Parish Council Updates

Tar Road travellers' site: As reported last month, three planning applications have been received by WODC for change of use for the land adjacent to B4449 Tar Road. There are plans for 8 family gypsy pitches with a site which accommodates 8 mobile homes, 8 utility/day rooms and 8 touring caravans. The Parish Council called an Extraordinary General Meeting on Tuesday 7 May to discuss developments, which was very well attended. Please write to or email WODC with your views. Message from Cllr Steve Good

I have recently been bothered by several planning applications referred for a decision to our Lowlands Planning Committee at WODC. As members of the Lowlands Planning Committee, there is a legally enforceable code of conduct with which we must abide at all times. Perhaps most importantly, we're required to keep an entirely open mind throughout the planning process and not to pre-judge any planning application until we have listened to all facts and heard all views. These include WODC Officers' professional opinions and recommendations, statements from applicants and professional agents, various statutory bodies, supporters and objectors, and our fellow Committee Members, as we debate the issues prior to casting our vote, without any political bias whatsoever.

Additionally, we're only allowed to take into consideration lawful planning issues and never allow non-planning issues, emotions, circumstances, or personal interests to influence our judgements. We may listen to all sides of any public debate, for example at a Parish Council, at the village hall, workplace, street corner, or pub, but we cannot contribute our own views at these times. Meanwhile, the public, pressure groups, applicants, their agents as well as County, Parish and District Councillors are entitled to lobby us, to write, email, and telephone to express their views, whilst we can say little in return.

As a result, we frequently find ourselves perhaps appearing 'aloof, or disinterested', which is anything but the truth. Indeed, it is very frustrating at times when the discussion is a 'red hot local topic' to have to stand back and project a 'No Comment' attitude. There is no limit on the lobbying undertaken in many newsworthy planning applications, nor, does it seem, on the amount of venom unleashed upon us by the 'losers' in many cases. Now you know what we're up against, please be understanding. Many thanks.

Sprouts from sprouts?

Woodstock farmer James Price has been explaining to West Oxfordshire residents about the importance of food waste recycling after reaping the benefits of using fertiliser created from leftovers. During the recycling process for the food waste collected from our doorsteps, gases are captured and turned into electricity, while the end product is a nutrient-rich fertiliser. After finding it to be very effective for oil seed rape, Mr Price plans to try it on wheat. Maybe, in due course, next Christmas's spare sprouts will launch the next generation!
