

# **Police Report**

Dear Residents,

I am pleased to report an absence of reported crime in the parish, I am however aware of an event in which fireworks were set off in the late evening. Whilst there are no regulations for fireworks or when they can be let off, it may be wise if you are likely to have an event to just add something to the community pages or let neighbours know as I am aware that a dog went missing overnight having run away as the display began.

In nearby Ellisfield we had a shed broken into at the Allotments on June 2<sup>nd</sup> where a strimmer was stolen. A white Transit van with a registration number of 05.D.1144 was seen in the area, damage was also caused to a padlock and chain, also in the allotments area.

At Herriard we have recently had theft of garden ornaments; an ornate metal post box was stolen from a house alongside the A339 and a saddle stone top was also stolen the same night, also from a garden. Both were heavy so several men would have been required.

Across the area we have experienced several non-dwelling burglaries especially in the Lower Wield area where there have been thefts of garden equipment, strimmers, chainsaws etc. I urge all residents to please record serial numbers and model numbers and take photographs of expensive equipment for your records.

Together with our contractor Serco we are making some changes to waste, recycling and garden waste collections in the borough. From the week beginning **Monday 22 July 2019**, over half of the borough's households will see a change to the day, recycling week or the time their bin is collected. Most of our garden waste customers will also see a change. These changes are necessary to ensure the smooth running of the service both now and in the future. They will reduce the distances bin trucks are travelling, revise the routes to incorporate new homes in the area and simplify collections for some residents so their glass and recycling is collected on the same day. Most importantly, you will still receive a weekly waste collection and a fortnightly recycling collection.

Leaflets will be sent to all households during the first two weeks of July. These will contain details of your collection day, your new timetable and any additional information that may be relevant to your household. Information will also be available from 1st July at www.basingstoke.gov.uk/bin-changes New bin collection dates will start from Monday 22 July.

# Basingstoke and Deane Local Plan Review

The current Local Plan was adopted in May 2016 and covers the period 2011 to 2029. National guidance now promotes the concept of an ongoing cycle of plan making and review, which is reinforced by a legal requirement to review Plans every five years. Following an initial review, which considered recent changes to national planning policy, including the introduction of a new approach for assessing local housing need, BDBC has taken the decision to update the current adopted Local Plan.

## How Long Will it Take to Update the Local Plan?

The council is required to publish a Local Development Scheme (LDS) to set out which planning documents will be produced and when. The new LDS, is available to view on the council website at <u>https://www.basingstoke.gov.uk/LDS</u>.

The LDS includes a timetable for the production of the Local Plan Review.

#### Thursday 4 July "The Way" (2010)

The Way tells the story of one man's walk on the Camino De Santiago, It is a Spanish drama film directed, produced and written by Emilio Estevez and starring Martin Sheen, Deborah Kara Unger, James Nesbitt.

The film honours the Camino de Santiago and promotes the traditional pilgrimage. Estevez said he did not want the film to appeal to only one demographic, Emilio Estevez called the film "propeople, pro-life, not anti-anything".

Thursday 1 August "Becket" (1964) Starring Richard Burton, Peter O'Toole,

film adaptation of the play Becket or the Honour of God by Jean Anouilh. It was directed by Peter Glenville and produced by Hal B. Wallis. The screenplay was based on the play. Our wonderful Year 6 pupils completed their SATs tests. Fuelled by a hearty breakfast each day, they showed great composure and battled their way through the gruelling tests on Grammar, Spelling, Reading Comprehension and three Mathematics papers. We are proud of all the children for their hard work leading up to the tests and their positive attitude in trying their best.



#### Year 6 visit Gordon Brown Centre

On Friday 17th May, all of Year 6 went to the Gordon Brown centre to relax after their SATs week. We enjoyed three activities: low ropes, a team obstacle challenge and laser tag.

The low ropes were actually a series of challenges. As well as balancing on beams and wires, we had to build a bridge and work as a pair to cross a swing bridge. Then there was also a rock climbing frame and a cargo net. Just when we thought we were safe, Mrs Hussey kept swinging the cargo net to make it a thousand times harder!

After that, we went to the second obstacle course, where we got split into two teams -Team Alpha and Team Delta. We stayed in those teams for laser tag too. As we completed the obstacles, we were timed. By lunchtime, both teams had an equal amount of points, so it was all down to laser tag.

Laser tag was definitely our favourite event of the day. Everyone had to wear sensors on a hat, and carrying our laser guns we headed into the woods. We played two versions of laser tag: one where we had to capture all of the opposite team, and one where we had to guard the VIP.

We had an amazing time and when the Year 5s become Year 6s I would definitely recommend this trip to them.

#### Chestnut Class visit QMC Science Centre

On Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> May we visited Queen Mary's College, to learn more about out science topic: Plants and rocks.

When we arrived, we split into five groups and were allocated to an activity. We worked our way around each activity throughout the day and therefore experienced a range of

experiments connected to our topic.

The first activity was building our own flower using various materials. We had learnt all about the different parts of a flower during our science lessons and used this knowledge to build the flowers showing each individual part.


We then had an activity that showed us how water moves through a plant. We used microscopes to examine the stalk and petals of flowers after being in different coloured water for a few hours. We realised that only part of the petals and stem had taken on the colour from the water, giving them a stripped appearance.

Our final experiment connected to plants was looking at seed dispersal. We looked at many of the different ways in which plants disperse their seeds. We made our own winged seed and practiced scattering paper hole punch circles in front of a fan to see the effect that wind has on parachute seeds such as Dandelions.

We also had two experiments that looked into rocks. The first one looked at how rocks change within water. We had a range of rocks that we looked at to see if, when fully immersed in water, they changed. We discussed why absorbent rocks might not be useful for certain jobs such as building houses.

The second rock activity explored volcanic rocks. We looked at how rocks are formed when a volcano erupts. We explored Pumice and Basalt rocks and then completed an experiment making a model of pumice stone and basalt using baking powder and molten wax.

We had a really good day at QMC and learnt lots more about both plants and rocks.



#### Year 5 and 6 Hockey Tournament

Some of our year 5 and 6 children participated in a inter school hockey tournament at Down Grange. They played well against some difficult opposition. In the end they drew 2 matches, lost 2 and won 1. We were playing against much larger teams and had few chances to rest on a very hot afternoon, so they showed great fitness levels and determination.

We were very proud of how well they worked as a team and showed our school values.



#### KS1 visit Marwell Zoo

To enrich their Amazing Animals topic, the children of Willow and Beech Class enjoyed a fun-filled trip to Marwell Zoo.

The children enjoyed exploring the Zoo and identifying animals and their habitats. It was fun trying to spot where animals were camouflaged by their surroundings.

Willow Class enjoyed a ride on the land train and a highlight for Beech Class was listening to the monkeys singing in harmony.

It was a joy to see the children exploring, being inquisitive, asking lots of questions and also trying to find out the answers for themselves.



#### Year 5/6 Cricket Tournament

Our Year 5/6 cricket team enjoyed participating in the local schools cricket tournament at May's Bounty Cricket Club. Coached by Mr Barden, we were up against some strong opponents and although we were not successful in our games, our team showed great spirit, excellent teamwork, resilience and exceptional sporting values.
