Success has not just been confined to the green as the Club has recently been awarded Clubmark accreditation by Sport England – the only Bowls Club in Hampshire to be so accredited and one of only 11 bowls clubs throughout the Country. Achieving this award means that the club is recognised as a safe, rewarding and fulfilling place for participants of all ages as well as helping parents and carers know that they're choosing the right Club for their young people. It indicates that the Club has high standards of welfare, equity, coaching and management and that we provide the right environment which ensures the welfare of members and encourages everyone to enjoy sport and stay involved throughout their lives. A huge amount of work went into ensuring we were able to demonstrate that, as a Club, we not only had in place the

necessary policies and procedures but also that we adhered to them and we are enormously grateful to our Treasurer Peter who led on all this. It must have been enormously frustrating for him to complete more than 75% of the process only for Sport England to change the rules but we can now say we are the first Bowls Club to have achieved the award using the new on-line system. Congratulations on the award have been received from the Chief Executive of Bowls England and we are now waiting to hear when the formal presentation of our certificate will take place. Perhaps the final words of the Assessor who visited the Club recently define us as a Club. He said in his report "It is very hard to define what makes a "strong/good club" but yesterday I visited a club that satisfies its members, is always looking to improve and has that friendly feel that you can't describe until you visit it for yourself."

Membership now stands at 130 but, as in most years, we should expect there will be a number of people who for varying reasons, will not re-join for 2017. The Recruitment and Retention Sub Committee will, as normal, be looking at how we can maintain numbers and ensure the membership is not skewed too much towards a particular age group and would welcome from members any ideas for recruitment initiatives.

CLUB TOUR TO THE LAKE DISTRICT

On 3rd September the tourists set off on their long awaited trip to the Lake District. It was a smooth journey on our Moreton's Executive Coach, equipped with on board wi-fi, and soon after 5pm we were in our home for the next week - the Skiddaw Hotel. Situated on the main street in Keswick it has a conservatory, ideal for people watching and this proved a popular meeting place throughout the holiday.

Sunday saw most people up bright and early and after breakfast it was leisure time around Keswick. The attraction of the shops was too great for some but others made the short stroll to Derwentwater through the beautiful Crow Park with a few venturing on to Friars Crag with its stunning views along the lake. Around noon we boarded the coach for what should have been a short trip to Caldbeck but we became lost around Cockermouth with our driver John patiently ignoring the back seat drivers with their mobile phone maps. No doubt an occasion when he regretted the coach having a satellite wi fi connection! Still by the time we arrived at Caldbeck, a village high on the Fells we had experienced some wonderful views. The village is famed for its connection with the huntsman John Peel, whose grave is in the churchyard. The locals were extremely friendly and there was a good deal of banter throughout the afternoon but they gave us a bowling lesson with Oakley managing only two winning rinks. The hospitality had to be experienced to be believed - wonderful scones with lemon curd or Cumbrian rum butter as well as scrumptious home baked biscuits.

Monday did not go to plan. Mary had planned for a drive over the Kirkstone Pass to Windermere followed by a boat trip to Ambleside and then a leisurely trip back via Grasmere but no one at Cumbria County Council had thought to tell the Tour of Britain cycle race organisers that they should plan their route so as not to inconvenience Oakley BC. Plan Z had to be used and to avoid the closures we travelled to Ambleside using the main road and then to Bowness where we caught a boat to Lakeside. From there we had to journey back to Keswick on the motorway. For most of the day it rained so we would probably not have seen much over the Kirkstone Pass but nonetheless it was disappointing for those on their first visit to the Lakes that their day was curtailed.

Tuesday saw the party split up. 18 members went off to Appleby in Westmoreland where they marvelled at the work that had been done to restore the green and pavilion following Storm Desmond. The game was close, again we came second,

but we left having had an enjoyable afternoon with friendly hosts. With only 18 tourists going to Appleby the rest had additional time to explore. Some walked around Derwentwater or took the launch. Others caught the local bus up the Honister Park past Buttermere and Crumock Water. Whatever they did, all enjoyed themselves.

Wednesday saw the tour heading for Carlisle, where members spent the morning browsing the city centre with some visiting Carlisle's new museum and others the Castle and Cathedral. After lunch we made our way to Courtfield Bowling Club. It was unusually a warm day and we had a warm welcome on the green. Friendly as the Courtfield bowlers were, they took no prisoners and we failed to win on a single rink with the President's rink skipped by the Secretary getting a bowling lesson. Again the hospitality was excellent with scones and fruit bread after the game and we made the short journey back to Keswick in good spirits.

