BDBC HOUSING FIGURES: 'ENOUGH IS ENOUGH'

The demonstration outside the Council Offices on 2nd September targetting BDBC's Economic & Housing Committee (EPH) meeting was widely reported.

At a follow-up meeting on 16th September EPH Councillors agreed unanimously to 'not support the required housing figure of 17,820 homes'. (To note that, of the 17.820 'required', 10,117 are already committed.)

However the Councillors voted six to five against 'refusing to accept or discuss the contents of the Report including the Site Selection Appendix'. In reality the Report on housing figures and its Appendix continues unchanged.

BDBC, as the Local Planning Authority, is faced with accommodating the housing targets imposed by Central Government according to latest Government 'Standard Methodology'. The message from our MP, Maria Miller, is that it is up to the Local Planning Authority to build their case to contest these figures and prove 'exceptional circumstances'.

Basingstoke in the last decade has been an area of high growth, breeding higher growth (ref the 'South East Diamonds for Investment & Growth' (SEDfIG) Partnership August 2010). Speakers at a Community 'Environment' meeting hosted recently by Maria Miller – from Thames Water and HIWWT – agreed on the pressure on our Chalk Aquafers and the 'very small' river Loddon, a fragile Chalk Stream and internationally rare habitat.

Basingstoke in recent years has over-contributed housing numbers compared to other Local Authorities. It has past reached a stage where these numbers are putting unsustainable and harmful pressure on our river and aquafers.

Please consider writing to our MP to say 'enough is enough'. Protection and the recovery of Basingstoke's Natural Environment – our Chalk Aquafers and Chalk Stream – must come before more housing can be allocated.

Please also urge our MP to support a Local Nature Recovery Strategy for the Lyde and Loddon Valley.

POLICING Past

Dear Residents, In response to last month's article, it appears that there is an interest in

past policing and law enforcement of the area. As such please find below similar details of yesteryear.

It is interesting as some subjects in society do seem to go around in circles. Last month I highlighted the problem with speeding motorists on the now A30. This month we have – albeit not a policing issue – the vaccination of children against smallpox and details for two of many people across the county who went to their local magistrates' court to seek exemptions.

Private summons could also result in people having to attend their local magistrates' court as seen below.

Basingstoke Divisional Petty Sessions on October 7th 1903, Mr Wake of Upton Grey applied to the bench for a certificate of exemption from vaccination in respect of his child, Dorothy Wake. The applicant stated he had a conscientious objection to his child being vaccinated, having lost a child before as a result of – he suspected – being vaccinated. He admitted his child was healthy and did not say that the child died in consequence of being vaccinated.

At the same court Alice Baker also applied for a certificate of exemption from vaccination in respect of her child. She too objected to vaccination on conscientious grounds, believing it to be injurious to the child's health. She had two other children who were not vaccinated. In both cases a certificate of exemption was granted.

LOCAL PLAN UPDATE (LPU)

National guidance now promotes an 'on-going cycle of plan making and review'; there is a legal requirement to review Plans every five years. BDBC agreed in May 2019 to start the preparation of a Local Plan Update (LPU).

The new Plan period will be extended up to 2039 as national guidance requires plans to look 15 years ahead.

HOUSING REQUIREMENT

Housing need is now calculated at National level using the 'standard method' reflecting Government intention to boost supply. This gives $c900\mathrm{dpa}$ (dwellings per annum) and so based on a longer Plan Period to 2039 the total housing figure would be 16,200 homes (900 x 18 years). Taking account of existing allocations this gives an outstanding requirement of c7,700 homes.

Go further back and we find that Thomas Moody, who was a servant to his Master Mr. Platt of Up Nately, appeared before the Divisional Petty Sessions on June 21st 1847, after Mr Platt took out a summons against him for his misbehaviour whilst in his service. He was fined 10s (£40.09).


