Draft Parish Council Notes

Present at the Parish Council meeting held on Monday 21st January were Cllrs. S Harrod (Chairman), P Allen, G Harris, C Deacon, G Bennet and P Fewell, plus Tim Darch (Clerk) and one member of the public. Apologies were received in advance from Cllr W Fox (Vice-Chairman).

The minutes of the meeting of the Parish Council held on Monday 17th December 2018 were signed and approved as an accurate record of proceedings.

The County Councillor's monthly report was received and is available on the Parish Council website.

Planning applications

The following planning applications were considered:

P18/S4096/FUL (6 Thame Road Great Milton Oxford OX44 7HY). New detached dwelling.

There have been no objections from neighbours, and the Parish Council AGREED to FULLY SUPPORT this application.

P18/S4161/HH (Haddon, Lower End, Great Milton, Oxford OX44 7NL). First floor rear extension and internal alterations to provide additional bedroom, alterations to existing dormer window and external material alterations to rear ground floor. There have been no objections from neighbours, and the Parish Council AGREED to FULLY SUPPORT this application.

P18/S4178/HH (Brannock, Lower End, Great Milton, Oxford OX44 7NL).

Replacement garage, home workshop and store. Demolition of existing garage and stores. Subsequent amendment to increase size of garage, remove store and replace chimney with flue (chimney was replaced with a flue on request of SODCs case officer for the application). There have been no objections from neighbours, and the Parish Council AGREED to FULLY SUPPORT this application.

P18/S3555/FUL (Hughendon Motors, London Road, Milton Common). To note amendment: additional information and amended acoustic fencing plan amplified by responses to the local highway and planning authorities and noise technical note dated 19/12/2018 received 19 and 20 December 2018. The Parish Council AGREED to FULLY SUPPORT this application.

P19/S0011/FUL (Crofts Furlong Farm, Lower End, Great Milton). Alterations to part of the existing equestrian building to form stables. There have been no objections from neighbours, and the Parish Council AGREED to FULLY SUPPORT this application.

P19/S0013/FUL (Welcome Break Oxford, Thame Road, Waterstock). 34-space extension to existing HGV park and associated works. The Parish Council AGREED that it had NO OBJECTIONS to this application.

The following planning decisions were reviewed:

P18/S3645/FUL and P18/S3646/LB (Monkery Farm Church Road Great Milton OX44 7PB)

Conversion of a grade II listed barn into a dwelling (as amended by revised plans received 3 January 2019). Planning permission is GRANTED for this application.

Financial Resolutions

A full bank reconciliation was received and the latest bank statement signed. The reconciled bank balance as at 3 January was £28,617.40.

Parish Clerk's update of matters in hand

Drainage grips on Thame Road, Lower End, Sworford Lane and The Forties have been cleared and dug out. Most of the village's road markings have been re-lined (Lower End excepted: the Clerk will follow up on this if not actioned within a week or two). SODC has 'deep cleaned' the village's pavements. Litter-picking of Sworford Lane was also requested but this hasn't happened: the Clerk is investigating but at the

time of writing had received no explanation.

Other matters

The recent tree survey raised few concerns, recommending some trimming here and there. It was agreed to proceed with the required works.

A request has been received for the annual donation towards the Maple Tree Children's Centre's operating costs for the 2019-20 financial year. It was agreed to donate £500 in line with the amount budgeted. The Children's Centre was thanked for the benefit it gives to parents and children resident in Great Milton.

The final version of SODC's Local Plan 2034 has been published. The publicity period for comment is open from 7 January to 18 February: documents can be viewed and comments submitted at www.southoxon.gov.uk/newlocalplan. The Parish Council will submit its own consultation response in due course.

Difficulties with access to driveways caused by inconsiderate parking have been reported by residents living near to the school. A suggestion was made by a resident to erect posts to demarcate driveways from the rest of the greens: the Parish Council has no objection to this but would not be able to fund the provision and installation of posts. The Parish Council will discuss the potential to use the recreation ground for parking with the Recreation Ground committee, ideally by means of a school employee unlocking and relocking the gate before and after school arrival and departure times.

