Dog Fouling

There is still a lot of dog muck being left on pavements and footpaths by inconsiderate owners. Please clear up after your dogs and if you allow children to walk your dog emphasise to them that they must pick up its mess. Whoever is walking the dog the owner is still liable for up to a £1000 fine for not picking up after it.

Noxious Smells & Road Spills

If a lorry spills some of its load and it could be a danger to drivers first report it to the police and then to Trading Standards on 01636 650000. Take a picture of the spill if possible and note the time, direction and any information on the lorry, especially the number plate. For smelly lorries take down similar information and report it to Environmental Health. Don't put yourself in danger to take photos or details.

POLICE WATCH

Police have made us aware of a number of things to look out for in the area, although crime figures continue to be very low.

• As many of you will have heard, St Mary's Church had its heating oil stolen between 12.30pm on 29 October and 8am the next morning. If you saw or heard anything please let the police know. Similarly if anyone tries to sell you heating oil door to door call 101 and quote 96-30102012.

Thieves choose the easiest targets so try and make your tank safer. Download the police's latest advice leaflet from the Parish Council website.

• Anyone can fill out a Neighbourhood Priority Survey, which helps local police understand the things that concern us most in the area. Visit <http://www.nottinghamshire.police.uk/> and follow the instructions.

• Police advise making your home look occupied at night by using timer switches on lights, fake TVs and radios left on to suggest someone's home. If you are out after dark close your curtains and make sure valuables are out of sight. Lock away garden tools and ladders that could help thieves enter, and fit low energy security lighting and motion-sensitive lighting outside your house to deter intruders.

• After a suspicious man called offering roofing services and then entered a man's home in North Muskham police are advising people to say 'No Thanks!' to doorstep sellers WITHOUT opening the door to them.

Rogue traders have also been preying on older people in the region, stealing cheques while doing maintenance work. They seemed to be legit, but the only way to ensure you're using a legitimate company is to visit www.trustatrader.com or www.buywithconfidence.gov.uk where all the businesses registered have been vetted.

When a workman arrives always check their ID and call the company by looking up their number online or in the Yellow Pages. Do not use the number on any card or paperwork they produce as that may be a scam too.