Albeit not in our area, on April 9th 1862 the Basingstoke Magistrates heard a case in which a man named Holland, was charged with disturbing, during service, the minister and congregation of the Primitive Methodist Chapel, at Charter-alley, Monk Sherborne, by laughing and talking. He was fined 6s (£17.74) and in default committed to prison for 14 days.

It appears that there was an organised system of disturbance at this chapel, greatly to the annoyance of those who attended. A similar case had came before the Magistrates previously and the offenders were fined.

In the present case a small penalty only was inflicted, the offence not being of a very aggravated character, but the Bench being determined to prevent a recurrence of such disgraceful conduct expressed a determination of dealing with any other offender much more severely.

And finally on September 2nd 1903, George Pithers from North Warnborough, was summonsed for having been drunk at Up Nately. PC Horne from Upton Grey, told the magistrates that he found him lying in the road asleep. On waking him he found he was drunk and quite incapable of taking care of himself and so the officer took him home. The night was very dark. Mr. Pithers was fined 10s and costs of 6s.6d (£25.54).



Basingstoke and Deane Local Plan Update

LOCAL PLAN UPDATE - DRAFT SETTLEMENT STUDY

NEWNHAM SETTEMENT POLICY BOUNDARY

The Local Plan Update Issues & Options Consultation held at the end of last year included questions on Part I of the Draft Settlement Study which detailed the 'hierarchy' of settlements within the borough.

Newnham was not, and has never been, included in the settlement hierarchy – being considered a hamlet and, in planning terms, as all in the Open Countryside.

BDBC Planning has subsequently reconsidered, and included Newnham as a Category 5 settlement (small village). It will be published as such in the next draft, Part 2, of the Settlement Study.

BDBC's response to Parish Council's initial questions is...

'Following the Issues & Options consultation, the LPA [Local Planning Authority] reviewed the process by which settlements were scoped into the study. This took into account settlement size (population), facilities and services, and proximity to facilities and services in other settlements.

'The threshold for Category 5 (small village) is that it has a population of 150 residents, and services and facilities within the village that provide at least two of four identified 'key' facilties – community, retail, education, social. If the settlement contains only two of these functions, a third must be accessible within 5km.

'The population of the village was determined using the Hampshire County Council Small Area Population Forecast (including adults and children) and based upon the village's main built up area. The facilities and services identified are the village hall and the Old House at Home, with a primary school and retail facilities identified within 5km (in Hook). For this reason, the settlement has been included as a 'small village' in the draft study.'

BDBC has invited comment on its draft outline for a Settlement Policy Boundary (SPB) as illustrated. The Parish Council is responding to challenge Newnham's inclusion as a Category 5 settlement and to dispute the boundary.



The Settlement Study is due to be discussed at Economic, Planning & Housing Committee (EPH) on November 18th.

The present Local Plan Policy SS5 imposes a housing allocation on Category 5 Settlements of at least 10 houses (in one development inside the boundary or in developments of at least five outside and adjacent to the boundary). This is in addition to 'windfall' permissions of less than five houses.

Newnham hasn't been given a housing allocation for Part 2 of the Study; this will likely change in time, perhaps at the next five-year review.

POND CLEARING SEPTEMBER 2021

Hampshire & Isle of Wight Amphibian & Reptile Group (HIWARG)

We have been surveying Newnham Pond since 2019, mainly due to the presence of Great Crested Newts (a protected species), but also because the pond contains a good population of all three native species of newts.

The pond is also home to a large assemblage of invertebrates, with several species of dragonfly and damselfly, mayflies, a good range of water beetles, several different families of aquatic true bugs, at least two families of spiders associated with wetland (long jawed orb weavers and otter/pirate spiders) and the more commonly found water slaters and freshwater shrimp. Not forgetting your mating pair of resident moorhen who sit at the top of the food chain, the sheer diversity of the pond make it one of the best 'village' type ponds that I survey in the Hart and BDBC areas.

Plants... there is a good selection of native aquatic plants, but one species which is not welcome, is the highly invasive, non-native Crassula helmsii (New Zealand Pygmyweed). It is a fantastic oxygenator but forms a dense, tangled growth of stems underwater, sometimes creating large mats on the water surface, eventually suffocating the pond.

