Traveller Encampments Warning from PC Andrew Reid

On 1st June at 3:55pm a black Nissan Pathfinder GL13 MPV was in Bagmore Lane at Herriard offering power washers for sale. I subsequently sent out an alert concerning this vehicle and have been able to find that at about 3:30pm it was in Upton Grey, at 3.55pm in Herriard and at 4.25pm in Preston Candover.

This vehicle is part of several used by members of the traveller fraternity currently illegally encamped on land at Winchester. I am aware that it was sighted near the recreation ground at Upton Grey, would have passed Herriard Green and has been in Stenbury Drive in Preston Candover.

The report to me was that power washers were being offered for sale by the two male occupants of the vehicle, HOWEVER we also need to be aware that whilst driving around looking for 'customers' these men MAY well have also been looking for a suitable site in which to 'pitch up' upon removal from any existing locations.

At this time of year illegal encampments are prevalent and it is not always large towns that such groups look to in order to set up a camp. I therefore ask all members of the Parish Council to please be aware that albeit I have no intelligence that any encampments are likely in our area, please make sure open spaces under your control and management are made as secure as possible to prevent illegal encampments from taking place by any unauthorised group of people.

Please use good locks on gates, or bars etc, please have the locks checked daily so that in the event of an unlawful gathering a statement can be made to prove that the locks were in good shape earlier that day and criminal damage has taken place in order to gain entry. Please also consider photographing your locks and spaces to show how the site looks just in case someone breaks in or moves onto the open land and causes damage to the grass area's, foliage or any furniture that you may have on it.

Please give me a call if you need any assistance within making things as secure and helpful to us in the event of an illegal encampment.

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POLICE UPDATE

Dear Residents

Reported crime appears to have returned to a more normal pace after the recent several shed and outbuilding burglaries across the whole area; however we have had a reported assault in Blackstocks Lane, Up

Nately which has been dealt with. I am also aware of 'mini moto's' being used to cause a nuisance to residents at The Hatch Industrial Park, in the event of a 'further visit' I ask that residents please call 101 to report this problem in order that officers can attend, in the event of certain offences being found these items can be seized.

I am also appealing for witnesses to the theft of two caravans from a field near Newnham overnight of 22nd / 23rd June 2016. This was the night of severe heavy rain and thunder storms at about 2.30 am; we suspect these thefts took place before that time. If anyone saw any caravans being moved about late at night or in the early hours of that night please give me a call direct. All calls treated in strictest confidence.

We have however been experiencing an increase in 'suspicious vehicle' reports for which I do thank residents and ask that this continues. On May 27 a Ford Transit tipper lorry with a ladder in the rear was seen calling at homes asking if anyone wanted any 'tree work' done, as a result I am aware that the people involved are active criminals and would have been 'scouting' the area on the look out for things to steal. On June 7th a white Renault Trafic van HK56 TUU was seen with a man looking around stables asking about a horse box for sale but looking around as he did so. There is no current owner or insured person for this vehicle but from research that I have made I am aware that a person linked to this incident has links with others involved in theft of equine equipment. Sadly they may well come back, but at least thanks to residents I have knowledge of their visit in case they do. Please continue to report any vehicle / person that you feel is suspicious, I will never be annoyed at anyone for passing me information of their concerns – suspicions.

You may recall some years back I was able to offer 'Smart Water' to local residents and the Constabulary provided it free to victims of crime. Basingstoke was one of the area's that took up the offer and in this area I provided as much as I was able to get hold of. Sadly we no longer do this which was a partnership deal with the Smart Water Company. However may I make residents aware of a company that allow FREE recording of valuables, the company state:

"By registering their valuables on www.immobilise.com owners can put details of their prized possessions on a national database that police can access and compare against items that have been found or recovered from suspected criminals."

"The online service is totally free and is quick and easy to use. Items marked as being registered with Immobilise are less likely to be stolen, and households displaying Immobilise stickers are less likely to be targeted by burglars."

The company website address is https://www.immobilise.com/ and is supported by forty-six UK Police Forces including the Hampshire Constabulary. Please just have a look to see what is on offer if you wish to sign up.

<u>Initial Results From Hart's 'Refined Housing Options' Consultation</u>

In summary, responses to the main questions show that 87% were against the 'Strategic Urban Extensions' approach that foresees a large development 'West of Hook'. The approach of a new settlement centred on Winchfield was put as first choice by of 59% of respondents.

