Village Hall News

The Hall traditionally holds its AGM in March and whilst we held it last year by Zoom, this year we are planning to hold it in person again – so the **Hall AGM will be held 7:30pm, Tuesday 22**nd **March**. As always, this is open to the public – please do come along to hear what is going on at the Hall.

What can the Hall do to improve its green credentials? Probably quite a bit but the upfront costs can be prohibitive. So, prompted by a scheme launched by Hampshire County Council offering grants to make community buildings more energy efficient, the Hall is looking at how it can reduce its energy consumption and its carbon footprint on three fronts: the installation of solar panels and energy storage bank; replacement of all our draughty doors; and the installation of LED lighting. It is still early days but we are hoping that our application for funding assistance will be successful and that we can push ahead with our plans. More news in future newsletters...

Each year, Asda's charity, the Asda Foundation, gives £1million to local communities through their Green Token Giving, supporting thousands of local good causes. After a pause due to Covid restrictions, the in-store token voting scheme is being relaunched and the Hall is very pleased to have been chosen as one of the beneficiaries at our local Asda store in Brighton Hill. As reported last month, the Hall has a badminton court and equipment, a Cornilleau competition table tennis table and two folding snooker/pool tables that have not been used for a couple of years and are just gathering dust! So the Hall is looking for a volunteer to bring them back into use to bring people together, the whole point of the Hall. Friday afternoons and evenings are usually free at the Hall so how about you get a few friends, neighbours or family members together and start up an informal group where you can socialise or get some exercise. If exercise is not your thing then perhaps board games, cards, chess, play music, get some food in, entice a Hall Committee member to run a bar (we are licensed) or just have a laugh and chat together. Whilst on the subject of looking for volunteers, we are still very keen to welcome more people onto the Hall's management committee. It's just four meetings a year and after that how involved you get is really down to what skills you have and can bring to the team – at the moment it would be good to get a bit more safeguarding and technology skills onto the team. HAMPSHIRE CONSTABULARY is pleased to be able to share a new QR code for members of the local community to report crimes, information and anti-social behaviour. behaviour. You can still report an incident via the website link, calling 101 (or 999 if it is an emergency). Hampshire Constabulary would like to thank members of the local community for reporting incidents to us as it helps us build a picture of what is happening in your district.

POLICE UPDATE FROM PCSO ANDY JONES

Officers are investigating a number of reports of thefts from motor vehicles and have arrested a man.

Between Wednesday, 26 January and Wednesday 2 February, a number of vehicles were broken into in areas between Burghclere and Beacon Hill. Various items including number plates, Apple Airpods, handbags and clothing were stolen.

On Saturday, 5 February, officers arrested a 47-year-old man from Havant on suspicion of the following offences:

- Theft from a motor vehicle in Whitchurch between Wednesday 26, January and Wednesday, 2 February
- Theft from a motor vehicle in Micheldever, Wed 26 January
- Theft from a motor vehicle in East Stratton, Thur 27 January
- Theft from a motor vehicle in Dummer on Friday 28 January
- Three x theft from a motor vehicle at Beacon Hill on Saturday,
 29 January

Many other theft from vehicles that have occurred in the Upon Grey & Candovers Area – not to mention two other counties – are also being linked to the individual in question. As of the 15th February it was around 26 offences (but still potentially increasing) which are to be put before the suspect. He has been questioned by officers and released under investigation while enquiries continue.

HIGHWAYMEN IN AND AROUND BASINGSTOKE

Back in the 18thC the area around Basingstoke provided rich pickings for highwaymen. Basingstoke was an important staging point on the Western Post Road as well as being a significant market town – where it was possible to see who was likely to be leaving the town with money. The town was surrounded by copses and woods from which to spring an ambush, and steep hills that coaches and horses could only climb at walking pace.

Sometime in late 1724, three highway robbers visited Basingstoke market. They saw which farmers were making most money and found out where their farms were. Having decided where their best returns would be, they left the market towards nightfall and hid themselves in a wood by a narrow lane near Ellisfield (possibly at White Hill just south of Ellisfield) to lie in wait for the farmers to return home. There they robbed several farmers and tied them up to prevent them warning others.

