RULES

1. Participation is open to all residents within the boundaries of Hothfield Village 2. Entry is free; no cost or fees apply.

3. Officers and Councillors of Hothfield Parish Council are not eligible to participate.

4. Entry Applications must be received no later than 5pm on Wednesday 15 December 2021

5. Contest is for exterior decorations only, including window decorations that are visible from the exterior.

Judging will be done from outside the residence only.

6. Judging will be based on "kerb appeal" as viewed from the road only. Therefore, only those decorations located on the road side of the property will be judged (corner gardens will be judged from both roads).


Judges will not enter the property to view back or side gardens.

> 8. Judging will consider: [a] Unique design and creative use of lights and decorations; [b] Storyline or theme; [c] Overall presentation.


9. Judging will take place by members of the parish council. judging will be completed no later than 8:00 p.m. on Friday17 December.

HOTHFIELD HEATHLANDS CHANGES WITH TIME

This is a story common across most of our nature reserves. Every week the stalwart volunteers come out on task, slog away all day cutting bracken, pulling birch trees, chopping back vegetation. Although it is certainly easy to see what they have achieved at the end of each day, it is hard to demonstrate the long term benefit when that birch will regrow and that bracken seems to spring back to life.

Over the years we have collected pictures to monitor changes across the reserve; some of these pictures go back a long time. I feel these two pictures particularly tell a story. The first one was taken in 1992, at a time when we had just taken on our first full -time warden for Hothfield Heathlands. The site at the time was thick with bracken and a young birch forest in the making. The bracken and birch were so dominant, almost nothing else was growing, with many of the heathland species on the brink of extinction.

Fast forward to the same view in August 2021. The volunteers are still tackling bracken and pulling birch, but



every year the site gets better and better. The heather is spreading rapidly across the reserve, heath-spotted orchids and southern marsh orchid pop up in huge numbers, the bees and wasps riddle the ground with their burrowing, while dragonflies pick the unwary out of the sky.

It can sometimes feel as if we are running at a standstill, but each of our volunteers has an essential impact on our reserves and the wildlife that lives there.

Footnote: some of you may remember the previous warden and his red tractor. The tractor was still running in 2019, and was sold on as a working machine for a tidy sum.





Everyone is welcome to visit Hothfield Heathlands, but please remember that this is first and foremost a haven for wildlife. Please keep dogs close to you at all times; do not let your dog run and play off the paths and through the areas of heather and gorse. Make sure that anything you bring with you leaves the reserve with you. Remove litter and dog mess, and place all dog bags in the bins.

Hothfield Heathlands is one of the best spots of wildlife in the county; with your help we can keep it that way.

Hothfield's best artefact?

Earlier this year I was asked what were the History Society's top six objects or documents. While we have lots of copies of photographs, postcards and copies of some documents kindly sent in or emailed by residents past and present, we don't have many real original documents or objects in the village archive. We do have a collection of trophies from the former angling club, and some darts trophies won by the late John Nicholls, and also a few items from the majorettes given to us by Diane Bowker (nee Nicholls), for which we are grateful. We were also given an oak peg that was once in the stables at Hothfield Place for holding a saddle.

My reply to the survey listed: silver christening cup once owned by a member of the Tufton family who was brother to a previous Lord Hothfield; a set of five watercolours of scenes of Hothfield (and nearby) from 1914-17; past account books and ledgers from Hothfield Place (the former country seat of Lord Hothfield); a catalogue with map from one of the auctions of Lord Hothfield's estates in the 1920s; a Bible given to a Gaunt family member by the school in 1852; and a desk jotter from the office of the Estate Manager who was based in the basement of Hothfield Place.

The question was posed as part of a project across Ashford to find 'hidden treasures' that are not in museums or on public display. The project is being carried out by Jasper Bouverie who was quite interested in the old accounts and the interesting items listed in the Manor's expenses, including 'playing cards for the ladies' and 'stockings for the footman'; "shoos and a hatt" 'for my Lord'; there was also 'a bottle of Hungry Water' (as far as I can tell 'Hungary Water' was an early perfume). He was most interested in the accounts from 1706 to 1712, which are held in the county's central History and Library Centre in Maidstone. So he chose one that we don't have! There are many documents, maps and Deeds relating to Hothfield in the central Kent archive, so Jasper went there

to read more. The current Lord's family also still have many interesting documents and items.

Those accounts related to when the first Manor at Hothfield was occupied by Thomas the Sixth Earl of Thanet (the title 'Lord' didn't come until the late 1800s). Thomas had three sons, all of whom sadly died as infants, but several surviving daughters. At the bottom of one page, in January 1712, the 'surgion' was paid for the 'bleeding of my lady'. The Earl's wife was Catherine Cavendish daughter of the Duke of Newcastle. Two of their daughters were also bled in February 1712. The letting of blood was considered to be a way of relieving ailments. Whether this helped is not known, but Lady Cavendish died of smallpox in April that year, but the daughters lived to old age.

During his time as the 'Lord of the Manor' Thomas was generous to Hothfield. The research by Reverend Russel records that the Sixth Earl donated a silver platen and flagon (now held securely at Canterbury Cathedral), an altar piece, a pulpit and some new pews; but he also established and endowed the first school in Hothfield, which was located on Coach Drive where at that time there were also houses.

FOLLOWING AN INCREASE IN RURAL CRIME

• Protect machinery, plant and tools:

• Keep valuable items out of view and store them safely when not in use.

• Security-mark machinery, plant and tools to make it easier for the police to identify and return them to you if they are recovered.

• Consider fitting alarms and immobilisers to items of machinery or plant.

• Keep track of where equipment is and who is using it.

• Make sure hired plant is returned promptly and check the identity of the person you pass it to at handover.

Ensure your staff members understand the importance of securing plant and machinery after use and remaining vigilant at work.

Secure your vehicles - Cars, tractors and quad bikes are tempting to thieves:

- Always remove keys from the ignition and keep them somewhere secure.
- Avoid leaving vehicles in fields secure them to a ground anchor, a wall, or inside a secure caged area if possible.
- Security-mark vehicles, photograph any distinguishing marks and keep a record of serial, chassis and model numbers to help identify them as yours.

• Consider fitting a tracking device to your vehicle to aid its recovery if stolen.