In the 'combined options' with more than one approach taken, the most 'preferred', with 40% putting it as first choice, was a new settlement at Winchfield combined with other smaller developments dispersed across the District. Only four per cent of respondents thought that the best option was to combine all three options of a new settlement, urban extensions and dispersal across the District.

It is clear that 'strategic urban extensions' are considered overall to be the worst option for Hart. It remains to be seen if this is reflected in the Draft Local Plan 'Preferred Approach' and 'Sustainability Appraisal' due to be published sometime this summer.

Hart's Draft Local Plan 2011-2032 will consist of:

Part 1: Strategy and Sites, currently being prepared.

Part 2: Development management and other allocations.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Old House at Home - Save our Newnham Pub

The final tally is 82 public objections submitted to the Planning Officer. Dale Ingram from Planning for Pubs Ltd is acting on behalf of the Parish Council and has submitted a formal objection on our behalf. The documents include a planning response document constructed by Dale with a variety of case references and appendices, a viability study produced by Anthony



Miller (advisor to Pub is the Hub), a concept business plan outlining an alternative future for the Old House as a Community Pub, and a summary document of all the petition support and comments. The viability assessment of the pub by Anthony Miller was commissioned by the Parish Council (former Chairman Clive Pinder) to counter the 'non-viability' argument put forward by Fleurets on behalf of Red Oak Taverns. Not to be outdone, Basingstoke and Deane has commissioned its own viability report. Raising concerns that the planning officer may be inclined to base his opinion largely on this 'in-house' report, Dale has requested that we have a week from publication of this document to review and challenge its findings. The 'statutory expiry date' of 21st of June for decision-time on the application has been updated on the website to an 'agreed expiry date' of Friday 12th August.

Closure Newnham Lane

Newnham Lane is expected to be closed on 4th and 5th July for surface treatment work, Newnham to Poors Farm Road.

Hampshire County Council Verge Cutting

As part of the response to cuts in local government funding, there will now be only one cut per year of grass verges in rural areas compared to two previously. Having said that the visibility splays – junction sight lines – are still supposed to be cut as required. All problems and requests for work should be reported via the HCC website.

Parish Council Audit

Thank you to Peter Brown for again conducting the Parish Council internal audit (2015/16). Accounts and audit figures, as submitted to the external auditors BDO, are available on the Parish website or from the clerk.

Progress meeting for the Chineham Treatment Works expansion

County Councillor Elaine Still has initiated regular progress meetings for the Chineham Sewage Works, notably the expansion approved last December for new sludge digestion, methane capture and electricity generation facilities. Newnham Parish Councillor Paul Gaskell attended the first (22nd June) meeting which included representatives from Thames Water (engineering, operations, customer liaison), Costain Engineering (site engineer), the construction company, council planning departments and neighbouring parish councils.

The Chineham Works expansion includes three new sludge digesters which work under pressure so less temperature required and less energy used. The digesters will extract more methane, feeding two new electrical generators (18,000 GWhrs) – along with the existing generators (2,000 GWhrs) – enabling the works to be 'electrically self sufficient' and also feed into the national grid. The improved 'digestion' also means the end product – used in fertilizer – has less weight and volume and so requires less transportation for the same product.

Thames Water says that work is progressing well: 80% of vessels and machinery is in place, the large methane storage vessel (the golf ball), and the flare stack will arrive shortly for installation. The next phase will be to add cables and pipework, construct the access road and build the 'control room' and operations centre. Then site testing and commissioning, with a proposed operational date this coming December.

Thames Waters conducts its own environmental monitoring, supported by routine assessments by the Environment Agency. Methane will be stored and used for power generation under normal operation, the flare will burn during emergencies only, noting that as methane burns with an almost clear flame this will contribute little to light pollution. The outflow into the River Lyde is reportedly to the most stringent standard in respect of the chalk stream's environmental sensitivity. The next progress meeting is likely in January following the scheduled startup. Fwd: Chineham Works - If anyone has any issues regarding the construction activities, please contact the Parish Council.

Note from County Councillor Elaine Still - `It's really important to have these regularly meetings to monitor progress of works going forward and I am pleased Paul is representing Newnham PC on the liaison panel. As a Chartered Engineer, he has a wealth of experience in this field which is invaluable when asking questions on the operational side.'



NEWS FROM ODIHAM COTTAGE HOSPITAL



Latest newsletter now available

Our summer 2016 newsletter is just going to print and gives the reader a full overview of the range of health and social care services supported by the hospital charity both at OCH and in the community.

With increasing financial pressure on the NHS and Adult Services it is fortunate that, as a voluntary care service, we are able to fill some of the gaps for local people. We know from anecdotal evidence, how much this is valued by the clients and patients we serve.

