Notes from Halam PC meeting held on Thursday 14th December 2023 at 7.30pm in the Village Hall



<u>Present</u> - Chairman Mr Bust, Mr Bevans, Mrs Blackburn, Mrs Denyer, Mr Wright, clerk Mr Rickett, FO Mrs Rickett Cllrs Laughton, Rainbow and 2 members of the public

Minutes of the previous meeting were signed as a true and correct record.

Meeting adjourned.

The subject of a flood meeting being held by Edingley PC was raised; the 2 members of the public would be attending as arranged by Cllr Laughton. Mrs Denyer to liaise with Mr Ross and Cllr Laughton to arrange for someone to attend a Halam PC meeting.

Cllrs Laughton and Rainbow gave their reports – spoke about Staythorpe Battery Plant, Muskham Solar farm and the pot line hot line being set up.

Village Hall

- The prices for the wall would be discussed at the end of the meeting when members of the public would be asked to leave.
- PAT this had been carried out.
- Electricity renewal the FO outlined the figures between the company we are with and a new firm, both were for British Gas, for 2 years the only real difference being the new firm had a cheaper standing charge agreed to go with them unanimous FO to arrange.

A letter was received from a solicitor in the Village offering help in doing this.

Roads and hedges

Letters were received about the state of School Lane and overhanging hedges in general. The Chairman reminded the PC that it is the householder's responsibility to maintain their hedges.

Correspondence

A letter was received from St Michael's Church, requesting a donation towards roof repairs. Agreed unanimously to give them one.

Planning

1 Manor Farm Cottage – single storey side and rear extensions - Agreed to support unanimously 5 for

Pepperbox Cottage – variation of condition 2 attached to planning permission 20/00311/FUL to amend the approved plans for the additional boundary red brick walls constructed to the vehicular and pedestrian access (retrospective) - Subject to it being agreed by Highways Halam PC have no objection.

Finance

Agreed to pay – Cleaners.

Cable cover

Precept budget was handed round for the Cllrs to look at and make a decision at the January meeting Local Services pay Agreement 2023 – to be looked at after the public have left.

Village hall wall -3 quotes have been received 1 from Nottingham and 2 local - After much discussion it was agreed to leave to the next meeting and maybe look at cheaper alternatives.

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<u>District Cllrs Karen Roberts and</u> Peter Harris Report for December 2023



Full Council Dec 12

The Community Plan 2023 - 2027 was agreed the Full Council. There are 8 key objectives for the Council following the Residents' Surveys and other engagement that Keith, Karen and I have had with residents in conversations and at our regular monthly Surgery on the Southwell Market Square on the first Saturday of every month. There will be some Key performance Indicators on these objectives, and these will be monitored by us and regular intervals; one new significant objective is to 'reduce the impact of climate change' with 15 key points to achieve this. The full Plan is available from us, in the library or on the N&SDC's website.

One major concern is the increase of the Internal Drainage Board's levy, paid in the main by the District Council with contributions from landowners. The levy is increasing by nearly 25% next year to over £950k. This will have an impact on all our council tax bills.

The Amended Development Plan was agreed There have been some amendments, but the deletion of a gypsy and traveller site in Winthorpe due to noise from the A1 which was unacceptable was agreed. The number of places required by the Government [a much higher number that other Districts] will still be acceptable so no new sites are being sought,

Cabinet

Work at Southwell Leisure Centre - the essential works that are required to the dry and wet side facilities at the Leisure Centre reported last month - is progressing. However, there will be a key meeting on Wednesday after this newsletter was published - where options on the swimming pool will have to be discussed.

The Learner Pool remains open during this period. A budget of £740,000 from the Capital Programme, to carry out the fire safety and general repairs to the dry side facility. has been identified. The Cabinet repeated its undertaking to make every effort to phase the works to keep the Leisure Centre operational, including providing a long-term solution to the leaking swimming pool. However, N&SDC and Active for Today warn that there is a possibility that the Leisure Centre may have to close for a period of time in order for the works to be carried out safely, effectively and efficiently. We will report back.

As pointed out last month the Community Grant Scheme is now open for applications with a maximum grant of £20k to allow for larger, transformational projects. Applications close on 22 December 2023

There are no meetings until the New Year so Cllr Keith Melton, Trent Ward, Cllr Karen Roberts and Cllr Peter Harris, Southwell Ward wish you a happy Christmas and best wishes for 2024.
