Staplehurst Bridge Club

Community Centre for Debt Advice report

The Debt Advice Centre in Staplehurst has been quite busy in the last year. A number of factors have contributed to this:

- Things are now functioning more normally in the financial world after the quiet period that was created by Covid. Individuals have reached a point of needing to tackle their debt situations – dilemmas that could be ignored during the pandemic, as creditors were not taking action.
- Step Change – a major organisation for helping people in debt, have lost funding for their Debt Relief Order department. A DRO is a simple and cheap way of achieving insolvency, particularly suitable for those on low incomes whose circumstances are unlikely to change dramatically. We have had an influx of clients who have been recommended a DRO by Step Change but then told they will need to go elsewhere to apply for it. We are able to complete DROs with the support of Community Money Advice, our umbrella organization.
- The current financial crisis with high energy prices and general high inflation has put a lot of pressure on everyone. Some existing clients have needed to come back to us to reassess what they are able to pay towards their debts as they can no longer afford the pre-arranged payment plan.

The debt advice process is very much like detective work, trying to find out all the necessary information, using old paperwork, clues, credit reports and so on. It is inevitable that many people are in debt because they have a chaotic lifestyle and are not able to keep on top

of paperwork and payments. Sadly, this fact often means that we start working with someone and then they stop engaging with the service. We may put in hours of work but don't manage to reach a solution because we are at the mercy of an individual who doesn't keep appointments or doesn't present the paperwork necessary to work the case.

Financially, the last few years have been quite relaxing. In 2020 we were awarded a grant from the Colyer Fergusson Charitable Trust to cover 3 years general running costs. Often grant making bodies specify that funds need to be used for start-ups, specialist equipment etc. CFCT did not make such specifications and we were free to use the funds for our annual indemnity insurance and affiliation fee to Community Money Advice. These are our highest costs each year. We have also been grateful for the ongoing support of Staplehurst Parish Council, topping up our funds and helping to keep us in paper, envelopes and stamps. We will be looking to apply for a further grant for CFCT as the money begins to run out later this year.

Staplehurst Community Events Group



2022 was the Platinum Jubilee year to celebrate Queen Elizabeth II's reign of 70 years so as an alternative to hosting our annual summer fete we decided to hold a **Party in the Park** instead.

Villagers with friends and family came to Surrenden Field on 4th June loaded with picnics, blankets, deck chairs and warm clothing as unfortunately it was rather overcast and quite breezy. They were treated to live music from six great bands with a patriotic finale of The National Anthem and Land of Hope and Glory. A funfair was enjoyed by the children and the tug of war for various age groups proved extremely competitive. It was a memorable day with lots of flag waving and probably one of the first events many of our new residents had experienced since moving to Staplehurst because of the Covid 19 Pandemic.

In June we hosted our **Annual Run** around the quiet lanes of Staplehurst and for the first time it included a 5K as well as the traditional 10K. A total of 252 runners participated.


Christmas time was very busy for us – it started in November with a **Christmas Fair** at the village Centre, and it was lovely to have our French Traders back since before Covid 19. All the stall holders, Local and French said they had had a successful day and many have already re-booked for 2023.

Our second Christmas event was the very popular **Santa Sleigh**. Because of the many new properties in the area, we had to extend the touring by another day so Santa, his motorised sleigh and helpful volunteer elves went out over 5 evenings and saw many happy children. Social media helped residents track his route so they weren't waiting outside in the cold for too long. From the money we collected in our buckets, we donated £1000 to the Staplehurst Winter Warm Rooms initiative.

Our third event was **Light Up Staplehurst** – basically we asked residents to display at least one small light in their front window and they could be lucky enough to win a random cash prize of £25. Imagine getting a knock on your front door on what was an exceptionally cold icy night and being presented with £25... we surprised 20 households, some of who were aware of our promotion, some who weren't and some new residents who hadn't even heard of us so at least it was a good public relations exercise!

The main ethos of our group is to host enjoyable events for the residents of Staplehurst but also, with the funds we raise we try to help, financially, other groups and charities in the village. During the past year we have donated almost £5000 towards good causes such as the local food bank, library users' group, horticultural society, village golf centre and luncheon clubs for the elderly and disabled.

Staplehurst Footpath group

The Staplehurst Footpath Group continued its programme of walks following its successful re-start in October 2021 after Covid restrictions were eased. For the time being, we are basing our walks on start points around Staplehurst or the surrounding villages.

