ElFest is in memory of Ellie Bostel who passed away in April 2017 after a short battle with cancer at the age of 23. She spent a month in Intensive Care and the High Dependency Units at Basingstoke Hospital who went above and beyond to make sure she was as comfortable as possible and doing everything they could to help her battle the disease. As such, all profits go to Basingstoke Intensive Care Unit to ensure that they can continue to do the fantastic work they do for our loved ones and the community.

The brain behind the event is Chloe Bostel, who organised the highly successful Hook Oxjam in July 2012, also held at the Old White Hart. The event raised £1,300 for Oxfam and attracted around 500 people from the local area. 



POLICE UPDATE Dear Residents

I am appealing for anv information / witnesses to criminal damage and antisocial behavior being caused in St Nicholas Church, Newnham between 5 pm on Friday April 13th and 9 am on Saturday April 14th, I am aware a group of youths were seen walking in the church yard between these times and will not tolerate any such behavior taking place in our area in general and our churches in particular. Since this incident all the churches now have in place additional security equipment in place.

Recent in another part of my area in Cliddesden however, we had an excellent result, on March 29th a resident reported that a car was parked in the parish and contained people who smelt heavily of alcohol; Police attended and subsequently the driver was arrested. At the police station he provided a reading namely 205 microgrammes of alcohol in 100 millilitres of breath, the limit being 35. The man has been sent to prison for over four months and banned for four years from driving. This is an excellent result and I make no apology in that if you drink and drive we will catch you and you will be prosecuted if over the limit. Could the man above stopped if someone inadvertently ran out in front of his car? Drink drivers kill, sometimes themselves but usually other innocent people. If you know of anyone who drinks and drives please call either me on my direct numbers and as always all calls treated in strictest confidence or crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555111. I was also reading an article in

the Basingstoke Gazette from January 1967 some fifty-one years ago. The article was entitled 'Police appeal – Don't make it easy for thieves' adding "Over 300 burglaries are made every 24 hours against homes, shops and offices. Every five minutes a thief somewhere makes of with cash

and valuables which at the end of the year totals an astronomical amount. The advice provided was identical to that which affects us all today and for this reason I have reproduced this article but added relevant parts for the 21st century. "Housebreakers do not only work at night and that anytime is thieving time". The article issued a seven point plan to coincide with a campaign called 'Don't Tempt Thieves'. The points were: 1. Close and Fasten - windows and doors. 2: All Ladders - should be securely locked away. If this is not possible they should be secured with a strong padlock and chain to something static. See that tools such as spades, picks and crowbars are locked away, they are often used to break in. 3: In the Evening - see that doors are locked, and if possible bolted. 4: Do not - leave large amounts of cash or jewelry in your home. Make use of banks. 5: Going Away - If going out at night leave a light on, but not in the Hall, in the lounge behind drawn curtains. 6: Never Advertise - Your absence by leaving notes or money for tradesmen. 7: Beware of bogus callers - ask for proof of identity and report all suspicious incidents to the Police. In conclusion the article added 'Carelessness Causes Crime – Don't let it happen to you'

Today just as in 1967 'Carelessness' is still the biggest gift we can give to the criminal, and although we have the advantages of CCTV, remote monitoring and alarms, we do need to remain vigilant and alert more so now than ever, please secure your home and outbuildings and sheds and report any suspicious incidents.

OWENS FARM

<u>17/02317/OUT</u> Land at Owens Farm, Newnham Road – Outline permission for up to 700 dwellings, a 2ha site for a primary school, a 0.5ha site for a nursery, a 245m2 retail facility, a 284m2 community facility, together with associated vehicular, pedestrian and cycle access, open space and landscape works. All matters other than access reserved for consideration at a later date. Full planning permission for the provision of 9.68ha Suitable Alternative Natural Greenspace and means of access. (Revised Transport Assessment submitted 23rd March.)

Over 600 people responded to this new consultation including Maria Miller MP and Ward Councillors. The main document for reconsultation – the Transport Assessment Addendum – was generally seen to be unsatisfactory and not fit for purpose. It is also now thought that Hampshire County Council will not support a primary school on the site.

It is understood that the Case Officer is minded to recommend refusal but not clear at time of writing if the applicant will wish to submit further information. Following refusal Wilbur Developments has six months to submit an appeal.

With every step Hart's Local Plan takes towards adoption the more weight it carries – the present land supply according the to Submission Plan figures is eight years. Once the plan is adopted, housing and 'gap' policies should make development proposals for this site untenable.

HART LOCAL PLAN SUBMISSION

The Regulation 19 Consultation closed on 26th March (the Parish Council commented on Policy NBE2 'Gaps between Settlements').

The decision of Hart Cabinet meeting of 5th April was https://www.hart.gov.uk/April-Meetings

'That the Joint Chief Executive, in consultation with the Cabinet Member for Planning, be authorised to:

'Submit the Proposed Submission Version of the 'Hart Local Plan: Strategy and Sites 2016-2032' and all associated documents, together with representations received, to the Secretary of State for independent examination under Section 20 of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 – prior to the publication by the Government of the final revised National Planning Policy Framework.'