No wonder Cumbria is green and has so many lakes. Thursday was driver John's compulsory day off and it had been planned that the tourists would spend the morning wandering around the market before going to Fitz Park to play on the best green in Cumbria. Another plan went wrong. It rained all morning though some brave souls went shopping and then at around 12.30 Mary had the disappointing task of informing us that as the rain was still falling out of the sky and as the green had puddles on it the match had been cancelled. We did, however, have the consolation of meeting up and reminiscing with Jan Foster and Dave Huyton who had travelled up from their new home in Lancashire.

The rain continued overnight and we woke on Friday morning to find the skies overcast but it was dry - just. Sadly the forecast for the afternoon was for heavy rain and late morning, following conversations with Croft Bowling Club it was decided to cancel the game. John, our driver, did, however, take us on a short mystery tour up the Whinlatter Pass and by the time we arrived back at the Skiddaw the rain had begun. The decision to call off the game proved a good one as it poured all afternoon and evening. The Farewell Dinner, where we were joined by Cumbria Secretary Margaret Docherty and husband, was as usual a great success. "Tour Virgin" Chris Williams gave a splendid vote of thanks to President Mary for all the work that had gone into organising such an enjoyable week and on behalf of all tourists presented her with a framed picture of Skiddaw with Keswick in the foreground. Replying Mary paid tribute to all who had helped her and presented the prestigious Black Mark trophy to Linda Smith (Black marks raised almost £300 for the Hospice), the Wooden Spoon to Hazel Solomon and the Tour Trophy to Peter Bown.

Saturday came too soon and by 9.15 am we had set off on the long trip home. The early part of the journey was in good weather but it was raining by the time we stopped for lunch at the Spread Eagle. From there it was one more comfort break before we were back home after a tour where we had an excellent coach and driver, a well located hotel with comfortable rooms and good food and friendly and hospitable hosts. Admittedly the weather might have been better but on arrival home the general view was that the tour was highly enjoyable and we now look forward to Devon in 2017.

Following the return from the Club Tour to Cumbria, the Club was visited by the Sport Hampshire & IOW Clubmark Assessor. This was the final stage of the Clubmark process and, two days later, it was confirmed that we had achieved the Clubmark accreditation status. A presentation of the Certificate will be arranged by the Assessor.

Statistics are difficult, but from the Sport England Club Matters website, at the point we attained accreditation almost 2,650 clubs had attained Clubmark accreditation representing approximately 13% of registered clubs. However, there are only 20 bowls clubs with Clubmark, and we believe only 11 of these are outdoor clubs.

Having led the Clubmark process for the past 18 months, I have been asked three key questions on a regular basis. These are:

What is Clubmark?

How can Clubmark benefit the Club?

What were the main changes needed to attain Clubmark?

What is Clubmark?

Clubmark is the universally acknowledged cross sport accreditation scheme for community sports Clubs.

It shows that a Club provides the right environment which ensures the welfare of members and encourages everyone to enjoy sport and stay involved throughout their lives.

An accredited Club is recognised as a safe, rewarding and fulfilling place for participants of all ages as well as helping parents and carers know that they're choosing the right Club for their young people.

How can Clubmark Benefit the Club?

As a single, national standard, Clubmark gives sports clubs of all types structure and direction. Clubs awarded Clubmark have seen many tangible benefits, such as:

Raised Profile – Clubmark is a highly valued accreditation. As well as raising the profile with local authorities, NGBs and other sporting and community bodies, all accredited clubs are listed on a national database and in other directories, to help them to publicise what they do, attract new members and grow.

Continuous Improvement – Accreditation encourages a club to adopt better, more organised systems and structures, thus helping them to run more effectively and efficiently.

Marketing and Communication – Clubmark gives clubs the confidence to promote themselves. All Clubmark clubs can access the Clubmark member's area, utilise the Clubmark logo and take advantage of other brand resources as well as bespoke information to help generate more publicity. The universal brand, recognising

quality clubs across more than 30 sports is a really valuable marketing tool.

Developing Coaches – As part of Clubmark, clubs are entitled to receive help to develop the skills of coaches. This, in turn leads to better quality provision and improved player performance.

Increased Membership and Retaining Members – Clubmark stimulates real thought about how clubs cater for members. Addressing issues like equity and child protection gives members and parents confidence when choosing a club.

Links with Schools –Clubmark clubs are normally the first invited to work with local schools and schools are being encouraged to signpost pupils to Clubmark clubs.

Funding – Many funding bodies state that applicants must be Clubmark accredited or working towards it.

What were the main changes needed to attain Clubmark?

Oakley Bowling Club was very lucky in as much as it was already a well-run club. Clubmark had been looked at by the Committee in about 2011 but, at the time, it was considered that there was too much to do and efforts were concentrated on the new pavilion. Since then the Clubmark rules have been refined and the Club has introduced Health & Safety and Safeguarding Policies and Procedures. When the gap analysis was done in 2015, it was decided that the Club should apply for Clubmark. The process has been slow and the rules have been changed three times since then.