One of the robbers told the farmers they were waiting to rob the fat farmer with the grey horse. One of the farmers replied that he would not be easily robbed. So when the fat farmer came into view, instead of telling him to 'stand and deliver', they fired at him without warning. Despite apparently being a large target, they narrowly missed him and he got away. The three robbers were brothers George and Richard Cutler – who also used the surname Miller – and John Winter. They were responsible for a number of highway robberies in the south of the county. One report said that the Cutlers 'belong'd to a Gang that had been guilty of several Murders'. 'They had lived by the Highway many Years.'

Before the main road to London was diverted across Hook Common in the 1780s, it passed through Newnham. The steep slope of Crown Lane made it an ideal spot for highwaymen to ambush their victims. Early in the morning of 17 October 1728, three highwaymen, two with long guns and one with a long stick, robbed several coaches coming from the west at Newnham Hill. They took £8 14s from the passengers in the Exeter Coach. In November 1747 a 'well-mounted highwayman' robbed a draper of four guineas 'on the Hills between Basingstoke and Newnham' as he was returning to London from Andover, and two highwaymen robbed a Quaker on Newnham Hill in November 1750. It is not known how many other robberies took place on that spot that were never reported in the newspapers.

THE HIGHWAY CODE: EIGHT CHANGES YOU NEED TO KNOW FROM 29TH JANUARY 2022

Rules for all types of road users have been updated in The Highway Code to improve the safety of people walking, cycling and riding horses.

1. Hierarchy of road users

2. People crossing at junctions

'When people are crossing or waiting to cross the road at a junction, other traffic should give way.'

3. Walking, cycling or riding in shared spaces

4. Cyclist positioning in the road

'To ride in the centre of their lane on quiet roads, in slower-moving traffic and at the approach to junctions or road narrowings • keeping at least 0.5 metres away from the kerb edge when riding on busy roads with vehicles moving faster than they are • Cyclists are asked to be aware of people driving behind them and allow them to overtake when it's safe to do so.'

DEADLINE REMOVED FOR RECORDING RIGHT OF WAY

Using historical evidence, it is possible to apply for long established paths – which are not official 'Rights of Way' – to be added to the 'definitive maps', giving them legal protection.

The Countryside and Rights of Way Act contained a provision that any pre-1949 paths must be recorded by 2026 in order to be legally recognised.

Government has removed the 2026 deadline, a move welcomed by the Open Space Society and the Ramblers which says it has identified 41,000 miles of missing 'Rights of Way' to be investigated and applied for in England as part of its 'Don't Lose Your Way' campaign. The Welsh government had previously repealed the cut-off date.

However DEFRA is also saying theat 'The Government will to take forward a package of measures in order to help enhance the way that rights of way are recorded and managed.

'As well as repealing the 2026 cut-off the Government plans to introduce a "right to apply" for landowners to divert or extinguish rights of way in certain circumstances.'

The Open Spaces Society has said it is concerned about the right to apply and will be lobbying against it.

5. Overtaking

You may cross a double-white line (if the road is clear) to overtake someone cycling or riding a horse if they are travelling at 10mph or less • People cycling may pass slower-moving or stationary traffic on their right or left.'

6. Cyclists at junctions

'When turning into or out of a side road, cyclists should give way to people crossing or waiting to cross.'

7. Roundabouts

'Drivers and motorcyclists should give priority to cyclists on roundabouts.'

8. Parking, charging, leaving vehicles

'Ten sections of The Highway Code have been updated, with 50 rules being added or updated. You can find a summary of all the changes in The Highway Code updates list on GOV.UK.

You can – read the full updated version free of charge on GOV.UK; download The Highway Code iOS app (£3.49) which will be updated with all the changes in Spring 2022 (an Android version is being developed); pre-order an updated hard copy online (£4.99), or buy at most high street bookshops from April 2022; plus sign up to get email alerts when the rules change.'

GREENING CAMPAIGN

We all know about the need to reverse climate change – we all have ownership of the measures we can or have time to take to reduce our carbon footprint. So why this campaign?

The Greening Campaign was started in Petersfield by Terena Plowright who wanted to make a difference in her own community. 'The Greening Campaign' is now a Community Interest Group with copyright for the support packages and logo. The Campaign has been run in villages and towns across England, and so this is a tested 'blueprint' to make the administration of the project simple, but also each community is part of a now officially recognised process. The thing about starting the The Greening Campaign is that it's about making a collective community committment. Which might seem inspirational? - or really not necessary?