Our newsletter also gives details of our financial results to the end of 31st March 2016. Over £128,000 has been spent supporting services in the year (more if the benefit of free/subsidised accommodation is included for services hosted at OCH). This has increased from £95,000 in the previous year as the range of services expands. Most of this money comes from our investment portfolio income but even so the Trustees have taken a very positive decision to use some of the charity's capital reserves to support services needed by our community today.

Retail activities make an increasingly important contribution towards our total commitment and we are delighted that both Odiham and Hartley Wintney shops have increased profits for the year and over £5,000 has been raised from our "Give and Grow" scheme (gift aid reclaim). Our new shop in Old Basing has got off to a flying start and we are now reaping the rewards of ebay sales. Thank you to all those who support our shops.

Dear Friends,

I can't believe this is the last time I shall be writing to you all through the pages of The Villager! Of course there have been many months when I have sat in front of a blank computer screen, with an equally blank mind, and no idea what I would write. But something has always come to mind and you have patiently read the stories about my family, our life here at The Rectory, our holidays and some of the issues of parish life and the Christian faith. Thankfully, you seem to have liked them! I've always loved both writing and receiving letters, especially the old fashioned kind that arrive with the postman

and have interesting stamps, and I had several pen-pals when I was a child. The lovely kind comments which many of you have made in response to my Villager letters have been very welcome replies to my ramblings!

The Church of England 'vicar' in any parish is in a very privileged position as we are called to serve the whole community and not just those who choose to go to church. Everyone has a right to be baptised, married and indeed buried in their parish church and our little ancient churches hold so much of the history of our villages. My strategy for my ministry, in so far as I have had any such thing, has always been very simple: to get to know as many of my parishioners as possible and to make myself known to them. I don't know you all by name (although I know a fair few!) and so this letter has been the one way I have had of speaking to every household. I hoped you would feel that you knew me, at least a little, so that if you were ever in need of me, you might feel comfortable about picking up the phone or emailing me.

I suspect a vicar never really retires – the clerical collar is never cast aside completely – but I shall be escaping from all those aspects of parish ministry that are the least fulfilling. No more rotas of Sunday services, no more marriage returns to complete and send to the Registrar's Office, no more attendance statistics to work out, no more worries about fundraising or the lack of young people in our churches. I shan't really miss any of those concerns and chores! But I shall miss our wonderful little churches, even when they have been icy cold in the middle of winter, because it has been such a privilege to be the first woman to lead worship in them Sunday by Sunday, to preach my sermons and celebrate the Eucharist as one in a long line of God's servants in this place.

And most of all I shall miss all of you. When we came to the United Parish in 2008 the prospect of having to get to know five different villages, the foibles of five little churches and ten churchwardens was quite daunting. But very soon you became dear friends and Roland and I have loved living among you and being part of each of your villages. I have always thought I have the best job in the world, as much of the time I am drinking tea and listening to people's stories which are always

fascinating! This last fifteen years of country life and rural ministry were our mid-life adventure, first of all in Long Sutton and South Warnborough and then in the United Parish. Now we are looking forward to our 'Adventure of the Third Age' (to coin a phrase!) and to finding out what blessings God has in store for us next!

We cannot thank you enough for your kindness and your love for us. It will stay with us always and we shall remember you with the greatest affection.

One of the most privileged roles I have as a priest is to proclaim God's blessing on the people I serve. Sunday by Sunday our congregations are sent out into the world with God's blessing ringing in their ears. I bless the very young as they come to be baptised, joyful couples being joined in marriage, I bless the very elderly in their homes and in the nursing homes, I bless those who are at the end of their lives and I bless those who are grieving, anxious and in pain. And so I bring this letter to an end with God's blessing for all of you:

God's love surround you God's joy fill your lives God's peace be in your hearts And God's blessing be with you all this day and always. Amen With my love

And Helene Gray, reflecting on her own experience of being (well!) in her 90s says that the greatest impact for her was losing her unblemished driving licence at the age of 92, thus losing her freedom, independence and the ability to participate in the in the intellectual activities that had been an integral part of her life. That, with her reduced mobility added to the feeling of closing horizons. But at the same time she is appreciative of her family, now with 10 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren to give her much joy, and the generous support of cherished friends. And she is fortunate in still having good memories that take her back to childhood: the muffin man with his tray balanced on his head, the ice cream man on his bicycle, the rag and bone man with horse and cart and the organ grinder with his monkey. Oh happy days! It was a privilege to listen to these dear folk and each one was applauded warmly.
