We've taken a few months break from our newsletter updates but that does not mean that work has stopped!

After our successful harvest the vines lay dormant for a few weeks until pruning began in the new year.

Pruning is hugely important for the vines as with any plant, and will have a huge impact on the shape of the vines and success of this year's crop.

Next will be pulling out the unwanted growth before we tie down the canes ready for the next round of fruit.

We have been thrilled with the responses to our advert for staff and have excitedly welcomed several members of the local community who have enjoyed getting stuck into the pruning. We are still looking to take on more people though so do get in touch at info@nineoaks.com if you would like to get involved.

Away from the vineyard we have been finalising preparations for the release of our first wines from this year's harvest – a pinot noir rosé and a chardonnay which will be released in the spring. We visited our winemaker to taste the final product and we are excited to share it soon!

Lastly we have been working with Kent Wildlife Trust (KWT) to dig some scrapes and a small pond on an unused part of the land next to the vineyard to create a miniature wetlands feature, in order to encourage and support local flora and fauna.



Dogs on Leads

We have made the difficult decision to ask owners to keep dogs on leads across all the open areas of Hothfield Heathlands (grassland, heather, scrub). With national declines in our wildlife and increased numbers of visitors, we need to ensure there is still space for our wildlife to survive alongside us.

Dogs off leads are one of the biggest causes of wildlife disturbance. Ground nesting birds are particularly at risk, with 66% of these species in decline in the UK. Keeping dogs on short leads will benefit other wildlife that can be harmed or dis-

turbed by enthusiastic canines - from snakes to mammals to amphibians. It also

prevents problems with dogs chasing grazing livestock. Dogs can remain off lead (under control) through mature wooded areas, around the perimeter of the reserve. Birds nesting in wooded areas are less sensitive to dog disturbance.

The decline in wildlife across our country is reaching catastrophic levels, with your help we can make a difference to wildlife on our doorstep. Some birds start nesting surprisingly early in Spring. It's possible to spot birds foraging for material or flying with a beak full anywhere on the reserve just now. The nesting boxes for barn owls on the Extension were cleaned out earlier this year ready for this year's broods, the 30cm high pile of pellets and owl droppings giving some indication of how well used the box has been. Tawny owls will have their first clutch of eggs by the end of March, deep in a hole in a tree or occasionally in the old nest of a crow. Raising nestlings early in spring before plants grow tall and lush makes it easier for the owls to hunt the small rodents that the birds depend on. Rooks meanwhile were building their shaggy nests in February, sometimes stealing material from other nests in the rookery. The lining has to be soft to protect and insulate fragile eggs and nestlings, and rooks have been seen pulling hair off the back of the highland cattle. There's competition lower down the trees, as Nuthatches might take over a woodpecker's nest in a tree trunk, closing up the opening with mud so that it can only be used by nuthatches. They will produce their first of hopefully two broods in April.

Another early nester on the reserve is the blackbird, which, weather permitting, will raise two or even three broods in the same nest, starting in early March. The female may take two weeks to construct the nest, low down and out of sight. She collects grass, small twigs, straw and other plant material and lines it with mud then fine grass. Long-tailed tits started building in February and might take three weeks to complete their beautiful barrel-shaped nests. Moss and wool are camouflaged on the outside with myriad flakes of lichen held together with silk from spider egg cocoons and lined with feather down. They probably won't lay eggs until April.

The significance of the low scrub and heathland habitats on Hothfield Heathlands for a large number of British nesting birds is huge, as over half of British breeding birds nest on or near the ground and rely on precisely the habitats provided by this reserve to protect first eggs, and then flightless ever-hungry nestlings. This spring and summer we hope wil-

> low warblers, yellowhammers, chiffchaffs, tree pipit, linnets and who knows, perhaps even the Dartford warbler or nightjar will nest safely and successfully here.

> The early broods don't always need insects, worms or caterpillars. Linnets eat seed all year and feed their young with seed. They rely on early flowering plants such as dandelion, dock, groundsel, chickweed and shepherd's purse, which first provide nectar and pollen for forging early insects, then seed in May for hungry young birds. Something to bear in mind when weeding the garden, to leave some plants and some wild corners for wildlife, as shelter, nesting material or food, and avoid trimming hedges now until early Autumn.

Spring on the reserve brings the flutter and song of birds, the buzz of insects, the glimmer of early flowers and the glint of running water. Enjoy!

Remember, things will improve and get better in time.





What was happening in 1923?

100 years ago the Maidstone and District no.10 bus plied the route between Maidstone and Ashford, calling at Hothfield four times per weekday in each direction (three services on Sundays but only two services on Wednesdays).

That September Lord Hothfield was having one of the first auctions of parts of his local estate, including selling accommodation, buildings and land totalling 263 acres around Ashford, including Westwell and Bethersden. Many of the plots for sale were around Watercress Farm and Beaver Farm to the south of Ashford which was at that time a small market town. A few roads of terraced houses had been built off Beaver Road but there was almost nothing else south of the railway in 1923. Beaver Lane was a narrow track and Lord Hothfield owned nearly everything in the area. The area is now Beaver Green but was being sold as hop gardens, pasture and orchards, most with tenant farmers. There were woodlands for timber and it's recorded that the Postmaster General paid one shilling per telegraph pole on the land. The sales catalogue promotes the land as good for fruit culture, dairy farming and market gardening close to the town with its cattle market, with rights for hunting, shooting and fishing.


