Good Neighbours

Now the nights have drawn in and the weather turned colder and along with COVID the cold and flu season is upon us. It is just as important to continue looking out for others now. If you have not seen your neighbours in a while, or you know they live alone or are a single parent, please find a way to say hello. You might be able to easily help them with something that they have been struggling with. Letting someone know we care can mean a great deal.

West Oxfordshire District Council (WODC) provision for residents who are struggling

This winter, vulnerable households in the District will receive support for food, energy and water bills. WODC has been allocated £131,730 to support residents who are struggling to make ends meet this winter as part of the recently launched government Household Support Fund.

The funding will be available through a number of different services to make sure the right support reaches those who need it; starting with individual support through Citizens Advice West Oxfordshire (CAWO), who will provide emergency vouchers and financial help towards food, fuel and other essential household costs, which launched in November.

The funds are not restricted to people in receipt of benefits and there are no requirements around recipients' employment status. Citizens Advice West Oxfordshire (CAWO) are overseeing the voucher scheme.

An opportunity to improve our environment

Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) has recognised the benefit of reduced speed limits in areas where motor vehicles mix with pedestrians and cyclists. Particularly the benefits such a change would afford to villages where there are limited and narrow footpaths, horse riders, dog walkers, children, and those with limited mobility all in close proximity to motor vehicles. OCC are therefore offering to help villages make the transition from 30mph zones to 20mph zones, where there is support from the community

There are recognised benefits from lowering the maximum speed from 30mph to 20mph:

- 1. Environmental 20mph limit reduces pollution by causing vehicles to travel at a more consistent speed, as acceleration and braking is the main cause of pollution and carbon emissions.
- 2. Health where widespread 20mph limits have been introduced, walking and cycling has increased because people feel safer to do so.
- 3. Safety should a collision occurs between a car and a pedestrian or cyclist at 20mph rather than 30mph it is far less likely to result in a fatality or serious injury.
- 4. Noise and Vibration reduction even a slight speed reduction reduces road noise and vibration.

Many Oxfordshire towns and villages are already embarking on this process as you may have seen in the Oxford Mail this week.

What are The Stanton Harcourt Parish Council doing about this offer from Oxfordshire County Council?

We are asking you for your views.

Would you like to see Stanton Harcourt and Sutton adopt a village wide 20mph zone?

- Hang bird feeders for hungry birds

Community Shop Questionnaire

A big thank you to everyone who filled in the questionnaires about the viability of a community village shop. The results/feedback was simultaneously encouraging, and discouraging. The overall desire for a village shop was overwhelming, but the problem is one of scale, and ambition. Many villagers want a big range of goods, with long opening hours which is going to be difficult to deliver. Also, many people have started shopping online since the pandemic. However most importantly the numbers of volunteers who said they were willing to work in such an enterprise was on the low side. There were 17 people who said they might be interested in volunteering, but we would need at a conservative estimate to tap into a body of 30 volunteers to make it viable and open the hours people said they wanted. 95 people said they would be willing to put in a £10 share, and several who would be willing to go on a steering committee. The problem seems to be scale, and number of willing volunteers. There are other opportunities for volunteering already in the village and planned in the near future, so watch this space. Thank you again for filling in our questionnaire... and maybe in time we might revisit the

In the meantime we are very grateful to the two shops within our village who seek to provide for the needs of the village. The village hall/post office opens for a short time daily to provide newspapers, magazines, sweets, birthday and Christmas cards and basic food provisions including bread, milk, and eggs. The post office services allow users to withdraw cash from their bank account and pay in cheques as well as pay bills and post parcels.

The Harcourt Arms provides a larger range of delicatessen type foods as well as some household goods and wine. They also offer take away coffee and baguettes. This store has more extended opening hours.

Both these stores are worth a regular visit and they both try hard to meet the needs of our community. Put simply, if we don't use the facilities we already have, we might lose them, which would be a terrible loss to the village.

Brandy Sour Cocktail

25ml lemon juice

1 maraschino cherry

serves 1

1 lemon slice to serve 15ml cherry syrup from the jar

Few drops Angustura bitters ½ egg white

50ml brandy ice

1. Tip the lemon juice, cherry syrup, bitters, egg white and brandy into a cocktail shaker with a large handful of ice. Shake until the outside of the shaker feels very cold. Double strain into a tumbler filled with ice.

2. Thread the lemon slice and cherry onto a cocktail stick, rest across the rim of the tumbler and serve.