An e-mail has been received from Wheatley Parish Council suggesting co-operation with them and other communities potentially affected by Expressway corridor B3 should it be chosen, along with a proposal for a meeting for the benefit of those living in the vicinity of corridor B3. The Parish Council AGREED to respond positively to the suggestion of co-operation but to investigate further the nature of the cooperation proposed.

The Salvation Army has offered to provide a recycling 'hopper' for textiles, which would be placed on Parish Council land. A similar facility benefitting the Air Ambulance has recently arrived in the pub car park: the Parish Council agreed that another clothing hopper was probably more than the village needed. It was therefore AGREED to decline the Salvation Army's offer.

The next meeting of Great Milton Parish Council will be held on Monday 18th February starting at 7.30pm in The Pavilion.

Ramblings from the Rectory

Whilst this is to be published in February, as I write the New year is still very new and so nearly a whole year lies ahead with all the opportunities and challenges it will bring.

And there are challenges. It is no secret that all three church buildings are in need of substantial work to prevent degradation of the stonework. I have estimated that if everything were done to a standard that would our church architects have asked of us, between the three churches the total cost, simply to restore crumbing stonework would be well over a million pounds. As someone said to me, this is un-fun money!

Also, we are still looking further ahead to provide better facilities in the Churches, this has already started in Great Haseley with the inclusion of an excellent Kitchen and WC. We want to see the buildings better used.

I wonder what local people feel about this work? How important it is? Who should actually take the responsibility for paying for it?

One possible answer to the latter question will be 'the Church should take responsibility.' What do people mean by the 'the Church?' Is it the small local band of faithful worshippers who should keep the thing going? Might it be the wider Church of England? After all the Church of England is wealthy isn't it? 'You're always asking for money' is a familiar cry whenever we go public about church finances.

However, much of the wealth of the National Church is tied up in the very buildings that are increasingly becoming a burden, buildings such as ours. Of the other investments in the national church that generate an income, the money is put where it is considered to be most needed and that is to the poorest dioceses. None of it will come to rural churches in South Oxfordshire placed as we are in arguably one of the wealthiest parts of the country! What that means is that the local church, churches such as ours do not get a penny of outside financial help from the 'Church of England' to keep the whole thing going, absolutely nothing. Everything has to be raised by our own efforts and provided for by our own generosity. That includes the payment for people like me to be in post - whether or not that will remain to be justified in such small communities will be a question that will need to be asked - and also of course the maintenance and upkeep of our church buildings.

So let me return to the answer to that question who should be responsible for paying for it? The wider Church of England will not cough up a single penny. It is hoped that the main funding will be from grants and yes we will need to look at all of these. The Heritage Lottery Fund is perhaps the most substantial grant body. However, whilst there used to be a special category for 'places of worship' this has now stopped, Churches such as ours are having to compete alongside other heritage buildings for what we have been told is a depleting pot of money.

If we can't raise all the money from grants should it then be the sole responsibility for the small congregations to pay the difference? I will humbly suggest here that no it is not. I am now going to say something which some might find surprising, although I hope that it will in fact be obvious. We don't need ancient and beautiful historic buildings to worship God. Really! We don't. I don't deny that they provide a bit of atmosphere, but my faith is not dependent upon where I actually worship God, it is not in any way dependent upon stone and mortar. If it were it should be rightly said of me that I was totally missing the point. My faith, and why I do what I do, is in the living God, the God who in Jesus has come among us who has died for our sin, who has shared in the human experience of suffering and death but who is risen from the dead, and who is coming again. Of far greater importance than the buildings we

worship in is the message we proclaim to shape the world with the news of God's justice, of our common standing before God who loves us, broken and sinful as we all are. The truth is we don't need historic buildings for any of that. I think it could be rightly argued that the energy and efforts needed to keep our church buildings going actually get in the way of the essential message. When we meet together, why not hire a local school hall? It would be warmer and cheaper! Weddings, Funerals? Again, village halls - anywhere that people can congregate.

I don't think though that local people would want that and no we haven't got to that place. I suspect that most local people would want to see the churches remain open and usable for generations to come. I also fully accept that the church buildings are seen as a part of the fabric and landscape of the local village scene, and dare I suggest as sacred places for some. If that is the case however, then local people should rightly be a part in helping to resolve the problems we face with our degrading buildings. Again I say, the burden cannot wholly fall on the faithful few who pitch up on a Sunday to worship in these buildings, that is just not right. Preserving the Church building never was and never should be the primary message or priority of a worshipping christian community (please see above!)

