GREYWELL WWI PROJECT - RESEARCH



Can you help?

We need photos, memories and all kinds of information from WW1.

Greywell has recently been awarded a grant, following a successful bid to the World War One Heritage Lottery Fund, and we plan to use the money to organise a weekend commemoration event over 7th and 8th November (Remembrance Sunday) 2015.

Research has already begun into the lives and military records of the men from Greywell who went to serve their country in the Great War. As many local people will know, five of these men fell in the conflict, while many others returned safely to the Village. We need help to trace the histories of those men and the families they left behind on the 'Home Front'.

Can you help with any information? Are there any relatives or descendants still living in the district? Does anyone have photos, diaries, letters, medals, or memories of the men themselves? We are also keen to find pictures of the Village and Greywell people before WW1, school photos, cuttings, letters cards or maps.

If you would like to be involved in the research, or can offer anything to help, please contact Jules Stanley, Greywell Parish Clerk, telephone 701 624 or email julian.stanley2@btinternet.com.

The research will be compiled and added to the Village website for everyone to see and some of it presented by a historian and expert on the conflict during 'workshops' on the weekend of the commemoration event. Also planned is a living history event for children, on life for young soldiers serving in WWI.

We have commissioned a new memorial to the fallen from both World Wars and we plan to unveil this on Remembrance Sunday along with a special tribute to those lost in WWI, which has been designed and made from five 'Tower of London' poppies.

More details of the commemoration events will be circulated later. In the meantime we hope for your support and interest in the project research.

JETHRO GRIGG **GREYWELL PARISH CLERK 1881-1921**

Earlier this month, Ken and Brenda Griffiths from Somerset, visited Greywell to return a long lost treasure to the Village. They had been in touch with Jules Stanley, the current Clerk to Greywell Parish Council, some time before – and you may remember the story from last month's Villager.

Pictured below Jules accepts with thanks, the picture and citation on behalf of the Parish Council from Ken and Brenda. It was originally presented to Jethro Grigg by grateful Greywell residents in 1921, following his retirement from office after 40 years' service as Parish Clerk and lists the names of most of the villagers of the day.





Brenda bought the ornate frame and hand written scroll at a car boot sale in Middlesex many years ago, with the intention of reusing the frame. The picture had been stored away and forgotten until recently when it turned up again during a house move. Once again many thanks to Ken and Brenda Griffiths for getting in touch and returning this piece of history to the village.

ELECTORAL REVIEW OF HAMPSHIRE

See The Local Government Boundary Commission for England website at www.lgbce.org.uk/current-reviews/south-east/hampshire/hampshire-county-council Consultation ends 3rd August.

The Local Government Boundary Commission for England has launched an electoral review of Hampshire County Council with a Public Consultation on **Electoral Division Boundaries. Such** boundary reviews are required every 10 vears because of changing population patterns (due mostly to new housing).

The aim is to ensure that all County Councillors represent a roughly equal share of the electorate, a figure of presently 13,846 plus or minus 10%.

The Commission is indicating that the total number of County Councillors will remain at 78.

The Commission website says that: 'We also aim to ensure that the pattern of divisions reflects the interests and identities of local communities as well as promoting effective local government.'

Local Impact of the Review

In line with the above it is unlikely that any of the Villager Parishes will be affected by the Review - and no recommendations for change affecting our Parishes have been put forward to HCC's submission to the Commission.

County Cllr Jonathan Glen has however recommended that Odiham Division - to which Greywell belongs – be re-named Odiham & Hook to reflect the evolving settlement size and population balance.

Regarding the Divisions of Loddon (Basing and Chineham Wards – County Cllr Elaine Still) and the Candovers (County Cllr Anna McNair Scott), both are within the 10% tolerance in terms of numbers of electors. Also the Loddon and Candovers divisions as currently drawn are each wholly within their separate

Parliamentary constituencies (represented by MPs Maria Miller and Ranil Jayawardena respectively). It can be argued that keeping the current boundaries provides continuity for electors and avoids unnecessary disruption.

However the Boundary Commission is inviting everyone to give their views.

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



Falling Trees – a mid-summer as well as winter phenomenon

A large old Ash tree came down onto a cottage at the Barracks on Monday evening 22nd June.

The tree fell on the main roof and the single storey kitchen roof but no people or animals were harmed - the rabbit in his hutch emerged unscathed!

