We can all live in our little St Mary Bourne bubble. Which is why the shop is absorbing as much of the increase in prices as we can. February and March have seen us take each individual product and assess its current price within the larger context of its increase from the supplier. In some cases, we've actually been able to reduce the price of products whilst with others we are just keeping them the same while every supermarket and shop hikes theirs up.

For example: The cost of our delicious Austwicks quiches have increased from the producer to us by 30p... however, we've decided to keep our prices the same and absorb the cost. Why? Two main reasons. Firstly, we know how much you love them and we don't want you to fall out of love with them. Secondly, this will ensure that our sales of the quiches won't suffer as a result of the increase, thereby supporting the local producer making them, who, in turn buys his raw materials locally and so the local love continues to grow and spread.

There is a catch, however. We can only afford to do this if more people use the shop. If the footfall and average spend stay the same, then we've only succeeded to reduce our margins to an unsustainable level. I don't mean to scare ... the shop is far from unsustainable, but the point is that to keep our prices low we need the village to support it and by keeping our prices low we become a much more attractive place to shop. We know that Supermarkets rule supreme and that you won't stop going there... I'm not going to either, but I am using the shop more for the things I run out of, forgot or just have a hankering after and for the lovely local produce that I can't get anywhere else. It would be great if you did too. That way, we can keep prices low while everything around us rises.

On another initiative, St Mary Bourne Village Shop has joined Too Good To Go. This is an App that combats the huge amount of food waste that goes on. Did you know that approximately one third of food production is wasted? How terrible is that?! How the app works is that you purchase a Magic Bag of products that are coming to the end of their shelf life for one third of the cost from stores that are part of the scheme. You won't know what's in the bag... nor will we until the end of the day but its contents will amount to £10 worth of products that you will get for around £3.33. The app will let you know when we have Magic Bags available, and you pay via the app. You just come and collect the bag at a set time and it's yours. Our bags are likely to contain bread that has been baked that day, fruit and veg and other groceries that are coming to the end of their shelf life or have passed their 'Best Before' date but are still perfectly good. We will, of course, continue to have the Food Bank box too. You can search for the app by putting Too Good To Go into your app store search.

And finally, I leave you with this. It is now March. Officially Spring. The warmth is on its way!

Parish Council Elections

Your Parish needs you! Parish Council elections are scheduled to take place on Thursday 5th May.

When the last parish council elections took place in 2018, unfortunately there were not enough candidates to force an election, therefore all of the present councilors have been co-opted rather than elected to the parish council (pc). I believe it is very important that the pc has a mandate from the electorate of the parish to act on their behalf. This means that there needs to be a minimum of ten candidates to stand for the election of nine councilors. I therefore appeal to all of those who care about what is happening within our parish and what we should be looking to do in the future to improve it for all, to please put themselves forward for election.

There will be information available from Basingstoke & Deane Electoral Services during March regarding candidate registration. To access this, you can make direct contact with them on the B&D website or use the link which will be on the pc website. You can also contact the Parish Clerk on clerk@stmarybourne-pc.gov.uk.

Chairman of St Mary Bourne Parish Council

Summary report from the **February** meeting of St Mary Bourne Parish Council www.stmarybourne-pc.gov.uk

Six councillors and the clerk attended the meeting. Borough Cllr Sam Carr was present for part of the meeting and three members of the public also attended part of the meeting. Time for Public Speaking:

a) Two local residents expressed concerns about the steep camber of the access road and the brick structure at the foot of the Spring Hill development which caused difficulties with visibility and traffic access. Cllr Carr would contact the developers to find a satisfactory solution to the problems. b) It was reported that the parish council landline 01264 738039 was no longer functioning.

Borough Councillor's Report - Cllr Carr announced he would be standing again at the B&DBC elections in May. There was discussion about a "hide" structure by the lake which Cllr Carr would support with planning and funding advice if required. The recycling facilities/bottle bank behind the shop would be removed as a B&DBC costcutting measure to prioritize larger sites such as Whitchurch. Insurance - A contribution towards the increased cost would be discussed with representatives of the Cricket Club and Bowling Club.

Lake:

- a) Mole problems in the lake surrounds would be investigated and quotes obtained.
- b) The clerk had obtained one quote for fencing repair and new fencing. Suggestions for contractors were made and the clerk would obtain further quotes.

Parish Council Elections - The B&DBC electoral team would contact the parish council to discuss procedures and provide documentation. Elections would be held on 5th May. Village Shop - The lease for the Shop would need to be redrafted after its proposed change of status from a Community Interest Company (CIC) to a Community Benefit Society (CBS).

Other matters discussed included the trimming of hedges growing over pavements, charging of electric vehicles and grip clearance problems in Stoke.