According to the Greening Campaign... By running Phase 1 it will engage ALL the community. The community will feel involved, and this will result in larger numbers taking part in the following Phases.

THEN CAN THE CAMPAIGN MOVE ON 'TOGETHER' TO BIGGER CHANGES...





PHASE 1 **Engagement &** behaviour change

Using the specialist pack, get everyone in your community to join together and make 5 significant changes to their lifestyle. Find out how much CO2 you have all saved together!



PHASE 2 **Three Pillars**

Using the specialist support packs, work together in your community to protect your local environment, retrofit your homes, and support human health. From here you have the building blocks for a sustainable community.



Horticultural Society News for March 2022

Hello from Claire!

Sunshine, very little rain, light frosts, birds singing, grass (and weeds) still growing – have we missed a couple of months?????

All joking aside – the weather has been very pleasant, which means we'll probably be picking daffodils in the snow for the Spring Show, again!

The advantage of the early good weather is we can get out start prepping the garden for the coming growing season. Fallen leaves can be gathered and either added to the compost heap or taken to the recycle centre, roses pruned, and paths swept, weeded and neatly edged.

Remember to avoid walking on frosty grass as this damages the grass blades, and can cause brown footprints to appear, which will take some time to go.

February News From St Leonard's

You may already have heard of the flood disaster at St Leonard's due to a burst water pipe, when a tap became detached from a water supply in the vestry.

This flooded the vestry, cellar, and much more seriously, the organ was damaged in the deluge.

Without the heroic action of Ross Palmer, Gill Palmer, Val Gofton Salmond, Ban Maunder and Eamonn Harding, it could have been even worse.

We have now to manage the insurance claim. To date, we have had quotes for the organ restoration of £11,500 + VAT and also a firm recommendation we have it cleaned in areas where it was not damaged at an extra £10,500 plus VAT. We may have to try to fund this ourselves via fund raising and grant applications, but we need to wait and see.

Replacement of the vestry floor is estimated at £1,200 but we fear there is further damage to the floorboards.

The insurance company has appointed a very helpful loss adjuster, and we will need to appoint an architect to oversee the work.

The first stage is to have the cellar, vestry and cupboard dried professionally, since we need a drying certificate before work can start. This is already underway.

We may also need permission from the Diocese before the work can start.

This means the vestry and organ will be out of action for maybe three months when the work starts, unlikely before summer at the earliest.

One thing we have learned and may be good advice for others – it is important to know where the main stopcock is because it took us a long time to find it in the church, not that it would have stopped the burst and subsequent damage.

SURGERY UPDATE – February 2022

Not a lot to report this month as it's early days since Operose/CGH has taken full responsibility for the running of our surgery. Early troubles have been reported in the merging of the NHS computer systems during the first couple of days causing a little disruption, but they seem to have been sorted by mid-week. Comments online have mainly been centred around hoping that Beggarwood continues to provide a level of service that we have come to expect over the last 2 years and does not slide down to the level seemingly being experienced with the rest of the Operose/CGH group in this area.

The staffing levels at Beggarwood remain stable and we have been reassured by Operose that they will not be diluting this by spreading the Beggarwood staff around the other surgeries. We have also been informed that we will continue to operate as a separate enterprise from the rest of the group and not have to share the systems that prevail in the other surgeries, in particular the telephone appointment system. We will continue monitoring this situation and working with Operose over the forthcoming months and years to ensure that we don't slip back into the kind of situation we had with the late Cedar group before NHUC took over. We will also maintain a close relationship with the NHS Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) and our local councillors and MP to help us along the way.

Rumours

It has been brought to our attention that an article published in one of the local Parish Magazines has mentioned that Operose may attempt to operate an American style medical insurance practice within Beggarwood. This is NOT the case and certainly outside of the scope of their contract with the NHS. Operose will continue to provide a full NHS service at Beggarwood and the CGH surgeries as with all the previous providers.


Thursday 3 March "Guernsey Literary & Potato Peel Society", 2018, 124 mins, Cert 12
