

NOTES FROM MARCH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Present – all Parish Councillors plus Clerk, together with Ward Cllr Mark Ruffell, and five members of the public including Basing Ward Cllr Onnalee Cubitt. Apologies from PC Andy Reid.

Parish planning applications Three planning applications for new-build properties discussed.

Neighbourhood Plan The Parish Council approved the Vision, Aims and Objectives, as drafted, consulted on and revised. A funding application has been submitted to the National Lottery.

Speed indicator device The first SID the PC purchased is again faulty. The problem appears to be as previously with the receiving antenna on the radar not working. Westcotec have agreed collection for repair.

Clean air campaign Noted that BDBC has introduced a byelaw empowering officers to caution or fine motorists 'idling' with the engine on. These enforcement powers only apply on the public highways, and not to private premises. Agreed that drivers waiting outsided Cliddesden Primary School should be encouraged to switch off car engines, be it on school premises or on the highway.

Lengthsman tasks March

Scheduled for full day (20 man hours) on Friday 13th, and a half day (10 man hours) Monday 23rd March.

- To cut back the vegetation around the road signs, and
- To clean the road signs across the Parish;

- To investigate, and alleviate as possible, flooding on Hackwood Lane (noted that road flooding worsening here, significant rainfall now ensures a 'lake' of increasing depth);
- Remaining hours to be spent clearing the pond silt traps.

It seems that County funding for the Parish Lengthsman Scheme will continue at least for 2020/21.

Village Spring Clean The Parish Council purchased 12 litter pickers, and recorded its thanks to 3CG for organsing the event.


Notes from Tree Officer – The Blue Cedar has failed at a 'predictable' failure point. As discussed with the tree surgeon, even if the tree is made safe, it will look unsightly, and would need to be further pruned in order to achieve a reasonably formed canopy. I would be content to see it replaced.

Unfortunately, Blue Atlas Cedars of early maturity seem to be prone to failure, either due to compression forks. As it is a Conservation Area, a re-plant notice will be served, so we have the opportunity to maintain tree cover. åIt would be good to get an appropriate sized tree, which adds to the landscape whilst providing a nectar source and fruit. Suggestions: Lebanese apple, Malus trilobata 'Guardsman', (or Brush Bush Eucryphia x nymansensis 'Nymansay').

T/00093/20/TCA (24 Feb) Hill View, Farleigh Road. T2 Cherry: reduce branches overhanging neighbouring property back to the boundary.

Update on the Cliddesden Neighbourhood Plan.

Since we began our journey at the Parish Assembly in May 2018, we have made considerable progress towards the completion of a plan for the village.

Our early milestones have been:

The formation of the Neighbourhood Planning Group

- Setting the Terms of Reference for the group
- ❖ The Open Day in November 2018, when we invited you to have your say on what issues should be included in the Plan. We had a great turnout and 85 people attended.
- ❖ A complete analysis of the information provided at the open day so that we could develop our Aims and Objectives.
- The production of a Draft set of Vision Aims and Objectives.
- Setting up a facebook page and a web site in the spring of 2019
- Reporting to you at the Parish Assembly in May 2019
- The production of a questionnaire which went to every household in June 2019. You gave us a response of 37% which is considered excellent by the standards set by other villages.
- The analysis of the information supplied in the questionnaire.
- Working with consultants we have nearly completed a detailed position statement and design guide
- A revision to the Vision Aims and Objectives has been made on the basis of the questionnaire
- We have produced an initial scoping document of the issues and this will be shared with you at an open day in the autumn.
- ❖ We have met regularly with BDBC throughout the process.
- We will be presenting a position statement to you at the next Parish Assembly.

As you can see in the ladder to the left of this article, we are graphically expressing our journey and this will be regularly updated in future and used on articles published in the village.

We have come a long way since the start of our journey and there has been a great deal of preparation work carried out. We have applied to the lottery for additional funding and hopefully will be able to make use of the expertise of planning consultants in developing our polices for the plan.

Our next step will be the open day in the autumn which will be held in the village hall where we will be asking you if we have got the right issues on which to develop our plan policies. Your involvement is critical to the success of the plan so look out for the adverts and put the date in your diary. In the meantime, if you are interested in helping us in any way please let one of the group know. The more people involved the quicker it will all get done.

With all the rain we were having it was either April showers, or how to plant your paddy field!

With this in mind here is a gem of wisdom from *Old Wives Lore for Gardeners* by Maureen & Bridget Boland...

Old Wives Lore for Gardeners...

'The best husbandmen would have the seedsman of turnips or rapes to be naked when he sows them, and in sowing to protest that this which he doth is for himself and his neighbours.'

Presumably, it was hoped that the gods might look more kindly on the naked, innocent amateur than on the prosperous market gardener.

Perhaps, though, the advice was not always given for purely magical reasons: we should not sow when the ground is too cold for the good of the seed, and are less likely to do so if we are told we must be naked when we do it.