Postcard from Binley - March 2022

"This, to my fancy, is a very nice country. It is continual hill and dell. Now and then a chain of hills higher than the rest, and these are downs or woods.

To stand upon any of the hills and look around you, you almost think you see the ups and downs of sea in a heavy swell (as the sailors call it) after what they call a gale of wind. The undulations are endless, and the great variety in the height, breadth, length and form of the little hills, has a very delightful effect."

WILLIAM COBBETT - Rural Rides, 1821

What a wonderful description of our valley! And to walk the downs and hills as I often do, you get precisely what Cobbett was talking about. To top it all we have the Bourne rivulet, a silver ribbon running the length of the valley, chattering and babbling away and when in full flow it really does set the old place off. Sadly though, I don't think she'll muster to much this year. As I write, Gangbridge pond is just about half full with a couple of depressed looking ducks paddling around. There are puddles in the riverbed around Stoke but normally by now she would be away flowing up beyond Hurstbourne Tarrant where she is known as the river Swift. I'm calling her a "she" because it just seems apt for a little chalk stream. And talking of chalk streams, there was a lovely exhibition in the Club Room at SMB Village Centre which I hope you saw celebrating these ecological marvels, the Bourne, Arle, Meon, Anton, Dunn, Test and Itchen to name but a few. All the photographs were taken by enthusiastic amateurs and highlighted how very precious these waterways are and in truth they are part of the reason I originally came to live here.

Doing some repairs to some brickwork at home I noticed one of the bricks was imprinted "Pike & Co Hollington". I knew there was a brick kiln up there and would guess they accounted for most of the bricks used in the construction of our period houses. Certainly, from Highclere all the way down the valley there are many old houses built in a Flemish Bond style from soft red hand cut bricks with blue headers that were glazed at one end. Sadly, this glazing over the years has fallen victim to frost and weather damage and on my house alone there are only a handful with the glaze intact. When newly built they must have looked spectacular, with pointing in a lime mortar and light reflecting from the glaze. I've always had a soft spot for old buildings, the ghosts of the past and the stories they could tell. Just to touch the stone and oak in the construction makes me feel good.

Talking to a friend from St Mary Bourne in The George the other day, he was amusing me with tales about his neighbour who has a car parking fetish. I know it must be tricky down there as there's more cars than space now, but this bloke marks his unofficial parking area like an old tom cat, using stolen cones and police tape. Put so much as 12 inches of Vauxhall Corsa into his zone and he'll be in your face. It made me realise how lucky we are in Binley where you can go months without seeing a neighbour. But going back to SMB neighbours, I bet there's a chap in Applegate who puts a high viz jacket on to put his bins out at 5am and then inspects everyone else's? Tell me there is! There's certainly a curtain twitcher in Denham Terrace because she's twitched at me a couple of times and I happily twitched back! And I do love a note writer. Generally written in capitals in blue biro on a scrappy bit of lined paper and stuck under the windscreen wiper of your car "I DO NOT APPRECIATE YOUR CAT TAKING A **** IN MY DAHLIAS!" And then again there are the perfect neighbours. The house and garden are perfect. The blonde children are perfect. There is always an organic food producer's van unloading in the drive, or a Cath Kidston sofa being delivered. They are happy, helpful, gorgeous to look at and you despise them!

Many years ago, when I was between wives and licking my financial wounds, it was necessary for me to rent a furnished top floor room for a while in a four-storey house in Streatham, South London. It comprised a big squeaky Edwardian bed, tired old furniture and a window that overlooked the toilets of a snooker hall. The only lavatory was on the ground floor so the landlady obligingly left a chamber pot under the bed with a note attached that said, "If you use the "Po" please do NOT put it back under the bed as the steam rusts the springs!". That always amused me.

Light TouchRecycling Bins

There is not yet much progress in Basingstoke & Deane

for extended recycling opportunities in our green bins. But there is new detail on the website and no harm in having a

recap. **It's important to get recycling right**. Collecting the wrong items can lead to good material being sent for incineration or alternatively you might spoil a whole batch by including the wrong sort of glass for instance.

