POLICE UPDATE FROM PCSO ANDY JONES

Report of 19th April

Police have recently raised the matter of metal theft and that a suspect had been identified... The suspect had been stopped by another constabulary and reported for driving offences. Police requested the suspect to attend the Police station to answer questions. Unfortunately he failed to arrive and it appears he is no longer in the country. This matter will await his return.

A resident of Nutley has reported a burglary believed to have occurred in the early hours of the 20th March. A quad bike and a lurcher dog have been stolen. Two more burglaries have occurred also in the early hours of the morning in the areas of Chilton Candover and Winslade. Again quad bikes have been targeted.

Please take every opportunity to harden security <u>your local Officer is always willing to offer crime prevention advice.</u>

On the 26th March, Police attended Berrydown Road in Axford after an incident involving a horse and a car. There is no fault to either party, significant damage was caused to the vehicle and the horse had to be euthanized due to its injuries.

6th April, further damage has been caused to the phone box on Bidden Road in Upton Grey, more glass planes have been smashed.

Unfortunately we have had two additional cars damaged by person(s) unknown on the 17th of April. Alas it comes as no surprise that it was a hot day and a weekend when it happened. Both cars had windows smashed and one had valuables removed from within – one was parked in Cliddesden and the other in Farleigh Wallop.

We are all feeling the pinch in relation to energy and other fuel bill hikes. Historically when the price of oil has increased the theft of the product also increases.

Theft of used cooking oil is on the increase nationwide and many of the rural pubs and restaurants have been targeted. Police have some lines of enquiry and work is going on in the background.

Two Basingstoke men who had a 'persistent disregard for the law' have been handed a prison sentence after fly-tipping household waste across Basingstoke. Lee Wainwright, of Schubert Road, was sentenced to 10 months at Winchester Crown Court on 5 April for six counts of fly-tipping between November 2019 and March 2020. James Christopher, of Pear Tree Way, was sentenced to nine months

in prison at the same court for 10 counts of fly-tipping across the borough between February 2019 and July 2020, The court heard how the pair dumped waste from L&J Clearances and L&J vans.

On another note your local Beat Officer has signed up to abseil down the spinnaker tower in Portsmouth in aid of Sebastian's Actions Trust. This has been booked for June this year so fingers crossed and Covid allowing it should be a challenging day.

BDBC LOCAL PLAN UPDATE



NEW HOUSING FIGURES (BDBC Full Council Meeting 24 March)

'Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council has agreed a motion by which it rejected the figure of 17,820 units in the Local Plan Update which had been calculated using the "Standard Method".

'The Standard Method uses data which is 13 years out of date whereas up-to-date data from the 2021 Census is becoming available. This amounts to "exceptional circumstances"* which would justify use of an alternative to the Standard Method. It is essential to identify a more robust and credible lower figure than that currently proposed.

'This can only be done without delay by using the Chelmer Housing Projection Model incorporating up-to-date 2021 Census figures without pausing the progress of the Local Plan Update. The Council resolves to request that Cabinet explores this model, informed by legal advice, to ensure that the Emerging Local Plan meets the legal tests of compliance and soundness when these tests are applied independently at Examination in Public in 2024 and subsequently by the Secretary of State.'

The motion was carried unanimously.

* NPPF (National Planning Policy Framework) para 61 says: '61. To determine the minimum number of homes needed, strategic policies should be informed by a local housing need assessment, conducted using the standard method in national planning guidance – <u>unless exceptional circumstances justify an alternative approach which also reflects current and future demographic trends and market signals.</u>'

The 'Standard Methodology (introduced in 2018) – in addition to its demographic calculation – includes an 'affordability ratio' which can amount to a *c*33% uplift in housing numbers – supposedly to moderate high house prices. The model presumes unrealistically that an over supply will lead to developers reducing prices; in reality developers decline to build so compounding problems with the five-year land supply.

CANDIDATES FOR WARD ELECTION ON 5TH MAY:

Holly Hopgood, Labour... 'Having worked as a caseworker for an inner London MP, I have been driven by two things – the lack of affordable, decent housing, and child poverty. When younger I volunteered for a 'Home School refugee project' set up to help children with their homework. It was such an eye opener as to how challenging these children's lives were...' Re Upper Swallick, I would support the B/stoke Labour position of not being in favour of this proposal. Whatever features the planned development has are not going to compensate for losing the nature of Cliddesden or the key amenity of our local countryside. My children go to nursery in Cliddesden, and I chose it because I love the open spaces right on their doorstep.'