The numbers on walks varied but usually about ten set out on the walks during 2022. The exceptionally hot weather during the summer was followed by a wet autumn and winter, with the Staplehurst mud making its presence very much felt on recent walks.

What has been pleasing in recent months is a flurry of new members, with numbers of walkers now in the high teens. It would be nice to attract in some younger walkers to build the group for the future.

One sad event was the loss of a recent member, Liz Davis, to illness in the latter part of last year.

Our walks take place on the second Sunday each month and are advertised in the Parish magazine, on local Facebook pages as well as our own page on there and on posters around the village. We would welcome new walkers of any age; most walks are four to five miles in length. However, we do not permit dogs as we often walk through fields with livestock.

Staplehurst Free Church

Our social, health and wellbeing activities have continued to expand alongside our usual services. The building is now in use every day of the week as follows: -

- Mondays – Debt Advice Centre, Men's Walking Group, Signing Group, SFC Choir
- Tuesdays – Friends Together, Winter Warmer, Community Fridge, Home Groups (off

site)

- Wednesdays – Prayer Meeting, Community Fridge, Home Groups (off site)
- Thursdays – FreeBees, Community Fridge, Mixed Badminton
- Fridays – Interest Group, Ladies Badminton, Worship Group Rehearsals
- Saturdays – Community Fridge, Leadership Meetings, Social Events
- Sundays – Church Services, Sharing Lunches and Social Events (occasional)

Key developments in the year have been as follows:

- In person attendance at Church services continued to increase. Online broadcasting, has also been maintained.
- A new 'Signing Group' started, being held periodically on Monday afternoons. These sessions help people develop their sign language skills in an informal and encouraging setting.
- The Community Fridge was launched as part of the Shepherd's Pantry portfolio a food-insecurity community support programme started during the Covid pandemic. to reclaim food from retailers and suppliers that would otherwise go to waste, or is surplus to their requirements, and make this available to the general public, particularly those in financial hardship at no cost. The Fridge is open at certain times over 4 days a week with a newly formed team now comprising over 20 volunteers collecting food, undertaking stock control and welcoming and informally supporting visitors.
- The Winter Warm Rooms were set up. This is a collaborative venture, coordinated by the Parish Council, facilitating several community organisations including SFC to open up their premises to local people and providing warmth and refreshments if they are having financial difficulty in maintaining heat in their own homes.
- A themed church service and community lunch were organised to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee and these were well attended.
- A multi-day 'Walk Through the Bible' educational event was organised in September and very well attended and received.
- The FreeBees support sessions for new parents has become increasingly popular such that two groups now operate on Thursday mornings and afternoons and a waiting list is having to operate; places do get freed up as parents return to work so over time, we are able to provide support to many who benefit from the help and encouragement given by the sessions hosts and other parents with shared experiences.
- A training programme called the 'Emmaus Project' being a new coordinated programme of community engagement events began and will continue over the next year.

One of the cornerstone activities of the Church is providing financial support for a variety of third-party charitable organisation and we are pleased to be able to report we have sustained this activity through the continuous generous donations of our members and regular attendees. In addition, the Church once again supported and acted as a "dropping off point" for shoeboxes filled with toys as part of Samaritan Purse's Operation Christmas Child Appeal. Rent-free office space and funding support was also provided to Staplehurst's Debt Advice Centre.

Staplehurst Horticultural Society

2022 represented a return to “normality” post-Covid for the Society. We were able to enjoy our full range of events from our monthly evening meetings and talks to a range of other events.

The year's highlight was probably our coach trip to RHS Hyde Hall in Essex. The site is outstanding, the weather was magnificent and even the coach trip was trouble-free, with no M25 issues!

Fund raising activities included our annual plant sale, again conducted around the village at a few members' gardens. This format has proved very successful and enables a greater interaction with the general public than our previous format at the Village Centre. Our Quiz again proved very popular with villagers at large; there seems to be a fixation in winning the booby prize! Our Christmas Dinner at Newnham Court was rather poorly supported, unlike our summer members' barbecue which proves very popular, with over 40 guests having a splendid time.

Our membership is rising slightly and has more than recovered the slight dip resulting from the interruption of Covid and includes several younger members which is most welcome.

All in all, there is a much-improved sense of camaraderie within the membership and a sense that all is well with the Society!

As ever, thanks to all who all who have contributed with especial thanks to the members of the Management Committee.

McCabe Day Centre Report on Lunch Clubs

The Lunch Clubs at McCabe Day Centre provide lunch for McCabe Day Centre residents and Staplehurst residents over the age of 60.