FACING THE CHALLENGE OF CORONAVIRUS

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York are calling for Church of England churches to put public worship on hold and become a 'different sort of church' in the coming months to face the challenge of Coronavirus.

In a joint letter, Archbishops Justin Welby and John Sentamu said it was now necessary to put public services on hold until further notice.

But they said that far from having to 'shut up shop', the Church of England must face the challenge by becoming a radically different kind of church rooted in prayer and serving others.

Supporting the Foodbank

St Leonard's will also continue to support the local foodbank. Please consider those in most need at these difficult times. A box for donations is in the church porch, or donations can be dropped off at 22 Southlea – please ring the bell and leave by the door and we will take them to the food bank.

St Leonard's Annual Report

Again a very busy year for St Leonard's District Church Council. The DCC had a priority to attract new members, but without success. However, we do have volunteers to help us with tasks such as maintenance, fund raising, special and general cleaning, flower arranging and church opening.

Services have continued the well-established pattern. The Easter service attendance up this year (69 compared to 62 in 2018). Midnight communion was down at 34. The nine lessons and carols attendance was also up (104 compared to 95 in 2018). The Crib service and Christingle services were lower on numbers and we do need to consider the best way to improve attendances. In general, church attendance was slightly down again, which is a worrying trend, as regular attenders either move away or are no longer with us.

An innovation is for Messy Church activities to take place in the vestry family communion and family services. The children, led by Claire Nunn, seem to enjoy this very much.

On a sad note, Shirley Maunder's passing just before Christmas means one of St Leonard's stalwarts is no longer with us. Shirley has served the church in so many ways, as a Church Warden (indeed the first to preach during a service), as St Leonard's PCC treasurer, as a PCC and DCC member, and as a good friend to so many. She was a major force behind the provision of new toilet facilities and a major donor towards these. We will sorely miss her.

St Leonard's once more hosted a very happy confirmation service on a gloriously sunny day, where the outside catering was much appreciated, as were the cakes and drinks brought by those being confirmed.

The food bank operating within the church continues to be successful and our contributions help the work to feed those more unfortunate.

In what has now become a regular event, Basingstoke Conservation volunteers have helped us to maintain and improve the SINC again this year. Each year additional improvements are made which we hope are appreciated by the village and visitors alike.

Once again we supported the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Historic Churches Trust in their annual fund raising event, Ride and Stride. We had two sponsored families participating as well as having the church is open as usual. St Leonard's benefitted from a grant of $\pm 6,000$ from HICHT and HCC, which was as a direct result of our support for the charity.

The great news this year is that we have completed the toilet, kitchenette and pew re-arrangements. These are now in use and are a welcome addition to the church facilities. While the work was underway, and after the work was completed, many people just turned up to clean away dust before services without which, services might not have been possible. The facilities were formally opened and blessed by the Bishop of Basingstoke.

Quinquennial work required on the black mould on church walls has been completed by volunteers. As ever, St Leonard's would not be able to operate as efficiently without the work of all volunteers.



POLICE UPDATE

Dear Residents

I am pleased to report a reduction in reported crime across the area of this magazine in the past few weeks. I do however wish to start

with an appeal for information in relation to a burglary to a shed in College Lane, Ellisfield, overnight of February 17th and 18th when a chainsaw was stolen.

While we have had no reported crime of note, please be mindful that during these interesting times the criminals will take full advantage if they can and such national emergencies will bring out both the very best and sadly worst of human behaviour. However I ask residents not to be worried about becoming a victim of crime, reported crime is low and with vigilance the chances of becoming a victim are even less likely especially in relation to fraud scams.

Cyber criminals are exploiting people's interest in COVID-19 to spread Ransomware by locking people out of their accounts or stealing information unless a ransom is paid. Ransomware is a type of malware that prevents you from accessing your computer (or the data that is stored on it). The computer itself may become locked, or the data on it might be stolen, deleted or encrypted.

Kindly read and follow the current advice from the National Cyber Security Centre to avoid becoming a victim of Ransomware.

There have been increased warnings over the rise of fraud scams exploiting the coronavirus outbreak, as UK losses near £1m. These include emails claiming to be from World Health Organisation and other official bodies with many people reporting scams which have seen people pay for protective equipment that never arrived, as fraudsters use the global pandemic to target members of the public. The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau said reports related to the outbreak have rocketed 400% in recent weeks.

The majority of reports were of online shopping scams where people ordered protective face masks,

hand sanitiser, and other products that have never arrived. Action Fraud, which has a reporting hotline, has received more than 200 reports of coronavirusthemed phishing emails, which trick recipients into opening malicious attachments allowing the theft of their personal information or financial details.

Some of the emails claim to be from a research group mimicking the World Health Organisation (WHO) or US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). They claim to provide the victim with a list of active infections in their area if they click on a link to a credential-stealing page, or make a bitcoin donation.