As part of Clubmark, the Club had to review and update or implement policies and procedures to meet the Clubmark Criteria. As a result, there is now a new Policies and Procedures tab on the website; this covers Policies (new ones are for Welfare and for Equity & Fair Play), Codes of Conduct (covering club officials & volunteers, coaches and bowls etiquette generally), and Role Descriptions (covering President, Secretary, Treasurer, Welfare Officer and Coaches).

As a result of the Clubmark process, the Committee has an improved understanding of its catchment area, has been able to better target recruitment drives, and has developed and recorded its coaching structure and their qualifications.

Going Forward

As always, there is more that can and will be done and there are three target areas for the coming year.

The Committee feel that they need to obtain feedback from members (especially as we have recruited so many over the past three years) as to how the club is run, whether the playing opportunities are correctly targeted, and what social activities should be considered. A survey will be circulated to achieve this.

In addition, the Committee wish to review the coaching structure (anyone wishing to become an Activator Coach or Level 1 Coach should speak with Ruth Bown or Sue Dixon).

There is also an intention to develop a coaching plan for existing members that will develop skills at all levels.

As you might be aware, introduced a slight variation on the scoring system at the start of this year. Instead of scoring purely on aggregate shot difference over the season, I applied a weighting factor, which is designed to reward players who attend regularly and submit all their scorecards (even the poorer ones!).

Keswick - An extract from a non-bowler's diary

As a non-bowler what did I want to achieve from my week in Keswick? The answer was to combine trips to interesting places, terminating where possible at the bowling greens where the tourists were playing. I could see that I could achieve this most days, at least until the weather intervened.

Sunday 4th September

The first morning in Keswick was an orientation trip around the town, checking out some shops for Sandra, confirming bus timetables and visiting Booths supermarket – it made Waitrose look downmarket!

The afternoon was a trip to Caldbeck and after being dropped at the bowling green, I set out along the river Howk to the remains of the bobbin mill, which once had the largest watermill (42 feet diameter) in the country, and now has some impressive waterfalls in the limestone gorge. Returning across the gorge on a footbridge, I reached the village, which has an interesting shop with a petrol pump outside (not very common these days) and then visited the adjacent

churchyard with the grave of John Peel ("Do ye ken John Peel"), which Spencer Kerley found ahead of me. Walking alongside the churchyard a restored watermill can be seen, this time on the Cald Beck after which the village is named, and which forms the boundary of the Lake District National Park in this area. Following the beck, the Oddfellows Arms was reached, which proved to be a disappointing visit with indifferent staff. I then returned to the bowling club in time to watch the end of the game and to participate in the excellent tea provided.

Monday 5th September

The day started disappointingly, but accidentally turned into a success. Today was a coach tour of the Lake District, but it clashed with the Cycle Tour of Britain, which was also in the Lake District, resulting in many roads being closed. We travelled first to the coach park to receive a briefing on what was hoped to be the route, and then returned to the hotel to pick up Jocky and Vera who had missed our initial departure. We stopped first in a rainy Ambleside and after a quick look around Sandra and I retired to the Queens Hotel – the oldest building in Ambleside, with a very chatty barman. The coach then took us to Bowness, tickets for a cruise to Lakeside over an hour later were distributed and time for pickup in Lakeside confirmed. As we left the coach a quick check of the timetables showed that there was an earlier cruise leaving almost immediately and we quickly boarded, as it would give us plenty of time to take a trip on the Lakeside and Haverthwaite Railway.

The boat departed at once but the cruise was not very interesting with some rain, mist and everything looking grey. At Lakeside we joined the steam train and travelled to Haverthwaite. Now with over an hour available we had plenty of time to look around, visit the engine shed and have an excellent homemade lunch in the station restaurant. We returned to Lakeside by the next train and caught the coach back to Keswick. A very lucky and successful day.

Tuesday 6th September

Today the bowling was in Appleby but Sandra and I stayed locally and were joined by Marion & Keith Bringes. We walked to Derwent Water, took a launch also carrying Ric and Sue Newson, to Hawse End on the far side, and walked alongside the lake. At one point we reached a large puddle where a gallant young man offered to give Marion a piggyback as she didn't want to get her new boots wet! We continued down the length of the lake and along the bottom,

crossing the Chinese Bridge over the Derwent river to reach the Lodore Falls Hotel, where we met Ric and Sue again, for an excellent lunch of triple-decker sandwiches. After lunch we walked up to the Lodore Falls. They would look better when there were fewer leaves on the trees, and we then walked down to the lake to take the launch back to Keswick. The journey back was quite funny because a rather ancient lady with too much make-up came round selling tickets and then she came round a second time collecting the tickets she had just sold us. Bizarre.