The Thursday Lunch Club meets at the McCabe Day Centre every week, except for a short break at Christmas and during August to mid September.

We offer a freshly cooked two-course meal with tea and coffee for £4, which includes a raffle. In addition to enjoying the food it is a good opportunity for the members to meet and chat together.

Transport is available for those less able at a cost of £2, which goes towards the hire of the Weald Club for the Disabled minibus.

Once a month we also offer Sunday lunch, usually on the second Sunday of the month. This is always a roast dinner with all the trimmings plus dessert and tea and coffee for £5, which again includes a raffle.

We enjoy an annual coach outing to Eastbourne in the summer, usually on the last Thursday in July. This has become very popular, our members enjoy strolling along the promenade, doing a bit of shopping, often having a fish and chips lunch and even an ice cream! We also provide a special Christmas lunch with festive food and organize parties to celebrate special events like the Queen's Jubilee and are planning one for the Coronation. We are extremely grateful to the Staplehurst Community Events Group for their contribution towards these extra social events.

Our Annual General Meeting is held in September and all people interested in the work of the Day Centre are welcome to attend.

All the cooks and helpers at our lunch clubs are volunteers and we aim to provide a happy, cheerful time for everyone.

Staplehurst Monarchs FC Report

This season was the second in the Southern Counties East Football League for the Men's First Team, and saw a new management team take over. Results have been mixed (not just for us, but across the whole league!) but we had some fantastic wins, including a 5-0 win over Premier Division Canterbury, 3 wins against Lydd who have since been promoted to the SCEFL Prem, and a good run in the SCEFL Challenge Cup. We also were chosen to be part of the inaugural SCEFL Groundhop Weekend, which saw over 330 people visit the Jubilee to see us beat Rochester 1-0.

We also entered the SCEFL Development League, a brand new league for this season, which aims to bridge the gap between senior and junior football. The standard was incredibly high, with teams from Sheppey Utd, Tunbridge Wells and Erith & Belvedere to name a few. Using a mix of experienced and new players, and drawing from the incredible talent of the junior section, we have competed well and currently sit 9th in the league with 5 games to go.

Our attendances have grown, with us averaging over 100 per game. We strive to become a community club, working closely with local businesses, charities and people. We attended the Remembrance Parade to lay a wreath on behalf of the whole club, and have made several donations to the Shepherd's Pantry. We have also been able to support a local lad, Owen West, with his charity fundraising and look forward to continuing this next season.

Excitingly, we are thrilled to have the first ever Women's team at Staplehurst Monarchs. A small group of women met for fitness training last summer, and have worked hard through the winter months, being joined by some of our junior girls who are ready for the challenge of senior football. The SCEG kindly sponsored their training shirts, and Frankie's Farm shop their kit, and we are now looking forward to pre-season friendlies before they enter the South East Counties Women's Football League next season.

The Parish Council and JFMC kindly allowed us to use the kitchen at the Nigel Best Pavilion after several break ins resulted in us losing our catering van. This has helped us immensely and we serve matchday food for both senior and junior matchdays which is all locally sourced.

Our aspirations for next season are high. We know there are challenges ahead but we are excited by what the season will bring. We would like to thank everyone who has been part of our journey this season – all the supporters, the local businesses who sponsor us, the Parish Council and JFMC for all their help, the committee and volunteers who work tirelessly for free, and all the players. We look forward to welcoming everyone back soon!

Staplehurst Monarchs Youth FC – Progress Report Season 2022/23

During the current season we have had 20 teams ranging from U8s to U18s. These included 5 girls' teams at U9s/U10s/U12s/U14s and U16s. We have also continued to run a player development group 'Mini Monarchs' for younger children (U6s and U7s). We have approximately 300 young people registered to play for us which is consistent with the previous season, something we are extremely proud of.

The 'icing on the cake' has been the on-field achievements of some of our teams in the past season, notably:

- Cup finals for the U8s, U9 Royals, U11s and U13s
- U13s Kent Plate semi-finalists up against teams from Folkestone, Orpington and Maidstone (all with huge catchment areas for players)
- U17s league winners
- U18s 6v6 league winners (Another new venture for us)

During the spring and summer, we have operated 'Wildcats' for girls between the ages of 5 and 11 to try football in a fun environment. A development for last summer was 'Squad Girls' which is aimed at older girls. Both groups have been successful and has led, particularly with the younger ones, to girls registering to play for our teams. Both groups have restarted this April.