As the Summer starts to wind down

into Autumn, HIWARG begins to look at management tasks we can take on for the land

managers of our survey sites. Earlier this year we agreed we would work on reducing the growth of *Crassula* as the water level drops. The presence of Great Crested Newts (GCN) means that we can't work in the pond itself (in the water) until November, which can often be too late.

Eight HIWARG members turned up to dig out 'turves' of Crassula to expose the seed bank and encourage other native plants to grow next year. We removed roughly a 2m strip of *Crassula* around 60% of the pond margin, avoiding plants in the deeper water due to a possible presence of GCN.

Did we succeed in beating back the *Crassula*? Unfortunately not! Fragments will and some roots will remain but it will be significantly weakened. We are planning 'Crassula Bashing the Sequel' to hit the rest of the growth and also the Bur-reed in November.

I'll also be back from time to time spot checking for regrowth. If you see me

loitering around the pond, please feel free to come over and chat if you have any questions.

FROM THE MINISTRY TEAM

The last 18 months of the pandemic have been very strange times. It is only now that most of the restrictions have lifted

and some elements of 'normal life' have resumed, that we've been able to see how much has changed.

Aside from the tragic loss of so many lives, one thing that seems to be widely felt is a sense of confusion and disorientation that the pandemic has brought about. It has been easy to lose our sense of what is most important in life, and even what life is all about.

Across our Benefice Churches at the moment we are wrestling with just this issue. We're spending some weeks looking at the book of Ecclesiastes in the Old Testament, and much of the book reflects on these questions. The writer is struggling with the issues: he says: 'meaningless, meaningless, all is meaningless... What do people gain from all their toils under the sun?'

Ecclesiastes raises the questions that the New Testament answers. Meaning is found not 'under the sun' but in the Son, Jesus Christ. It is through him that we can truly know God and be known by Him, and this is where we find meaning, and the hope of abundant life now and eternal life beyond.

Jesus said: 'This is eternal life: that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom you have sent' (John 17:3).

A few days ago a friend of mine posted online this remarkable photo of a mountain goat. He mentioned that

there is one thing he loves about this image. It's not the fact that this mountain goat is about to make a massive leap, that if done wrongly could alter the rest of his life... It's not the fact that he even had enough faith to do so!

What he loves is that the goat's eyes are focused on one thing only - his final destination. He's

not looking down wondering if he is going to fall to his death. He's not looking behind him regretting the decision he made, wondering what would happen if he took a different route to his final destination.

His focus is on one thing only – the other side.

And this is so true in our own lives. We find meaning once again as we fix our eyes on God. Not distracted by looking down or behind or around, but focused on him.

As we come out of lockdown, one of the best ways

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

PROPOSAL FOR A NEW AREA OF OUTSTANDING NATURAL BEAUTY

This began as a proposal for 'Valued Landscape' status to help counter the Upper Swallick garden village concept. It is now gaining strength as a CPRE proposal for a 'linking' Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) to join up the protected areas of Chalk Downland. As the maps below – the North Hampshire Downs lies between the AONB North Wessex Downs and Surrey Hills – then on to the Kent Downs and High Weald – 'the Big Chalk'.



Indicative boundary for the proposed North Hampshire Downs AONB

This boundary line is a rough guide only (drawn with a mouse on a screen). It has been subject to a number of changes with the potential to change again.

A version of the Proposal was submitted to BDBC Full Council meeting of March of this year where it failed to gain the support of Councillors whose Wards are outside the proposed Area. Hampshire CPRE and STaNHD however are continuing to promote the concept. The Parish Council Chairmen of Cliddesden, Ellisfield and Winslade have written a joint letter to all other Parish Councils within the suggested AONB seeking thier support.

As the map stands at present the M3 is the dividing line from J5 to J7. Up Nately and the majority of Mapledurwell would therefore come within the AONB (as would Greywell) while parts of Andwell and all of Newnham Parish would not.
