


Q7: We have drawn up draft objectives on Landscape and the Environment - please could you rate them in order of importance to you?






Q8: We have drawn up draft objectives on Climate Change, Settlements and Design - please could you rate them in order of importance to you?


Q9: We have drawn up draft objectives on Community and Highways - please could you rate them in order of importance to you?


Q10: What do you feel are the most important aspects of the character of the area? Tick all that apply



Q13 - Which footpaths and bridleways do you use most in the Parish? Are there paths you would like to see - if so, where?

- Could do with a footpath to the rear of Hansards for safer access to village hall.
- I would like to be able to walk from Kimsbridge to Awbridge Village Hall without having to go all the way up to Church Lane on the Test Way (avoiding roads)
- Bridleway down Dunwood Oaks Centre is very important. Linking this area to the village centre with a footpath would be desireable.
- Between the park and Church Lane. Behind the school through the fields. Conservation area by the park. I wish there was an easier way to walk from Awbridge to Dunbridge avoiding roads.
- Upper Ratley to Village Hall path. Kents Oak/Newtown path. Several paths from Danes Road to Newtown Road.
- The wildlife sanctuary
- Test way and around Awbridge Danes I should like to see safe pedestrian access down Saunders Lane
- between church lne and village hall this needs work to stop it flooding though!
- Church Lane to Village Hall and Coombe Lane
- Footpath from Danes road to Newtown
- It would be good to have a footpath from the Test Way behind The White House up to the Romsey Road near the village hall.
- Between Romsey road and church lane A footpath to the village hall would be good to save walking on the main road
- It would be great if pathways, of any sort, could give access to the Duke's Head, to Kimbridge Barns, and particularly along Danes Road
- Village Hall across to Church Lane, footpath from Coombe Lane to Church Lane abutting Earls Coombe, cut through from Danes Road to Newtown Road (opposite Church Lane), footpath across the field from Danes Road to Newtown Road.
- From Danes Road through Newtown to Doctors Hill and Gambledown. Old Dunwood golf course path from Newtown, crossing Danes Road and down to Coombe Lane, then footpath past back of Nature Sanctuary to emerge in Church Lane and/or through Sanctuary and across fields from village hall. Fields at Butlers Wood Farm down to Carters Clay. Test Way.



Q15: How do you most commonly travel from settlement to settlement?




Q16 What is your main reason for these short journeys?

Q18: Do you agree with the potential Local Green Spaces (LGS) as shown within the villages on the maps?






Q20 - What buildings or landmarks do you think should be noted as a locally important building / structure or non-designated heritage asset?

Q21: Do you agree with the potential target areas highlighted for infrastructure improvement as shown on the plans?



Q23: Are there new or enhanced community facilities you believe would benefit the community that could be provided?





Q25: Should we instead rely on the Council to choose housing sites for us up to 2040?








Q27 - If we allocate housing , how many houses would you like to see developed in the future up to 2040?


Q28: Do we have a need for more: Tick all that apply





Q29: Would you like to see the individual hamlets remain separate or joined together in the future?



Q30: Does you have concerns about the reduction in the number of small dwellings being lost to large replacement dwellings?



Q35 - Where do you think the main areas of flooding are and what is the cause?

- Main flooding issues are in village centre where historic drainage systems have not catered for climate change.
 All new development is bound by new planning considerations with sustainable drainage systems which support improvement to flooding
- On the top corner of Saunders Road by the bend. This is also a tricky path to navigate and not wide enough with large vehicles passing.
- Saunders Lane, Romsey Road are permanently covered in surface water and the junction between. Newtown Lane and Danes Road floods regularly. I think the building of a large number of houses on what was a single plot is reducing the area for to water soak aways to be effective. We rely on soak aways due to the lack of mains drainage. Saunders lane becomes an ice rink when the temperatures drop due to the formation of black ice. One day the consequences will be worse than an abrupt stop in the fields at the bottom of the road.
- Awbridge Hill/Stanbridge Lane flood run-off from neighbouring fields and poor ditch maintenance
- Coombe Lane is a nightmare, run off from pasture land and inadequate drainage which quickly becomes blocked.the bottom of Saunders Lane becomes a torrent when it rains hard. In winter this then freezes and becomes very dangerous
- Towards the bottom of Saunders Lane as so low
- Junction of Dane's road to Newtown road
- Large puddles forming on roads where there is runoff from paved drives and gardens being built on with no regard for drainage
- · By the Hansard cottages poor drainage.
- Junction of Old Salisbury Lane and Stanbridge Lane. Caused, I assume, by nowhere for the water to run off the road, or a badly designed/ poorly maintained road.
