

# INSPECTING YOUR TREES FOR DAMAGE

Trees are marvelously resilient and can resist attacks by fungi, predators and human activity. But if these are persistent or malicious, where perhaps deer eat the bark off the trunk, there is not much our poor tree can do. It begins to show signs of stress and may eventually die.

Provided an owner of a tree can show that he or she has "done what is reasonable" if faced with a claim for personal or property damage from a tree falling down, then any prosecution (for instance

under the Occupiers Liability Act) will be less likely to succeed.

So to comply, what should we look for on a regular basis? Let's start by investigating the crown of each tree. A good example of the problem is a diseased field maple perched rather precariously opposite our house on the verge of the Tunworth Road. Its boughs are just beginning to come into leaf but clearly there is a whole area in its middle that is dead. Fortunately the hazard has been noted by Hampshire Highways and the tree is destined to be felled.

I have drawn a diagram to illustrate other problems such as decay and weakness. Tree roots are usually found in the top 2 ft (60 cms) of soil. These can extend a long way from the base and they need air as well as water. Their enemies for a relatively quick death are disease and "the man-with-the-digger" who carelessly cuts into them during excavation. Slower deaths usually come from chemicals and from builder's rubble that tends to compact the roots. Bonfires under trees should be avoided as the branches above will dry out and crack. The presence of a fungus does not automatically mean the tree is doomed. A fungus can live quite benignly in a tree, which sets up barrier zones to contain it. When fungal spores meet fresh air they then fruit. Autumn is the best time to see various polypores, honey fungus and beef steaks – that I am told are delicious when cooked and eaten with shallots! Well done Lucy!

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

# Owens Farm Hook 'Illustrative MasterPlan'

17/00857/EIA Owens Farm, Newnham Road. Request for a Scoping Opinion



This application seeks approval for the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) required for 'Land at Owen's Farm' prior to a full planning application being submitted.

This will be a speculative application as Hart's Draft Local Plan site selection is to be published for consultation on 26th April and at last draft did not include 'West of Hook' sites.

The Environmental Impact Assessment Scoping Report is on the Hart Website.

'1.1 This report sets out a proposed scope and content of the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) to be carried out on behalf of Wilbur Developments Ltd for a residential led development on land at Owens Farm, Hook. The application site is located to the West of Hook and extends to 31.15 hectares. The proposed development, which is shown on the 'Illustrative Masterplan', comprises approx 750 dwellings, a primary school, local centre, playing fields, sports pitches and ecological area, together with associated access roads, car parking, pedestrian and cycle links and public open space.'

OLD HOUSE AT HOME

Dear Friends of the Old House at Home

Thank you for your continued support – and patience as so little apparently happened for so long. The latter it seems is partly down to us, the many responses submitted, and counter submissions by the Parish Council to every 'Addendum' submitted by Fluerets on behalf of Red Oak Taverns, so increasing the case officer's work load. As the agreed case expiry date passed, Red Oak Taverns were able to pre-empt a decision and go straight to Appeal on grounds of non-determination.

However the case officer has confirmed his report will recommend refusal and the BDBC Planning Department will support this recommendation at Appeal. This clearly correct but fantastic outcome is due in large part to the level of local support for the pub and opposition to the change of use. We will need please to continue to demonstrate this level of engagement and concern to the Inspector.

# **Public Hearing**

So suddenly wheels are moving forward. Everyone, who previously responded to the planning application, received a letter giving notice of the Appeal. With thanks to those quick enough to support the request for a public hearing, a second letter confirmed this and the date for further submissions which is now midnight 16th May.

Dale Ingram who is 'Planning for Pubs' continues to represent the Parish 'Council and has requested the hearing be held in the Clubroom. We should get to know the date a month in advance but the estimate is a Tuesday end of June to mid July. (NB this is an 'informal hearing' not a 'public inquiry'.) The venue will be up to the Inspector but it would apparently be unusual to reject a request for a local hearing.

#### CALL TO ALL TO MAKE FURTHER REPRESENTATION

The BDBC case officer will forward all the responses he originally received to the change of use application, including all Red Oak Taverns' documents and his own report, to the Inspector by 16th May. However, it is likely that Red Oak Taverns will seek to discredit the weight of previous opposition, given the time that has gone by. That this is now old news... people have lost interest, moved on... they're no longer concerned about the pub etc...



# CAMROSE DROP-IN CENTRE

It has been so encouraging during the weeks of Lent to take in, each week, a car boot full of tinned and dried foods, toiletries, blankets, sleeping bags and warm clothing for the homeless and needy people in Basingstoke. This generosity has come from our five Churches and Villages and we are most grateful.

The Camrose Drop-in Centre at the present time provides hot meals, and breakfast, twice a week for 30/35 people in Glebe Hall and of these people 20 are rough sleepers (sleeping on the streets) and a good number more are sofa-surfers. Basingstoke now has a greater number of rough sleepers than Winchester and this used not to be the case. Winchester now has a day dropin centre and a night shelter and the night shelter is purely for "dry" homeless people.

We will now be supporting the Food Bank but please be encouraged to continue giving warm clothing and bedding for the homeless in Basingstoke. Thank you.

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# From Alan Hoar, Reader, North Hampshire Downs Benefice

At the end of this month we shall have another opportunity to worship together as a Benefice, this time on Thursday May 25th at St Andrews, South Warnborough at 7.30pm when we celebrate the Feast of the Ascension.

The Ascension reminds us of the story of Jesus on the mountainside bidding farewell to his disciples before, as the Acts of the Apostles puts it, he was lifted up and a cloud took him out of their sight. This does not make Jesus the first Spaceman who is now out of our reach but it does locate him with God - God who lesus reveals to be not out there but at the very heart of life. At the same time, though, we still need the language of height to express how we

When I speak about God I instinctively want to speak about someone who is above me in all kinds of ways: - Above me in power, above me in morality, above me in love. One who was not seen to be above us in those ways would not,

It's important that we hold those three things; power, morality and love together in our thinking about God. For power unrestrained by morality and love is quite simply devilish. Power and morality without love can be harshly judgemental. Love without power and morality can lapse into a kind of vague benevolence along with which anything goes.

In what life do we see the perfect combination of power, morality and love if not in the life of Jesus the Christ? Christ in whose Ascension we celebrate the heavenly quality of a life which was affirmed as being the life of God through the events of the Crucifixion and Resurrection.

Christ who stands on the mountain and bids farewell to the disciples is wounded and the Ascension tells us that those wounds are taken into the very heart of God himself. If Jesus the Son of God coming to us affects our understanding of God then it is at least arguable that the taking up of Jesus the Son of Man into heaven affects the understanding of our humanity that is within God; so that, as it has been put, we have a friend in heaven. We all need friends who are above us in some way or another. Friends who whilst understanding us and loving us will not pander to our weaknesses or encourage us to wallow in our failings but rather help us to see ourselves as we can be and lift us up.