We are of course enormously grateful for the efforts already given to maintain our churches, for instance with our parish fetes. However those alone will never come any way near what we have to do if we are to secure the buildings for future generations. We do have to look for people who can give to this, yes financially of course, but as importantly we are looking for those who have expertise and experience with the sort of fundraising we have to engage with to find a way forward. One or two are already doing that and again we are really grateful but if anyone reading this has a desire to help with this we would love to hear from you.

So a bit of a challenge then....

Thank you so much to all of those who helped with preparing our church for Christmas - the wonderful decorations, music, refreshments and contributions to the services. You will hear of other fundraising activities over the next couple of years to help us achieve this. Tony Sinnott kindly has painted a board to advertise how much we have raised and how much more we need for the Tower Restoration Fund. This will be erected in the churchyard so you can see how we are doing!

Any ideas for making our church relevant for our village and how to help preserve and develop the building for future generations would be greatly received.

A Pilot Scheme for a Car Service to Existing Bus Service 280

Eight people have agreed to be drivers for the scheme (see below), but more would be welcome! I also need someone to be a coordinator. Please think about it and get in touch with me if you can help.

The 280 bus from Oxford to Aylesbury stops close to the end of Sworford Lane, but too far from the village for most bus users to be able to access. A small group from Great Milton are proposing to set up a voluntary system of lifts to and from a Wheatley bus stop so that residents of Great Milton can access the 280 bus.

What we need:

- A group of volunteers prepared to use their own cars to drive bus users from their homes to a designated bus stop and/or collect from the same place. (It need not be the same driver for both journeys).
- Two 'contacts' who would be prepared to take phone calls and coordinate with the volunteers via a group email list.

How it would work.

Potential users of the scheme would ring or email one of the two contacts and say which bus they would like to catch AND which bus they would be returning on. At least 2 days' notice must be given.

The contact would circulate the details and find one or two people to make the journeys (clearly it will not always be possible for the same driver to do both journeys).

A small charge would be made to cover petrol costs (£2 per journey).

Users would complete a short registration process and agree to the following:

• The service would operate between 9am and 4pm Monday to Friday. As



it would be a pilot scheme to identify need, it would be easier to offer lifts only between 9 - 10 am, 12 - 1pm and 3 - 4 pm.

- The user is responsible for informing their driver if there is any change in the arrangement (e.g they miss the return bus or the bus is delayed.)
- The scheme should not be used for regular trips such as for going to work or shopping at Asda.
- Adequate notice must be given to the coordinator, Ideally a week, but a minimum
 of 48 hours.
- Initially the scheme would be open to users over 21 years of age. Users must be able to get in and out of the car and on and off the bus without assistance.

A pilot scheme will run from March to June, subject to volunteers and co-ordinators being forthcoming.

View from Views

As a "New Year" comment, I recently read the following, In 1787 Thomas Jefferson wrote to George Washington, "Agriculture is our wisest pursuit, because it will, in the end, contribute most to real wealth, good morals, and happiness", I think there are a lot of organizations and individuals who would do well to take note of this comment. How true the above statement is today 230 years later, as it is the stability that



agriculture gives to a community, can, and does, on its own provide, the environmental protection, wildlife conservation, biodiversity, soil management, and anti-pollution initiatives, to the best of its ability within the constraints of having to make a living. This is not to say we are successful, but in spite of public perception we are concerned and are trying to right the wrongs of our, and our Governments policies of the past, we do not though always get it right but we are trying and certainly doing our best. I must add that this message would come from most of the farming community but not all sadly.

Great News was announced on "New Year's Day" that we had successfully passed some space rock further into space than we have been before, this will tell us about the origins of our universe and that of our own planet. Then a couple of days later the Chinese announced that they had landed on the dark side of the moon. It seems to me that if all the pundits are right about climate change and pollution, if we do not spend similar amounts of money on these subjects, there will not be a planet earth, or the need to know the origins of, or worry about. We seem to be able to spend money on exciting high profile projects, ignoring more fundamental issues such as, care for our elderly, mending roads, local communications (both physical and on air/wire), or even run a sensible railway,(without building a brand new all singing and dancing one that no one wants). It is interesting to read that some MPs are seriously questioning HS2, if this could be stopped then that would release more for other projects like perhaps the existing Rail Network.