Important to note: Any sorted recycling put in a large plastic bag is automatically treated as rubbish and gets burnt so a complete waste of your efforts. Everything must be clean and loose in the bin! So here we go. Thumbs up to plastic bottles of all sorts (washed, well **squashed** and the lid replaced, so they don't go bang in the machine; even pump action lids are okay), aerosols (unless they have a black cross or skull and crossbones on. Do they blow up too?), drinks and food cans (squash loose lids and metal jar or bottle tops inside the tins so they reach the machine), paper includes brochures, telephone directories, newspapers, battered old paperbacks etc. but not paper with glitter, grease or paint on, so leave the fish and chip boxes and kids art to fuel the furnace in the grey bin. Nor shredded paper which I think must just fly about and be a nuisance (very good for the compost heap or guinea pig bedding), and no jiffy bags because of the liners. Most wrapping paper is unsuitable if it has metallic patterns, plastic layers or is very light such as tissue paper, (open your presents carefully and reuse it). Cardboard can all go in if you flatten it or cut it up (preferably take off the plastic tape) or leave it beside the bins as long as no wind or rain is due. It won't be taken if wet. Glass won't be taken if it doesn't fit flat in the green boxes as the lifting mechanism may drop a bottle in your drive if overloaded. Remove metal lids (see above for how to recycle them) and don't put in Pyrex, light bulbs, broken glasses or windowpanes (there are different types of glass too). Well done if you have survived this far.


If it has not been mentioned yet, the answer is **not for your green bin**, but there is another chance for plant pots, carrier bags and all soft plastic, sandwich wrappers, paper



drinks cups, jiffy bags, drinks cartons (tetra Pak), tin foil, crisp packets, batteries, paint pots and many other random items. Look on the Sustainable Bourne Valley website for ideas, but bear in mind it is undergoing an update too. *Ch*

Ideal family activity. No need for a telescope. Choose a clear night. Have fun!

To learn more about impact of light pollution. Look at dark sky resources- CPRE Night Blight website.

2 March - New Moon. The Moon will be located on same side of the Earth as the Sun and will not be visible in night sky. Best time of month to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters as no moonlight to interfere.
18 March - Full Moon. Moon will be located on opposite of the Earth as the Sun and its face will be fully illuminated. Known as Worm Moon by early Native American tribes.
20 March - March Equinox. The Sun will be directly on the equator and there will be nearly equal amounts of day and night throughout the world. This is also known as first day of spring, (vernal equinox) in the Northern Hemisphere and first day of fall, (autumnal equinox) in Southern



Hemisphere.

Volunteers sought for chalk stream projects

If you're interested in nature, you might have come across the *Watercress and Winterbournes Landscape*Partnership Scheme. This initiative focuses on seven chalk streams - including the Bourne Rivulet - which are home to many amazing species. These precious habitats are under increasing pressure, and need our help to thrive.

The scheme gives us a chance to make a real difference, but we can't do it without support from local residents. Volunteers are crucial to the delivery of our projects, and right now we'd especially love to hear from anyone interested in the roles below. Training and equipment will be provided; please note some may require a DBS check.

Events

We run in-person events ranging from walks and talks to wildlife watching and craft sessions. You could welcome attendees, set up equipment, lend a hand with activities, or talk with visitors about the streams. Events vary in length, busyness, and activity level, so may suit those with limited mobility or availability.

Youth education

We deliver sessions that let young people connect with the streams. You could assist with river dipping, identifying invertebrates, water conservation exercises, and other fun activities. Sessions usually take place during term time (daytime for schools, evenings for uniformed groups) and may be indoors or outdoors.

• Community action

We engage local people in collective action to tackle key issues. You could support our projects Save Every Drop (focuses on saving water) or Septic Smart (focuses on responsible use of private drainage like septic tanks). Tasks can range from delivering leaflets to becoming a community ambassador for your chosen topic.

Oral histories

We collect personal stories from local people to learn how the streams have touched their lives. You could record thoughts, memories, and experiences from individuals in audio form. You could also help with preparing the stories for submission to the county archives or be interviewed yourself!

She willingly gave service to Crux Easton church where she helped with fund raising events and was a member of the PCC for over 40 years. She also worked at Three Legged Cross and Field House for many years.

For Daphne family was always important; so when her daughter Linda married Clive, he was instantly welcomed to the family. She was even more excited by the arrival of her Granddaughter Clair who would spend lovely country holidays at Keepers Cottage with her Nanny Daph and Grandad Ron. Daphne was always very proud of Clair and her achievements and no one was prouder when Clair married Gavin. Typically, Daphne took Gavin to her heart and the final happy piece of the family jigsaw was the arrival of her Great Granddaughter April.

When Ron passed away, St Mary Bourne became Daphne's home for the last 20 years of her life. She joined in village events and developed a large network of friends. She especially enjoyed the walking group. Daphne was always grateful for everyone's friendship and support. At Gangbridge Lane she had wonderful neighbours who kept an eye out for her and looked after her, especially during the pandemic and when she became ill.

The family would like to thank family and friends for their love and support during this sad time. Especially the village of St Mary Bourne who welcomed Daphne into their hearts and gave her friendship and love.

