

Talking Point

'I'm so done with this summer!' my youngest daughter declared. 'Next year needs to be better.' (she's getting married...) It does seem rather strange writing the September Talking Point when it feels like we're still waiting for summer to start. Already adverts are full of 'back to school' when I've only just waved farewell to teachers and pupils praying for them all to have a well-earned break. But we did have a few weeks of glorious early summer – and dare we hope for an autumn Indian Summer?

We arrived here in Dorchester in the dead of winter – it really was very cold! And whatever this summer may have been – the first year with a new garden is always a journey of discovery. The Rectory garden has some very real delights – especially a glorious herbaceous border planted by my predecessors. It also has some challenges – it's size in the first place, but also brambles and bindweed and nettles which are beyond us to eradicate – we can only hope to keep them at bay. And one of the trees has needed major surgery! The Japanese Pagoda Tree, we learned the second largest in the country, has needed a very severe pruning for safety's sake. It looks rather harshly cut back right now – but the tree surgeons, who clearly know and love trees, are hopeful it will flourish again. It may still be the second largest of its type – we have learned there are more measures of a tree than its height.

Arriving in this team of churches and their local communities is also an amazing journey of discovery. As with our garden, I think I will need the full cycle of 12 months to begin to feel anything other than new. But I am past feeling brand new – experiencing a growing love for these churches and communities as I get to know them, with all their joys and challenges (just like the garden!) – and caring for churches often feels very like caring for a garden – sowing and planting and pruning and clearing the brambles – creating conditions for health and growth.

Gardens feature through the story of the Bible – from the Garden of Eden, to Gethsemane where Jesus wept before his crucifixion, to the garden of the tomb where Jesus was laid to rest and where the resurrection was revealed – through to the end of the book – the hope of a restored creation – not back to Eden, better than that: restored, re-created, re-imagined, more glorious than the first – with Jesus the gardener declaring 'Behold I make all things new'.

And for now we share in God's work of re-creation in his world. Our cold wet British summer, along with the heatwaves experienced elsewhere, are a sharp reminder of the urgent need for us to be caring for the world God has entrusted to us. Jesus said 'I have come that they might have life, and have it to the full.' (John 10:10) – it's a verse many church schools draw on for their vision statements, and expresses God's longing for each and every one of us. All of us who have encountered the transformation Jesus brings are entrusted with sharing this good news – this gospel – with others.

On the first Sunday of September we will be having a Team Service in Dorchester Abbey – a Confirmation Service with Bishop Gavin, where six people with be committing their lives afresh to follow Jesus, and the church will be affirming them, confirming them in their faith. Do come to support and encourage them – it will be a great service where I hope we will all be encouraged and inspired in our faith.

And for now I leave you with the collect prayer for that first Sunday in September – may we all be open to the work of God the gardener in our lives:

Almighty God, who called your Church to bear witness, that you were in Christ reconciling the world to yourself: help us to proclaim the good news of your love, that all who hear it may be drawn to you; through him who was lifted up on the cross, and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

John Howell MP writes

I know that many constituents share my concern on issues around climate change. As such I understand some of the concerns expressed over the decision to agree new oil and gas licences. However it is important that this is seen in full context and alongside other measures that are being introduced.

The wider context is that of energy security. We have all witnessed how Russia has manipulated and weaponised energy, disrupting supply and stalling growth in countries around the world. Now more than ever we need to increase our energy security to reduce our dependence on imports. This will not only help to protect our economy and is also important as, we are told, the carbon footprint of domestic gas production is around one-quarter of the carbon footprint of imported liquified natural gas. Further the independent Climate Change Committee predicts around a quarter of the UK's energy demand will still be met by oil and gas when the UK reaches net zero in 2050.

Alongside the oil and gas licences the Government has also confirmed two more industrial Carbon Capture, Usage and Storage locations and thus the continued commitment to helping all parts of the United Kingdom decarbonise to reach net zero by 2050. This puts us on track to store 20-30 million tonnes of CO2 per annum by 2030, which is the equivalent to removing approximately 4-6 million cars from UK roads each year. It will also help realise the UK's carbon storage potential, which, with an estimated 78 billion tonnes of theoretical CO2 storage capacity on the continental shelf is some of the largest in the world.

At the same time as this announcement from our own Government I was interested to read the comments of Dr Jim Skea, the newly appointed head of the IPCC, about achieving target of limiting global warming. Dr Skea recognises that if you constantly communicate a very negative message it can paralyze people and prevents them from taking the necessary steps to get a grip on climate change. Whilst he in no way underestimates the problem his pragmatic approach is refreshing. He hopes to adapt the IPCC to provide better and targeted advice to specific groups such as town planners, landowners and businesses recognising the need to address "real people and their real lives". This is echoed in the approach that the Government is taking. The Prime Minister has stated that the Government is keen to reach the target in a way that is proportionate, pragmatic and does not place unnecessary burdens to household budgets. This I believe is the right way to go. We need to bring everyone with us to make things possible. I have put more detail on this on my website.