The anticipated timetable is for Submission to the Inspector mid-May (as soon as practicably possible) with a view to being Finalised and Approved by Full Council in November 2018. However it has to be considered that this timetable will depend on the progress of the revised NPPF (National Planning Policy Framework) upon which the rationale for the housing figures calculation depends.

Hart's Joint Chief Executive report to Cabinet notes that • 'The Council's intention was to submit the Local Plan for examination at the point when the revised National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) was adopted. Unfortunately, the Government's timetable has slipped and it now suggests that the final document will not be adopted until late summer / early autumn. This gives concerns as continued delay creates greater uncertainty.

• 'The draft NPPF however confirms the intention to move to a standard methodology to be used to calculate local housing need, and the draft National Planning Policy Guidance (NPPG) confirms that the methodology to be used is similar to the approach outlined in the Government's September 2017 *Planning for the Right Homes in the Right Places* as adopted in [Hart's] Submission Local Plan – including its inclusion of additional uplift to meet affordable housing needs.'

The Report goes on to say that ...

• 'While there is a risk in submitting a Plan based upon a methodology not yet formally adopted by Government, this risk is considered to be small as... any Local Plan examination is likely to take place after the revised NPPF is adopted,' and

• 'Given that Hart will be one of the first authorities to submit a Local Plan using the Government's new methodology for calculating local housing need, Officers will need to secure a final independent assessment of the Plan and the representations received to ensure that the Plan is as sound as we can make it before it is submitted to the Secretary of State.'

Letter from Helen Chatfield, Benefice Youth Pastor

What a difference a day makes, or more precisely in my case, what a difference 5 months makes! I could have no clue, as we waved Michael off on his adventure among the penguins, the adventures I would be part of, right here at home in our brand new 'Benefice of the Future', while he was away.

Just a few weeks previously, I had listened to Simon confidently quote Esther 4:14 and proclaim that God had been preparing North Hampshire for 'just such a time as this'; I had stood in trepidation under the gaze of the expectant faithful as I was introduced as the new Youth Pastor, who would be conjuring up a growing and vibrant community of young people within our benefice; I had gone home, slightly overawed, wondering what on earth I'd let myself in for...

Fast forward nearly half a year, and you'll find me dodging skulking teenagers as I tip-toe round Robert May's, hiding 350 chocolate eggs among lockers, behind stairs and above doors. Just before the bell rings, we sprint back to a music room next door to the tennis courts. where we welcome over 50 young people to TheSpace: somewhere they can come to feel safe, loved, unjudged and make slime (but more about that in a future piece...) How did I find myself in this position? What price had I paid to be welcomed so openly into this school, as well as all the others within our communities...?

Now, those of you who know me at all, will confirm energetically that my fingers are anything but green. I have a stack of colourful plant pots in my kitchen cupboard which testify to the demise of many a generously-given pot plant, donated in my previous life by an enthusiastic child or grateful parent, which didn't quite make it through the summer holidays. So, it is with awe and not a small amount of envy that I look onto the immaculate gardens and bountiful fields which surround our homes. It gives me a real spring in my step, when I start noticing the green shoots of bulbs lovingly planted months before in the cold ground by gardeners preparing with confidence for this time

of new life. As I walk between the RAF base and Odiham, I enjoy the changes in seasons demonstrated by how the farmer carefully and diligently prepares the land in various ways to allow for the successful harvest of which he is confident. And as I trudge along the hardened path in that very field, made by the passage of thousands of tiny feet on their way to school, I am reminded of a story Jesus told, which we all know very well, of another farmer who sowed his seed in a field he'd diligently prepared. Now, in this story, much is made of the seed which landed on the path, in the thorns or was gobbled up by the birds, but can I draw your attention to the wheat which thrived? Those seeds which the farmer confidently threw onto the ground he'd lovingly prepared in the months and years that went before? The shoots which pushed up through the soil that was full of nutrients and had been broken up by the plough? The ears of wheat which stood tall and true in the sunshine and indeed went on to produce seeds of their own, which could in turn be sown in years to come?

You see, on this occasion I believe Simon might even have got it right (don't tell him I said so, whatever you do!). Over the past few months, time and again I have seen doors opened, ears reached and hearts engaged in a way no-one could have predicted possible. No-one except possibly the farmer who has been lovingly tending our communities, softening our hearts, putting people where he knows they will be effective in the months and years which have gone before, confidently preparing for 'such a time as this'.

Over the last few months so many people have come and shared how much they want to engage with the children and young people in their communities, how desperate they are to show them they are loved, appreciated and welcomed, so scared, not knowing what to do or where to start. This is my encouragement to each of you, as we witness the miracle of new life bursting from the ground all around us. Be confident, for this ground - our communities, our children and families, our places of work - has already been lovingly tended and prepared for 'just such a time as this'.
