PARISH COUNCIL

- $\ensuremath{\mathbb{B}}$ A meeting was held in the Village Hall on 26th June 1992 attended by 6 Councillors and the Clerk.
- 1. Progress concerning replacement of the vandalised sign posts was discussed.
- 2. Details of the maintenance works required in the Village Hall were discussed and it was agreed to proceed with the works at a cost of £254.
- 3. The Parish Council's request for a further length of footpath to be constructed on Halam Hill had been raised by Mr. R. Brown at a recent meeting of the Road Safety Committee. It was agreed that the Clerk should write to Notts. County Council to ask about the present position.

- 4. Agreed that the Clerk should write to Newark and Sherwood D.C. to request that weeds growing in the gutters should be removed as part of the road sweeping work.
- The problem with the new roof tiles being used at Roseneath, Radley Road had now been rectified.
- Agreed that Mr. H. Rickett would attend the site inspection by the Planning Committee in connection with the proposed development opposite Bluebell Cottage, Back Lane.
- Details of the following planning applications had already been circulated and it was agreed to recommend approval:
 - a) Mr.& Mrs. B.E. Lodder, conversion and new access at Manor Farm, Radley Road.
 - b) Mr. & Mrs. Wilkinson, Carport at 6, Radley Road.
 - c) Mr. E. Bust, 4 bedroomed house and garage adjacent to Strickland Farm.
- It was agreed unanimously that Mrs. Irene Young should continue as a governor of Halam School for a further 4 years.
- 9. A proposed footpath diversion to the rear of Strickland Farm was unanimously approved. (Messrs E. & S. Bust declared an interest and did not vote.)
- 10. Mr. S. Bust gave a verbal report on the AGM of the Notts. Assoc. of Local Councils which he had attended with Mr. R. Brown.
- 11. It was reported that the sewage pumping station is to be reconstructed later this year.

PARISH COUNCIL A meeting was held in the Village Hall on 31st July 1992 attended by 6 Councillors and the Clerk. 12 Parishioners were also present.

The first part consisted of an open meeting with a talk by Mr. C. Williamson, the Director of Planning for Newark & Sherwood District Council, on the Southern Area Local Plan, a copy of which had been sent to the Parish Council for comment. Mr. Williamson answered numerous questions particularly concerning the proposed village envelope and conservation area.

Following the open meeting it was agreed by the Parish Council that the response to the consultation on the Local Plan would be finalised at the next Parish Council meeting on 14thAugust 1992.

Amended plans relating to the planning application by Mr. & Mrs. B. Lodder for the proposed alterations and extensions to Manor Farm, Radley Road, were considered and it was unanimously agreed to recommend approval.

A planning application by Mr. R. Oxby for a proposed barn conversion and erection of 3 dwellings to the rear of The Plough was considered and it was unanimously agreed to recommend refusal. The Parish Council would look more favourably on a less intense development.

A meeting was held in the Village Hall on 14th August attended by 6 Councillors and the Clerk, together with 5 Parishioners. Both District Councillors representing Halam were present.

It was reported that the vandalised sign posts should be reinstated with the next four weeks.

The following planning applications have been approved by Newark & Sherwood District Council:-

Sir John Starkey's Daughters' Settlement for a new dwelling on land opposite Bluebell Cottage, Back Lane.

Mr. E. Bust for a house and garage on land adjacent to Strickland Farm.

Mr. & Mrs. Wilkinson for a carport at 6, Radley Road.

An open meeting was convened to discuss the village envelope and conservation area proposed in the Southern Area Local Plan. Agreed that the Parish Council would reject the village envelope proposal by 5 votes with 1 abstention. Also agreed unanimously to reject the conservation area proposal.

A planning application by Mr. B.E. Lodder for renewal of outline planning permission for 2 building plots on the paddock adjacent to Manor Farm was considered and unanimously agreed to recommend approval.

A consultation by Newark & Sherwood District Council on behalf of Severn Trant Water Ltd. for reconstruction of the sewage pumping station on Mansfield Road

was considered and unanimously agreed to agree to the proposals.

Agreed that a Harvest Supper would be held in the Village Hall on Friday 9th October.

Agreed to request the installation of a street light in the vicinity of Halam Manor/Cedar Lea, Radley Road.

: Agreed that the hire charges for the Village Hall to remain unchanged for the present.