Reach Through

The reach through is an exercise that combines lateral strength and rotation of the core. This is an important aspect of core strength as there is a perception that this is only about the ability to do sit ups.

Start position is in side plank (picture A). This is lying on the side, with the lower elbow directly below the shoulder, forearm resting on the floor, feet one on top of the other and shoulders, hips, knees and ankles in a straight line when viewed from above or in front. The top arm is straight and raise at right angle to the floor.





From this starting position rotate the torso around the lower shoulder. Bring the upper arm across the front of the body and then reach through

the gap between the torso and the ground (picture B). Reach as far behind you as you can and touch the floor. Then reverse the movement to return to the starting position. Whilst this rotating movement is happening aim to keep the body straight, that is shoulders, hips, knees and ankles in a straight line when viewed from above or in front. The hips should remain the same height off the floor throughout. Complete the required number of repartitions and then repeat on the other side.

To reduce the intensity this exercise can be done resting on the lower elbow and knee with the knees bent at 90°. It should be noted that there will be less rotation from this position. To increase the intensity a weight can be held in the upper hand. This increases the work of the upper shoulder and back as well as the core. To get the most from this exercise technique is very important. If when doing it you feel your technique slipping then stop have a rest and then continue with good technique.

Parish Council Grant Scheme

Stadhampton Parish Council has a small budget of £2,000 per year to award to local community groups or charities. Applications must benefit the residents of the Parish of Stadhampton and Chiselhampton.

Councillor Community Grants Funding A new round of funding from the Councillor Community Grant scheme has launched in South Oxfordshire, to help local charities and organisations across the district. As part of the scheme, every ward in South Oxfordshire has funding to support local projects that directly benefit local residents. Organisations can now apply for grants from £250 up to a maximum of £5,000 from each ward councillor where the project is located. Before applying, applicants are encouraged to get in touch with their local councillor to discuss their project and visit our website for further information and details on eligibility. Applications are made online and are open until midday on Friday 20 October 2023. The last round of funding, which closed earlier this year, awarded £179,824 to help 99 proiects across the district. Recipients ranged from biodiversity and wildlife projects, to those improving mental and physical health and wellbeing, improvements to community buildings and recreation areas, and more. Rural England Prosperity Fund More than £1.2m is being made available to help improve the rural economy across our districts. We've secured funding from the government's Rural England Prosperity Fund, which can be used to provide a boost to projects such as creating rural business hubs, setting up community energy schemes and diversifying farm businesses beyond agriculture. Any organisation with legal status will be able to apply for the funding when it opens in the Autumn this year. This will include:

• Public sector organisations; • Higher and further education institutions; • Private sector companies; • Voluntary organisations; • Registered charities. Before the application process begins, the Economic Development team wants to understand which organisations might apply and for what type of project, and so is asking anyone interested to send an Expression of Interest in the run up to the funding scheme opening later this year. Rubbish Updates! It's important that residents are aware that if they have problems with waste not being collected, or if they notice situations whereby Biffa operatives are putting electrical recycling into general waste trucks (for example), please report directly to Biffa, either by phone on 03000 610610, or at admin.southoxford.biffa.co.uk. They can then investigate and resolve for you. If you have already done this and the issue continues, please escalate to the Council's waste team at waste.team@southandvale.gov.uk, or by calling 01235 422146.

Parishes may also be aware that a man has been ordered to pay more than £1,400 after garden waste was found dumped near Great Haseley. Magistrates heard how, in January 2022, the resident had carried out work at a property in Great Haseley and had been paid £150 to remove four bulk bags full of garden waste. However, he failed to ensure that the waste was disposed of properly and it was then found dumped on the side of the road along the A329. The resident claimed that he didn't have enough space in his vehicle to take the waste away himself and so had paid a scrap metal collector to do it for him. However, he didn't know who the person was and failed to provide any evidence of this arrangement. He was fined £200 and was also ordered to pay full prosecution costs of £1,247 and a £34 victim surcharge.

Anyone producing or transporting controlled waste must ensure it is disposed of legally and that a record is kept of what the waste is and where it's going.

It would be helpful if we could remind our residents of this responsibility in parish magazines/communications, with the advice that if you see a fly-tip or suspect that someone is involved in fly-tipping, please report via southoxon.gov.uk/flytipping, or call 03000 610610




