Dear all,

By the time this issue of the Honeypot is published, most of you will be aware of the news regarding my future ministry. At the end of June my family and I will be moving to Shrewsbury as I become the next Vicar of St Chad's and St Alkmund's.

This is not only a big move and change for me, but also for my family. Aisha's illness in the autumn of last year was a challenging and difficult time for us. It was during this time that we began asking questions about what is best for us as a family: from ministry to location.

Then God got involved in a very big way. An opportunity came, and it felt like a door was put in front of us. When God presents us with a door, we need to gently push. It might be that the door remains closed, and God is using the experience to help us discern His path for us further down the line. Or, it might be that the door opens, and God is wanting us to do something in the here and now.

The door opened. In fact, it felt like it flew open. More doors came in the following weeks and months. And each time, the door flew open. We began to realise that God really was calling us to follow this. We noticed things lining up in ways that were more than mere coincidences. From the deepest feelings both Aisha and I had independently from one another, to more explicit signals of God's plan for us as a family.

The culmination was being called for interview in March. After which, the Bishop of Shrewsbury offered me the position, which I accepted. The final door God had put in front of us had opened.

I would like to say a big thank you to all of you. Not only for your understanding about our move, and the reasons behind it, but also for the way Aisha and I have been welcomed as members of these communities over the last three years. We have witnessed kindness, generosity, a creative spirit and a real sense of fun. I have seen the Spirit of God at work in the hearts of those who love Him, and I have been truly amazed at your resilience and creativity as we emerged from the pandemic. We had to make quick and difficult decisions together, and each time we managed to keep smiles on our faces. Ministry here has taught me that people are incredibly resilient, that ordinary people are capable of extraordinary things, and that the love of God dwells in the deepest parts of all our hearts.

My final service with you will be at Rushbury church at 10 am on Sunday 25th June. I will leave thanking God for all that you have taught me, and thanking God for the opportunity to walk alongside you for a while, with the joy of His love in our hearts.

STRETTONDALE PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP **NEWS**

Last year the Church Stretton medical practice had considerable difficulty in recruiting additional reception and administrative staff. I am pleased to report that they have now succeeded. The practice is still very busy so please be patient when contacting them. The flu and Covid vaccination programme last autumn was considered a success but they will be looking into how to reduce the queuing time. Unfortunately many patients who went elsewhere for their Covid vaccination had their flu jabs at the same time. This resulted in the practice being left with quite a surplus of flu vaccines. The practice remains liable for the cost of any left over flu vaccines. It orders them about 14 months in advance, the number being based on the number of eligible patients. It would be helpful if patients had at least their flu vaccinations at the clinics organised by the practice.

Some hospital departments are suffering significant delays in dealing with referrals. Once a patient has been referred to hospital the practice is unable to advise on

anything specific and patients should contact the relevant department and/or consultant.

One of our committee members has joined the Joint Overview and Scrutiny Committee and reports back to us. This meets regularly with various providers of NHS care in Shropshire to learn of issues and possible solutions being considered. It appears that our medical practice is one of the more efficient ones in the area and appointment waiting times are below the national average.

We encourage patients to use our comments box in the surgery. Specific individual issues should be directed to the Practice Manager in writing. Social media is a useful medium for providing updates but please don't use it for complaints. All concerns raised are taken seriously and discussed during regular staff training sessions Alison Phillips (Chair)

Active Travel - Cycling and Walking

Shropshire Council has drawn up a draft 10 year Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan for Church Stretton and will be consulting on the draft documents from 17th April until 29th May 2023.

Although The Plan has been largely designed for "Church Stretton" it is just as relevant to householders who regularly travel into the town to use the services, visit the shops, for leisure activities etc.

Even the title is a bit of a mouthful, and this article is intended to help you understand a bit more about the issues.

The Benefits of Increasing Cycling and walking

Apedale residents are surrounded by opportunities for cycling and walking, but getting into Church Stretton on foot or by bicycle is never going to be the default mode of transport. However, if there is a greater proportion of travel in the more urban area, then everyone will benefit. Fewer cars in our towns means more space for pedestrians and cyclists.

Cycling and walking are currently deterred by a lack of safe routes, a lack of safe crossings of busy roads and inadequate footways and safe pedestrian spaces.

The government announced in 'Gear Change' in 2020 that they are determined to tackle this by providing better facilities for Cyclists. Narrow cycle lanes at the side of the road will no longer be supported. Pedestrians and cyclists will be given greater priority in sharing out the highway space. Facilities to encourage children to walk and cycle to school will also be provided.