The Plough Inn – Report from Plough Inn Working Party

A decision to finance roof repairs for The Plough Inn via grant funding has been adjourned to the next meeting to enable the Working Party to meet and formulate their recommendations.

Dog Mess

The Parish Council has received a number of complaints about dog mess on footpaths, and at the football field. It is unacceptable to leave dog mess in public areas, particularly where it could come into contact with children, and dog owners are reminded to act responsibly and pick up after their dogs, and either take waste home or use one of the designated bins.

B3048 stream bank repairs

During the week beginning 7 February, contractors from Hampshire Highways dredged the stream, using the spoils to build up the bank alongside the road, and had placed reflective posts along the length of the bank. A number of residents contacted the Council to express disappointment in the results of this work, in particular the appearance and number of the reflective posts. As the PC had not been notified beforehand that work had been scheduled, it was not possible to let residents know that the work would be taking place and the reasons for it. After contacting HCC, it was ascertained that Highways decided to carry out these works following a meeting at the site in March 2021. The PC has been exploring repairs to the stream bank for a number of years, anticipating that any repairs would be similar to those carried out in St Mary Bourne. Highways had advised that they may be able to make some repairs, but not before 2023. The

majority of the reflective posts are no longer in situ, having been knocked down or removed. The PC has been advised that Highways contractors will return shortly to replace the posts. The Clerk has placed an article on the website containing a message from Hampshire Highways explaining the reasons for the work, and confirming that further repairs are to be considered through HCC's Operation Resilience scheme.



THE OTTER

Twenty five years ago the otter was on the brink of extinction, after half a century of agricultural chemicals leaching into rivers and polluting the food chain. Following the ban of these chemicals in early 1990s water quality increased so the fish population increased. You are more likely to see an otter today than any time in the last fifty years. Following the ban on hunting them in 1978 you can now see them in every British county.

Otters are a member of the stoat family. They have a long body and a long tail, thick dense brown fur and big, webbed feet. They are adapted to life on land and water.



There are a few otters in the village, not seen very often as they are mostly active at night. Otters live in burrows in a bank or under a tree root called a holt. Otters can breed all year round but mostly in the spring. They have 2-3 young called pups or kittens, who stay with their mother for about a year or until she has another litter.

Otters are experts at catching fish which is their main food besides frogs and birds. Many fishing lakes have put an electric fence around their lakes to deter them.


The Annual Parochial Church meeting of St Nicholas will take place on Sunday 3rd April at 11.15am after the morning service in St Nicholas Church.

Veronica Daniells 1940 - 2022

Veronica was the daughter of Rosemary and John Jenkins. She was born in 1940 in India where her father was stationed with the Indian Police. Younger sister to Hilary and older sister to Noel, the family lived in West Bengal until 1944 at which point, worried the second world war might spill over into India, their parents made what must have been a heart-rending decision to stay in India while their daughters were put on a boat to England. On arrival back in England, all three sisters moved to Wales where they lived with their Aunt Margaret. Veronica saw her mother and father very rarely until they returned from India for good in 1954. After school, Veronica attended a secretarial course in London, but a much bigger world beckoned. The curiosity that was such a driving force of her life took hold and she decided to embark on a travelling adventure with her younger sister, Noel. They set sail for Canada, making their way to Montreal where Veronica found work first as an au pair and then at a bank. One day, while leaving a parking lot in Vancouver, Veronica reversed into a car that someone had foolishly parked behind hers. Luckily for her daughters, that "someone" would turn out to be her future husband, Michael. Michael always said it was love at first sight and eventually they travelled on together, setting sail for warmer climes, spending time in Jamaica before heading home to England. They married in September of '63 and made their first, happy home in Frimley Green where their daughter Caroline was born in 1966. They moved to Andover Down in 1970 – where, two years later, Veronica proceeded to paint the entire house while heavily pregnant with her second daughter Victoria. Victoria didn't seem to mind and joined the family in the summer 1972.

Veronica loved living in Andover Down and felt lucky to find some lifelong loyal friends and neighbours there. Going on local walks and exploring the local area was something which she loved -and spending time picnicking by and swimming in the River Test here in Longparish was something the whole family enjoyed.

Veronica volunteered for the local Save the Children charity shop in Andover. A world class maker of marmalade AND an enthusiastic baker, her husband, her daughters and occasionally when no-one was looking, the family dog, were the lucky recipients of a steady stream of cakes. In 1987, Veronica returned to the workplace as a full-time secretary at Lloyds TSB. When her beloved husband passed away in 2003, Veronica dealt with her grief in a typically stoic manner embarking on a new chapter in her life. working in Andover for Lionel Hitchen as a Senior Customer Service Administrator. After retiring in 2011, Veronica joined several rambling and walking groups.


