

HOTHFIELD HEATHLANDS IN OCTOBER.

Lots of work planned for the next few months.

Scrub Removal

With our Precious Peatland project, we will be carrying out lots of scrub removal from across the reserve. The most vigorous scrub species are birch and alder; adapted to grow very quickly from seed, they are the pioneer species that would pave the way for the site becoming a woodland.

Woodland is a very important habitat, and Kent Wildlife Trust manages thousands of acres of woodland across Kent. However, quality heathland and bog, the main habitats at Hothfield, are not found anywhere else in Kent. Losing this area to woodland would wipe out hundreds of species that would not survive under a canopy of trees.

The trees also have a further detrimental effect on the bogs, sucking up thousands of gallons of water, drying out the peatland. Once the bogs lose their moisture the peat dries up and the carbon stored for hundreds of years gets released back into the atmosphere.

There will be large excavators carrying out this work, so please keep a safe distance and follow the instructions on any signage.





Path Improvements

We will also be carrying out path improvements on the rest of the reserve, using sand to raise some of the muddier paths and making them easier to navigate over the winter. We will also be having a new boardwalk installed, but depending on ground conditions, that may wait until next year – watch this space.

Fencing works

We will be replacing some of the more dilapidated fences, making sure our cattle, ponies and sheep are safe and secure.

Volunteer Work

At the same time, our wonderful volunteers will be carrying on with the winter work across the reserve. Tree -popping birch from the heathland, repairing fences, building up dead hedges, fixing paths, looking after the livestock and all the other work that this tireless gang carry out.

The future King in Hothfield

Only a few months ago we were celebrating the Platinum Jubilee of our long-reigning Queen with a party in the Village Hall and various events at home and in the streets. Sadly, last month we witnessed the pomp and ceremony of her lying-in-state and funeral. Did you know that the King visited Hothfield in the summer of 1993? Of course, then he was Prince Charles and he was visiting the Heathland nature reserve with the Warden at that time. The Prince showed a keen interest in the good work that was under way to conserve and improve nature. Park Drive resident Ray Knight also presented the Prince with a sprig of pink geranium that the Prince popped into his buttonhole and wore for the rest of the visit.

More Vietnamese refugees have made contact

You might recall from previous Newsletters that we were contacted by Syd Doyle who helped to look after Vietnamese refugees in and around Hothfield in late 1979, and late last year one of the refugees made contact who thought that she could identify herself from one of the newspaper photos of that time.

Recently another refugee, Tommy, sent an email: "I think I'm one of the children who stayed in Hothfield with my family, but I don't have many photos of the place and just bits of childhood memories. Do you have any photos of the hospital building and surrounding area from that period? This should help confirm if I actually did stay there, as I do recall the building was next to a lake and a field with horses. Also, were you one of the team members who helped at the centre or know of anyone who was?"

I sent Tommy some images of the former Hothfield Hospital and also let him know that I wasn't a helper but I let him have the email addresses of a few that had contacted me (with their permission). He then provided more recollections of his time in our village: "I just about recognise the first one with the round water fountain as I remember there was a round pond somewhere near the main building, but my family did not stay in the main building. There was another shared single storey building which was more modest and not quite as grand where we and a few other families were housed, which was located at the far side just beside the large lake. I think they called our building Lakeside. I recall it take a good few minutes to walk from our building to the main building via a small path. Between the path on one side is a large field where they kept horses and on the other side is a dense woodland. I love the morning stroll along the path (which was filled with beautiful countryside wildlife), to the main building where we catch the school bus to take us to Hothfield School I think. My first school ever and it was such a wonderful experience even though I knew no English at the time. I think our building has been long demolished.

I have very fond memory of my short stay at Hothfield. It was one of the happiest childhood period of my life and I remain forever grateful to the team who have supported us during that time. They made huge effort to include us in the community as I have fun memories of the various events I've attended. I'm currently living in London with my wife and children. Actually I'm now intrigue and thinking of making a visit to Hothfield. After all these years and from looking at google earth, the whole place looks like it has been redeveloped and looks nothing like my childhood memory which is a shame. Anyhow it would be nice to be there and see it in person."

I'm grateful to Tommy for sharing his story, and I hope that he has been making contact with other refugees and some of the English helpers that supported them at Hothfield. Nine Oaks Vineyard October 2022

This month in the vineyard is all about harvest! We have been monitoring the sugar levels in the grapes, and we are ready to go. Just in case, we have been busily attempting to protect the grapes from pesky visiting birds with nets and kites.

We will be conducting our first harvest day on Sunday 25 September, with more due to take place most likely on Sunday 2 and Sunday 9 October. We would still love to hear from volunteers, so do email us on info@nine-oaks.co.uk if you'd like to join in.

We are anticipating harvesting around 4 tonnes of grapes, both chardonnay and pinot noir, which will go to make a traditional-method sparkling wine, a still chardonnay and a pinot noir rosé – the latter two hopefully being available from Spring 2023.

As always, we are very grateful to the members of the community who have supported us on our vineyard journey so far, and look forward to sharing the excitement of harvest with you.

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