Those general aims have been translated into the draft Plan for Church Stretton. We are very fortunate to be included as one of the Market Towns in Shropshire Council's Plans. The Plan is in effect a bid for funding from the Government as well outlining proposals for improvements for walkers and cyclists. There will be details in The Plans that lead to questions and issues that are currently not clear or need amendment. That is the nature of a draft drawn up for consultation.

There is much more detail in the Plan than can be covered in this short article. Stretton Climate Care will be putting on a workshop to enable the local community to discuss the Plan, probably on the evening of 22nd May and details will be announced on our web site, on Community matters, posters and social media.





Churches Count on Nature 2023

In 2021 we started Churches Count on Nature, working in partnership with the Church of England, the Church in Wales and A Rocha. The idea behind Churches Count on Nature is to encourage as many people as possible to visit, explore and enjoy their local churchyard, spotting wildlife and recording what they see. These records are then sent to Caring for God's Acre; via an online system such as iNaturalist or iRecord, by emailing us the list or by popping it in the post. These records then go to build up a picture of just how important churchyards are for biodiversity, information which we can then share more widely.



We decided to encourage all those involved with Churches Count on Nature to run some sort of nature spotting activity during Love Your Burial Ground week, a celebratory week which has been running for many years now involving those managing burial grounds of all types and denominations including our magnificent cemeteries. Many of you have taken part over the years and even more then joined in since 2021 via Churches Count on Nature. So far, we estimate that over 16,000 people have been involved in this initiative, some of them simply enjoying a visit to a beautiful and peaceful spot and listening to the bird song, others providing a full species list in Latin of the lichens and invertebrates they've found!

The good news is that we are running it all again from Saturday 3rd to Sunday 11th June, so please join in! To take part, have a look on our website for information and inspiration, plan your activity, register it with us and request your free Starter Guides plus a Field Studies Council fold-out chart. Visit our website page Be Involved or click HERE. Involvement can be very low key — a few friends listing wildflowers - or can be larger including perhaps your neighbouring school or Messy Church group. If you're unsure about what to do or who might be interested then start small, previous years feedback suggest that you may be pleasantly surprised at the level of local interest. We're hoping for a bumper year in 2023, perhaps the start of local action inspired by Sir David Attenborough and the Wild Isles television series?

LETTER FROM HEREFORD FOR MAY

I remember this time last year we were about to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee and the sense of excitement and joy at marking 70 years of her reign. Probably none of us could have imagined how quickly the national celebration was to be turned to national mourning as we marked her funeral so shortly afterwards. I was struck in the midst of a period of mourning we suddenly had a day of proclamation as King Charles was proclaimed as the new monarch and a new King took the throne. This month we will have the Coronation and very publicly, King Charles III will be crowned in Westminster Abbey with great pomp and ceremony. As a nation we seem to excel at these public state occasions and the Church of England and faith are at the heart of them. They are moments of national pride and celebration and this will be no different as we come together to mark the occasion.

As Christians it is right and proper that we should pay respect to those who rule over us but we should also remember that we belong to another Kingdom and our ultimate allegiance is to another King. In Jesus' trial before Pilate we see this tension between the kingdoms of our world and the Kingdom of God come into stark contrast. Jesus is specifically asked whether he is a King.

"So Pilate entered his headquarters again and called Jesus and said to him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" Jesus answered, "Do you say this of your own accord, or did others say it to you about me?" Pilate answered, "Am I a Jew? Your own nation and the chief priests have delivered you over to me. What have you done?" Jesus answered, "My kingdom is not of this world. If my kingdom were of this world, my servants would have been fighting, that I might not be delivered over to the Jews. But my kingdom is not from the world." Then Pilate said to him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this purpose I was born and for this purpose I have come into the world—to bear witness to the truth. Everyone who is of the truth listens to my voice."

John 18:33-38

Jesus makes the point to Pilate that his is not an earthly political kingdom but instead he is the King over and above all earthly realms and kingdoms. In our modern political world we do not any longer believe in the divine right of kings to rule over us but as people of faith we recognise that we follow an eternal King who will one day return to rule over our whole world. The writers of the New Testament recognised this and Paul in particular in his letters reminds us that as people of faith we are ambassadors of Jesus' Kingdom. Ambassadors are not citizens of the country they live in but representatives of another Kingdom. Our churches are in that sense embassies of the Kingdom of Heaven and we are its diplomats, pointing others to our kingdom and its values. Peter writing to the early church tells us that we are strangers and foreigners in this world because we have become citizens of another country. I particular like how the Message puts this:

"Friends, this world is not your home, so don't make yourselves too comfortable in it. Don't indulge yourself at the expense of your soul. Live an exemplary life in your neighbourhood so that your actions will refute their prejudices. Then they will be won over to God's side and be there to join in the celebration when Jesus arrives. "

1 Peter 2:11-12

As Christians we are called to a life of service and this will be mirrored in the Coronation, as the King will not only promise to rule his earthly nation but submit himself to the values of God's Kingdom. We too are called to joyfully serve our communities and one another. My prayer is that through the words of the Coronation service we might all be reminded to commit ourselves in Christian service to Jesus and to each other. We are reminded too that at Jesus name every knee will bow and every tongue will confess Him as lord.