The countryside is very quiet at the moment, now we have past the Rubicon of the shortest day Christmas and New Year, we can look forward to spring bulbs bursting out all over birds getting on with what they do at this time of year, longer evenings and warmer weather. Whilst on the subject of the weather, in the last few years I have been keeping a few records (not that accurate but representative) of rain fall here at Views Farm, this shows the average per year has been 25.84 inches, with 2017 being 23.14 and last year 2018 being 21.84 in spite of the prolonged drought. I will repeat

what I eluded to in earlier comments that last year we survived last year's drought because the summers weather followed a wet cold spring and early summer, this was then followed but a very benign autumn the result of which is there does not seem, with the exception of Oil Seed Rape (OSR), a bad crop anywhere except a very few exceptional cases, this being due to ideal conditions at planting time. The problem here is that OSR, which has to be planted in August/September, this year it was very dry at this time, any cultivations done then made the conditions even drier, consequently a bad germination.

Whilst on the subject of OSR, I am always moaning about the damage the pigeons do during the winter, in the last months or so I have been commenting that we do not seem to be suffering this year. Although they have done a little damage it is nothing compared to previous years, why is this we ask ourselves, I really don't know the answer. Generally I don't think they have been a problem so far, I had been thinking it was that we had more ground cover than usual, (they don't like landing on covered ground) then it occur to me that the field we are growing it in always seems to have a buzzard or 2 in it, maybe one day we shall know. All my thoughts on the subject of these pests have been shattered, as I was about to believe that perhaps I had got to a situation where I knew how to control them. Sadly this is not the case as, I have been reliably informed that there is an abundance of beach masts, a great favorite of pigeons, in the Chilterns and that is where they all are. Unfortunately for the pigeon population because there is such concentration of them in one area they are infecting each other with some disease or other, as there appears to a lot of dead ones about. This of course could be nature's way of controlling numbers as there was really too many of them around. None the less it is an interesting subject. It is also amazing how the cold weather affects the OSR as every time we have a frost more of it seems to disappear, on inspection it is only shrinking it is all still there. We don't notice this in any other crops unless we get a prolonged cold spell like 1963, that's a different story. Now all my thoughts on what.

Having said all the above as I look out of the window today (mid Jan) suddenly I notice a few around the crops, let's hope they do not increase and that there is still some Beach masts left in the Chilterns.

John Howell MP writes...

I write as Parliament gets into full swing again and Brexit looks to dominate media attention once more. However, despite the obsession of the press and media with Brexit I am sure many will be relieved to know that there are several other serious parliamentary issues which are still being dealt with. This month I write to share some of the things not in the headlines but, I think, important.

Feedback suggests that Universal Credit is generally welcomed but I know that many people have been concerned with the implementation of it. I was pleased to see changes in the delivery and that with this the rollout remains on track. I have raised queries with Ministers and work with them as we move forward.

Oxfordshire Lowland Rescue Charity may not be a particularly well known charity but it does important work assisting the police in the search for vulnerable missing persons. I was delighted to learn of £11,883.60 new government funding awarded to Oxfordshire.

Although it is against the law to refuse access to someone with a Guide Dog, a survey by the charity found that three quarters of assistance dog owners reported that they experienced this problem. I was pleased to be able to support a recent event in Parliament run by the charity Guide Dogs to raise awareness of this discrimination and to learn of the impact of this on people.

I share the growing concerns at the increase in mental health problems, especially among young people, and am thus pleased that in Oxfordshire children and young people's mental health services are to be transformed as the county becomes one of 25 trailblazer areas across the country that puts the NHS and schools together to transform mental health care. This is welcome news of much needed support for young people.

Finally, you may like to know that Heathrow's consultation on the use of airspace and future operations has now opened and will run until 4th March 2019. This will provide the chance to contribute to Heathrow's plans for future airspace use and on their proposals for how the airport will operate.