Others are offering fake medical support and targeting people who may be vulnerable or increasingly isolated at home. Fraudsters try to lure you in with offers that look too good to be true, such as high return investments and 'healthcare opportunities', or appeals for you to support those who are ill or bogus charities.

The advice is simple, think very carefully before you hand over your money, and don't give out your personal details unless you are sure who you are dealing with.

Other fraudsters are tricking people into clicking on a malicious link to a newsletter with coronavirus updates, sending investment and trading advice on how to take financial advantage of the economic downturn or directing people to a fake HMRC website offering tax refunds.

If you think you have been a victim please report to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040. I would also recommend a visit to the Action Fraud website which has some useful anti-fraud information.

The Metropolitan Police are reporting that thieves are offering to shop for the elderly and then stealing their money and not returning with the goods. Also that burglars have been posing as NHS workers carrying out coronavirus testing in order to gain entry to homes.

Please do not worry, just be vigilant and if you need any advice please call.

Council tax changes during COVID-19 outbreak

All BDBC residents paying by installment (all now over 10 months) will have their 'no payment' months in April and May 2020 – this is instead of February and March 2021.



These changes will be automatically applied. If residents wish to set up a different payment plan, including reverting to paying over 12 months they will need to email us at localtax@basingstoke.gov.uk

Working age residents who receive support though the Council Tax Reduction Scheme will receive a further reduction of up to £150 on their Council Tax bills. This discount will be automatically applied.

On Tuesday 25th February, Oak Class went to London, to visit the Clink and the Houses of Parliament, to finish our History topic of Crime and Punishment.


The Clink was once a prison, run by the Bishop of Winchester. It was opened in the 12th Century and operated until the 18th Century. The nickname 'Clink' comes from the noise that was made by the prison blacksmith attaching chains to the prisoners when they entered the gaol. We found out that many poorer prisoners did not survive their stay in the Clink; they would have had to pay for food, water and even their chains. Conditions in the prison were not good: prisoners had to use a bucket in the corner of the room as their toilet and rats infested the cells. Some prisoners even ate the rats as they could not afford food. We also learnt about the types of punishment that were given to those who were found guilty of breaking the Bishop of Winchester's laws.



After lunch, we travelled to the Houses of Parliament to discover how our modern-day laws were made. We were given a tour of both the House of Commons and the House of Lords, and our tour quides explained how the two Houses create laws and check those laws. We were very lucky to see both processes in action, watching debates on tax avoidance and the proposed HS2 rail link. We also got a chance to see Westminster Hall, where (amongst other people) Guy Fawkes was tried.

Once we had seen the Palace of Westminster, we returned to the education centre, where we learnt about the suffragettes and how they had struggled to get the vote for women. At the end of the session, we had a chance to meet the MP for North East Hampshire, Ranil Jayawardena. The children got to ask him some interesting and thoughtful questions before we had to leave. Although it was a long day, we all learnt something new and felt very privileged to have been able to visit the parliament buildings.

On Thursday 27th February, seven Year 6 members of the netball team participated in the annual High Five competition. Led by captain, Oliver, the team confidently took to the court to achieve a 4-0 victory against St John's Primary School. Our next game was against Park View, we managed another victory with one more game to go to ensure entry into the next round we were up against the formidable North Waltham. The match was touch and go but with amazing teamwork and a touch of encouragement from the side lines. Cliddesden not only won but sailed through to the next round as top of their group. This was a great experience for the team and really boosted their confidence. We will now take part in the finals on 19th March.



There were lots of colourful and creative hairstyles worn in school for Mad Hair Day. We raised £94 for St Michael's Hospice.

Our Tag Rugby team played in the third leg of the Norman League Tournament at Chalk Ridge. We began by defeating leaders Hatch Warren 3-2 and drew our remaining games against St John's and Chalk Ridge. Despite the driving rain and mud, we played very well and were unlucky not to win all our games as we did have some tries disallowed for not placing the ball properly. Something we will now work on. We have one final meeting at our home venue at Brighton Hill on 30 March 2020. We currently stand in second place, 6 points behind the leaders Hatch Warren. It may seem a long shot to catch Hatch Warren but we will certainly give it a go!

We started the Book Week with a whole school assembly to launch our 'Share a million stories' in March challenge. We followed this with the first book buddies time. Everyone chose books and the older children shared them with the younger children. It was lovely to see all the children engaged and really enjoying books in different places with new friends.

Thank-you, Mrs Nunn for leading our children, and sharing their amazing creative responses with the whole school. In the afternoon, the finalists from each year group heat competed in the Cliddesden Spelling Bee. Congratulations to Eli for winning, and the runners up Elsie, Zoe, Bluebell, Luke A, Ewan and Alizé. All the staff were very proud of the high standard of spelling across the school.
