

The great outdoors

ABOUT 70 people met at Asham Wood, near Downhead, on a gloriously sunny Bank holiday Saturday to celebrate the beautiful ancient wood-

There were sessions run for
visitors in woodland crafts,
making bird boxes and bat
roosts, identifying bird calls,
Tai Chi, nature discovery
walks and charcoal making.

raise awareness of Asham
Wood and its importance for
wildlife with the many visitors. We very much appreciate

Visitors learnt about the
trees and plants of Asham
Wood, including hearing the
songs of woodland birds, on the
walks with professional coologist and wildlife enthusiast
Eve Tigwell, and Adel Avery
from the Somerset Bat Group.
Alex Arthur made a batch of
charcoal from hazel coppiced
in the wood, with many of the
visitors cutting the wood for
the oil-drum klin.

The Frome Men's Shed, supported by Frome Town Council made 100 kits of bird boxes and bat roosts for the event. Visitors were able to assemble these during their visit to Asham Wood and take away to install at home. Pete Gulliver ran this event for the Frome

Men's Shed. He said "We would normally have used battery operated screwdrivers to make the boxes up, but we didn't want the noise to disturb the wildlife". Pete, also a member of Frome Bat Care, provided visitors with fascinating information about bats in Somerset, including the importance of East Mendip for Greater horseshoes, and where to put the bat roosts and bird boxes.