Richard Lilleker, Liberal Democrat... (Published info) 'Richard has lived in Old Basing for over 10 years and works locally as a dentist. His children attend a local school where he is a parent governor. He is passionate about preserving and protecting the environment.' The Liberal Democrat position in relation to Upper Swallick is opposed: 'recognising the need for more homes, but without detriment to existing residents... significant infrastructure deficits are not solvable.'

Anna-Marie Moynihan, Hampshire Independents... Anna-Marie's twitter comment @Hants_ind_party on Apr 20 says: 'Sewage is still being pumped into our rivers and streams. Overdevelopment is causing environmental disaster around Basingstoke.'

Kate Tuck, Conservative... 'A committed local campaigner – I will continue to defend our Ward from inappropriate, excessive, large scale development – A strong advocate for local green space valued by residents – I will speak up for nature, our chalk streams and our chalk downland, we must protect this for future generations – Zero tolerance on fly-tipping and I will work closely with County.'

Policy RT1 – Maintaining accessibility in rural areas, and providing realistic alternatives to reduce dependency on the private car Policy RT2 – Sustainable access to the countryside.

MESSAGE FROM COUNTY CLLR JULIET HENDERSON RE 20MPH PROPOSALS

'The County Council is asking for views on a draft Local Transport Plan. I would really encourage Parish Councils and residents to take part.

'If as the Plan suggests we are to encourage the appeal of walking, cycling we should have 20mph zones in rural villages and residential areas and I would encourage residents and the Parishes to make this point when they submit a response.

'In summary – the plan proposes transformational changes which: Shift away from planning for vehicles, towards planning for people and places – Reduce reliance on private car travel – Support economic development and regeneration – Meet national priorities to decarbonise the transport system – Promote active lifestyles.'

'This is a new move to tackle flytipping which is a crime, blights communities, poses a risk to public health and the environment, and costs up to £392 million a year.


'I support this change in government position. The cost of fly-tipping clear-ups to private landowners and councils is a huge amount of money and the issue is increasing every year.

THE BLUE LAMP TRUST

The 'Bobby Scheme' run by the Blue Lamp Trust provides free home security visits, long-life smoke alarms and advice to vulnerable residents in Hampshire and the Isle of Wight, particularly the elderly and victims of burglary and domestic abuse.



A full crime prevention and fire safety survey is carried out by one of their specialist trained, police-vetted, fitters. They will provide both general and specific crime and fire prevention advice to improve resident home safety. When appropriate their fitters will fit items such as locks, spy-holes, door chains and smoke alarms, etc. This service is completely free.

The Bobby Scheme can also supply and fit police approved key safes for a small donation.

The Bobby Scheme is free to those who are vulnerable due to age (over 65), circumstance, disabled, or a victim of household crime.

MOBILE PHONE LAW CHANGE COMES INTO EFFECT

'The consequences of using a mobile phone while at the wheel can be catastrophic.'

This is the message from Hampshire Constabulary and Thames Valley Police's joint operations Roads Policing Unit as new law changes came into effect 25th March.

'The change sees the law expanded and mean you can receive an immediate fine of £200 and penalty points on your licence for the following offences while driving:

- Illuminating the screen
- Checking the time on your phone
- Checking notifications
- Unlocking the device
- Making, receiving, or rejecting a telephone or internet based call
- Sending, receiving or uploading a photo or video
- Utilising camera, video, or sound recording
- Drafting any text
- Accessing any stored data such as documents, books, audio files, photos, videos, films, playlists, notes or messages
- Accessing an app
- Accessing the internet

'There are just two exemptions to the law, allowing for a call to be made in an emergency where is it not practical to stop, and for contactless payment for a service provided at the time – for example, road tolls or drive-throughs – but the vehicle must be stationary.'




Your Village Hall Needs You!

Beggarwood Surgery Update April 2022

Two new doctors have joined the CGH team, a Dr Robinson and Dr Ambrose who will both come on board in the next few months. A receptionist is being sought for Beggarwood to fill a vacancy.

It was reported that during the last few weeks an occasion had arisen when Beggarwood surgery had reached a staff/patient capacity. Fortunately, CGH has a Duty Capacity Response Team, which enabled urgent patients from Beggarwood to be seen at Camrose. We asked if patients were more pleased just to be able to see a doctor or whether there were complaints about having to travel to Camrose. There

have been no complaints about the travel involved. We applauded the decision to open the response team at Camrose to Beggarwood patients. We also asked if people are being told why they are being asked to go to Camrose, and Operose confirmed that a clinician would explain the situation and advise patients about why they need to go there rather than being seen at Beggarwood.

We continue to receive good comments on face-to-face appointments being made available, even at short notice. Also, that the reception team at the surgery are being as helpful as they can in helping patients sort out the confusion that NHS England has caused with the integration of patient records and the inability for some patients to order prescriptions online.