We added to our bank of referees by helping a number of players (Both boys and girls) to undertake the necessary training and nurturing their development thereafter. We currently have 4 girls who have trained with us.

We have also helped managers and coaches with their training and development. This is something we hope to continue with in coming seasons.

During the season we improved links with the senior club. Members of our hard-working management committee helped them in various ways on 'home' match days. We have also provided a number of players to both their U23s and even 1st team. We thank the U23s manager Jay Fuller (previously Lee Mackelden) for their encouragement of younger players.

Due to the large number of teams, we have continued to use an additional pitch at Staplehurst School. We believe this has generally worked well and we would like to use their pitch next season. Hiring the pitch helps to provide much needed additional income for the school. We would like to thank groundsmen Dean Fuller (Jubilee) and Bill Totterdell (Staplehurst School) who maintain all of our pitches, they've done a great job in extremely difficult circumstances during a very wet winter.

With the ongoing drainage problems at Jubilee Sports Field, we often need to source additional pitches during the winter months. As in previous years, we mainly hired pitches at The YMCA (Maidstone) and both South Park and Senacre.

Winter training for our teams is a real issue due to the aforementioned drainage problems at Jubilee. Our teams have to travel 'far and wide' to such places as Maidstone, Loose and Tenterden to find suitable facilities at some expense. The proposed 3G artificial surface at Jubilee would make a massive difference to us and help boost the local economy

The Monday Afternoon Chat Club

The Monday afternoon chat club continues to meet each week from 2 to 4pm at the McCabe Centre for local residents over 60 years of age.

The members, which number around 22 and 4 helpers enjoy games, quizzes, tea, biscuits, cake and occasionally a visit from a local group to entertain them.

Over the last year the group held an Easter bonnet competition with prizes for 1st, 2nd and 3rd places. Each member took home a lovely easter egg.

In June they celebrated the late Queens platinum jubilee with afternoon tea at the McCabe centre. A raffle of Royal themed prizes was held, with one member winning a hand knitted Queen.

We enjoyed a trip to the Weald of Kent for afternoon tea.

Sadly, the planned Christmas party was postponed due to the heavy snow that arrived very suddenly. The party eventually took place in January with each member taking home several gifts.

We have enjoyed visits from the Headcorn Ukulele band and also a local hand bell ringing group. The members were able to have a go at the hand bells, harder than it looks. One of our group members brought along his keyboard one afternoon and we enjoyed a singalong. We are always grateful for any local group to come along for a while to entertain our members.

Before Christmas the original committee made the difficult decision to stand down. Rita Game has been leading the club for over 10 years with help from Joan Buller, Ann Stephenson, Margaret Donnelly and Barbara Keel. They are now enjoying being members of the group. They certainly left big shoes to fill. A new committee has since been formed and we hope to continue the good work that Rita and her team started.

We are also grateful to Julie Franklin and Richard Swain who assist us with transport.

Poppy's Day Nursery & Poppy's Baby Care Unit 2023

Poppy's Day Nursery is OUTSTANDING

On 23rd February 2023 our Nursery at Headcorn Road was inspected by Ofsted and we have been graded as Outstanding in all areas with no recommendations. As we approach 15 years of providing "full day" childcare for Staplehurst and the surrounding area we are very proud of this grading, our achievements over the years, the staff teams both here and at our Baby Unit in the High Street.

To celebrate our 15 years and the Ofsted report we shall hold a garden party in the summer for staff, parents and the children.

Following our successful planning application last year our New Builds opened October 2022

- Our Staff training room and the children's new Sunflower Room.

Currently we have 27 members of staff, we employ Apprentices under the "Apprentice Scheme in Childcare" supported via Parenta. We have one volunteer who has been with us for over 10 years.

Last September 23 children moved to Primary Schools and we held a Graduation Ceremony at The Free Church for those children leaving, their parents and staff. This year 17 children will leave for Primary Schools.

We currently have 85 children registered mainly from Staplehurst and surrounding area. We have waiting lists for new children till 2024.

We continue to access KCC courses to develop staff in all areas of nursery care; this includes Safeguarding and SENCO Courses. We now have our own "in house" Paediatric

first aid trainer. All staff are trained in Paediatric First Aid and we can offer training to other settings.

We maintain links with the local Primary Schools, Pre-Schools, and Village Library. For our fundraising during the year we collected Xmas presents and delivered them to the Children's Ward at Pembury Hospital. We managed to raise £100 for Red Nose Day.