Wednesday 7th September

Today I was allowed out on my own and took a bus to Carlisle. The next part of my journey was on a rail replacement bus to Appleby because the floods of last winter had caused major subsidence that was still being repaired. I then joined the train to Ribblehead. It stopped several times, at carefully restored stations including Dent the highest station in England at 1150 feet. (Nothing like Jungfraujoch, the highest station in Europe at 11,332 feet that is also worth a visit.)

Arriving at Ribblehead a brisk walk took me down to the viaduct, a symbol of this line, and responsible for both the attempt by British Rail to close the line and the successful opposition which resulted in restoration of the viaduct. Returning to the station, and reluctantly passing by the Station Inn, I visited the exhibition about construction of the

viaduct, before crossing the double track to the north bound platform in time to catch the train, this time further north to Armathwaite. A short coach ride brought me back to Carlisle, where a 15 minute walk took me to Courtfield Bowls Club in time to watch the end of the game and in time for tea.

Thursday 8th September

Thursday was market day in Keswick and a very wet one. As well as the market, Sandra and I visited The Puzzling Place a museum of optical illusions. An interesting and enjoyable place to visit. With Sandra bowling in the afternoon, I took the 77 bus that takes a circular route from Keswick. I got off at Gatesgarth and walked along the side and back of lake Buttermere, ending in the village of Buttermere in time for a late homemade lunch in the Bridge Inn. I then took the next bus over the Honister pass back to Keswick. Travelling through places with names such as Buttermere, Borrowdale, Brandelhow makes you feel like you are travelling through a JRR Tolkien novel. After dropping my bag at the hotel I set off for the bowling green to watch the end of the game only to meet Peter and Ruth Bown who told me the game had been cancelled. Oh well, no tea today!

Friday 9th September

Sandra was not bowling today so we made an early start, catching a bus to Workington, walking to the railway station and catching a train to Ravenglass, the only coastal village in the National Park. The train was late, but fortunately the connecting Ravenglass and Eskdale narrow gauge steam train waited for us and we were soon underway, sitting at the back of the rear carriage with an excellent view of the line. I will digress here, as the history is interesting. The line having been initially built to 3 foot gauge to take iron ore from the hills above Boot to connect to the main line never made money and closed in 1913. In 1915 WJ Bassett-Lowke the model maker bought the line, and between 1915 and 1917 re-laid the line to 15 inch gauge to enable him to test his largest models under harsh conditions. The quality of his models has resulted in replica Bassett-Lowke models still being made today. Furthermore during this time, in 1916 Bassett-Lowke bought 78 Derngate in Northampton where he employed Charles Rennie Mackintosh to redesign the whole house, the only house Mackintosh designed outside of Scotland. 78 Derngate has now been fully restored and is well worth a visit if you are in that area.

The journey to Dalegarth for Boot, for some reason this always makes me think of (William) Boot from the novel Scoop by Evelyn Waugh (an entertaining book which is well worth reading), takes around 40 minutes. After looking around, watching the locomotive being turned on the turntable, visiting the shop and café we joined the returning train, sitting in an open carriage (perhaps not entirely wise as it did rain a bit on the return journey). At Ravenglass we visited the Ratty Arms, so named after the Cumbrian name for the railway La'al Ratty, meaning little railway, before joining the main

line back to Workington. We had intended to take the bus to Cockermouth to join the bowlers, but as the bowling had been cancelled we stayed on the bus back to Keswick – another tea missed!

Finally

My thanks go to President Mary for organising this tour to Keswick. I really enjoyed visiting so many places and the company of the Oakley bowlers. As a non-bowler I had a wonderful time.

When we arrived back from the tour our first view of the new roof was from the coach as we approached the Buckskin roundabout. It looked huge and very open and it had been raining all day. Having picked up our car from Kay and Spencer's we drove round to see everything for ourselves. It was quite a shock as everything was very open and very wet. Fortunately anything which hadn't gone into storage was covered with tarpaulins but it was a relief that the weather improved allowing everything to dry out.

I'm writing this whilst staying in Ric and Sue's house which they kindly offered as they were going away for a week. We have also enjoyed Mary and Terry's hospitality and not least Terry's cooking which is superb and look forward to a few more days with them before we can move back in.

I'm pleased to say the roof is now felted, batoned and by the time you read this hopefully retiled. Most of the new windows will also be in and fingers crossed we will be pretty much rewired (thanks to Martin Smith) and replumbed. Work continues apace and we are itching to get back in to start cleaning up and get decorating and putting in the kitchen.

It's very strange being homeless but we've been so lucky to have the help and support of friends and family. We look forward to the finished product when anyone interested will be able to pop in for a coffee and a look around to see what eventually we will have achieved.