In this case the tree came from the railway embankment. Once the emergency Network Rail



The tree surgeons were excellent, friendly and very caring. Chainsaws were carefully working before and after midnight and having moved what they could they kept men on duty to mind the tree - which couldn't be left unattended.

The following day Network Rail sent the heavy lifting gear. By Wednesday the chainsaws wound down and the men were repairing fences.

Barracks residents report great community spirit with neighbours rallying around to advise, mind children and make tea.

The Network Rail emergency number will now be added to the Parish website and the Parish 'emergency plan' document which is being updated.

Where the trees don't come from the railway... on speaking to PC Reid the official procedure is ...

'In the event of a tree down if people call the 101 number for Police who pass it through to HCC Highways; police do attend if it is dangerous to traffic, eg a dark country lane, however we are not always able to and often controllers will not use resources when they have other commitments.' However Andy said it's never a problem to try to call him directly first...

'As a rule I have always found local people are extremely obliging, I am happy for you to call me as I have a local 'head based' directory of who can help and when and to be honest we can clear a road before the initial Council Supervisor attends to assess before calling a "team" out on overtime.

The bad winter before last, Andy arranged for the clearance of numberous fallen trees across Newnham Parish, aided by Richard Fouracre.

Although Andy is willing to be first port of call whether or not a pubic Highway is involved, where there is any potential risk from trees, keeping to hand the numbers of local tree surgeons prepared to be called out of hours is a good idea (and the recommendation from BDBC tree officers who also cite the Arboricultural Association website www.trees.org.uk).

As a charitable trust we have teamed up with our partner Radio Lollipop, who provide hospital radio for children across the world.

Together we believe in the healing power of music and play. One in four children are admitted to a hospital before reaching age 14 and although some patients have only a short stay, many have a recurring need for care. Some who are terminally ill will spend much of their short lives in hospital.

We are now working to ensure that every child who is admitted to one of the severe illness wards across the UK is given access to an iPad (or equivalent) for the duration of their stay. This will provide them with access to music-based creative play apps where they can create music, remix music, share music and interact directly with the Radio Lollipop broadcasts and the volunteer bedside carers.

Music has been proven to increase children's recovery rates as well as ease tension and fears. The apps will also enable children to safely access instant messaging and Facetime to help keep them directly in touch with their parents and carers.

To date and thanks to the work everyone has put in we have already committed £15,000 to the project. The LMT is also starting to provide 'hardship grants' to students who show incredible creative and musical talent but are unable to afford the privileges of good tuition and academic support for their talent.

Final consultation - SOLVE has made its views known in previous responses but commented briefly...

Whilst regretting that a further 100 hpa has to be found from Greenfield sites, SOLVE supports the Country Watch view that, given the evidence, BAS 133, Hounsome Fields, can be added to the site allocation.

Rowan Lodge Nursing Home

June was another busy month, we've enjoyed trips out, many walks in the village and taken full advantage of the good weather when we've received it!

All of us at Rowan thoroughly enjoyed the National Care Home Open Day and had a lovely turnout – with a nice BBQ to finish the day.

On Wednesday 1st July at 2pm we have Daphne from Comfort Clothing visiting with a display of summer clothes and Brantano shoes will be here with a variety of stock for sale also. Please do come along and have a browse.

After discussin with our residents and families, we have taken the decision to stop our monthly coffee morning/ afternoon due to decline in interest.

'We would remind all involved that the Flood Risk Sequential Testing found Hounsome Fields to have a low or nonexistent flood risk. Most sites to the East of Basingstoke in the Loddon Valley are high risk and not recommended for additional housing.'

Although the Revised Plan does not propose the large scale house building between Old Basing and Newnham originally suggested, there remain serious concerns about excessive housebuilding throughout the Borough. SOLVE shares the concern of many residents and Maria Miller MP that the massive hole in the budget (£190m shortfall in the February 2015 Infrastructure Plan) means that infrastructure will not be in place to support the housebuilding programme forced on Basingstoke by short-term National policies.

Basingstoke has been designated a 'Growth Hub' by the Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP) but is approaching full employment. A continued focus on growth can only come at the expense of drawing in new commuters and an increased population to the town.

The practical outcome will be thousands more houses, pressure on schools, increased traffic congestion, inadequate water/sewage provision and the loss of green space. Given the budget shortfall it is difficult to envisage how this growth will improve quality of life in the Borough.

POLICE **UPDATE**

Dear Residents,

Over the past few weeks we had reported a dog bite incident at Newnham which is

currently being investigated.