"Therefore God also has highly exalted Him and given Him the name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of those in heaven, and of those on earth, and of those under the earth, and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father."

Philippians 2:9-11

As we celebrate the Coronation in our communities we pray.

Blessed are you, Lord Jesus, for as you were sent by the Father, so you send us. Equip Charles our King and all your people with the gifts to fulfil our calling, that we may love as you loved, serve as you served, and willingly follow wherever you lead. Blessed be God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.





From Rushbury Parish Council Old Chest 5

There have been four coronations since the establishment of Rushbury Parish Council but there is no evidence that anything was done to mark that of Edward VII in 1902. While we do not have the minutes, there are financial documents that show what the Council organised in 1937 and 1953 and a receipt relating to 1911.



The Coronation of George V Thursday 22 June 1911

The only document we have is a receipt from "Home Words" Publishing Office of London in the sum of 6s 3d (about 31pence) for 100 Coronation Souvenirs with Parish Title including postage. There is no record in the parish council financial statement and it could be that they were actually purchased by St Peter's Church and Rev J Jones who was the Rector as well as the Chairman of the Parish Council misfiled the receipt. There is no record of what the souvenirs were or who received them.

The Coronation of George VI Wednesday 12 May 1937

On the day of the coronation a pensioner's tea was organised, followed on 13 May by a tea for children. Mr Lewis of Old Post Office Stores, Church Stretton provided groceries at a cost of £2 11s 8d. In addition J Juckes & Sons of East Wall supplied 3lb 4oz (1446g) of beef to the value of 3s 3d. Today's value of the food purchased is difficult to calculate, allowing for inflation the cost would be about £140 but this does not take account of differential inflation of food prices. A trip to the cinema to see a film of the coronation was also organised. Mr Arthur Bolton (proprietor of the Royal Oak) charged £1 5s 0d for the hire of a coach for the return trip for a party to the Regal Cinema in Craven Arms where the seats were charged at £1 7s 0d. The Regal had opened in 1936 equipped with a British Talking Pictures sound system and screen of about 21ft (6.4m). It closed in 1971 and was demolished six years later. Twenty coronation beakers and 100 coronation services were purchased for the sum of 18s 2d including packaging from Wilding & Son of Castle Street, Shrewsbury. It is unknown who received the beakers; the services were presumably published copies of the order of service. It seems that the equivalent of about £300 was spent on celebrations and souvenirs.

The Coronation of Elizabeth II Tuesday 2 June 1953

Unlike for the 1937 coronation no receipts are extant but the Payments and Receipts Book does survive. This lists payments to the village hall of £1 7s 6d for hire and £1 10s 0d for decorations. An unspecified number of Coronation Spoons were purchased for £18 8s 10d but we do not know who received them. A television set was hired for the day costing £4 3s 3d. A sports event was held, prizes for which were purchased for £8. Insurance for the event was £1 5s 0d and duplication costs were 9s. A copper beech tree was purchased as a longer lasting reminder of the occasion for £2 2s 0d. It still stands outside the Village Hall but it is uncertain who actually planted it, recollections of local families differ. The total expenditure was £36 6s 7d equivalent to about £800 today. Donations towards the costs were received from six individuals in the sum of £5 9s 6d.




CHURCH STRETTON FIRST RESPONDERS NEED YOUR HELP URGENTLY

As a young child I always wanted to be involved with some form of nursing that would enable me to give something back to the local community. I qualified to become a First Responder 13 years ago and my husband is also qualified so we work as a team operating from home.

Emergency calls will be directed to ambulance crews and to us as back up. However, it is not unusual for us to arrive before the ambulance due to heavy demand upon the service. We are both qualified to attend category 1 calls that are life threatening and category 2 which are life changing.

It may surprise you to know that we are unpaid volunteers and can only exist thanks to financial support from within the community. Our current vehicle is unlikely to pass the next MOT and is not a viable proposition to attempt repairs with 160,000 miles on the clock.

We have yet to achieve funding for a replacement 4-wheel drive vehicle. In addition, we will need to find a further £2000 to cover new vehicle signage and insurance.

With your help we hope to continue providing a life saving service working in conjunction with our emergency services