At The Hollies we had an assault and a public order incident reported, along with two units broken into at The Hatch Industrial Park back on May 5th.

We also had a theft and a theft from an unlocked vehicle reported, both in Nately Scures. I urge all car owners to please ensure your vehicle is locked and please remove the sat navs and other valuables from view, we have had hundreds of pounds of damage caused to a vehicle only for a cheap sat nav left in the window, and some insurance companies will refuse to pay out as the owner has not taken responsibility to protect their property.

I have recently carried out speed enforcement from 7am onwards in Newnham Road, Newnham. During these times I stopped five vehicles, two of which have been reported for the consideration of prosecuting them for travelling at excess speed, their speeds were 39mph and 38mph, the other motorists were warned, I am aware of the speeding issues in Newnham and in other villages; however along with the camera van and excellent support from the Parish Council, I can confirm that further enforcement will take place in Newnham and indeed in other areas.

NEWNHAM TRAFFIC CALMING

The plan remains to deploy a 'black box' to monitor traffic volume and speed (this usually takes place over a week) after the Black Dam works are completed, now scheduled for October.

Comment from PC while conducting speed checks...

'I watched the traffic that morning which I would deem as a normal morning. The majority of traffic was in or slightly over the the limit but insufficient for enforcement action, ie over 32/33 mph. The pinch points do work especially the one near Kingsbridge Copse, the problem is that some will drive faster to the point in order to get through before the approach of the on coming vehicle or speed away before slowing to get past it.

As always when the traffic is heavier it is slower, it is when there is light traffic that the speeders take their chances, from my records this appears to be true in the late afternoon, hence the higher recorded speeds when I carried out speed enforcement before. I am also aware that the Safety Camera van has visited Newnham and will endeavour to get the results from their visits.

In many cases (even my own on the odd occasion) there is a perception that traffic is travelling faster than it actually is...



OCH Befriending Service

We were delighted that the 22 volunteer Befrienders were recently all given Recognition Awards by Hart District Council's Chairman, as a measure of the value of the work undertaken by the service in their support of isolated and lonely

patients with long term medical conditions.

The success of the service has meant that it is being used as a model by Hampshire Hospital NHS

Trust who are launching their own, similar service based at Basingstoke Hospital.

121 Youth Counselling

Earlier this year the hospital trust agreed to provide funding for Hart Voluntary Action's youth counselling service in order for it to be expanded within the Hart area. Counselling sessions are now taking place at OCH and at St John's Church Hartley Wintney. This is a

DEFIBRILLATOR NEWS

The Parish Council is pleased to announce that the second Defibrillator has now been installed in the old red Phone Box by the Village Pond in Up Nately – the first having been installed at the Gamekeeper's Mapledurwell.

In the event of a suspected heart attack, whoever is with the patient should ring for an ambulance immediately. The emergency service will give the location of the nearest unit and will provide the access code to the Defibrillator. However leaving to get the Defibrillator can only be an option if the caller has someone with them, so one person can fetch the unit while the other stays and gives CPR chest compressions.

The design of the Defibrillator is such that training for its use isn't actually required. Instructions on the system are very clear and it is very simple to use. The training provided is aimed at explaining how to give CPR chest compressions and familiarising people with the system to make them feel less wary of it – and also spreading the word about the existence of the Defibrillators.

Following requests for further training on the Defibrillator and CPR we have arranged an additional session at 10am on Saturday 12 September in the Village Hall committee room.

Hello to everyone in the United Parish.

I last wrote this column exactly a year ago when I was just about to be ordained deacon and start work as

your curate alongside Jane. Where has the year gone? The past 12 months have just flown by as I've got to know many of you, shared some wonderful moments of fun and fellowship at village events, and of course have helped to lead worship at the many and varied services in our five beautiful churches. You've all made me feel so welcome, and my husband Lewis too. This has helped me settle into my new role so much more readily and for which I thank you from the bottom of my heart. As the saying goes, time flies when you're having fun!

Of course, this has also been a year of much learning. As valuable as my three years of training at theological college were, training 'on the job' is so much more enriching. I cannot stress enough just how fortunate I am to be working alongside and learning from Jane. Not only is Jane very experienced in ministry, she is also an amazing pedagogue. I'm so grateful to her for the time she gives me and for the wonderfully organised training plan we're working to. Katy is young enough to make bishop one day (go, Katy!). In 'compensation', I've recently acquired a purple car, a bit deeper in colour really than bishops' attire, but close enough! If you see me driving around and have time for a chat, please do stop me.
